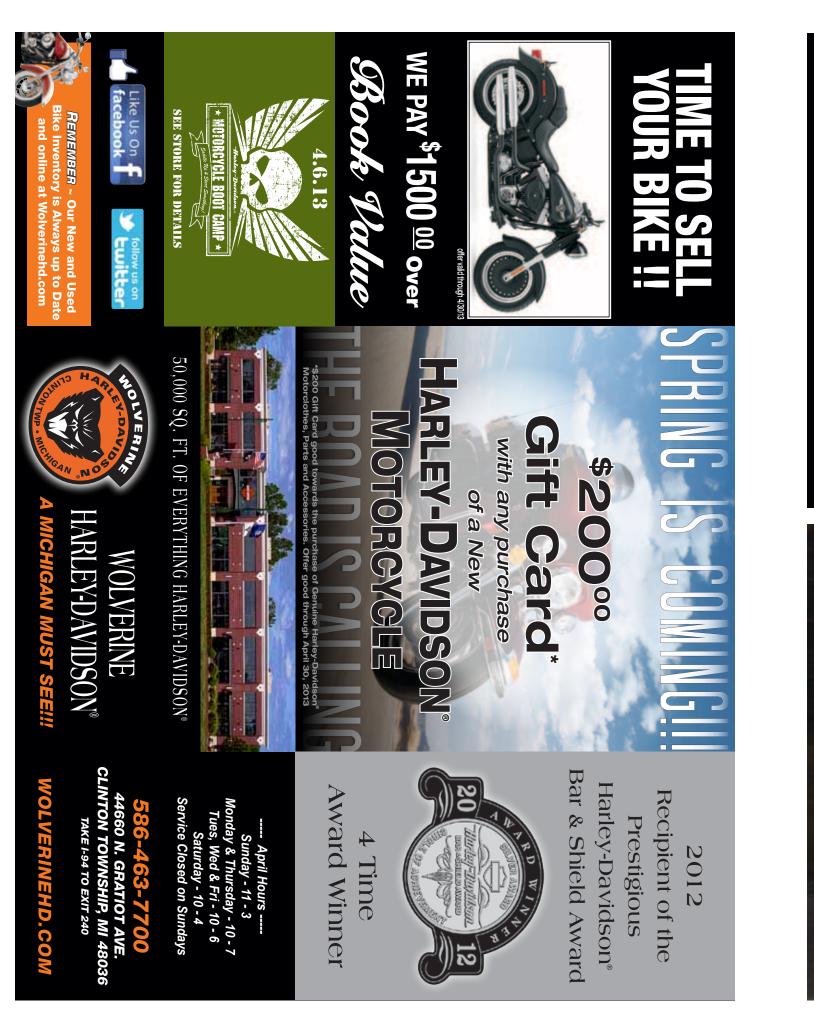
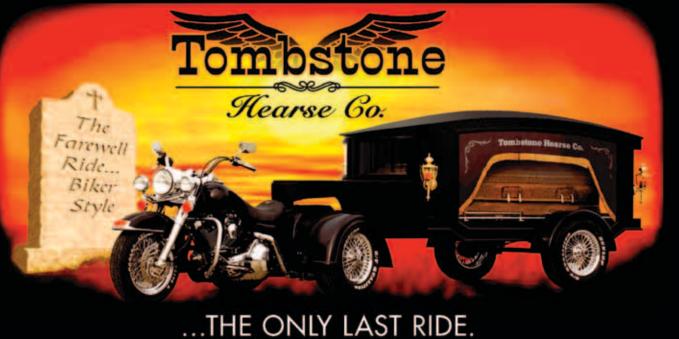

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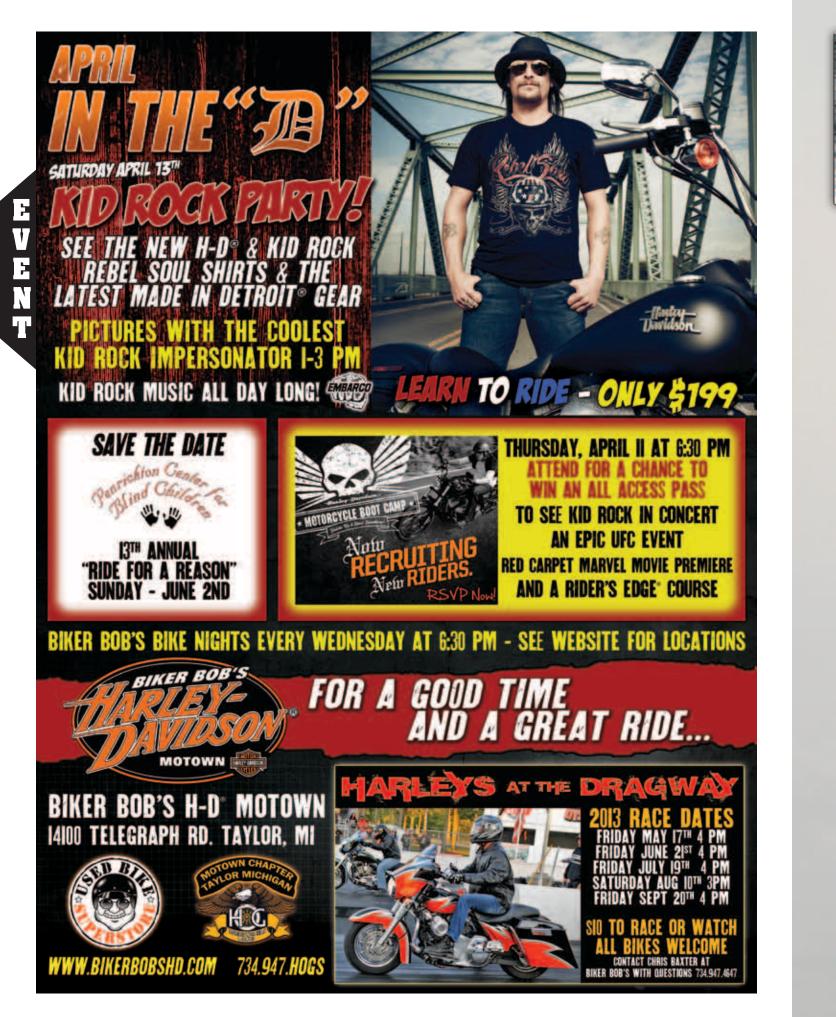
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Get Ready!

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The Motorcycle Lawyer on THE LAW Wire Highway Barriers: Cheese Graters for Motorcyclists

A highlight of my January was speaking with the Tri-County HOG chapter at Great Lakes Harley Davidson in Bay City, Michigan. After my speech about the present motorcycle laws in Michigan there was a question about the wire highway barriers that the state of Michigan is using now in greater frequency than they have in the past. That guestion prompted me to write about these barriers in this article.

What is a wire highway barrier? Also called median cable guardrail—it is comprised of cable rope made of steel wire that is mounted on posts that are driven into the ground. The idea is that the wire barrier prevents a vehicle that has left the roadway from striking another vehicle and creating a more dangerous situation. The barrier stops or reduces the speed of the impacting vehicle. It is usually installed in the grass between opposite traveling express ways. The barrier is meant to stop or deflect, say a car that left the road and was heading across the median and would hit another car in a head-on impact.

The Michigan Department of Transportation's information pamphlet entitled, "Cable Guardrail in Michigan, Making State Highways Safer" tells us that the increased use of wire highway barriers started in 2008 when Michigan installed 280 miles of cable guardrail at a cost of \$40 million. MDOT claims that cable barrier is the most cost-effective safety barrier available costing about \$13 per foot where this regular steel guardrail cost \$30 per foot and concrete barriers costing \$80.

MDOT expects the cable guardrail systems to save 13 lives and additionally prevent just over 50 injuries that incapacitate motorists. MDOT maintains that cross median crashes are more deadly, in fact, three times more deadly, than other freeway crashes. It suggests that the cable guardrail system is expected to reduce cross median crashes by approximately 90%.

However, the wire barriers have also caused damage. Newspaper reporter, Aaron Aupperlee of the Kalamazoo Gazette reported in his 2010 article that a Michigan State Police Sargent who was also an accident reconstructionist stated that the barriers have prevented three or more vehicles from crossing over the median and hitting on-coming traffic in slippery weather. However, he also reported there were many more crashes into the barriers from vehicles sliding off the roadway.

Impact to motorcycles: Certainly motorcyclists benefit from other vehicles being stopped from crossing the median and hitting them-the motorcyclist. But obviously the concern is that these wires present a more serious risk of severe injury and even death to a motorcyclist. Some motorcyclists refer to these wire rope barriers as "widow makers." I have heard talk that if a motorcyclist hit one of these barriers there would be a 'cheese-grater' effect.

Safety options are possible for the wire barriers. One includes covering areas of the wire rope with an impact-absorbing plastic.

Australia, Canada, Sweden, and other European countries have used the wire barriers longer than the USA. Rob Chadbourne of South Australia was guoted by another journalist as saying, "It needs to be covered with plastic or another material, so if motorcyclists do come off their bikes, instead of sliding through the wire, they slide along it."

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The only study I found on point on this issue was: MOTORCYCLE IMPACTS INTO ROADSIDE BARRIERS - REAL-WORLD ACCIDENT STUDIES, CRASH TESTS AND SIMULATIONS CARRIED OUT IN GERMANY AND AUSTRALIA by Berg, Rucker and Grzebieta, Zou Paper Number 05-0095.

Here is a relevant and interesting quote from it: Simulations of the wire rope barrier collisions showed that regardless of angle or speed it is unlikely that the motorcyclist will clear the barrier cleanly. In many cases the motorcyclist's extremities became caught between the wires. This results in the rider being subjected to high decelerations and high injury risk secondary to impacts with the road.

In all the simulated wire rope barrier collisions, the wires guided the motorcycle into the posts leading to heavy contact with the post. The motorcycle and the rider were subjected to large decelerations because of this snagging effect

This writer's research found that the State of Michigan has outweighed the cost of non-motorcycle vehicle benefit against potential motorcyclists harm. It decided against the motorcyclists-more wire barriers are being installed. They are on the rise.

I asked motorcycle safety instructor Gary Lewandowski about riding next to these wire guard rails. Gary advised that you should always have '360 degree awareness' which includes identifying hazards. He continued, "Part of safe riding involves having an escape route if and when a situation arises. Your escape route must factor in the wire guardrail as a very serious hazard. Every situation is different."

Perhaps expert Lewandowski's immediate utterance is tell-tale. Within five seconds of our conversation, I mentioned "wire guard rails." He interrupted and blurted out, "I just shutter when I see them."

Do you have a service-connected disability and need a vehicle modified to operate it?

Can a Veteran Receive Financial Assistance From VA to Purchase an Automobile?

Yes. Financial assistance, in the form of a grant, is available to purchase a new or used automobile (or other conveyance) to accommodate a veteran or service member with certain disabilities that resulted from an injury or disease incurred or aggravated during active military service. The grant may also be paid, if disabilities are a result of medical treatment, examination, vocational rehabilitation, or compensated work therapy provided by the Department of Veterans Affairs (VA).

The grant is paid directly to the seller of the automobile for the total price (up to \$18,900) of the automobile. The veteran or service member may only receive the automobile grant once in his/her lifetime.

What Disabilities Must You Have to Qualify for the Automobile Grant?

A veteran or service member must have one of the following disabilities to qualify for the automobile grant:

loss, or permanent loss of use, of one or both feet

· loss, or permanent loss of use, of one or both hands, or

· permanent impairment of vision in both eyes to a certain degree

Does VA Pay to Adapt a Vehicle?

Yes. Those qualified for the automobile grant, and veterans or service members with ankylosis (immobility of the joint) of one or both knees or hips resulting from an injury or disease incurred or aggravated by active military service may also qualify for the adaptive equipment grant.

Adaptive equipment includes, but is not limited to, power steering, power brakes, power windows, power seats, and special equipment necessary to assist the eligible person into and out of the vehicle. Contact should be made with your local VA medical center's Prosthetic Department prior to purchasing any equipment.

The adaptive equipment grant may be paid more than once, and it may be paid to either the seller or the veteran

How Can I Apply for an Automobile and/or Special Adaptive Equipment Grant?

You can apply for the automobile and/or the special adaptive equipment grant by completing VA Form 21-4502, Application for Automobile or Other Conveyance and Adaptive Equipment and submitting it to your local VA regional office. The instructions on the VA Form 21-4502 contain a list of adaptive equipment that has been pre-approved for particular disabilities.

Note: After you complete and submit Section I of the application, the VA will complete Section II and return the original to you. You are responsible for

obtaining the invoice from the seller, updating Section III, and submitting the form to your local VA regional office for payment.

If you are entitled to adaptive equipment only (i.e., service connected for ankylosis of knees or hips) you should complete VA Form 10-1394, Application for Adaptive Equipment - Motor Vehicle and submit it to your local VA medical center. Additionally, VA Form 10-1394 should be completed for approval of equipment not specified on the VA Form 21-4502.

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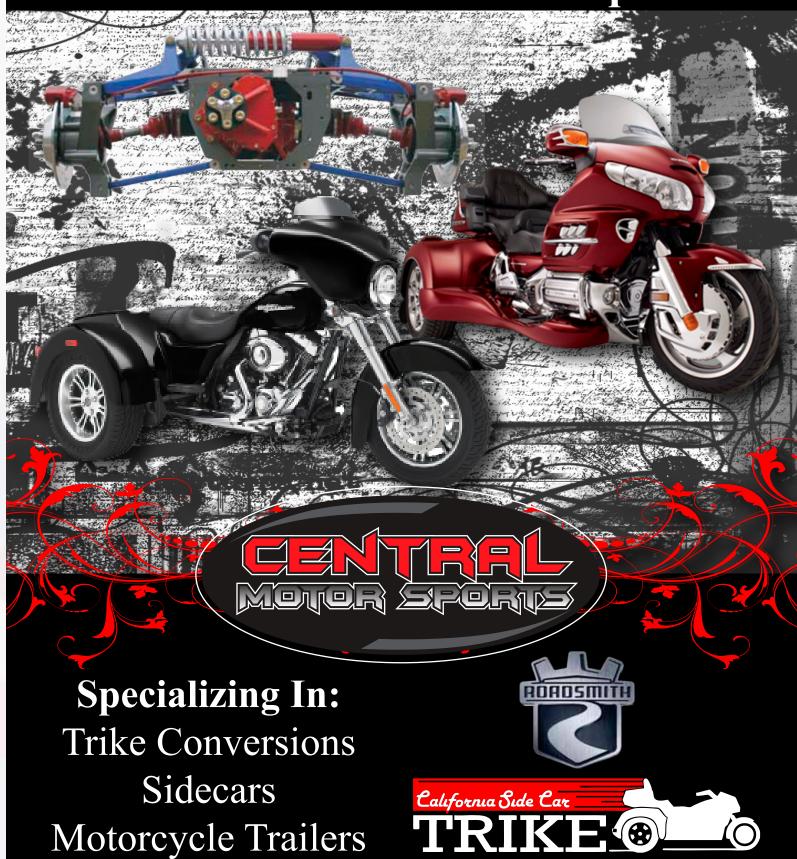

Picking A Line... Which one to use?

Imagine you're riding down a winding country two-lane. The sun is shining, the breeze is blowing and the ride is perfect. You stop for lunch or dinner in a oneintersection town at a Mom & Pop diner where Babs, the waitress with the beehive hairdo, calls everyone "Darlin" and knows everyone in town. I mean, that's why we ride, right? It certainly isn't so we can run up and down the superslab in traffic and go to the double-arches-have-it-your-way-choke-and-puke. It's the country roads, feeling the breeze, watching the countryside go by, small towns and the great people you meet along the way.

In Michigan, too many of our fellow riders are involved in single motorcycle accidents in curves. In fact, most of the single vehicle accidents involving motorcycles in the U.S. occur in a curve. We all know someone who had a crash where they went off the road in a curve. When you ask them what happened, they say something like, "I don't know." Or, "I was just going along and the next thing I know, I was in the ditch."

So, why did this happen and what can we do to help ourselves? Two things will make a great deal of difference; 1) Looking where you want to go, and; 2) Picking a good line.

Now when I talk about picking a line, I'm not referring to what you're going to use on the waitress with the beehive hair. She's probably heard it anyway. What I AM talking about is the path you're going to take to get through the curve.

The key to picking that good line? LOOK where you want TO GO in the road, not at what's around the edges. If you've ever noticed, when you turn your head to look at something, your bike tends to go that direction. C'mon, admit it. It happens all the time. Look at the scenery on the side of the road, and the bike goes to that side of the road. Look at the accident on the other side, the bike goes that direction too. The key to traveling through curves safely is to look where you want to go. If you look at the big tree right on the edge of the road while you're in the curve, there's a good possibility you're going to meet that big tree, and it might not be the meeting you want to have. That's why you have to look THROUGH the curve, past the big tree, to where you want to go.

There are basically three different kinds of curves you're going to encounter; constant radius, increasing radius and decreasing radius curves.

A constant radius curve, as the name implies, doesn't change from beginning to end. When we start learning to ride and learn about curves, we learn to follow an outside-inside-outside path. This path allows us to widen the curve as much as possible, which takes us close to the apex, or most inside point of the curve. This is one option. This path, however, may not always be the best or safest route through a curve, primarily because at the exit you can end up at or near the outside edge of the roadway; outside-inside-outside, right? In Michigan, that means potholes, cracked pavement, sand or gravel, or trees and brush and the eversuicidal Whitetail Deer. At the outside edge, you don't really have enough room, or safety margin, in case of trouble. You also may not be able to see through the curve far enough to alert yourself to road conditions or oncoming traffic. That leads us to our next option, which gives a better margin of safety.

When you enter a curve, most of the time you are able to see what's in front of you up to the apex or a little farther, but not generally what's at the end of the curve. If you wait a little longer and make your turn a little later, you are able to see farther into and through the curve which allows you to see and plan for any problems. In racing they call it a "late-apex" because the apex of the path you're taking is beyond, or later, than the actual apex in the road. They do it to increase speed (a discussion for another day), we do it to increase safety. By waiting to start the 18 THUNDER ROADS MAGAZINE APRIL 2013

curve, you create a situation where your path of travel causes you to exit the curve more in the middle of the lane rather than on the outside edge of the road. This can make a huge difference when the motorcycle-swallowing pothole you can't see at the start of the curve is on the edge of the road waiting for you at the end of it. By waiting just a little longer to start the curve, you are giving yourself more time to see farther through the curve, see the possible hazards and more space on the exit to avoid that pothole or some other hazard.

With an increasing radius curve, the curve starts out with one radius and gradually opens up becoming less and less of a curve. Because of the type of this curve, generally you can see much farther through this curve at the beginning than the other two. While you still want to look through the curve as far as possible, it is likely that the greatest hazard you will encounter with this type of curve is to get on the throttle too soon which will cause you to run wide on the exit, back to the edge, or to go too fast and run into a meeting with Deputy Dawg, neither of which is desirable. By looking as far through the curve as you can, you increase the distance you can see, giving yourself more time to react and space you have in the road in case there's a problem.

In a decreasing radius curve, the danger lies in the fact that the curve gets tighter the farther you get into it which can result in you ending up on the outside edge of the curve with no place to go except off the road. In Michigan, these are typically found on freeway exit ramps although they are also found on some of Michigan's more scenic roads. What I notice is that riders get into the curve and then try to compensate for the increasing tightness of the turn they didn't see by leaning the bike over farther. When they end up on the outside edge of the road where all the gravel and sand accumulate, and the bike is leaned hard over, they can lose traction and end up sliding into the curb or into the ditch. Not where we want to be.

By waiting a little longer to begin your curve, you allow yourself a longer sightline through the curve, giving yourself a "heads up" that the curve is going to tighten up. This allows you to make adjustments to your speed and line earlier to maintain your safety margin. In a decreasing radius curve you have to keep looking deep into the curve to where you want to be.

One more thing about curves: don't be too eager to get right up on the apex of the curve. Motorcycles lean. Your tires may be on the right side of the double-yellow, but if you're leaning, your head, shoulders and maybe a good part of the rest of you can be over the line. Cars and trucks lean to the outside of curves (your side of the road) and aren't very forgiving when they contact motorcycle riders.

By looking where you want to go and picking a good line through the curves in the road, you're more likely to end up at that Mom & Pop where you just might have a line that the waitress with the beehive hair hasn't heard. Now that could be interesting.

Wild Rose ~ Rose Leland







Wild Rose is a 1974 Harley-Davidson FLH. Her story begins in the early spring of 1998, when we were looking for a bike for my husband; a friend stated that he knew of a bike for sale that might fit. When the barn doors opened, we were surprised to see what used to be a dresser standing on flat tires, bent front end, covered with plastic, motor torn apart, rusted pitted and left to rot for the last four years. We couldn't leave her there as she needed to be on the road as Harley intended her to be 24 years before, so after \$5,500 and 4 crates of parts later she was on to her new life

From 70's brown to gloss black paint, new parts, engine work, lots of hours and six weeks later she was on the road, only to be taken out two weeks later when a 90 mph wind shear leveled our garage, leaving one handle bar sticking out of a window. A little more work, more new parts and again she was back on the road. My starter bike didn't make it out of the garage alive, so being sick of the FLH already my husband told me that if I could ride it I could have it, we took turns riding it that year and I found that we were a perfect fit. During a ride in early fall the engine blew and my husband then looked at me and said "Now you can really have it!"

We then turned the engine over to Ernie Dalrymple, who rebuilt it starting with the points and going all the way up to the heads. She was bored, and had a lot of new parts installed including a bigger Andrews cam and Keith Black pistons. While the engine rebuild was taking place I started designing a new paint scheme and made a list of what parts, accessories. envisioned for the new design. Over the next four years that vision appeared. From a hinged stock rear fender to a smooth fender, from a king/queen seat to LaPera King Cobra, from 8 spoke mag wheels to wire wheels to 5 spoke billet wheels. From 70's brown to gloss back to grey marble/pink tribal/ silver stemmed pink roses, from stock banana calipers to GMA clear anodized calipers. Changed from stock includes: Dyno Power rolled tip drag tailpipes, Super Glide battery, black controls, tail light that is shaped like the tribal graphics and is frenched in, lots of Kuryakyn accessories, smooth fender struts, floor boards, crash bars, turn signals, saddle bags, windshield, fender trim and accents.

Big Displacement and Head Work

With the completion of Stage One and Two, you now have our fine running machine that is sounding good and running like the factory would love for their bikes to run, however they are severely regulated by our government and the factory cannot do what they would love to do. The next step, if you choose, is to take the displacement up and get those heads breathing and venting, which does not necessarily mean we make the ports bigger either, ahh... a mystery.

Big bore kits are a common request for shops, a few years back when I was in high school the big deal was to take a Honda 750 and make it an 836, that was huge in the day, then the CBX came out and blew us all away, yeah my first street chopper was a Honda 750-Four, my friends, and it was a blast! It was actually my first street bike and I didn't intend to chop it, but a teen driver decided to run me over so my dad said it would be cool to chop it ... so with some help of an independent shop in north Lansing called Custom Cycles on East Street, I was on my way to build my first chopper ... and OK, a few years ago was 1978. I have to tell you I loved going into that shop, the owner was a great guy and he really helped me out, though he was a Harley guy, he loved my enthusiasm and imparted all kinds of wonderful wisdom upon me ... I chopped it chromed it and painted it black, then rode the crap out of it (so did my dad).

Today, riders are getting big inch bikes right out of the factory, however guys will be guys and, yup, we love more power! The easy way to get more inches is to put bigger pistons in. The second way to get more cubic inches is to change the stroke length. When you make the stroke longer, you are stroking the engine, hence the term stroker motor. In 2007, Harley did us a favor and took the 88 to a 96 by giving us a stroker right from the factory, thank you! On the other end of the spectrum, you may not wish to have a long stroked out engine if you want a guick revving engine, you will want a shorter stroke and a lighter flywheel.

The Harley twin cam was made from 1999-2006 as a 88 cubic inch, and can be made as big as a 98 cubic inch without case modifications or stroker cranks, but they are usually only taken to 95/96CI. The 2007-2011 edition is a 96 cubic inch engine in stock dress, it can be taken all the way out to a 107 without case mods, however Harley states you should only take it to a 103 because of cylinder wall thickness. S&S has some cylinders they state because of the different materials they use that allows better wear and heat resistance they can use thinner cylinder walls to make the bike a 106 without worry according to S&S. In 2012, Harley took most all of their models to a 103. If you desire to go bigger you have some obstacles such as case thickness and new crank shafts. if you decide to go huge you should think of getting new cases from Delkron, or S&S, especially if you are making an Evolution a big inch monster.

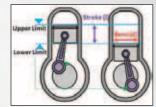
The Sporty crowd is never left out, easy day there, we can take your 883cc (54ci) to a 1200cc (74ci) in no time by boring it out and slapping a set of pistons in. Not enough you say? Johnson Engine Technology, Revolution and S&S can help you take that bad boy sporty to an 88ci, 90ci or a whopping 103ci (fig 1) and terrorize any of the so called big Harleys. You know, I think I may just do that with General Grunge! To set the record straight, the Evolution Sportster/Buell engine is a great motor and can make some serious horsepower; it is a nice lightweight power plant with great valve geometry that cubic inch for cubic inch beats the big twins hands down.

Bore and Stroke

You may be asking, what do all these numbers mean? Well then, let's take a step back. The displacement of a bike is the total amount of the combined cylinder volume. You get this number by knowing the Bore, which is the diameter of cylinder and Stroke, which is the distance the piston travels inside the bore, this is shown in Cubic Inches (CI) or in Cubic Centimeters (CC). The mathematical equation for cylinder volume is PI r2*H or 3.14 X Radius(Bore /2) X Radius(Bore/2) X Height(Stroke) which gives us the cubic inches of one cylinder, then we times that by the number of cylinders to get our total cubic inches(total volume). For example: If you own a V-Twin and it has a cylinder bore of 4" and has a piston stroke of 4" then your equation would look like this ... 3.14*2*2*4*2 = 100.48 cubic inches. Remember, I had to take the diameter (4) and make it a radius (2)... now you can figure out any cylinder volume whether it is for a motorcycle or a home project.

Bigger Displacement means more Power ... or does it?

The short answer is yes, however there are many factors in making that displacement work well for us; just throwing bigger pistons in is not the answer to all performance needs. You must have everything else in your engine working for you to get everything your big bore has to offer you, that's is why making the right choices during your stage one and two are so important. I have seen much smaller displacement bikes spank a huge bore bike all day long ... don't forget gear ratios either, both in the trans and the final drive. Good ole Baker Drivetrain has really helped us out by offering some killer gear ratio combinations that will make that bike rip up some asphalt right off the line but in 6th (or 7th if you are lucky enough to have Bakers 7 speed) gear cruise at a nice calm RPM at 70-80 MPH down the highway giving us good mileage and long engine life.

Porting Heads ... Good flow or too much?

When you want to make more power, many don't wish to put the cash into head work and depending on what your goal is, headwork may not be the biggest

bang on the dyno for your buck, however doing headwork is paramount to get your engine working to make you as much torque and horsepower as possible and even in some cases bring more HP and still get good if not better MPG! The ultimate key is to have a great running bike that will last a very long time without failure, sometimes that takes a little money, but it is money well spent. With all that being said, good headwork is not a simple matter of taking a Dremel and hogging out your ports and making them super shiny, this can be disastrous! (Fig 3)

I am not a head porting expert so I talked with one of the most knowledgeable guys I know, Bob Johnson owner of Johnson Engine Technology. This guy will give you so much info in 30 minutes your brain will be numb! He educated me on all kinds of great stuff as we talked about porting, including how the ole Pans, Shovels and Ironhead Sportys are really great engines, he said if properly built they simply don't break down and they can last as long as any Evo or Twin Cam ... today engine longevity has more to do with today's oil than Harleys engineering.

Head flow and the flow bench

The tool to measure flow through a port on a head is called a flowbench, the whole idea of the flowbench is to monitor the airflow of heads and other components like air cleaners and intake manifolds. More flow is supposed to translate into more power the problem is that a flowbench does not factor in velocity of air it only measures flow. (Fig 4)

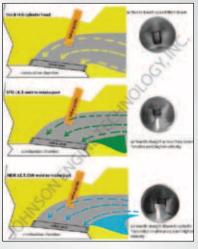
Here's what Bob Johnson said about Harley big twins. The ports are already too big, porting work therefore just lowers the intake velocity, making the engine even less able to flow air after BDC-especially at low and middle rpm. To get the value of a big-ported head, you have to rev the daylights out of it-to big, con-rodstretching numbers like 7500. This is why so many people contend that "...when you're done, it's still a Harley.'

Now, because every engine is an air pump, the object is to get as much air in the pump as possible in your RPM range (2.000-6.000 RPM). Air. like everything else on this earth has a mass, therefore, the ratio of air to fuel in your engine also has a mass. Because the ratio of air to fuel has mass, it also has energy (E). Now because of the weight of the fuel, the weight of the air, and the chemical E found in the fuel and air, this chemical E can be transferred into

horsepower (HP) and torque. Therefore, the goal is to get as much of the air as physically possible, in the engine so that its chemical E can be turned into HP and torque. Therefore, cylinder head design is not just the attaining of peak flow numbers on a flow bench. Cylinder head design is the design of the intake and exhaust port to be able to achieve the highest velocity with the highest mass.

Bernoulli's principle states that when area decreases velocity increases. As a result, Johnson correctly sizes the port area of cylinder heads so that the highest velocity and highest mass flow rate that is physically possible, can be achieved. Because our engine design relies on extremely efficient cylinder head design, other areas of the engine, such as compression, camshaft profiles, and engine displacement do not have to be at extremes to make good useable HP and torque.



Last Word

Make sure you get yourself a good engine builder and good head porter, depending on what you are looking for - bigger may not be better for your riding style. Remember that after all the engine mods and possible gearing changes, tuning is the most important thing to your bike, literally a tuner can take your stock bike re-tune it with a Techno-Research tuner and give you about 10 more foot pounds of torque with nothing more than changing your ignition map, then he will work on your fuel mapping. Also please pay a few extra dollars BEFORE you make any of these mods to have your tech check your cams, cam plate. and crank run-out (left side crank bearing issues), it is a serious problem that comes straight from the factory sometimes with zero miles. Even if you have low miles get this taken care of before your mods. (Yeah, I know, no one wants to put in new crank bearing into a new bike but you will be happy you did.) Your independent shop wants you to be riding maintenance free for tons of big smile miles, let em build you a great bike ... no shortcuts please.

That's wraps up another month of fun for me, off on a European adventure! I'll have a weird tech or not tech article that will show you what's up over there next month!

I hope to see many, many of you great people soon at the shop, at an event (Thunder on the Grand is coming up soon!) or on the road ... Ride with a big smile on your face, spring is here and God loves all of you great riders! Blessings for a safe riding season!

We have donated over \$100,000.00 to Hospice over the years. A small slice of the funds raised goes for our radio campaign co-sponsored by the Region, WUPS, and local Businesses. Nice segue to our flyer, eh? C'mon out, it's a GREAT time.

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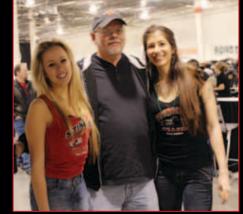

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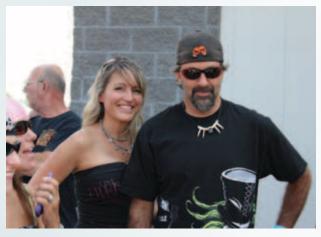

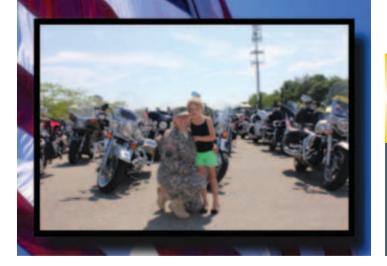

LEGISLATION WOULD PROHIBIT E15 GAS PENDING FURTHER INVESTIGATION

Congressman Jim Sensenbrenner (R-WI) has introduced H.R. 875, which would require the Environmental Protection Agency to stop the use of gasoline containing 15% ethanol (E15) until its harmful effects are investigated further.

H.R. 875, introduced on February 28, would repeal the EPA's waiver decision approving the use of E15 and the authority of the agency to grant further decisions until the EPA seeks an independent scientific analysis of the effects of the E15 blend.

"There have been several tests and warnings highlighting E15's harmful effects on engines and their components, but they have all been dismissed by the EPA. Therefore, we must force the EPA to stop the use of E15 fuel until the serious safety, durability, performance and environmental concerns have been addressed," announced Rep. Sensenbrenner,

Sensenbrenner has introduced several bills to address the risks associated with E15, and his latest legislation to halt the sale of the 15% alcohol blended fuel until further studies are completed, came less than a week after witnesses from automobile and motorcycle industry and consumer groups testified before the Science, Space and Technology Committee that more testing is needed.

"We have a responsibility to ensure that Americans using gas-powered machinery – whether it be cars and boats or chainsaws and lawnmowers – are not put at risk due to faulty fuel that has not been adequately vetted," Sensenbrenner said

BILL INTRODUCED IN CALIFORNIA TO REGULATE LANE SHARING

No sooner had the California Highway Patrol published guidelines on how to safely maneuver your motorcycle between lanes of slow-moving traffic, than SB 350 was introduced by State Senator Jim Beall (D-San Jose) to codify the rules into law.

California is the only state that allows "lane sharing" or "lane splitting," precisely because there are no laws against it; though officers have a variety of charges they can levy against a reckless rider such as unsafe lane change or too fast for conditions.

Beall's bill would restrict the practice by prohibiting motorcycles from splitting lanes unless specifically allowed: "...when a highway has been divided into three or more clearly marked lanes for traffic traveling in the same direction, a person operating a motorcycle shall not pass another vehicle in a portion of a lane occupied by that vehicle unless the following conditions are met:

(1) The passing occurs during traffic congestion.

(2) The passing occurs at a safe speed."

Following furious feedback from motorcyclists opposed to over-regulating an act that 87% report doing almost daily during crowded commutes. Sen. Beall soon pulled his proposal and turned it into a two-vear bill for future reconsideration.

In the meantime, although ABATE of California did not initiate the measure the group will work with Beall to amend the language, and vows "...our goal is to ultimately submit a bill that addresses the concerns of the motorcycle community; a bill that can be supported and endorsed by the ABATE membership. If the final bill doesn't meet ABATE's requirements. ABATE will vigorously oppose the bill and try to kill it."

DRIVERS CAUSE MOST CRASHES WITH MOTORCYCLES. RESEARCH SHOWS

For motorcycle riders, people in "cages" bear a disproportionate share of the blame for the high number of motorcycle crashes, while car drivers feel careless motorcyclists careening in and out of traffic are putting their own lives at risk. So who's mostly to blame when four-wheel and two-wheel vehicles collide? According to a recent Florida Department of Transportation study, bikers are right. Motorists driving cars and trucks are mostly at fault, often failing to vield the right of way to the smaller vehicles.

In analyzing 10 years of Florida motorcycle crashes, Chanyoung Lee, a senior researcher at the University of South Florida's Center for Urban Transportation Research, found that 60% of the time motorists in other vehicles are at fault when they collide with motorcycles.

But the study uncovered more: When looking at all motorcycle crashes, motorcycle operators bear a lot of responsibility as well. They have a significantly higher number of single-vehicle crashes than other drivers. Some 34% of motorcycle crashes involve one vehicle, according to the study, compared to only 19% of car crashes involving one vehicle. When looking at really severe and fatal motorcycle crashes, 50% involve just the motorcycle and no other vehicle, but when multiple vehicles are involved, greater blame falls on four-wheeled drivers. And most motorcycle crashes involve other vehicles

But it's also a matter of awareness, according to Lee, who is part of FDOT's Motorcycle Safety Coalition. In driver surveys, FDOT has asked people how often they see motorcycles. Those with motorcycle endorsements on their driver's licenses report seeing motorcycles all the time, while those without endorsements who live in the same area report occasionally seeing motorcycles.

Due to minimal levels of protection to their riders, approximately 80% of motorcycle crashes result in injury or fatality, according to the Network of Employees for Traffic Safety, while only 20% of passenger car crashes injure or kill the vehicle occupants.

MMA HELPS DEFEAT SOUND WARRANT IN YARMOUTH. MA

The Massachusetts Motorcycle Association (MMA) is pleased to report that a town bylaw proposal has been successfully defeated in Yarmouth. With short notice, the MMA in concert with the Yarmouth Chief-of-Police and Deputy Chief attended a recent Board-of-Selectmen meeting and were successful in convincing the board that such a Bylaw would be unsuccessful.

Armed with prior testimony used successfully around the state, including used to overturn a similar bylaw passed in Falmouth and subsequently struck down by the Commonwealth Attorney General, MMA Legislative Director Rick Gleason joined the Chief and Deputy Chief of the Yarmouth Police Department in their argument that Town Bylaws cannot exceed State Law, and that such a measure would essentially be meaningless.

The MMA has long held strong opposition to the use of the OEM EPA Stamp on stock exhausts as an enforcement tool, because it is a consumer protection mechanism and not meant to be used against the consumer. It is also hard to locate on many models of motorcycle, hidden under seats on sport bikes, under

saddle bags of cruisers, or simply facing the wrong way for aesthetic reasons. I've said for years: 'Australia today, Canada tomorrow, and the U.S.A. the day Most critically, per the very regulation that entitles it, it expires in one year or after.' I truly believe countries like Canada, Germany, U.S.A., and others are 3.729 miles, whichever comes first!! watching to see what works in Australia to outlaw motorcycle clubs - starting with the 1%er ones." Instead, the MMA (www.MassMotorcycle.org) continues to hold a firm belief

that the existing laws on the books are sufficient if properly implemented and enforced, specifically that simple test procedures do exist for muffled exhaust, whether replaced with after-market or not, with a reasonable sound level.

LICENSE PLATE CAMERAS - A NEW WAY TO NAB SCOFFLAWS

First came red light cameras attached to traffic lights to catch drivers trying to beat the light; then came speed cameras along the roadway to ticket leadfooted speeders; but now police are deploying cameras in their cruisers to scan our license-plates in order to get instant feedback on unpaid tickets and other warrants

It also allows authorities to monitor where average citizens might be at any particular time. That bothers some privacy advocates and organizations like the ACLU that oppose public intrusions into individual privacy. The groups are becoming more alarmed about license plate tracking as a growing number of police departments acquire the technology for electronic surveillance of traffic on public street

Little Rock, AR Police Chief Stuart Thomas said the law enforcement benefits outweigh any concerns about possible abuse of the information, which, as a public record, is legally available for anyone to see.

Lawmakers in several states, including Minnesota and Utah, have suggested setting a time limit for their departments regarding how long such data can be collected and stored, but many places like Little Rock have no set policy and have a growing archive of license plate photos, along with time stamps and the locations, showing where motorists were at certain times.

Privacy advocates worry about the potential uses for such outside law enforcement, from snooping by stalkers and private investigators to businesses that sell personal data. "Given how few rules are currently on the books to protect our privacy, it's plausible that private investigators and data-mining companies could acquire this location data," said ACLU staff attorney Catherine Crump, adding that the organization has requested more information from government agencies, but hasn't filed any lawsuits.

AUSTRALIA BANS BROTHERS BEHIND BARS

Since last Nov 19, the Australian State of Queensland in Northeastern Australia has banned the distribution of the monthly newsletter "Brothers Behind Bars" in its prisons. Brothers Behind Bars is a digest of biker club and motorcycle news edited by retired Sons of Silence patch holder Iron Mike Davis, and is an outreach program supported by the National Coalition of Motorcyclists (NCOM). BBB is specifically aimed at motorcycle club members and is stubbornly nonpartisan.

Mike Davis was notified that the words he publishes were illegal in Oz with a peremptory, unsigned form letter from the government of Queensland that read in full: "On 7th of November 2012 Queensland Corrective Services issued a directive from head office that all correspondence between prisoners who are members of an Outlaw Motorcycle Gang (OMCG) & OMCG members & associates was to cease immediately. As a result the author of this letter has been identified to be either a member or associate of an OMCG as such your mail has been returned to you."

The Aging Rebel article went on to describe "Anti-Bikie Laws" down under: "Queensland has been trying to outlaw motorcycle clubs since 2009 when the state passed legislation formally called the Criminal Organisation Act of 2009. These anti-bikie laws give police the power to declare which organizations are criminal & which are not. Similar sets of laws have been passed in the Australian states of New South Wales & South Australia, and have been challenged in the courts by the Hells Angels, Finks & Rebels MCs. Australia's strategy has been difficult to implement in the United States because the U.S. Constitution specifically guarantees citizens' & visitors' rights to move freely, assemble peaceably, to keep & bear arms & to express themselves freely in numerous ways including the right to wear a patch on your back. Various Fed police forces in America including the FBI, the ATF & increasingly the Dept of Homeland Security have attempted to subvert these Constitutional guarantees using the Racketeer Influenced And Corrupt Organizations Act (RICO) & in several recent cases trademark law."

CANADIAN RIDERS BALK AT HEFTY INSURANCE HIKES

Premier Brad Wall savs "maybe mistakes were made" and the Saskatchewan government will revisit motorcycle insurance rate hikes proposed recently by Saskatchewan Government Insurance. "Our MLAs are reporting a lot of feedback on the issue, not just from those who are riders or have motorcycles, but others in general who note that these increases seem to be very high," Wall told reporters.

When the legislature reconvenes for its spring session next week, the Saskatchewan Party caucus will discuss its next steps, Wall said. He said he's not convinced SGI has exhausted all of its options to help eliminate a \$9-million deficit between crash injury payouts and fees charged to motorcyclists. "Obviously, what's being proposed by SGI for the rate rebalancing means huge increases and immediate increases, if approved, for riders," Wall said.

SGI's proposal to the Saskatchewan Rate Review Panel would mean a sudden 73% jump in insurance costs for the average motorcycle owner, compared to an overall vehicle insurance rate increase of 1.03%. The move prompted a backlash from bike enthusiasts and business owners, who fear a big blow to new and used bike sales which could devastate the motorcycle industry.

If approved, the rate increases would take effect in August, but Wall said the chance is "slim" the proposal will stay as is. He wants the government and SGI to look at other creative options, such as using better price incentives to reward motorcyclists who have taken training courses.
