
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


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Happy Holidays!

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
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Grand Rapids non-profit to build house in six days, gives it to a veteran for free

When homebuilder Rich Bloem bought a vacant lot in Southeast Grand Rapids in April, the plan - construct a home and make a profit - was the same he's always formulated over his 21 years in the business.

That changed as Bloem, the owner of True North Homes, said he had an epiphany that led him to do something drastically different.

Bloem created Homes of Hope, a nonprofit organization that he said will lead a build that will transform the barren lot into a completed residence in six days.

The house will go to a veteran for free, a two-story, 1,322-square-foot home with four bedrooms and two baths. An unfinished basement offers another 816-squarefeet that could add a fifth bedroom and a full bath.

The completed home, to be named "Home for a Hero," will be LEED-certified and constructed from structural building panels. Solar panels will be utilized, and Bloem wants the house to be as environmentally and financially sustainable as possible.

"The home will actually net-meter backwards, so the utility company will send a check to the occupants," he said. "Their costs will be very minimal."

Bloem said Homes of Hope will partner with Volunteers of America (voa.org) to begin the selection for the veteran who will receive the completed house.

The volunteers will break ground May 2014 and the six days of construction are scheduled to take place in June. After completion, Bloem hopes to present the veteran with his or her new home on July 4.

Veteran wants to donate goats to Afghans

Rick Burns didn't put the war behind him. The bravery of the Iragi people and the hunger in the eyes of Afghans wouldn't let him.

Burns is an unheralded sort of war veteran. He didn't fire guns or disarm bombs, but worked as an Army civil affairs officer to understand and help citizens caught up in the terror. When he came home after three tours, he had a plan to continue helping in a very lowan way. He wants to give them farm goats.

Karadah will give two goats to each of 15 families in Khairabad, Afghanistan, who will collect their milk, make yogurt and pass on the goats' offspring to another needy family, who will do the same.

The goat project still needs \$4,000 toward its goal of \$10,000 to get the animals to the families. Burns won't let it rest until it's done. He said he can't change everything, but he can do this small thing.

Vietnam soldier gets knife back, 40 years later

Former Army platoon Sqt. Loyd Cates of Smithville, Texas, kept a hunting knife clean and sharpened for more than 40 years after it was left behind in Vietnam by an injured former Hamtramck soldier.

"I don't know why, but I felt that someday I would see him again," Cates said of Sgt. Frank Cybulski. "I was going to hold onto it."

The knife this week finally was returned to Cybulski. The knife was a gift from Cybulski's parents, sent to him after he left for war and asked them to send him a hunting knife

Cybulski, who was 20, had it with him when he and Cates, then 21, were on patrol in southern Vietnam with around 30 other members of the 199th Infantry Brigade the morning of Jan. 14, 1970. North Vietnamese soldiers detonated a mine, "and then there was (another) explosion," Cates, 65, said.

Cybulski was evacuated to a hospital in Long Binh, and then sent home. Cates retrieved Cybulski's knife, hoping one day to give it back.

When the two finally spoke over the phone early this month, it was as if no time had passed. Cybulski and Cates said they hope to reunite in May at the 199th's reunion in New Orleans.

As for the knife, Cybulski said he wants to carve the number 754 into its handle - the number of men from the brigade who died in the war. "I can't forget those guys," he said. "Never.'

He plans to visit the Vietnam Memorial in Washington, D.C. "My grandson just turned 2-years-old, and it's very important to me to walk that wall and touch it with him," Cybulski said. "I want to place that knife at the wall in Washington and leave it there."


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The Motorcycle Lawyer on THE LAW Michigan motorcyclists are being punished for avoiding collisions with motor vehicles

Motorcyclists punished for avoiding collisions with cars

Back in September, I talked about a case involving a motorcyclist who was shafted out of no-fault benefits by the Michigan Court of Appeals, and saddled with over \$100K in medical bills. The case, Detroit Medical Center v Progressive Michigan Insurance Company et al (Ct App #304622, July 23, 2013), had to do with a motorcyclist who ended up laying his bike down in the process of avoiding a crash with a motor vehicle.

A little no-fault background is necessary to understand all this. In order for a motorcyclist to be entitled to no-fault benefits, including all medical bills paid for life, wage loss, household chores, and mileage to and from the doctors, a car, truck, van, SUV, or other "motor vehicle" must be involved in the crash.

The Court stated that "...the motorcyclist's subjective, erroneous perceived need to react to the motor vehicle," was the cause of the crash, placing fault on him and denying him no-fault insurance benefits I think he deserved. Basically, they said the motor vehicle needed to be closer and the threat to the motorcyclist more imminent. I did not represent the motorcyclist and was not involved in this case. There have been several other cases over the past few years of Michigan courts shafting motorcyclists based on how "involved" (or not) a motor vehicle is in the crash. These court cases are changing the decisions of no-fault adjusters in a way that I think is unfair to motorcyclists.

Real vs. perceived danger

Is there a difference between real and perceived danger? According to the Michigan Court of Appeals, there is. When the Court of Appeals reversed the decision in Detroit Medical Center v Progressive Michigan Insurance Company et al (Ct App #304622, July 23, 2013), they did so because the panel felt that "...for the motor vehicle to be considered 'involved' in the accident, the operation of the motor vehicle must have created an actual need for the motorcyclist to take evasive action."

What I can't figure out is how the Court could determine that the biker was mistaken about the need to take evasive action. No rider is going to dump his bike, risking damage, injury, or death, on a whim. The only time that a motorcyclist would purposefully dump his bike is if he felt that it was the only way to avoid a more serious situation, like a crash with a motor vehicle.

In Grange Insurance Company of Michigan v Bozung et al (Ct App #304557, June 6, 2013), we see a similar story. Mr. Bozung was riding a motorcycle when he came suddenly upon stopped traffic at an intersection. Bozung dropped his bike rather than collide with the motor vehicle ahead of him, which was insured by Grange Insurance Company of Michigan (Grange). The Trial Court decided in his favor, but the Court of Appeals reversed this decision, siding instead with Grange. Conflicting witness accounts, and the inability by the Court to establish whether the motor vehicle was parked as opposed to stopped ultimately shafted Bozung out of no-fault benefits, since they felt they could not say for sure if the motor vehicle was sufficiently "involved" in the crash for him to qualify.

Braverman v auto Owners (Ct App #306492, August 20, 2013) involved a female rider who was killed when she laid her bike down to avoid colliding with a tractor trailer. The Court used similar logic in this case as in the others I have mentioned, stating that the motor vehicle, in this case the tractor trailer, was not actively involved in the crash. However, Braverman's case was remanded for trial because the Court was not able to establish conclusively whether the truck was properly lighted; without lights, the Court felt the truck might have actively contributed to the crash.

An impossible choice

What bothers me most about these decisions and others like them is that if there had been contact between the motorcycle and the motor vehicle, the Courts wouldn't even look at who was at fault, and they certainly wouldn't be worried about whether the danger of the situation was "real" or "perceived."

It seems to me the way these cases have been decided forces motorcyclists to make an almost impossible choice. They can either choose to dump the bike, avoiding the collision, but likely not avoiding injury, and risk potentially not qualifying for no-fault benefits because there was no contact between them and the motor vehicle. On the other hand, they can allow a collision to happen, risking their lives, and almost guaranteeing more serious injuries, in order to be sure the courts will allow them to collect no-fault benefits.

If anything, I think the Courts should be encouraging motorcyclists to ride safely and do whatever they can to avoid a collision, but that may no longer be the case. If the Court of Appeals continues this analysis in these cases and deny motorcyclists no-fault benefits for trying to avoid a crash, I think they are adding insult to injury, literally.

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
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

Officers come and participate from around the U.S. and Canada. About 70 plus police officers come and ride the competition course for just some good fun and test their skills.

These motor officers are on the roads day after day protecting us on their motorcycles. They have to also protect themselves being on a two wheeled motors and do their job.

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Tech Tips By Steve

UNDER PRESSURE - OR NOT?

I hope you all had a fantastic Thanksgiving! I love thanksgiving, for my family it is a time to gather, eat and listen to stories of some greatness and some sadness too, but all of it brings us closer together. Unless of course I fall asleep after all the yummy goodness and miss all the talk.

Every Harley tech out there can tell you a story or two about today's discussion about a little trouble point on the fuel injection system. Let's say you have a bike that seems to run well, then it just dies, or it will run for about 3 minutes then dies. Also, this little problem can make the bike spit, sputter and backfire or have a power problem and so forth. What could it be? Well it COULD be one or both of the plastic fuel lines inside the fuel tank that supply your glorious fuel injection system with the almighty petroleum. One of these lines go from the fuel pump to the fuel filter and the other goes from the fuel pressure regulator to the supply fitting on the bottom of your tank. These lines are prone to failure and are not easy, but not horribly difficult to change. Now I am not going to go into a step by step "how to" but I will give you a few pointers and the first is to figure out if the problem is actually inside the tank, whether it be a bad regulator. fuel pump, fuel line(s) or clogged filter, well, that is to be figured out later. I will say sometimes a person with good hearing can hear the hissing or pinhole leak when the fuel is low enough ... I can say I have never "heard" this ... but I am very hard of hearing so there ya go.

Fuel pressure check is where you start. Before going crazy tearing into things find out what your fuel pressure is, on a Harley it should be between 55-62 PSI. If your pressure is too low for whatever reason, you can have spitting, sputtering and hesitation, loss of power and possibly a no start situation. To do this you need a fuel injection pressure tester, if you happen to have a friend that has a fuel injection pressure tester with the connectors for your specific Harley, you're in luck. If not, you can pay a shop to test it for you or go purchase you own, they range from close to \$500 for a Jims kit all the way down to the Harbor Freight basic one for around \$20. The ones from Lang and Jims have the correct fittings for Harley, the others you will need to invest some extra time to find and a little cash to buy the fittings make them work. The flip side is if you buy an automotive one you now have the fittings to check your car too.

You have tested your bike fuel pressure and it is around let's say 25psi and you think you can hear something inside the tank. The next step is to take the fuel canopy off. The fuel pump, filter and regulator are all attached to the canopy. This is easy as long as someone has told you that this assembly is spring loaded so you can get it out of the tank relatively easy, if not, you may try to force it and have disassembly of parts that were not intended for disassembly. Drain the fuel tank, remove the console and lay on rear of bike upon a shop rag. Then take off the 10 canopy bolts, the assembly will only come out a little bit, then you have to take the supply line off of the fuel pressure regulator and use a screwdriver or thin long punch and push on the top fuel pump assembly as you slide it out of the tank. This will open the spring loaded hinge and allow it to be removed... see, easy! Now it's off, you have inspected it and you found a pinhole in the supply line hose. Harley sells a new supply (Fig 3) hose with a new check valve supply fitting with new o-ring supplied, however I would not stop there, since this is less than stellar fun and most of us would not rather go into our fuel tank for repair regularly I would replace the old fuel filter too(Fig 4). The new filter should come with a new hose and clamp also ... now you have both pesky lines replaced. One other note, you will need a tool for clamping the stepless style hose clamps used to hold all your new lines on.

Do everything in reverse, replace the canopy gasket and inspect the ten canopy screws for the sealing devices, if they look crappy, replace all the screws ... we don't want fuel leaks! Connect the fuel pressure tester again and see what you have for pressure ... 55-62psi? YES! Wonderful job, now put all the rest back in place, clean everything up and take her for a nice long test ride.

I hope this helps you diagnose a common problem that isn't a real budget buster, if you do decide to tackle this yourself, get your repair manual out and do it step by step according to Harley and in less than a half a day you will be up and running!




Fig 2 - Fuel Tank Assembly



His friends stood by him and once Robert decided to change his life for the better, it still was hard but, he still conquered a lot. He was told he couldn't get a CDL, yet he got a CDL. He is now a bus driver and passed all the necessary tests needed become safely certified.

He has met others that have lost limbs and shared stories and became friends with many. He started being a motivational speaker and counselor on his own. He has a passion to help others overcome their tragedies of losing limbs and learning how to do everything all over again. 



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ABATE OF MICHIGAN UGLY SCARY ISSUE

Part II continued from last month's issue...

Two weeks ago, I attended the Logging Congress in Escanaba. I was looking for a new chainsaw, and had heard that Stihl was now building a saw that was E-20 capable. Sounded good to me, I wanted more info. First guy I talked to at the Stihl booth got right up in arms about what he thought was the dumbest question he'd had all day. More controversial than wolves in the U.P. apparently. And, I thought I did a remarkable job keeping my cool. All I wanted to know was what model of saw it was. Luckily for me, an older rep from the company came over and got the other rep to leave. The new dude said that they had a saw that was actually good for up to E-25. It carried a \$1000 price tag- but it was a \$990 saw before they added the \$10 worth of parts it took to make it capable of handling E 25. That's right, kids - \$10 more in parts will cure most issues.

Here's another interesting chain saw thing I learned last spring: there's a logger in Missouri who's running two identical chain saws. Bought the same day, go to the woods and do identical things. Saw #1 is running Recreational 90 (ethanol free), saw #2 is running E-85. Identical oil used; only difference is that saw #2 has been re-jetted for ethanol. Plan is to run them until they both die, and tear them apart.

The performance of the E85 saw from a HP and torque perspective is obviously better, but longevity and cost to operate is what's being measured. Here's where myself and ABATE differ - I've been asked to write my congressman to demand that E15 not be allowed to be sold. Bullshit. ABATE and the rest of us should be demanding that manufacturers get on board with giving us fuel systems that don't have issues handling ethanol. If anyone thinks that ethanol is going away because ABATE or the AMA says it should, I've got a bridge to sell you. Some would say that I'm simply suggesting that we all bend over and just take it: quite the contrary, I'm baffled as to why it's still an issue with manufacturers to give us trouble free fuel systems when the technology is readily available.

Up until I had to quit because of a bad back and neck, my family and I were racing vintage snowmobiles. All of them needed a touch higher octane (tighter squish from stock), so we needed race fuel. My local fuel supplier stocks a lot of Sunoco race fuels, 104 with 20% ethanol being one of them.

We were running that fuel (as were a lot of our competitors) through single, twin, and triple cylinder air cooled motors that were built in the 60s and 70s. We were using Tillotson or Mikuni carbs, depending on the class the sled was in. We happened to be running sprint races, but I know many running that particular fuel in vintage Enduro races with the same motors we used. It's possible to use ethanol in older motors. We did it successfully. Others have done it successfully. I'm mechanically retarded, and even I was able to bungle through a simple process to make an old motor run 1500 rpm more than it was intended to run, with an old overweight unskilled jockey running the throttle, all the while NEVER having any sort of fuel issues doing so. Having a real tough time getting behind either oil companies or lazy manufacturers telling us it can't be done."

Well there you go. Pat, I believe, is a life member of ABATE and he has earned the right in my eyes to present his side of the argument. The trick is finding the truth; the treat has been getting a Yoopers version of it.

As security has become more stringent at high-profile, potential terrorist targets like airports, major commerce centers, and embassies, terrorists have been shifting toward "soft targets" like schools, theaters, and shopping malls. This isn't really so much a new trend, as a progression History is rife with examples of terrorists and "resistance fighters" shifting from hardened military and government targets to "soft" civilian targets as a means of attracting more attention, and wreaking more havoc. History shows the same trend among demented mass murderers who want to go out as infamous celebrities by running up the most gut-wrenching body-counts.

Both the terrorists and the lunatics have similar objectives - to make the biggest headlines possible by creating the most emotional impact. Not long ago, the easiest way to do that was to hijack or plant a bomb on an airplane. The natural vulnerability of a few hundred, unarmed people in an oversized aluminum can hurtling through the sky at 600 miles an hour was an obvious



"For me it's a profound question," he continued. "People are quick to say gun control, people shouldn't be armed,' etc., etc. I think they have to ask themselves: 'Where would you have wanted to be? In a city where there was gun control and no citizens armed if you're in a Westgate mall, or in a place like Denver or Texas?" Valid guestions which I'm sure most reporters will continue to ignore or dance around.

In the conclusion of their report, ABC took a dig at Noble's comments by pointing out that the gun control debate in the US had recently been ignited by mass shootings, including one in a movie theater in Aurora, Colorado, just outside of Denver. What the report failed to note is that the movie theater where the massacre took place was posted "No Guns." Not only that, the demented murderer passed by at least two other theaters that were closer to his home, but which were not posted "Gun Free Zones," Perhaps that was coincidence or there is some other explanation, but on the face of it, it suggests that Noble is on to something.

It is frankly astonishing to me that Noble has taken this position publicly. hope he will pursue this line of reasoning and that he can hold onto his position at INTERPOL long enough for his philosophy to spread through the agency and into police agencies they deal with. When victims become firstresponders, criminals will become more cautious. ABC and the media can dismiss these ideas, but I'm not expecting terrorists to storm the Phoenix Cabela's store any time soon.



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
