

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#### Veteran Status on Driver's License

House Bill 4037, sponsored by state Rep. Nancy Jenkins, adds a veteran's designation to Michigan driver's licenses for veterans who request it and show proof of military service with an honorable discharge. A companion bill, Senate Bill 219 sponsored by state Sen. Darwin Booher, adds the designation to state issued ID cards when requested and proof of military service with honorable discharge is presented. The designation will be available on driver's licenses and personal state IDs beginning May 2014. Governor Snyder signed the bills into law on May 14.

Prior to this, some businesses that offered discounts for veterans required the person to show their DD-214. I don't know of any veterans that carry that around, and it could lead to identity theft (my DD-214 has my Social Security number on it). This will allow you to prove you are a veteran by showing your driver's license with the veteran status checked. To get the status on your driver's license you will need to show the Secretary of State office your DD-214.

When the bill was first introduced I thought of another way it could be used that people weren't discussing. It lets law enforcement officers (LEO) know on traffic stops if the person is a veteran, and therefore the person "could" have PTSD. Two ways to think on this one. If the LEO understands the person could have PTSD, he would approach him in an appropriate manner different than he would a regular citizen. The second aspect of this is the LEO going overboard and calling for lots of backup because "he may have a psycho on his hands". I haven't asked any LEOs what they think on this subject. Then again, I could be full of it on this angle.

#### Sexual Assaults

We've all seen the numerous news reports about the military and sexual assaults. In D.C. the House passed by voice vote a bill (HR 671) that would require the Department of Veterans Affairs to update regulations regarding military sexual trauma to ensure it is recognized as an in-service stressor in determining serviceconnected post-traumatic stress disorder.

#### **Diplomas For Vietnam Veterans**

Michigan Vietnam veterans who failed to finish high school because of the war could receive their diplomas under legislation in the state Senate. The Veterans, Military and Homeland Security Committee are expected to take up the legislation.

The bill would allow high school boards to award diplomas to Vietnam veterans aged 65 and older. Michigan law already allows World War II and Korean War veterans to get diplomas.

Republican Sen. Judy Emmons of Sheridan is the bill's sponsor. She says in a statement that "it may seem like a small thing, but to our veterans and their families it is an important acknowledgement of everything they gave up so we could remain free."

#### Michigan Veterans Agency

Gov. Rick Snyder created a veterans agency with a cabinet-level director. And lawmakers on both sides of the aisle are pushing several bills aimed at assisting those who served in the military.

One of the driving factors behind the recent focus on vets is recognition that the state has historically fallen short in serving its veteran population, which ranked 11th largest nationwide in 2010.

In 2010, Michigan came in dead last for per-capita utilization of federal veterans' benefits. Last year the state improved slightly to fourth-lowest. State veterans af-

fairs officials warn that the report is deceiving because it includes high-cost capital expenses for VA centers or federal settlements with other states.

Nevertheless, Michigan still ranks low in health, education and other benefit spending, and it's a statistic used by many in explaining the recent focus on veterans' issues.

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
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


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### **The Motorcycle Lawyer on THE LAW** Shopping in the men's department: Tips for women looking to buy a motorcycle

Many riders, myself included, have noticed a change on the roads in the last few years. There have always been women that ride and ride well, but more and more women are taking control and grabbing the handlebars. The Motorcycle Industry Council's 2008 Owner Survey shows that women riders made up 23 percent of the 25 million motorcyclists in America that year; that means 5.7 million women saddled up to ride the open road.

It's interesting to see the way the industry is reacting to this growing demographic. It's true there have been women riders all along, but the spike in uptake over the last ten years has definitely changed the way bike and gear manufacturers are making and marketing their products. Surprisingly, the big manufacturers are not yet capitalizing on this new market by producing bikes specifically for women, and there are only a handful of custom shops who build bikes for female riders.

With that in mind, here are some tips to help women riders find the best bike for their ride.

**Safety first:** If you have never ridden a motorcycle, take a MSF Course or Riders Edge Course. If it's been a long time, MSF also offers a refresher class. They will supply motorcycles to practice on so you can get current on your skills.

**Do your research:** Before you buy a bike, think about the type of riding you want to do. Are you looking to commute on the bike, or to cruise around on the weekends? Do you need speed? Do you plan to ride with others, and if so, what is their riding style?

There are a few different styles of bikes, the most common being sport bikes and cruisers. Sport bikes tend to be lighter-weight bikes designed for speed and precise cornering abilities. Some require the rider to maintain an aggressive, leaned-forward position in the seat, which could be uncomfortable for long rides or anyone with neck problems. Cruisers, on the other hand, allow the rider to sit in a more relaxed, upright, and comfortable position. They are often a little louder and can come with more "bells and whistles", like mp3 players and backrests. However, they also tend to be significantly heavier than sport bikes, which could pose a challenge for smaller, lighter women riders. Harley Davidson offers a "Sportster" which is still a cruiser styled bike, but lighter and more easily maneuverable than say a "Touring" motorcycle. Some have argued that previous models have been top-heavy for some women riders, but their new "Low" series addresses that and can be a great option for women looking for a bike that is both fast and comfortable.

You will also benefit from doing a significant amount of research on the type of safety gear you buy for riding. Once you know the type of riding you plan to do, or the type of bike you want to purchase, read up on safety! There are a lot of different options for safety gear, including jackets, helmets, boots, gloves, and chaps. You need to research the material and read about the safety ratings for each item. How do they work together? What are other users saying about the products? There are hundreds of user forums out there, many of which cater specifically to women riders. Find out what others are saying and what works for them before you start shopping.

**Try it on:** Once you've settled on a style, get out there and start trying on different bikes. You really can't buy a bike just by looking at it. You need to climb on and see how it feels. Is the seat comfortable? Can you reach the controls comfortably? Is it the right size for your leg length? Can you pick the bike up, and can you keep it up while straddling it? You should also see if it feels top-heavy. If it does, try another. Keep on trying until you find something that feels comfortable and secure. Do not

settle. If something is not quite right, consider having it customized so that it's perfect for you. Customization will add to your overall cost, but it's a worthwhile investment because it will make your ride safer and more comfortable. Look for bike events in your area where many different manufacturers will have bikes on hand for you to try. Consult forums and local bike clubs to find out if they host inperson events where you can go to meet club members and try out different rides. Motorcycling is a really tight-knit community, so I suggest you take advantage of that and let experienced riders help you find your perfect fit.

**Know your true budget:** The retail price of the bike isn't the only thing you need to plan for when making this purchase. The bike itself is likely to be the biggest ticket item, but you also need to budget for safety gear, and in many areas you'll need to take a safety course in order to legally ride on the road. You should also plan for other costs including gas, insurance, maintenance, and membership fees if you plan to ride with a club or a group. Remember to budget for customization! You may be buying a bike designed for a male rider, so you may need to have a few adjustments made to the bike in order to get it just right for you.

My suggestion is to start out on a small, lightweight bike with a lower seat height (depending on your height). This will help you to truly feel comfortable while learning to ride. It is always easier to learn to ride a small bike really well, mastering its full potential and then move up to a larger bike.

Some great smaller bikes are; the new Bobber made by Harley-Davidson, the Honda Rebel and the Kawasaki Ninja 250.

Keep in mind that, depending on the type of riding you choose, lowering of a motorcycle does have an effect on the handling of some motorcycles while traveling through turns. Bottom line, don't let someone convince you to buy a bike that you do not feel comfortable on – It's your ride!

Buying a new bike is an exciting event for any rider, beginner or experienced. It's an opportunity to learn more about the sport and the technology available, which just keeps getting better. As the number of women riders continues to increase, we should see more and more companies getting on board and creating new products designed with women in mind.

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
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
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
# Safe Travels

#### FEDERAL RULE WILL REQUIRE A "BLACK BOX" IN NEW VEHICLES

Congress failed to pass legislation that would have required manufacturers to install event data recorders (EDRs) in all new vehicles, so a federal safety agency is using its rulemaking authority to mandate that all new cars sold in the United States be equipped with so-called "black boxes" - capable of capturing what happened in the moments before and during a crash.

Citing privacy concerns, House Republicans had succeeded in removing a Senate provision requiring EDRs from the final transportation bill last year, so the Obama administration is bypassing the legislative process in favor of the administrative rule.

Insisting the devices are meant for crash investigation purposes, and not for invading privacy, the U.S. DOT National Traffic Safety Administration mandate wil require all automobiles and light trucks manufactured after September 1, 2014 to have an EDR device that stores driving information for federal investigators.

Automotive EDRs are similar to -- though not nearly as sophisticated as the black boxes used in commercial airliners, and they are already installed in nearly 92% of today's vehicles, according to industry officials, and provide important information for industry engineers and, in some circumstances, law enforcement authorities.

But Horace Cooper of the National Center for Public Policy Analysis called the move "an unprecedented breach of privacy for Americans." Cooper said that contrary to what is being claimed. EDRs "can and will track the comings and goings of car owners and even their passengers" -- and what they can record is virtually unlimited.

In the meantime, U.S. Representatives Mike Capuano (D-MA) and Jim Sensenbrenner (R-WI) have announced their intentions to introduce the "Black Box Privacy Protection Act" that will protect drivers' and riders' rights by requiring dealers to disclose to consumers if a vehicle is equipped with an EDR, would require manufacturers to allow consumers to deactivate the device, and clarifies that the owner of the vehicle owns the data and it cannot be accessed without permission.

"Consumers should have control over the information collected by event data recorders in vehicles that they own and they should have the option of disabling the device if they choose to do so. This is a basic issue of privacy," said Rep Capuano.

#### **DESPITE MEDIA HYPE, MOTORCYCLING IS SAFER**

Record numbers of motorcycles over the past few years have resulted in an increased number of annual motorcyclist fatalities, and in light of overall motor vehicle fatalities steadily decreasing gives the impression that motorcycling is becoming more dangerous, but just the opposite is true.

While so-called safety experts point to more and more states relaxing their hel met laws as the root of all this evil, it's in fact a numbers game that motorcycle enthusiasts are winning.

Over the past five years, since 2007 when there were just over seven million motorcycles in the U.S., motorcycle registrations nationwide have ballooned to eight and a half million: an increase of 15% more motorcycles on the road today. while at the same time fatalities per 100,000 registered motorcycles has actually decreased by nearly a quarter! Moreover, over the past decade motorcycle registrations have risen 40.7% (from 5,004,156 in 2002 to 8,437,502 in 2011), but the fatality rate dropped 17.3% (from 65.35 per 100K to 54.66).

Check out the most current statistics acquired by the National Coalition of Motorcyclists (NCOM) from the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration's Fatality Analysis Reporting System (FARS), compared to motorcycle registration numbers found on the U.S. DOT Federal Highway Administration website:

Year - Registered Motorcycles / Rider Fatalities = Fatality Rate per 100,000 Motorcycles

2007 - 7, 138, 476 / 5, 174 = 72, 48 2008 - 7.752.926 / 5.312 = 68.52 2009 - 7.929.724 / 4.469 = 56.35 2010 - 8.009.503 / 4.518 = 56.40 2011 - 8.437.502 / 4.612 = 54.66

\*\*NOTE: According to these data analyzed by the National Coalition of Motorcyclists, motorcycle registrations have increased 15.4% over the past five years, while fatalities decreased by 10.9% and the fatality rate declined 24.6%...why isn't the news media reporting THESE facts?

#### GERMAN STUDY CLAIMS MOTORCYCLE HELMETS COULD BE SIGNIFICANTLY SAFER

A study carried out by the German Hohenstein Institute in Bönnigheim shows that motorcycle helmets could indeed be a lot safer if some other measurements would be taken into account, concluding that inner shell size alone is not enough for providing the best protection-to-fit ratio, and the head shape is just as critical.

The Hohenstein Institute study narrowed the head shapes to 6 major categories, with an amazing width variance of 3.5 cm (1.37"), determining that one helmet size cannot possibly offer the best fit for all these head shapes, even provided the circumference is the same.

With the way the inner impact laver fits on the rider's head being one of the critical elements in shock absorption and G-dispersion, it's apparent that the same shape will create different pressure points on a motorcyclist's skull, leading to various outcomes in similar crash conditions.

Spaces between the skull and the protective layer / liner result in less optimal protection in case of an impact, and such anthropometric head data could improve helmet design and manufacturing significantly, should the leading brands take notice of the study's finding.

#### JAYHAWKERS SEE THE LIGHT

The Kansas legislature unanimously passed House Bill 2318 which allows a motorcycle's headlamp to be wired with a headlamp modulation system, which must meet federal standards. The bill also allows certain types of lights on the sides of motorcycles, visible only from the side and not from the front or rear and to not protrude beyond or outside the body or wheel of the motorcycle. The side lights may emit white, amber, or red light without glare.

The legislation was signed into law on April 4, 2013 by Governor Sam Brownback and goes into effect July 1st.

#### RED-LIGHT CAMERA COMPANIES FIGHT LAWS AND RULINGS AGAINST TICKET CAMS

Purveyors of red-light cameras continue their guest to place cameras on every street corner in the nation, and one strategy is to put the hit on states that have traditionally been "protected" from cameras either through legislation or court ruling

Redflex lobbyists recently swarmed over the Minnesota Statehouse pushing a bill to allow ticket cameras into the state. The bill was written to thwart a 2007 Minnesota Supreme Court ruling that Minneapolis' red-light camera program was unconstitutional. The bill was defeated in committee, thanks in part to the efforts of ABATE of Minnesota and the National Motorists Association (NMA).

In Michigan, where a 2007 ruling from the state's attorney general has been keeping cameras at bay, recently introduced camera legislation has turned Michigan into the latest photo enforcement battleground state.

The NMA (www.motorists.org) warns that if you live in one of the 15 states that have taken steps to keep cameras out, stay alert. Chances are that a camera company lobbyist is cozying up to a friendly state lawmaker with a nice campaign donation and a pre-written camera bill that needs support.

#### HONDA & BMW EXPERIMENT WITH "AUTONOMOUS MOTORCYCLE"

Most connected vehicle technologies have focused squarely on the car, but BMW and Honda are working to develop autonomous driving technologies that work on two wheels. Both BMW and Honda have already added plenty of connectivity to their cars, but now the two automotive giants are working with the University of Michigan and Australian startup Cohda Wireless to put networking smarts into their motorcycles.

Adelaide-based Cohda designs radio systems and software that will not only link nearby vehicles on the road to each other, but also to the road itself. The idea behind its autonomous car technology is to create an ever-changing ad-

As for motorcycle applications, Cohda and UMTRI plan to test technologies that let bikes talk to traffic lights, roadside beacons and other cars, warning them of green lights about to turn red and dangerous curves ahead requiring them to slow down. By using a long-range secure form of Wi-Fi, a motorcycle could communicate with a car long before the drivers can see one another as they both approach a blind intersection.

#### CANADIAN INSURER TO TRACK MOTORCYCLIST BEHAVIOR WITH "TELEMATICS"

With an eye to calibrating insurance rates, Saskatchewan Government Insurance plans to use new technology to track how fast and how far motorcycles go. It's called telematics and someday could be used to help set insurance rates, among other things, but for now SGI is just trying the technology out with a pilot program.

It's looking for several hundred motorcycle users to volunteer to have their bikes equipped with telematics technology. The "black box"-type gadgets would record speed, braking, mileage and location. The volunteer riders would have weekly updates on their driving behavior, to show them what information SGI would be looking at.

"Usage-based insurance is the ultimate in rating fairness because it essentially lets the driver control their own insurance rate through their driving behavior," said Donna Harpauer, the minister responsible for SGI, "Simply put, those who drive responsibly pay less and those who don't pay more."

While no one's rates will be affected by the pilot program, the experiment is one of the ideas coming out of the Motorcycle Review Committee, a group formed in the wake of a storm of controversy after SGI had proposed boosting motorcycle rates an average of 73% to compensate for high injury claims. Government-owned SGI later withdrew its proposal and came back with some milder proposed increases for motorbikes, including the telematics pilot program that could begin as early as this season.

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

# We've come a long way, Baby! HISTORY OF WOMEN IN MOTORCYCLING

Aarch was women's history month, and it gave me an opportunity, or an excuse, to reflect on the impact women have had in motorcycling. I remember growing up and seeing Virginia Slims cigarette ads that said "You've come a long way baby". That is no further from the truth today when we talk about women and motorcycling – we've come a long way baby. But there were a few key women who formed our history and helped to put us in the position where we are today with a freedom to take the bars and ride wherever we want, enjoying the freedom of the wind next to our partners and not behind them, riding pillion. They forged the way for us, denying the stereotype that surrounded women, relegating them to the role of wife and mother, barefoot and pregnant, as they say. Women have been riding for almost as long as the motorcycle has been around;

since the late 1800's. In 1916 the VanBuren sisters, Adelene and Augusta, rode solo cross country on Indian motorcycles. They rode from New York to California and were the first to ride to the summit of Pike's Peak. They carried sand from the Atlantic Ocean and poured it into the Pacific Ocean. Many years later, Chris Sommer Simmons rode in the Cannonball endurance run, a coast to coast ride on antique motorcycles. In honor of Adelene and Augusta, she too poured sand from the Atlantic into the Pacific Ocean.

Bessie Stringfield was the first African American woman to ride across the United States solo and during World War II she served as one of the few motorcycle dispatch riders for the United States military. In the 1930s and 1940s, Bessie took eight long-distance, solo rides across the United States. Speaking to a reporter, she dismissed the notion that "nice girls didh't go around riding motorcycles in

those days." Further, she was apparently fearless at riding alone in an era when racial prejudice was a tangible threat. It was reported she was deliberately knocked down by a white male in a pickup truck while traveling in the south. Still, she was not deterred, and like the Van-Buren sisters set the stage for women in motorcycling. All these women were inducted into the AMA Motorcycle Hall of Fame.

Women are the fastest growing segment of the population currently purchasing new motorcycles. Women are racing motorcycles, traveling unchartered territory making solo rides across foreign countries; women are mechanics, bike builders and more. They are found in every facet of the motorcycle industry and are continuing to be written into the history of motorcycling. What the future holds is exciting and will certainly bring new technology and improvements in motorcycles that were once thought impossible. It is an exciting time to be a rider. But being a rider comes with responsibility; responsibility to ensure your bike is safe and you are prepared both physically and mentally for the road that will unravel be-

fore you bringing you to unlimited adventures.

Some things to consider if you're a lady rider, or thinking about becoming one are:

Typically women weigh less than men, are usually smaller in frame and shorter than men (but not always). This results in heavier bikes being difficult to maneuver and makes it difficult to reach the ground. Resolutions include: boots with 2" heels (make sure they are solid, cover/support the ankles, and are for riding not fashion), lowering the bike, or lowering the seat. Buy a bike that sits lower to the ground, like the Harley-Davidson Softail Deluxe. Avoid the Sportster 1200 custom or 883 (they sit higher), even if a man tells you to start with one. Learn on a small bike, like a Honda 250.

Learn how to pick up the bike if you drop it. Take a motorcycle safety course.

TCLOCS – Tires, Controls, Lights, Oil, Chassis, and Stands. This is the acronym used by the Motorcycle Safety Foundation to remind riders of all the areas of the motorcycle that should be inspected each time, before you ride.

Take a first aid and CPR course; self-aid/buddy care is an important facet. If you or a buddy is in an accident in a remote area, know what to do before first responders arrive. Always carry a cell phone. If traveling alone, let someone know your route and expected arrival time. Call them when you arrive, or if you are behind schedule. If you don't show up, they can send out a search party.

Ride to your abilities, even when following an experienced rider. If you can't keep up through the curves, slow down and take them to your ability. You'll get better as you gain experience.

Certain areas, times of year, and times of day are prone to deer strikes. Motorcycles and deer do not mix. I was in a collision with a deer several years ago. The deer lost, but it could have gone either way. It was so desolate that not one car passed us within the 20 minutes that we were on the side of the road. If traveling alone, consider taking a route that will not have you on lonely, country roads, where assistance will be hard to get if you're injured or out of gas. Trust me, there are places like that; the loneliest highway, the Mojave desert, the mountains of Tennessee and North Carolina, for instance.

Learn the history of motorcycling; think about joining a club like HOG. Read about patched clubs and learn the etiquette, and possible threats.

Finally, what to wear: the required gear, of course; ATGATT -- All The Gear All The Time. It's a personal choice, but laws vary from state to state and even country to country.

Know the rules, and the consequences of your choices. Not wearing a helmet is a personal choice in many states, but it may come with dire consequences, for instance. Consider your jewelry choices. If the necklace or earrings flap around in the wind, they will be a distraction. Rings can get caught on parts of the motorcycle, and should be avoided. Likewise, fringe on vests, chaps and other clothing items can be an annoyance and may cause you to be distracted, or may get caught up in the bike's moving parts. And, last – don't worry about helmet hair; although there are solutions – like the dent in your left boot, unless you have a heel/toe shifter, it just proves you RIDE.

One other famous motorcyclist, Theresa Wallach, inducted into the hall of fame in 2003 for her tireless efforts in furthering motorcycle education, training and safety, summed up the lifestyle in a 1977 interview with Road Rider Magazine:

"When I first saw a motorcycle, I got a message from it," she said. "It was a feeling – the kind of thing that makes a person burst into tears hearing a piece of music or standing awestruck in front of a fine work of art. Motorcycling is a tool with which you can accomplish something meaningful in your life. It is an art."

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# ABOUT JULIE'S JOURNEY ву Debra Wright

#### This is Julie Holt Legas

Julie's husband Scott Legas and brother, Tom Holt are both Detroit Firefighters Her father, the late Tom Holt, Sr. was also a Detroit Firefighter.



Julie is a beautiful woman with a zest for life, a big heart and a warm smile. She is doing her best to fight Cerebellar Ataxia, a debilitating disease that affects your motor skills.

Imagine being trapped in a body you can't control. You can't dress yourself or bathe yourself. You suffer violent tremors when trying to raise a spoon to your mouth. You are confined to a wheelchair, because you can't control your leg movements. For you, tying your shoe is a major accomplishment. Treatment after treatment has been endured in an effort to bring things under control. This is what life is like for Julie Holt Legas.

Julie wasn't always this way. Just a short time ago, life was normal. In October 2011 she and her husband Scott, a Detroit Firefighter, were enjoying life. Julie was a Dean's List student pursuing a Nursing degree. She wanted to care for others, to provide comfort and assistance to those in need. She began having unexplained lightheadedness and blurred vision. Her ability to walk and balance normally began to diminish.

October 2011 was the start of numerous visits to neurology, rheumatology, and her primary care doctor. A spinal tap was done in February 2012 and it was discovered that Julie's spinal fluid's protein levels, t-cells, etc. were way out of balance. Since then she has been treated at both the Cleveland Clinic, and Mayo Clinic.



She has undergone test after test, IVIG treatment (protein infusion), Riutuxan (a form of chemotherapy), Plasmapherisis (blood wash), and Cytoxan (another form of chemo).

With her motor skills and speech abilities continuing to degrade, Julie was confined to a wheelchair (since May 2012). She needs help doing the everyday things you and I take for granted. Julie describes this as "being trapped in a body that doesn't work". Thankfully, this disease attacks the body, but not the mind. As Scott savs "Julie is sharp as a tack."

In January 2013, Scott and Julie went to the Mayo Clinic. Hoping for another treatment, they were told that all the traditional treatment that is approved in America has been done, "Go home and adjust your lifestyle."

Being the fighters that Julie and Scott are, they were not satisfied with that answer. They will be going to Hope Hospital in Zhuhai, China for stem cell treatment. This treatment is cord cells, NOT embryotic or fetal cells. It consists of four injections that will provide approximately 400 million cells. This treatment has been showing promising results for patients with Cerebella Ataxia, but it is extremely expensive and not covered by insurance.





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


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# Road Captain Skills Challenge

eople seem to always wonder just how this all started. Well, as good or bad as it may sound the RCs of many local chapters just were tired of only meeting up for funerals. Between 1999 and 2006 three (3) of the local chapters had lost a road captain either on a ride, going to, or after a ride. 
Now in the fifth year, we found a welcomed parking lot at the Wayne Eagles where we continue to practice.

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# **Tech Tips By Steve**

# **CHARGE!**

No<sub>5</sub> don't go invading another country or charging a town and take it over with your small army, I mean charge your battery! I would like to go over the basics of your charging system that most all of you can do on your own. will go over how to test your battery for charge, load test your battery, charging system test, testing the circuit breaker and lastly a stator test.

In the spring, or anytime you feel like it, you will need a multi-meter, if you do not have one they run around \$25 all the way up \$550 or so for a top of the line Fluke Meter ... yes, yes the el cheapo at Harbor Freight will work fine and in fact we will be using such a bargain brand for this demonstration today. Before doing any testing please make sure your battery cable connections are clean and tight!

#### **Battery Testing**

The first test is a simple battery test, start by finding your battery, set the meter on DC and the range at 20, connect the red lead to positive terminal and the black to the negative terminal and you should be reading between 12.4V to 13.5V as shown below.



If your meter reading is lower don't worry guite yet, simply put it on a good battery maintainer like a Genius or a PulseTech, they will tell you if your battery can take a charge and will bring it to a charge safely without overcharging it. Most newer bikes have a small drain on the battery running items such as your computer and clocks, this will take your battery down within a few days so if you have not ridding your bike in a while or have not kept it on a battery maintainer you may get a low reading. In my opinion, the drain issue is why Harley started giving everyone free chargers and already installed maintainer cords with new bikes. Older batteries can lose a charge fast and can take a false charge, but will not hold it so the second you hit the starter they are weak or even worse will not work at all, most likely it is time to get a new battery. If you like, you can prove your weak battery theory with a load test. The load test is best done with a load tester but you can do it with a multi-meter too, and I will go over the multi-meter way due to the fact that most do not own a load tester. You have to make sure your bike does not start so the easiest way is to take your spark plug wires off, however do not take your plugs out because you need the compression load on the starting system. Now with your meter of DC range 20 and the leads connected to the battery hit the starter, the reading should be dip down around 10 or so, 9.5 is OK, but your battery is starting to go bad when you see a reading 9.0 to 9.5 VDC and if it is below 9 VDC change out your battery it will fail you very soon. This is assuming you have the correct battery size for your bike and it is fully charged before starting this test. This test is a bit hard on a battery so afterwards make sure you fully recharge your battery.

#### Basic charging system check

When your battery is fully charged the next step would be to check to see if your charging system is putting out a sufficient charge, and this is an easy test. You should already have your battery exposed from your last test; get your multimeter ready by setting it on DC and the range on 20 (same as the last test). Start your bike and rev it a little to excite the charging system ... (no, silly, not that kind of excite)... with the bike above idle put the multi-meter leads on the battery terminals ... red on positive and black on negative, your reading should be about 14.3 to 14.7 but should never be above 14.9. If your reading is below 14VDC your charging system is in the fritz!


What is on the fritz? Well assuming all your wiring and connections (Look at pic below) are in good shape, it could be the circuit breaker/fuse, regulator or the stator.



The picture above is a common problem on older Harley charging systems due to lack of maintenance, the connection gets rusty and eventually breaks. Unfortunately this is not a cheap thing to fix... usually you have to replace the stator

#### **Testing the Circuit Breaker**

First check the easiest one, which is the circuit breaker, do this by performing a continuity test with your multi-meter. A continuity test tells you whether you have a connection between two points or not, you can do this with fuses and any other wiring you wish to see if there is a break or heavy resistance in a wire/devise or not. Locate and disconnect the circuit breaker, set your meter on ohms, set the range on 2K and touch one lead to one post of the circuit breaker and the other lead on the other post you should read .000 which is the same if you took the two leads and touched them together. If it tests good, then the next thing is to test the regulator.



#### **Testing the Regulator**

The regulator takes the AC voltage from the stator and converts it to DC and charges the battery. Testing this is an easy test too, locate your regulator, it is most commonly just in front of the engine on Harleys, it is there because they get hot and need constant cooling and in my opinion why it is a bad idea to put a chrome cover over them. Using a 12VDC test light this time, connect one end to a ground and the other end to each pin on the regulator lead coming from the regulator, if you get any light whatsoever from any pin the regulator is bad. If it tests good or bad you should check your stator before replacing parts for two reasons, you could damage a new regulator if the stator is bad and if the stator is bad you can get a discount if you buy a whole charging system at the same time instead of buying parts as you go.




#### Stator test

The stator is under your primary cover buried under the primary chain sprocket so it's a real bugger if this goes bad. It is a stationary set of windings that have a rotor or a big magnet spinning around it to create AC voltage.



Stator problems are either a short to ground or an open circuit.

First, we will check for a ground using your test light again. Unplug the regulator from the stator and start the motor, put one end of the test light to each stator pin with the test light one at a time. If the bulb lights when connected between any of the stator plug pins and ground the stator is shorted and needs to be replaced.



Next check for output (an open winding will have little to no output) back to using your multi-meter on this test. With either a single or three phase system, first set your meter to AC this time and range at 200, unplug the regulator and then start the engine, rev it to a steady 1000 RPM.


On a single-phase system, connect one lead from the meter to each pin on the stator plug this will show you what the stator is putting out.

On a three-phase system, there are three separate windings hooked end to end. You need to test the voltage on each set of windings. The plug has three pins. First, take a voltage reading between pin one and pin two. Then pin one and pin three. And finally, pin two and pin three. This will test all three windings. All three should read the same voltage at the same RPM.



You will need to know what size your charging system is to know if it is working properly, for example a 32 amp stator should put out 18 volts VAC at 1000 RPM. at 2000 RPM it should be 36 VAC and at 3000 RPM it should be 54 VAC.

A stator that is shorted to ground may still produce full AC voltage from pin to pin. The problem with this is the rectifier changes the AC current to DC current and then uses the ground as one leg of the DC. When the stator shorts to ground the AC and DC get mixed together and our charging world is kaput.



In my humble opinion, if your stator is bad I would replace both the stator and regulator, it is just a safe way to go. Also, if you have a single phase unit I would replace it with a three phase unit if you can afford it. Three phase units do a much better job, especially at low RPMs.

Cycle Electric makes some great stuff right here in the USA and they have systems to retrofit almost all bikes to three phase. They also do the regulator thing a bit different, according to Karl, President and head master mind at Cycle Electric: "To control voltage on Harley Davidson alternators other rectifier regulators dump current to ground. This causes maximum stator current and temperature at all times. Cycle Electric rectifying regulators block current to control voltage. This reduces stator current resulting in lower temperature and less drag on the motor, which means more efficient operation. The largest and most noticeable benefit is a smoother charge to the battery. This means less battery maintenance and longer battery life."

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# WATKINS BOYZ SPEED & KUSTOMS







(Third in a series about some of the world-class, state-based motorcycle builders we have in Michigan)

Kip Watkins, owner of Watkins Boyz Speed & Kustoms, loves to paint. No matter if it's bikes, hot rods, Jeeps or even signs. He says, "I paint because I love to. I don't do it for the money or the fame...and besides it's too late to become a brain surgeon." He is a second generation painter. He followed his father, Donnie Watkins, a custom painter, into the business at age 14. Donnie painted custom choppers in the 60's and 70's was happy to pass along his skills to his son. Kip's first paint job was his `67 Firebird. And since opening his first shop in 1983, Kip has "...never looked back." Over the past 30 years he has always maintained a shop in the Traverse City/ Kalkaska area. And his newest shop is on US 31 South just outside Traverse City.

Since then, Kip has learned how to do more than just paint. He has done 30 ground-up builds, dozens of 'mild' custom builds, 300+ paint jobs as well as too many 4 wheeled vehicles to count. The walls in Kip's shop are filled with the magazine plaques showcasing his talents. A lot of bikes including, Kenny Olson's (yup that Kenny) "Six-String Sled", to the "So-Kal (Kalkaska) Speedster", the "#38 Bike" (one of Kip's favorites), or the "Rajun Indian" (more on that in a bit). As well as building bikes for Kenny Wayne Shepherd (yes that Kenny), A.J. Foyt and Larry Foyt (grandsons of the Champion Indy driver). And even a satiny-blue and white bike for the Editor of American Iron Magazine, Chris Maida.



Although he can do anything, the style of bikes Kip REALLY likes to build are the vintage racing style bike of the 30's, 40's and 50's. Something you'd have seen at the drag strip, road race or even the salt flats. As witnessed in the aforementioned "Rajun Indian". A vintage, raced-themed, copper clad beauty. All built around an Indian Motorcycle 'bottle cap' motors Kip acquired through a chance meeting at the Detroit AutoRama, with the man responsible for manufacturing them for Indian. One minute he's saying what a great design the engine was, and how well it looked, and then they're exchanging names, numbers and addresses and talking details for shipping a complete engine. He also Thanks his Dad, his family and Roche Featherstone, for without their support, Watkins Boyz Speed & Kustoms would not be what it is today.

I asked him, "Where do you think the industry is going?" Kip believes that regulations will slowly continue to strangle the small builders, eventually out of business altogether. He says "...you have paint; you're going to need a fire suppression system and special storage area." "...you do welding; you're going to need extra insurance....
