





Is it Warm Yet?

I never did end up going to Florida after all in March. I had to stay and deal with the insurance company etc after a fire at my house. Oh well, stuff happens Speaking of Florida:

Florida In-State Tuition for Veterans

Warm weather is not the only reason military veterans may decide to head to Florida. The state will now waive out-of-state tuition fees for veterans. The Florida G.I. Bill eliminates out-of-state tuition fees for honorably discharged veterans The new law, which won unanimous support in the state legislature in March, will cost an estimated \$11.5 million annually, according to state officials.

The federal post 9-11 G.I. bill obligates the Department of Veterans Affairs to cover in-state tuition for all military veterans within a 15-year period of their retiring from the service. The new measure in Florida means veterans who are not residents of the state will no longer have to pay the out-of-state difference in tuition, so there will be no out-of-pocket tuition costs for veterans.

Veteran Seeks to Open Military Stores to All Who Served

Thales Newsome of Orangeburg spent a decade in the military, with 13 months

Having put his life on the line for his country, he said he was shocked by what he experienced when he went shopping at the Fort Jackson military base earlier

"I went to the Army base to buy some military items," Newsome said. "When went to the cashier, she asked for my military identification card. I showed her my veteran's card and my driver's license.

"She needed to see a current military card," he said. "I informed her that I am a combat veteran and spent ten years in the military. She told me that was not good enough and that I was not authorized to shop there."

That prompted Newsome to begin collecting signatures on a petition to allow all veterans to shop at military installations. Newsome received 200 signatures, which were sent to U.S. Congressman James Clyburn last month and is now working on obtaining another 200 signatures to be sent to President Barack Obama.

The DeCA notes that commissaries provide veterans an average cost savings of more than 30 percent compared to shopping at a civilian grocery store.

Sheriff Joe Introduces Segregated Veterans' Unit in Arizona Jail

Maricopa County Sheriff Joe Arpaio has introduced a new jail unit specifically for inmates who served in the military, joining eight other jail units under his jurisdiction in Phoenix, Arizona.

"They fought for our country. The least we can do is help them. When some came back, some had mental problems. We have drug prevention programs, alcoholism," said Arpaio.

He hopes segregating the veterans will help keep them on the right track. "I served in the military in the Korean War, so I have a bond with these guys. I want to see them succeed," said Arpaio.

The cell blocks in the veterans' unit are painted red, white and blue. Flags from all branches of the military hang from the ceiling, and military themes adorn the walls. The unit is home to 250 veterans, the majority from Maricopa County's Durango Jail, which houses over 2,200 general population male inmates.

Inmate Touche Jamar Pouncey is an Operation Desert Storm/Desert Shield veteran. He is currently in jail for probation violation, and admits transitioning back to civilian life was a challenge. "I've seen decapitations; I've seen people burned up. I've seen a lot of things that affected my brain and why I do the things that I do now." Pouncey said.

Maricopa County Jail provides special services to the veteran inmates suffering from PTSD, such as psychological attention and job training. Special treatment programs are not the only benefits. Inmates in the veterans' unit do not see the gang wars that dominate the jail's general population. "Where we've come from and what we've experienced throughout the military is camaraderie. It's deeper than what your race is. Being here is a blessing because we don't have to deal with the constant violence," said Pouncey.

Veterans Fly American Flags for 1st Time in 14 Years at Hart Plaza

A group of U.S. war veterans gathered today at Hart Plaza on Detroit's riverfront, where they returned large American flags to poles that had been bare for 14 years.


With a tall ladder amid falling snow, the veterans raised each of five 10-by-15-foot flags on their newly restored poles near Jefferson Avenue. Then they sang "God Bless America."

A \$60,000 fund-raiser is under way to bring to 20 the number of bright, bold, new American flags flying in the plaza by Flag Day on June 14.

IF HE WAS YOUR SON.

t times over the last few years I catch myself thinking about two parents that I have never met but that have become very much a part of my prayers. I wonder what each day in their lives must be like. I think the not knowing would drive me half crazy. Of course I'm talking about Jani and Robert Bergdahl. They are the parents of Sgt. Bowe Bergdahl the only American being held captive in the Afghanistan conflict. I have three sons of my own and it was hard to sleep when they would come home a little late as they were growing up. It's hard to think about what these two parents have been going through for the last 4 ½ years.

First we need to remember that Bowe is not the only missing American. He is the only missing soldier from the current conflict. I think most of you know where I stand on this subject. If there is ever one American missing it is one too many. WE MUST NEVER LEAVE ONE BEHIND! When someone joins out military they do so to defend our freedom. It seems that the least we can do as a people is to make sure they come home. There is no flag I have ever seen that moves me the way the POW/MIA flag does. As most of you know I wear a doo rag almost everyday. It is not an accident that most of them have to do with our POW/MIA. We must not let this issue be swept under some political rug. We as a people must demand that our politicians bring our soldiers home. Every Tuesday for the last three years I have shared on my Facebook page Bring Bowe home. I never thought it would still have to be shared almost 5 years after he was captured. I ride with some friends and we decided to get some of the Vietnam POW/MIA bracelets only this time with Bowe Bergdahl on them and wear them until he comes home. I had no clue it would be on still. I wear it with honor and hope his parents know they are not alone.

Sgt. Bergdahl was born March 26, 1986 in Sun Valley Idaho. Bowe was assigned to the 501st Infantry Regiment, 4th Brigade Combat Team, 25th Infantry Division based at Fort Richardson, Alaska. He went missing on June 30, 2009 in South East Afghanistan near the Pakistan border. He is believed to be held by the Haggani network an insurgent group affiliated with the Taliban somewhere in Pakistan. There have been a few videos where he has been seen alive. The latest was dated Dec. 14, 2013 and in the video he talks about the death of Nelson Mandela proving that the video was filmed recently. There are also reports out there that ay that he was drunk when captured or that he joined the Taliban. Most of the reports have been denied by the Dept. of Defense. I don't care about the circumstances, BRING HIM HOME and we can sort all the rest out.


In closing I just think that we need to treat our soldiers better. They have no problem signing a blank check to the American people. When we stop taking care of the ones that defend our freedom we lose the part of us that makes us Americans. Bowes parents watched him leave for military service with the belief that one way or another he would come home someday. We need to keep that promise to them. Because like I said at the beginning WHAT IF IT WERE YOUR SON ...?

The Motorcycle Lawyer on THE LAW

Get Endorsed. Get Insured. Spread the Word. May is Motorcycle Awareness Month

Motorcycle season is finally underway, and during the month of May we recognize Motorcycle Awareness Month. This month is a chance to celebrate all things motorcycling and to promote awareness among all drivers by encouraging them to watch for motorcycles. Over the years I've helped a lot of injured bikers with their motorcycle crash cases, and I wanted to share three important things Michigan riders can do to help protect themselves and other bikers during this motorcycle season.

Get endorsed: In Michigan, a motorcycle endorsement (CY) is required in order to ride on the roads legally. Having a CY endorsement means you have passed a vision test and a written test at a Secretary of State office, you have passed a rider skills test or completed a certified motorcycle safety course, and that you have brought proof of having done these things to the Secretary of State's office to get your endorsement.

Getting a motorcycle endorsement in Michigan isn't expensive; the initial cost is less than \$15, and renewals are only \$5. It's worth it: riders who are pulled over without one could be fined and may have points added to their driver's license. Legal benefits aside, motorcyclists who get their CY endorsement will be able to apply the skills and lessons they learn from their experience.

Get insured: As The Motorcycle Lawyer, I can't emphasize enough how important it is to have proper insurance on your motorcycle. Without insurance, you can be left high and dry if you put your bike down or if something happens to you; the risks of riding without proper insurance far outweigh the costs to insure yourself and your bike.

In Michigan, the bare minimum insurance for motorcyclists is to have bodily injury coverage. Without it, you're not riding legal. In my opinion, you should also have uninsured and under-insured motorist coverage. These compensate you for your injuries if the negligent driver has no insurance or too little insurance. I always recommend carrying a medical or health insurance policy as well; call it a "backup plan." No Fault only pays the medical bills when a "motor vehicle" is involved. Without this backup you could be stuck with the medical bills if you go down because of something like loose gravel, a pothole, an animal, or another motorcyclist.

In Michigan, wearing a helmet is the motorcyclist's choice. If you plan to ride without a helmet, you also need to have at least \$20K in First Party Medical Benefits coverage for yourself, and any passenger, over the age of 21, who plans to ride without a helmet must also have \$20K as well. Collision coverage will pay to fix your bike if it is damaged in a crash, and accessories coverage will cover repair or replacement costs if you have any custom work or accessories on your bike.

You know the expression, "dress for the crash, not the ride"? I always tell people that insurance is protection, and you can never be over-insured. Insure yourself and your bike for the crash so you can enjoy the ride without worry.

Spread the word: There's only so much motorcyclists can do to protect themselves while out on the road. Obviously, how we ride matters, as does getting endorsed and being properly insured. At the end of the day, though, a big part of rider safety is ensuring that car and truck drivers are aware of motorcycles and share the road. Without driver awareness, it's almost impossible for motorcyclists to ride safely. That's why motorcycle awareness campaigns are so important. My office has spent a lot of time and energy creating a Watch for Motorcycles campaign that involves billboards, bumper stickers, and driver education to remind people to be hyper-vigilant when they get behind the wheel of their cars.

In my opinion, every motorcyclist in Michigan needs to be actively involved in promoting motorcycle awareness; tell your friends, get a bumper sticker for your car or truck and a sign for your lawn, and use social media to spread the word. Remind drivers that motorcyclists are everywhere. Tell them that motorcycles are harder to see than larger vehicles, so they should look twice. Let them know that most motorcycle-car crashes happen at intersections, when a car turns left directly in front of a biker. Motorcycle awareness campaigns don't work if nobody hears about them.



The Winners














TEGH TIPS OUTD

After one of the coldest winters on record, even some of the most hard core Midwest riders have left their bikes sitting for an extended period of time. "Sitting" is pretty much the worst thing possible for a motorcycle - especially if left unprepared for the lack of activity. In most cases, the biggest challenge will be your old fuel – if not properly treated with a stabilizer. While this has always been an issue – the standard use of Ethanol in our fuel makes things even

Condensation can also build up in the tank and possibly get water in the gas and carburetor. This can especially be a problem if the tank was left less than full or if the temperature went up and down a lot over the winter. You should ALWAYS fill up your tank with treated fuel before

storing or leaving your bike to sit. Of course, we don't always plan on leaving our rides parked for extended periods – so old fuel is often an issue we must consider

As gas gets old, it breaks down and turns into a varnish form, the last thing you want to do is try to



start the motorcycle, otherwise it will try to draw all that solid varnish material into the idle and main jets, and clog them up so bad that the motorcycle will hardly idle or won't even run until you clean them

It is almost impossible to empty all of the fuel from any engine system so there is always old fuel somewhere in any fuel system. Straight gasoline starts to deteriorate around 30-60 days and ethanol fuels break down even faster than straight gasoline. When gasoline breaks down leaving gum and varnish in fuel tanks, fuel lines, carburetors, etc. Ethanol is also a great cleaner of gums, varnishes, dirt and the rust that water in the fuel creates. That is why ethanol is used in almost every bottle of carb / injector cleaner on the market. So when you fill up your tank you introduce fresh ethanol to run through your fuel system and it will dissolve the deposits running all that crud through the engine's fuel system clogging fuel filters, injectors, and carburetors. Clogged fuel filters will drop fuel pressures telling the regulator to work the electric fuel pump harder to keep the fuel pressure up. This will burn out fuel pumps. Gummed up carburetors and fuel injectors all lead to poor performance and all of this leads to hefty repair bills. Considering you never really know how long the E10 sits at the refinery in a holding tank before it gets transported to the pump station to sit in the underground storage tank just to be purchased by you to sit in your tank before being burned in the engine, break down of the E10 gasohol fuel can be a real issue.

Pure gasoline does not absorb water but ethanol will. Ethanol is hydrophollic this means it pulls moisture from the air and bonds with it. In ideal conditions E10 gasohol will keep roughly .5% water by volume is suspended in gasoline. Our fuel tanks and fuel storage cans are hardly ideal conditions as they need to be vented allowing the ethanol to absorb more moisture from the atmosphere or in the form of condensation. Ethanol never truly bonds with assoline molecules; it is a loose mixture at best so when the threshold of .5% water is exceeded or the E10 gasohol mixture cools off every night the water / ethanol solution falls out of suspension in the gasoline. Oil and gasoline float on water as they are lighter than water so the water / ethanol mixture will stay at the bottom of your fuel tank. The process of the water and ethanol separating from the gasoline and sinking to the bottom is called "Phase Separation". Phase Separation is a real


problem because the water from the bottom of the tank is sucked up and sent to the engine it causes a lean condition raising the engine temperature causing valve damage, carburetor, fuel lines and electronic fuel injection pumps pull fuel from the bottom of the tanks where the ethanol / water mix stays and water doesn't burn well in the engine leading to premature engine / fuel system corrosion and poor engine performance. It gets worse, ethanol and water mix in E10 gasoline is a breeding ground for microbes like bacteria and fungi which just adds to the corrosion and debris in your fuel system.

All of this means that you need to do something about your old gas. If you stored your bike without adding any fuel stabilizer to your gas, the first thing you want to do is drain the fuel into a safe container without any holes in the bottom so no fuel leaks out. Pull the hose off the petcock (fuel valve) and make sure fuel comes out. Drain each float bowl on each carburetor by opening the drain valve screw on the lower outer side of each carburetor float bowl. Make sure to inspect this fuel very carefully. If it smells like bad fuel, but doesn't have any rust or any solid varnish particles floating around. You're good to go. Check the condition of the fuel tank. If there isn't any debris in the tank. You can flush it out with fresh fuel and put some fresh fuel in it. Your old fuel can go into your cage (four wheeled vehicle) - if it doesn't have any debris in it. They are far less sensitive and it will mix in with the newer fuel in the larger tank. No need to waste it.

If the fuel looks OK, then put the fuel hose back on, turn the fuel valve on, and let some fuel run through the carburetors, and flush out the float bowls. Then turn the fuel valve off. Close all the drain valve screws on the floats and turn the fuel back on. Hopefully, no fuel will run out any of the hoses anymore. If it does, then you have dirt in the needle and seat portion of the float and you will have to pull the carburetors and clean them.


If you drain the tank and brown sediment flows out with the fuel you will have to pull the carburetors and have them cleaned and synchronized by your local mechanic.

To avoid these problems in the future, at the end of the riding season, make sure to top off the tank with fuel and add fuel




No matter how comfortable you keep your bike over the winter – the fuel in the tank will break down.





or a mid-season 2014 release, Harley-Davidson returned to the same place it unveiled the original icon in 1977 – Daytona Beach. 





The Legend of the Bell

any years ago, on a cold December night, a crusty old biker was returning from a trip to Mexico with his saddlebags filled with toys and other assorted trinkets for the kids at a group home near where he worked. As he rode along that night, he thought about how lucky he had been in life, having a loving riding partner that understood his need to roam the highways and to his trusty old pan that hadn't let him down once in the many years they had shared the road together.

Well, about 40 miles north of the border, in the high desert, lurked a small group of notorious little critters known as road gremlins. You know, the ones who always leave little obstacles like, one shoe, boards, and pieces of old tires on the road, and also dig those dreaded potholes for bikers to run over and crash, thus giving the road gremlins a chance to rejoice over their acts of evil.

Well, as the lone wolf of a biker rounded a curve that moonlit night, the gremlins ambushed him, causing him to crash to the asphalt and skid before coming to a stop next to one of his saddlebags that had broken free. As he lay there, unable to move, the road gremlins made their way towards him. Well, this biker, not being one to give up, started throwing things at the gremlins as they approached him. Finally, with nothing else to throw but a bell, he started ringing it in hopes to scare off the dirty little gremlins.

About a half a mile away, camped in the desert, were two bikers sitting around the campfire talking about their day's ride, and the freedom of the wind blowing in their faces as they rode across this vast country. In the stillness of the night air they heard what sounded to them like church bells ringing, and upon investigating, found the old biker lying along the roadside with the gremlins about to get him. Needless to say, being part of the biker brotherhood, they proceeded to ward off the gremlins until the last ran off into the night.

Being grateful to the two bikers, the old road dog offered to pay them for their help, but as all true bikers do, they refused to accept any type of payment from him. Not being one to let a good deed go unnoticed, the old biker cut two pieces of leather

from his saddlebags tassels and tied a bell to each one. He then placed them on each of the biker's motorcycles, as near to the ground as possible. The tired, old road warrior then told the two travelers that with those bells placed on their bikes, they would be protected from the road gremlins and that if ever in trouble, just ring the bell and a fellow biker will come to their aid.

So, whenever you see a biker with a bell, you know that he has been blessed with the most important thing in life—friendship from a fellow biker.

THE PURPOSE OF THE BELL

Many of us have heard the story about Evil Road Spirits. They are little gremlins that live on your bike. They love to ride, and they're also responsible for most of your bike's problems. Sometimes your turn signals refuse to work; your battery goes dead, the clutch needs adjustment, or any of several hundred things that can go wrong. These problems are caused by Evil Road Spirits. Evil Road Spirits can't live in the presence of the bell, because they get trapped in the hollow of the bell. Among other things, their hearing is supersensitive, so the constant ringing of the bell and the confined space drives them insane. They lose their grip and eventually fall to the roadway. Have you ever wondered how potholes are formed? The bell has served its purpose.

If you pick up a Bell of your own, the magic will work, but if your bell is given to you, the power is doubled, and you know that somewhere you have a special friend helping to look after you. So, if you have a friend who doesn't have a bell, why not give them one? It's a nice feeling for the recipient to know you care. The bell, plus a good preventive maintenance program by the bike's owner, will help eliminate Evil Road Spirits.

POLISHING THE BELL

It has been a tradition among some of us for a long time to attach a brass bell to our left swing arm, to remember our brothers and sisters who have gone down riding. It's a small thing, but the reason a brass bell is chosen is that, as we ride, it gets dirty and tarnished. Every time we get down washing and polishing it, we are reminded of friends lost, and our thoughts turn to the meaning of being in the wind. As we ride and hear the bell ring, we know that our brothers and sisters are riding with us, and how easy it would be to join them with a single mistake. And maybe, just maybe, the next time a situation comes up; they will be there to help us...as long as we remember them by polishing the bell.





ABATE OF MICHIGAN LOOK FOR MOTORCYCLES

May was Motorcycle Awareness month. Then the government decided to change it to Motorcycle Safety Awareness month. Can't seem to ever leave well enough alone can they?

Anyway, time to get the signs out at excellent locations where cagers will be reminded to LOOK FOR MOTORCYCLES. ABATE of Michigan eliminated the whole May is whatever thing and focused solely on the message to, "watch out for motorcycles" this year. We have signs available for \$10 non-members and \$8 members that are designed to get the message out all summer long. See your local Abate Region Coordinator.

We have some other great ideas around the state that make an impact on motorcycle awareness also. In Grand Rapids Region 8 initiated a deal with the public transportation system to have Watch For Motorcycle signs on the backs of their busses. Excellent idea. Near and dear to my heart is our Region 21 Summer of Awareness Radio PSA program. We have 10 Public Service Announcements played 10 times a day on two of Mid Michigan's most popular radios stations. We record them ourselves and have a great time doing it. I can't say how many times over the years people say "I heard you on the radio"!

Our riders course trainers have already taught over 400 people how to ride and got them on the track to a cycle endorsement. We have dozens of Abate events already planned all across the state this summer. These events are all volunteer events that raise money FOR BIKERS IN MICHIGAN to have legislative representation in Lansing.

Speaking of legislation, we have been busy this last winter and with spring here you might appreciate a few accomplishments that we worked on that are beneficial to motorcyclists. HB 4781 should be completely passed by now, this reduces the number of Temporary permits obtainable, so as to ensure people get an endorsement.

HB 4265 Passed. Allows motorcyclists to run a red light after two cycles when their motorcycle won't trigger the light. HB 5191 Passed. Allows choice on a helmet for ORV use on own property. HB 5211 Passed. Allows motorcyclists to sue for motorcycle damage up to \$1000, which was not allowed prior. HB 5438 Passed. Requires Drivers training classes to include Motorcycle Awareness. HB 4630 Dead. This bill would have raised license plate fees for motorcycles dramatically. HB 4763 Dead. This bill would have allowed tickets to be written based on Camera data.

Add to that our efforts in Washington to fight against Motorcycle Only Checkpoints, a National Federal Helmet law, and posturing for Mandatory High Visibility Clothing. The oversized, over funded, need to justify their existence, federal safety agencies just keep coming back with another attack on our freedoms and lifestyle.




miles of this trip were on Interstates.)





Join Along on the Motorcycle Ride of a Lifetime

Author's Journey Takes Him Across North America

Just Cruzin' is a day-by-day account of Douglas A. Miller's ultimate motorcycle ride of a lifetime, which took him from Southwest Michigan across the byways of North America. On his two-month journey, he encountered wild animals, mechanical failures, vast climate changes, and narrowly escaped death.

The 16,246-mile transcontinental motorcycle ride began and ended in Michigan. About the Author: Douglas A. Miller didn't plan to write a book, but was encouraged by people who followed his adventure and heard his story. He has lived most of his life in Southwest Michigan, where he now resides in semi-retirement following a career in nursing.

Tech Tips By Steve


SHOKINGS

Street Glides ride harsh and that's being nice about it! Harley Davidson used their lower air shocks on the bike and they simply are a horrible riding shock, heck even the Ultra Glide shock is not all that great with the extra 1" of ride height. BUT, I have finally found a rear shock that will ride perfect for all Harleys (including trikes). You really have to try HARD to bottom out with full bags and 500+ pounds of riders on board ... even with a lower ride height if you choose! Too good to be true? ... Nope, they are a coil shock made by Terry Cable. Terry will build 'em just for your riding type and load with a huge amount of adjustability too if things change. Still not convinced, well ask Will Barclay the two time winner of the Hoka Hey Motorcycle Challenge riding over 10,000 miles straight with no hotels, no stopping for restaurants and almost no rest on a Harley Ultra Glide with Terry's rear shocks and front suspension upgrades. When you order them from your local shop tell them as much info as you can so Terry can have them already set for you. Of course, there is a crap load of adjustment available on these so if you would like a softer or firmer ride you can easily adjust to your liking. BONUS they are made in the USA!



Terry Cable Shocks- You will receive two shocks pre-adjusted and an adjusting tool (if you have a bagger you will also get the two air line plugs).

Easy to install, take off your bags if you have them, place a towel over your exhaust just in case something goes wrong and you drop something. Then remove the airline by pulling the top red tab up and wiggling the airline out and inserting the stainless air feed plug supplied with the kit so the shock won't loose air. Do this on both sides first, if you are not using a jack, so the shocks don't collapse. Personally, I like using a flat jack so I know nothing is going to fall or collapse, it makes it easier to line things up. Take the bottom bolt out first and then remove the top bolt, holding the shock in your hand to make sure it does not fall and scratch your exhaust. Then install it all in the reverse order one side at a time. You will be done in about 30 minutes or so!


I have unscrewed and raised the chrome cover to show you just how huge of a ride adjustment you have!

Now I would like to address the front forks and the lack of maintenance done on them. I believe you should change out your fluid every 20K; this can be quite a chore if you have an ultra or road glide which came with a left fork cartridge system 2002-2005 (NOT Road King). To do the oil change on this fork system you need to take the front left fork off to service it, what I like to do is switch out the innards to the old style or use the newer style cartridge emulator or dampening valve that Harley starting putting in the 2006 and newer that made them work like a cartridge style shock but made them easier to service and work much better.



The top spring is the cartridge style and the bottom is the Traditional style

A non-Harley service manual trick to change fork fluid on most other Harley model forks including both forks on the 2001 and older style fairing bikes and the right fork on the 2002-2005 fairing bikes and both forks on 2006 and newer style fairing model Harleys is as follows. Pull the ground wire off battery, take out the ignition switch by inserting the key and turning the switch to the accessory position then push up on a small tab under the switch and rotate the switch till it stops and pull up on the housing removing it, watching out for the spring under the switch because it may fall out. There is a nut below that with a metal and plastic spacer that you will have to remove. Then remove the plastic cover unplugging the wiring harness from it, this will gain you access to the top fork nut. You will have to spend about \$20 or so for a special socket to remove it without damaging your bike, Yup I have done without using this tool but it is soooooo easy with the correct tool!

After the top nut is removed take out the bottom drain plug. Tip – use a hand impact driver to take out the drain plug, it is in there tight and you can strip out the phillips head if you're not careful. Drain out the fork oil and measure how much comes out; you should get about 10oz or so after compressing the forks a few times.

When putting the new fluid back in the 2006 and newer bikes (Tip-ALWAYS use a new fork drain bolt and sealing washer) ONLY put about half of the fluid back in, put the top cap on then slowly compress the forks up and down, this will allow the fluid to get by the dampening valve. Pull the top cap back off and slowly dump the rest of the fork fluid in, put fork top cap back on, tighten and compress the forks a few times again.

For the 2002-2005 fairing model guys, you have a choice to make, however all of them include taking at least the left fork off the bike like the picture below. One choice is to follow Harley Davidsons service procedure and service the cartridge like the instruct then do this again in 20K miles. The second choice is you could buy the innards from a non-cartridge style FL fork system and install them into the left leg and discard the cartridge. YES the lower legs or "sliders" are the same inside on the cartridge and non-cartridge forks, then the next service interval you can do the service the easy way. With this choice you may get some fork dive due to no cartridge in the left fork but I have not heard any complaints from people doing this (you can always use heavier weight fluid to get a stiffer ride). Third choice is to get the innards from a 2006 and newer fairing Harley and change both sides out to the updated dampening valve system and have your cake and eat it too.

HUGE thank you to Richard Wityk from Ohio for taking the time to hand write me a letter describing his dealership fun fuel problem ... Turns out they said he had a bad baffle in the fuel filter on his injected 2007 Harley Deuce that would shift and shut off the fuel, similar problem we talked about a few articles ago with the fuel line pinhole on injected bikes, it would run great then starve for fuel and shut off, then coast to a stop try it again and the bike would run fine ... sorry you had a problem on the road Richard L but glad it is all fixed and you are up and riding J. Tip- always replace both fuel lines and the filter if you suspect this problem.

Hope you are all riding and having a great time brothers and sisters!

I field a lot of questions from bikers, especially when they see: my Sporty parked outside the shop, and one of the most common is, "Can I open carry on my bike?" The legal answer is, though it may be visible, it is legally considered concealed. because you are operating a motor vehicle. You may carry it : you are cheating yourself, and ignorance of the law is not an exunloaded, in a locked case, with ammo separate from the gun, reasonably out of reach within your saddlebags, and then there the premises of anywhere that sells beer, wine, or liquor – that exception of bars), and you may have your loaded gun on you, concealed or not! There are several steps you must take, and it will cost you about \$200-\$300, but it's absolutely worthwhile if you want to ride and have your firearm with you.

STEP ONE: Be a resident.

I know this may sound silly, but not all states require residency to issue a concealed weapons permit. Michigan does. You must be a resident of the State of Michigan for at least six months prior to applying for your Concealed Pistol License (CPL), though this may be waived if you hold a current license from your prior state of residency.

STEP TWO: Know your background.

In order to obtain a license to carry concealed, you must undergo a background check by the State of Michigan, in order to prove that you have behaved in a lawful and responsible manner in the past. Before you proceed to step three, you should read the application to verify that you meet all the requirements.

STEP THREE: Take a class.

The State of Michigan has explicit requirements that CPL classes must meet in order to be valid. Be sure that you are enrolling in a class that will give you a solid education, because otherwise: on the "Firearms" tab on the left side of the page.


