



# BMW REVAMPS THE R 1200 GS FOR 2013



It's been 9 years since BMW introduced the R 1200 GS, during which time it has clearly become one of the all-time great motorcycles. It is the world's top selling enduro and BMW's all time most popular model with over 170,000 bikes sold. For 2013, this class defining motorcycle receives an almost shocking change - adopting a liquid cooling system.

BMW is quick to point out that their system is an "Air/Liquid Cooling System". Taking a page from Formula 1 engine design, BMW has developed what they call "precision cooling". The newly updated Boxer Engine replaces the more traditional coolant oil with a glycol-water mixture which allows a higher level of heat absorption and dissipation. This liquid cooling system only circulates through the high temperature, extreme stress points. The balance of the engine is cooled by fins on the exposed cylinder heads. BMW Engineers report that the cooling ratio is 65% air to 35% liquid (glycol-water blend) - while previous versions were 78% air to 22% liquid (oil).

BMW has indicated that the move to the new design was aimed at improved noise and exhaust emissions, but industry experts believe that competition may have also driven the change. The BMW GS has faced increased challenges in terms of performance from its two main European rivals - the liquid cooled Ducati Multistrada and Triumph Explorer.

The new Boxer Twin appears to boost the GS to 125 hp from 110 and shows an increase in torque production to 92.2 lb/ft from 88.5 at 6000. The results come from an engine that maintains the same 1170cc displacement as before.

BMW has also improved throttle response and engine control through its E-Gas

electronic throttle sensor system. This ride-by-wire approach also allows for cruise control and multiple performance settings. The GS also introduces five ride mode options as well - all aimed at fine tuning the riding experience. Here is a summary of the changes, as provided by BMW.



Clean controls and improved ergonomics are key to the new GS

### E-GAS AND CRUISE CONTROL

An electromotive throttle actuator is now used for the first time in a GS motorcycle. Here, rider commands are passed on directly by the sensor in the accelerator twist grip to the engine control system; this then regulates the throttle valve electronically. The use of the E-gas system provides a significant improvement in terms of controllability and response. What is more, the rider can adapt engine characteristics to the situation on the road by means of five modes (optional extra). It was also possible to include an electronic cruise control function (optional extra).

# ASC AND RIDING MODES AS AN OPTIONAL EXTRA: FIVE FREELY SELECTABLE MODES - "RAIN", "ROAD", "DYNAMIC", "ENDURO" AND "ENDURO PRO"

For optimum adaptation to the rider's individual needs and purpose, the new R 1200 GS now offers five freely selectable riding modes for the first time: these are an ex works option and feature three different E-gas settings and with varying engine characteristics. Linked to this is Automatic Stability Control ASC with a special enduro configuration. If this option is chosen, BMW Motorrad ABS, ASC and - if installed - the semi active suspension are all adapted to the respective profiles of these five modes

## SEMIACTIVE SUSPENSION: BMW MOTORRAD DYNAMIC ESA FOR OPTIMUM RIDING DYNAMICS IN EVERY SITUATION AS AN EX WORKS OPTION

The new semi active suspension BMW Motorrad Dynamic ESA (Electronic Suspension Adjustment) taps into a whole new range of possibilities as well as provid-





ing maximum riding safety and performance. Dynamic ESA monitors the vertical movement of front and rear wheel control as well as other parameters by means of a spring travel sensor in each position, and adapts the damping automatically to the situation depending on riding conditions and the maneuvers being carried out. Damping adjustment at front and rear is effected by means of electrically controlled regulation valves.

### NEW CHASSIS WITH TUBULAR STEEL BRIDGE FRAME AND SPECIALLY ADAPTED WHEEL/TIRE DIMENSIONS OF 120/70 R19 AT FRONT AND 170/60 R17 AT REAR AS A WORLD FIRST

The chassis of the R 1200 GS uses a completely newly developed tubular all-steel bridge frame with a bolt-on rear frame. Along with the newly designed Telelever at the front and the EVO Paralever at the rear, this has resulted in a further significant increase in torsion stiffness and hence ride stability and steering precision. Optimized handling qualities are the result of refined master geometric chassis data, and a longer swing arm provides further improved traction - especially when riding over rough terrain.

A globally unique feature of the new R 1200 GS are the tires in the sizes 120/70 R19 at the front and 170/60 R17 at the rear, specially adapted to improve performance.



The new R 1200 GS has the innovative new vehicle power system with altered function partitioning as already used in the 6-cylinder models K 1600 GT and GTL. As before, CAN bus (Controller Area Network) and LIN bus technology (Local Interconnect Network) enables significantly reduced wiring as compared to a conventional system. The previous central vehicle electronics has been partitioned into two separate control units.

The Multi-Controller, newly available for the GS, allows fast and convenient operation of the BMW Motorrad Navigator IV. It is located on the inside of the handlebar grip. This means that selecting functions is much less distracting than pressing buttons and does not require hands to be removed from the handlebars.

### AERODYNAMICALLY OPTIMIZED WINDSHIELD WITH ONE-HAND OPERATION AND OPTIMUM ERGONOMICS

The improved knee grip can be clearly felt when seated, too. A high and a low seat, as well as an adjustable footrest system and adjustable foot controls, round off the program of special accessories offering individual adjustment facilities.

### Hero's Card

The Soaring Eagle Casino in Mt. Pleasant, MI introduced the Hero's Card. The card is only for active duty, retired and veteran members of the military and the card is free. Some of the perks for it are one complimentary first-class room per month (I assume there are date/day restrictions but I haven't had time to inquire), \$20 per week in pre-loaded Premium Pay, 50% off one concert ticket price and 20% off at the spa, and 30% off at Aurora Buffet. ### Free Michigan State Park Entry for Certain Veterans

In June, Michigan Governor Rick Snyder signed a pair of bills that offer free state park entries to veterans who are eligible for 100 percent disability, who were prisoners of war, or who have received the Medal of Honor.

House Bills 4297 and 4439, sponsored by state Rep. Frank Foster, waive the annual \$11 state park Recreation Passport fee for vehicle license plates issued to those military veterans. The Michigan Secretary of State indicated that, as of November 2012, there were about 8,070 specialty license plates eligible for the free recreation passport endorsement. There have been 7,642 disabled veteran plates issued, 426 former POW plates, and two specialty Medal of Honor license plates issued in Michigan.

### U.S. Made Flags on Veteran's Graves

A bill introduced in the Michigan state Senate would require flags placed on the graves of veterans by a municipality to bear the mark "Made in U.S.A."

Senate Bill 428 was introduced June 12 by state Sen. Roger Kahn, R-Saginaw Township, and is co-sponsored by state Sen. Mike Green, R-Mayville, and three

The bill would amend a 98-year-old law that set up the provision of flag holders and American flags to the graves of veterans.

As it stands now, the state law requires local governmental bodies to pay for the cost of flags and flag holders for the graves of U.S. Armed Forces veterans buried within that body's boundaries, if they are petitioned to do so by a "recognized veterans' organization" or by five or more citizens.

The amendment would require municipalities to use flags and flag holders made in the United States, as long as price is competitive.










# Michigan's Good Samaritan laws: Could you be liable for injury damages if you stop to help an injured biker?

Many people have questions about Michigan's "Good Samaritan" laws, which are actually a group of laws that protect people who choose to help others (MCL 691.1501-1507). Good Samaritan laws are very fact-dependent, and there are many nuances and exceptions to their application depending on the circumstances of a given situation. The law is constantly changing, so what is accurate now may not be accurate in the future. Still, I wanted to provide information about the basics of the Good Samaritan laws and explain how they might apply to motorcyclists and motorcycle accidents. It's important to remember that this article is limited, and while it is my opinion that liability is limited as written below, that does not mean that you cannot or will not be sued.

It's important to generally define some of the terms that are often used in these laws before we go any further. Many Michigan courts would accept that "Gross Negligence" is conduct so reckless as to demonstrate a substantial lack of concern for whether any injury results and "Willful and Wanton Misconduct" means that the person acts with such reckless indifference that harm will probably result.

### **Accident Scene Management Classes**

Most of you by now know that our law office gives back to the motorcycle community. We promote motorcycle safety, we advocate for motorcyclists' rights and we actually try to prevent motorcycle wrecks. For almost ten years now, our office has been involved in reigniting the Accident Scene Management Class in Michigan.

Debbie Parinello, who has worked in our office for the last eight years, became a licensed Emergency Medical Technician (EMT) specifically so she could teach the Accident Scene Management Class, and later became a full-fledged paramedic so she could teach the advanced class. I cover the legal portion of the class, part of which deals with Michigan's Good Samaritan laws.

A lot of people have some wrong ideas about their rights and liabilities when it comes to helping injured bikers. I always try to clarify a few of the relevant parts of this law to try to help people understand when they may or may not be liable for injury damages.

### How do Good Samaritan Laws affect licensed medical professionals?

One of Michigan's Good Samaritan laws (MCL 691.1501) deals specifically with medical professionals that have a license. Physicians, physician's assistants, or nurses rendering emergency care outside of their job duties are not liable if they cause harm when helping. However, if their actions amount to gross negligence or willful and wanton misconduct, they may be liable for the harm that they cause. For example, if a nurse is driving down the highway and sees a motorcyclist go down, she can provide medical care and not worry about being held responsible in civil court, unless their conduct was so unreasonable that it was reckless.

### Performing CPR or using a defibrillator

Another of Michigan's Good Samaritan laws (MCL 691.1504) deals with a person who voluntarily performs cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR) or uses an automated external defibrillator (AED) when it is not part of their job. A layperson who performs CPR or uses a defibrillator on someone who looks like they need it is not liable if they cause harm, unless your actions amount to gross negligence or willful and wanton misconduct

In other words, an individual who has no duty to do so, and who voluntarily and in good faith does CPR on another person, is not liable in a civil action for damages except for an act or omission that constitutes gross negligence or willful and wanton misconduct. It also lists specific persons not liable in a civil action for damages, except for an act or omission that constitutes gross negligence or willful and wanton misconduct for use of defibrillators.

To give an example, say you are riding with a friend who is rear-ended by a car and is thrown to the ground. You go to him and it appears that he is not breathing

so you do CPR on him. You will not be held liable for any damage you may have caused unless your conduct was so unreasonable that it was reckless.

### Layperson has no Immunity

It is important to understand that laypeople do not have immunity from injury liability under the Good Samaritan laws. If you are not a licensed medical professional, and you stop to help someone, you could still be liable for injury damages. However, the way the law is applied is different depending on the type of help you give.

If you perform CPR or use a defibrillator on someone whom you think needs it, that person would have to prove gross negligence or willful and wanton misconduct if they were to sue you. However, if you perform a different kind of first aid treatment without a medical license, the person you helped would only have to prove regular negligence in an injury suit. In other words, they have to show that you did something "unreasonable" for a layperson to do, and what you did caused further harm

To give an example, if you as a layperson come across a downed biker who clearly has a broken leg twisted in an unusual manner, and you attempt to set that leg, you could be held liable if you cause further damage to the biker's leg. This is because you do not have the necessary medical knowledge to set a broken leg, and the biker would have been better off if you had simply stopped to keep them as comfortable as possible until a qualified medical professional arrived on the scene.

### There is always more to the story


I don't know anyone that would not stop to try to help a fellow motorcyclist that had gone down. Good Samaritans don't normally stop and think about things like liability laws before they try to help a downed biker. In a search of the case law involving only appealed cases in Michigan, there was not a single case where the Good Samaritan was sued for helping at a vehicle accident. If you follow the information provided in the Bystander Assistance Class, in my opinion, you would not be held liable. I feel so strongly about this that, if you are sued for helping at an accident, my firm would defend you for free (restrictions apply), as long as you met certain criteria.

Remember, this is not a comprehensive review of Michigan's Good Samaritan laws, just a short summary of a few points that are often misunderstood. Our office makes an effort to reach out to motorcyclists and to provide information for the motorcycling community whenever we can. # Running with the Pack?

Whether you are a pack dog or a lone wolf, it's a good idea to educate yourself about riding in a pack. Riding with a large group of friends, or an escorted ride, can be a ton of fun. A mile of rumbling awesomeness winding through country roads in the sunshine is a pretty cool feeling, and you're right there in the middle of it, a part of it.

As awesome as it can be, however, riding with a large group is more complicated. There is more to watch for, the rider beside you, in front, behind, in addition to traffic and other obstacles. If riding with strangers, you don't know the skill level or riding habits of those around you, or in the pack (or if they've had a few too many). Coming from a lone wolf, I find it just adds stress to what should be an enjoyable ride, but, to each his own. Just some things to think about.

So before you head off into the sunset, keep in mind a few things..

**Safety checks.** As you would with any ride, check out your bike before you take off, such as tire pressure, turn signals, brake lights, etc. Remember, you're in a pack. Not only is your life in other's hands, their lives are in yours. Don't let an avoidable mechanical issue become a disaster on the road.

Be prompt, with a full tank of gas. A large, organized ride will just leave without you. But when riding with a decent size group of friends, be courteous, show up when you say you will, ready to go. Ever try to take twenty bikes through a gas station? What a pain in the @ss. Do it before you meet up.

Know your hand signals, and pass them back. Group rides are safer and smoother when everyone knows the turns in plenty of time, or if there is a dead animal up ahead to avoid. (I won't go into hand signals here, if you don't know them, learn them before you show up for a group ride!)

**Keep it together.** Not too close, but don't leave gaps. It can stretch the pack out too far, increasing the chance to not make it through a light, or, leaving an opening for a car to insert themselves into your fun.

These are just a few observations of my own, and I certainly don't claim to be an authority on riding in a pack. Just make sure you are prepared if you choose to ride with a large crowd, my point is there is more to think about than just the fun stuff. More info can be found at your local motorcycle safety class, also, if your road captains hold a meeting before the run, gather around and listen.

So, just like the ride itself, if you enjoy it, get out there and do it. Life is short. Just be smart. Keep yourself and others safe, and make lots of memories.







### **EMISSIONS TESTING NO LONGER REQUIRED FOR MOTORCYCLES**

The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency has dropped its requirement that Phoenix-area motorcycles undergo annual emissions inspections, the last place in the country to require such testing. The federal agency has approved a request from state environmental officials in Arizona that motorcycle tests be discontinued, effective immediately.

The request to drop the testing requirement came in response to a 2008 state law requiring the Arizona Department of Environmental Quality to do an analysis of pollutants emitted by motorcycles and make a proposal to the federal agency. "Our analysis has determined that the cost and inconvenience is not providing a significant environmental benefit," said Trevor Baggiore, deputy director of air quality at ADEQ.

Even though motorcycles account for 3.5% of vehicles on the area's roads, the department's analysis determined that they emit "insignificant" amounts of pollution, accounting for less than 1% of total emissions in the Phoenix metro area Pima County (Tucson) and Maricopa County (Phoenix) were the only areas in the United States that required motorcycles to pass yearly emissions inspections at a cost of \$19 per test, and Pima County halted motorcycle testing in

Congratulations to ABATE of Arizona, the MMA of Arizona and the Arizona Confederation of Motorcycle Clubs (ACMC) for their years of stalwart efforts to relieve Grand Canyon State riders of these unnecessary costs and burdensome time wasted in long lines.

### ANTI-ABORTION MEASURE RIDES MOTORCYCLE BILL THROUGH N.C. HOUSE

In controversial political maneuvering, the Republican-controlled North Carolina House recently pushed through anti-abortion legislation, using as their vehicle a motorcycle safety bill that lawmakers had stealthily gutted and turned into a measure to further regulate abortion clinics.

Republicans introduced the legislation (S.B. 353) in the House Judiciary Committee the previous morning by attaching the abortion provisions to a motorcycle safety bill -- without first notifying either the public or their Democratic colleagues. "This bill came hurriedly through the Senate, rerouted through the House on a motorcycle," lamented state Rep. Alma Adams (D). "No input from stakeholders, no public scrutiny, no transparency, no fiscal note."

The final vote was 74-41 on July 13; the bill now heads back to the GOP-led state Senate for approval, then on to Governor Pat McCrory (R) who says he will sign the measure into law if it reaches his desk.

### **GUAM ENACTS "LIMITED HELMET LAW"**

Originally, Senator Tommy Morrison's bill called for universal helmet use for all motorcycle riders in the U.S. protectorate of Guam, but the revised version of his proposed helmet law makes it mandatory only for riders under the age of 18 and for those with less than 3 years riding experience.

After a lengthy public hearing and receiving input from the community, Bill No. 87 "Limited Helmet Law" passed unanimously, and also requires new riders to first complete a defensive driving/motorcycle safety education course prior to being licensed and prohibits licensees from operating a motorcycle or scooter of larger engine size than that which they take the motorcycle exam on. In order to operate a motorcycle with a larger engine, the operator must apply and test for a new license under that engine size.

### AMENDED HELMET LAW HAS POSITIVE ECONOMIC BENEFIT IN

Changes last year in Michigan's mandatory helmet law have had a positive effect on motorcycle riding in Michigan, according to ABATE of Michigan. There has been an increase in motorcycle travel in Michigan since April of 2012, said ABATE in a recent press release.

"Motorcycle tourism is up. Motorcyclists across the country are coming to Michigan in droves. Very few out-of-state motorcyclists were seen in Michigan before the adult helmet requirement was modified," according to ABATE. "Cyclists from across the country are discovering the beauty of the lower and upper peninsulas of Michigan. There is an increase of out-of-state participation in Michigan motorcycle events by as much as five times during the summer of 2012."

"Our members have reported an increase in motorcycle tourism since the enactment of the rider choice law." added Scott Ellis, executive director of the Michigan Licensed Beverage Association, which represents more than 1,800 restaurant, bar, party store, hotel and casino establishments across the state "From Monroe to Muskegon to the Keweenaw Peninsula, more out-of-state motorcyclists are stopping, staying and spending money at our restaurants, hotels and attractions," he told the Midland Daily News.

Motorcycle sales also are up in Michigan, and ABATE says that 2012 was the safest riding season in 10 years for licensed motorcyclists in the state.

### MOTORCYCLE CHECKPOINTS IN NEW YORK NET NEARLY A HUNDRED

More than 80 motorcyclists and their vehicles were checked by speciallytrained State Police motorcycle inspectors near Buffalo. NY in mid-June, with two checkpoints resulting in the issuance of 92 traffic tickets for offenses that included helmet and equipment violations.

New York has been the epicenter for the Motorcycle-Only Checkpoint debate, which has resulted in four states; New Hampshire, North Carolina, Virginia and California, passing laws to prohibit law enforcement agencies from establishing motorcycle-only checkpoints.

In addition, on the federal level Congressman Jim Sensenbrenner (R-WI) has introduced H.R. 1861 "To stop motorcycle checkpoint funding," and also contains language "to force the DOT to focus motorcycle safety efforts on crash prevention programs, not national helmet mandates."

### MOTORCYCLE CLUB SUES CITY OVER DISCRIMINATION

A local motorcycle club said it was just doing things by the book when it filed a permit to hold a BBQ fundraiser at a local park in Rio Vista, California, but the city and the police chief turned that simple request down. Now, the motorcycle club is filing suit, claiming it was discriminated against.

"No one other than us has ever tried to put in a permit," Saxon Creed MC

President Rob Anderson told News 10/KXTV. "We thought we were doing the

Last July, the club wanted to hold its fundraising pig roast at Blackwelder Park. the same park where dozens of other community events have been held. So. the group filed for a permit with the city. But, the request was declined by the police chief and the city.

The group held their pig roast this year without problems at a Veteran's Hall right next door to the park they applied to last year.

Members of Saxon Creed MC say they feel like the request was denied because they are bikers. The group has filed a discrimination lawsuit, claiming its civil rights were violated. They're suing for \$250,000 in damages on behalf of their 15 members. "It makes me very angry," Anderson said. "This is America. We all have rights. I don't like seeing anyone's rights trampled on."

### MAN ON A MISSION

"This will be the most important thing I have ever done." says Tim King, founder and news editor of Salem-News.com, in regard to his scheduled 48-state motorcycle ride for Veterans. "I am riding 48 states this summer to educate Vets through talks and media appearances about health issues that are taking lives: we're talking about PTSD/TBI, Agent Orange and the effects of serving aboard toxic military bases."

A former Marine who has covered the wars in Afghanistan and Iraq, Tim and his wife Bonnie received the NCOM Silver Spoke Award for Media in 2011 for advocating on behalf of motorcycle clubs and riders and their civil rights, and they have also been recognized by the Oregon Confederation of Clubs for Excellence in Journalism

Tim is riding thousands of miles to share the information he has accumulated over his journalism career and nine specific years reporting for Salem-News. com and he's doing it by himself, so your help can make Tim's trip safer and

Tim's covering an ongoing war here at home where Veterans are fighting for their rights, and he'll be checking in with motorcycle riders who are busy defending their civil rights in regard to club membership and other issues, so he's enlisting the support of the motorcycle community to publicize and help fund his mission. ### VERTICAL MOTORCYCLE LICENSE PLATE BILL CLEARS PA HOUSE

Legislation allowing the vertical display of registration plates on motorcycles was recently passed by the state House and now heads to the Senate for con-

House Bill 1060 is sponsored by state Rep. Mark Keller (R-86). "This legislation is specific to motorcycles," explained Rep. Keller. "Currently, the state vehicle code does not specify how a vehicle registration plate may be mounted. However, regulations in Title 67 of the Pennsylvania Code require horizontal mounting of vehicle registration plates and do not give the option for vertical mounting. HB 1060 would also "authorize the Pennsylvania Department of Transportation to produce, upon request, registration plates for motorcycles which display the identifying characters in a vertical alignment."

"Owners of custom-made or vintage motorcycles are sometimes reluctant to mount the registration plate horizontally on the rear fender because doing so

interferes with the custom paint job or other custom work done on the cycle." according to Keller. "Many of these owners have approached ABATE of Pennsylvania, the motorcycle advocacy group, about making this legislative change, and ABATE supports my legislation."

### MORE RULES PROPOSED FOR CANADIAN RIDERS

Saskatchewan is considering more requirements for new motorcycle licensees, supervision for new riders and the possibility of mandatory gear. The ideas are among more than a dozen changes to motorcycle safety, training and insurance rules proposed by Saskatchewan Government Insurance as it looks for ways to reduce claims, save money and quell the roar of angry riders.

One suggestion is for potential riders to pass a basic skills test or complete a motorcycle training program before they're issued a learner's license. New riders who don't take the training courses could see an additional \$500 a year fee or be restricted on the size of the bike they use.

Helmets and eye protection are currently the law in Saskatchewan and similar rules apply across the country, but no other jurisdiction in Canada has mandatory rules for wearing gloves, ankle-covering boots or clothing that cover arms and legs, according to SGI.

The review was launched earlier this year after a proposed rate increase which would have seen insurance costs for motorcycles go up by an average of 73% to cover a \$9 million gap between what SGI takes in from motorcyclists in fees versus what is paid out for collisions.

The public has until the end of July to comment on the proposals and SGI is to report to the government in the fall. The goal is to have the new rules in place for next year's riding season.

### MOTORCYCLE BAN LIFTED IN PAKISTAN

After five years, Pakistani authorities have lifted ban on motorcycle riding in Bajaur tribal region. The ban on motorcycle riding was imposed in 2008 when the Taliban stepped up their activities in the region, and the ban was aimed at controlling insurgency and preventing targeted killings because motorcycles were being used for attacks against anti-Taliban forces.

The announcement about lifting the ban was made by Brig Ghulam Haidar, a sector army commander, during his speech through the security forces-run FM radio channel (Radio Aman FM 88). "The lifting of ban on motorcycle riding is a gift for the tribesmen on the eve of the holy month of Ramadan. This good news may enhance happiness of Ramadan," he said.

Brig Ghulam said that imposing the ban on motorcycle riding was a difficult decision but it was taken only in the larger interest of people of the tribal agency.

It made me happy.

Then I wondered how many riding free were Abate members. I wondered how many understood the totality of the 40 year fight to modify Michigan's helmet law for choice. Then I wondered how many were enjoying the proceeds of all our years of effort, our dollars invested, and our commitment to the cause of freedom, without ever having contributed? Then I started to get mad. Then I let it go. It does not matter to me if anyone other than myself fights the fight, pays the dues, or makes the effort. I only have to live with myself.

Now, that being said, I do realize that me, myself, and I, would never have gotten the helmet law changed. It was the collaborative effort of a lot of like minded non-politicians who came together, donated, worked, and committed to a cause. And knowing that, it is my duty to do everything I can to incite those who are apathetic to the cause to stand up and be counted. To, if nothing else, join Abate. That modest membership fee is needed to keep what we all enjoy, and much more. I am not beneath laying a guilt trip on you if necessary. Like, you ride a \$20,000.00 motorcycle without a helmet, but your too cheap to spend \$25 bucks to support the organization that got your right to make that choice back?

But I don't think being cheap has anything to do with it. To join Abate requires defeating an internal emotional hurdle that many would just as soon avoid, or ignore. It is engaging in political activism. It is stressful to take a stand against the government. It's a step out of the comfort zone.

Do not judge the entire organization by the actions of any one member. We are as diverse as the population of Michigan. Many M/C Club members are Abate members because M/C Club members are bikers. The majority of Abate members are just non-affiliated bikers. A large percentage of Abate members are Veterans. Another large percentage are Christian Riders.

Abate of Michigan is a grass roots political organization representing bikers of all types. The bottom line being we will protect our right to ride, and ride as is our right to.






PT Customs replaced all the missing engine parts and rebuilt top and bottom. Engine and exhaust have a killer sound. Oil tank

kit caused a little delay in build but is shiny and cool. Leather seat tooling brings in the Birmingham Small Arms logo as a tribute to the engine manufacture BSA. Head light and rear fender were donated by my buddy Bob. A lot of time and sweat went into this I would like to thank all who contributed their critiquing and

help. It's a riot to ride!!!










# SOOO...... YOU WANT TO RIDE THE TAIL OF THE ORAGON?






Some call it US 129...some call it The Dragon...whatever you want to call it, it is about as close to heaven on earth as I have ever been. I rode it for the first time in 2004 and have been back every year since then. There is a certain kind of magic up in those mountains. The eleven mile stretch of road known worldwide for its 318 curves (resembling a dragon's tail- hence the name) makes for a ride that is exhilarating, awe inspiring, and humbling all at the same time. Some of the sharpest curves have been given names over the years...Gravity Cavity, Beginner's End, and Brake or Bust Bend just to name a few.

Those names have not been given lightly. Make no mistake about it, the Dragon is a dangerous road. Fatalities are a fact of life up there. The biggest mistakes I've witnessed fall into the "common sense" category. I've seen even well experienced riders lose their sensibilities while embarking on the amazingly exciting, yet still perilous journey that is known as riding the Tail of the Dragon. I've put together a small list of reminders for those of you that wish to take on the challenge of US 129.

1. Wear your protective gear! As tempting as it is to let that fresh mountain air envelope you, doing so without the proper clothing might make it the last air that you breathe. When I ride, I wear long pants, leather jacket, full face D.O.T. approved helmet, boots, and gloves. I have wrecked on the Dragon before, but thanks to my protective clothing, I walked away unscathed.

- 2. The speed limits are set at the posted speeds for a reason! This is not to say that you have to act as if you were driving Miss Daisy, but you do need to be aware that the speed limits set for those curves are there for your protection and the protection of others on the road. A lot of the curves up there are called tight or "technical" curves. Follow the speed limit because if you go around them any faster than recommended, the only three options you have are either going off the side of a mountain, running into a mountain, or blowing the curve-going outside your driving area and into oncoming traffic.
- 3. Know your bike and your skill set and ride within the limitations of both. There are some motorcycle rental places in that area that will gladly take your money and let you rent a bike to ride the Dragon. If that is an option you choose, I highly recommend renting the bike for a long enough period of time that you know how it performs and handles before you take it on the Dragon. Contrary to popular belief, sport bikes are not made for speed. They are made for handling.
- 4. Be courteous! US 129 is a public road not a private racetrack. There are other motorcyclists, cars, and trucks that travel it daily. There has always been some discontent between the sport bike riders and the cruisers when it comes to the Dragon. I've ridden it both ways and can see the validity in both of their stands on the subject. Bottom line is just to be courteous to everyone else on the road. If you're on a sport bike, don't pass folks when there's a double yellow line and don't fly by them so fast that you put

- I've ridden the Dragon solo and I've ridden it with a group. If you're riding solo, keep in mind that there is no cell phone service up in that stretch of the mountains. If you get hurt out there, you're stuck until someone sees you, then goes back down the mountain to get cell service and call for help, and until help makes its way up the mountain to your location. So be extra careful and aware of your surroundings! If you are riding with a group, make sure to have a designated meet up spot in case anyone in the group gets separated. Also be sure to still pay close attention to your surroundings at all times. It's easy to get caught up in just "following the leader" or looking at all the amazing scenery, but if you do that and the leader goes down, there's a strong likelihood that you will go down as well.
- 6. Make sure your bike and all your gear is legal! You will be stopped for not wearing the proper helmet, having an expired or missing tag, not having your tag mounted in the proper place, etc. Those tickets are highly expensive! If you normally wear a novelty helmet, it is much more cost effective to stop along the way and buy a D.O.T. approved helmet rather than risk the cost of a ticket.

Another thing to be aware of is that there are several professional photographers that are out there every day taking pictures of

riders as they go by. Don't let yourself get distracted by them. Maintain your lane and keep your eyes on the road. They make sure to stay out of the way of traffic and are situated off the road, but they can inadvertently startle you if you're not paying attention when you're riding and happen to come up on them. Just be aware that they are out there. They are there to capture that moment of you being on the Dragon. You can purchase the pictures from them if you would like. Their business cards are at the local gift shops.


One of the last things I'd like to mention is the Tree of Shame at Deal's Gap Motorcycle Resort. It is a tree with a collection of various parts that have been left by people who have wrecked on the Dragon. Some have been left by loved ones of those who have died while riding the Dragon. It serves as a reality check of what can happen when you take on the challenge of riding those curves.

And finally, it is a local legend that it is bad luck if you purchase a sticker to put on your helmet, bike, vehicle or anywhere else BEFORE you ride the Dragon. Even if you're not superstitious by nature, why chance it? Ride it first, then buy your sticker!

Ok, enough of the warnings! Time to move on to some fun stuff!

I've been asked several times which I prefer riding in the mountains – my sport bike or my Harley. It's a completely different experience and I enjoy both immensely. The thrill of the sport bike is always great...I started my motorcycling hobby

appreciate the scenery a little more. It's breathtakingly beautiful up there. Both bikes have provided me with the "wind therapy" that makes every trip to the Dragon worthwhile.

I love the whole region up there. It is a truly motorcycle friendly area. The local businesses thrive on the motorcycle community's visits to their area from all over the world to ride up there. Be sure to stop in and support them. You will always find friendly faces, great food, and folks willing to sit around a campfire at night swapping stories

When I go on vacation to the Dragon, I usually go first to an area in Georgia (referred to as the Georgia Loop by the locals) and ride Blood Mountain, which is in between Blairsville, GA and Dahlonega, GA. Dahlonega is a tourist town and is actually the site of the first American gold rush in the country. It's a wonderful area with quaint shops, antiques, great little restaurants, and some of the best local wines you'll find anywhere. On more recent trips though, I started staying in Blairsville because it's not quite so touristy and has a real old town feel to it. I usually stay at Seasons Inn and highly recommend it if you make your way up there. The owners are very motorcycle friendly; the rooms are always clean and nice; the rates are very reasonable; and they provide nice little extras- such as rags to clean your bike. A great place to eat while in town is at the Hole in the Wall restaurant. Very unique place with great food.

Once I've ridden Blood Mountain, I usually head on up to Deal's Gap, which usually takes me about an hour and a half. I always stop at Wheeler's Performance shop and say hi and talk to a person I consider one of the best and friendliest motorcycle mechanics in that whole area! Folks, he is the man to see for all your motorcycle needs! Now for lodging, there are a lot of places to stay in that area, but for the best rates and the best access, I normally stay at Deal's Gap Motorcycle Resort at the Dragon. The rates are very reasonable and it's an interesting place to sit back and just watch the traffic when you're not out riding. In the peak season there are hundreds of people a day coming

on sport bikes. Since having a Harley though, I've learned to in and out and you get to talk to people from all over the world Because of its location situated right at the beginning of the Tail of the Dragon, it serves as a central hub for all things going on.

> Right across the street from the resort is an independent Tail of the Dragon Gift Shop that has an expansive collection of souvenirs, t-shirts, and maps. The map at the top of this article is courtesy of the owners, Ron and Nancy.

> Because of how convenient and popular the Deal's Gap Motorcycle Resort is, they book up fast. If you want to stay there, you need to call months in advance to get a reservation. If they are booked or if you just prefer a more rustic type accommodation, I highly recommend the Punkin Center Motorcycle Resort run by two very good friends of mine, Jody and Sherry Montgomery. It is comprised of individual cabins with clean beds and hot showers, but no cable TV. There is a kitchen/bar where you can go have a beer or soft drink and watch TV if you would like. When I have stayed there in the past though, I have preferred to just disconnect from the outside world and enjoy the beauty of the surroundings. If you are staying there, you've got to try the pizza. It is handmade and out of this world! Mr. Jody and Ms. Sherry are great people who will sit down with you and talk to you about anything under the sun. If you're in the area, stop in and say hello!

> I just can't say enough about the natural beauty of the area, the friendliness of everyone you'll encounter, or the thrill that you will get from riding the Dragon. I fell in love with it on my first trip in 2004, and it has been my choice destination for all my vacations since then. If you haven't been, make plans to go. As long as you use your common sense while riding, you won't regret it!

# Tech Tips By Steve Barn Find Bargain or Money Muncher

Vow Now that was some great warm weather, huh? Sorry, all you cold weather freaks, this boy likes it hot, although my shop peeps are not too fond of me, not on the lack of air conditioning right now so I am going to need you all to come down and spend a crap ton of money so I can get them air... Smiles! I do hope you have had a great start on summer and logging in many miles of motorcycle fun, seeing wonderful sites and maybe attending a few events. too!

The venerable barn find everyone dreams of, finding that great deal or rare bike they have always wanted in some hidden location behind an old tarp or forgotten barn, but WAIT! Is it a true "deal" or is it a going to munch all your funds and leave you in a worse place than if you had just gone out and bought a well maintained bike? I will say there are many great finds out there and it just so happens a customer just brought one in, so let's go through his bike together and see if he made a wise purchase. Once you go visit your new found treasure take a look at the general condition, find the true mileage, ask will it start or at least will the engine manually turn over, look at the paint, mirrors, grips, seat, tires, chain or belt, look for rust and damage and once you are convinced it may be worth repairing it then put the cash down, take her home and take it step by step, putting as little money into it as you can making sure it will run and be safe. I would not go ordering a whole bunch of stuff until you are for sure she is a real diamond in the rough.

A customer of ours brought us a 1995 Sportster that he paid \$900 for, it has very low mileage but it has been sitting for over 10 years. It is sporting good paint and no real damage other than a ripped seat, otherwise cosmetically looks nice, now to see if the mechanical side is going to be a money muncher or not.

### AIR INTAKE


First thing is to remove the airbox or air cleaner, little rodents love the air intake system and in almost 100% of long term stored bikes (even in ones stored over the winter) you will find a nest of some sort. It is vital you clean this before you turn the engine over or you will suck all kinds of garbage into your carb and engine. They will most likely eat your paper filter up so you will be into the price of an air filter, so our first item to purchase is an air filter, which we will set the price at \$25.

### ENGINE

Now that you have cleaned the air intake system out, and you know you will not suck in all kinds of nasty debris into the engine, it's time to see if it rotates freely and has compression. Take the spark plugs out and spray some PB Blaster or some sort of penetrating oil into the cylinders before trying to rotate everything; this will help break and rust that may have formed. After it has set a while you can attempt to rotate the engine, do this carefully with the crankshaft nut or put the bike in gear and use the rear tire preferably so you can control how fast and how much it will rotate. If all rotates smoothly then you can do a compression test. If you have a kick start bike you can go straight to the compression start, if it is electric start you may want to get the electrical temporarily working instead of trying to use the back tire to rotate everything. There are a couple of choices of compression testers, one is a simple push in style and the other screws into the spark plug hole, both work fine for what we are doing, however the screw in type is best. Our bike turned over easily and had 155lbs of compression which was great. Next we took a look at the oil as it was drained and it looks good for old oil. After a few more tests, we will replace the oil and filter, run it for a bit, drain and replace it again with another new filter just to make sure all that old crap is out of our barn burner! Another \$34.50 for oil, and filter. Second oil change was Amsoil and it ran another \$43.78.

### TRANSMISSION AND CLUTCH

It is almost impossible to tell if these are working properly until you get it running. Pull the clutch in and out to see if the cable is free, push the sifter down and see if it engages roll the bike back and forth while it is in gear to hear for anything odd, shift it up and down the gears ... that is about all you can do.

### TIRES, BELTS, CHAINS, SPROCKETS


Take a look at the tires not only for wear but for weather checking and dry rot, our bike miraculously had great rubber that had no sign of dry rot, however I did recommend changing the tires soon just due to age. A rear belt can be an expensive proposition, the labor is a bit much, plus a belt can go over \$200, so keep that in mind. Chains are easier to replace but still can be expensive especially if it is a nice O-ring 530, those can get above \$200 too. Remember to look at the front and rear sprockets, most change out the rear sprocket but neglect the front.

### ELECTRICAL

You will have to get a battery eventually, hopefully you are lucky enough to have a spare shop battery to test the system, this helps with the budget because if the system is bad or the engine is not where you want it to be you don't have the price of a new battery into the bike yet. Our battery was bad and we replaced it with a Deka battery. I do not like using the el-cheapo batteries, I tried to help some budget minded customers and had some el-cheapos at the shop for a bit but the batteries fail quickly and the terminals are crap.... So we only use Deka and Odyssey batteries now. Our bike needed a battery so we installed a new one after checking and cleaning the battery cables and making sure the battery case was clean and the pad was in good shape, ours was in great shape. After a

good charge, we pushed the button and, voila! the starter worked great! We did a test on the rest of the electrical and all worked great, turn signals, brake lights, horn, high/low beam and the charging system all passed with flying colors.

We put the old spark plugs in the wire and tested for spark, our bike was good to go there so we gapped and installed new spark plugs. Battery and plugs total \$112.50

### **FUEL SYSTEM**

Next is to make sure your fuel system is ready to go, first take a look at the fuel tank and all rubber hoses, if you're lucky it will be full of fuel, if that's the case it should be relatively clean inside and just need the old fuel dumped out and the tank flushed. Worst case scenario you have to replace the tank ... in-between scenario is you have to have it etched and resealed. Our tank was full of fuel so we dumped it out, inspected and cleaned it and put it back on the bike. This bike is a carbureted model so we will be taking the carburetor off, take it apart, dunk it in carb cleaner and rebuild it using new gaskets, float needle, accelerator pump, intake to carb seal and a few other miscellaneous seals. You can buy a one gallon can of carb cleaner from your local parts store, it comes with a nifty tray to dunk your stuff down into the solution and retrieve it with ease. This stuff is far friendlier to your hands and parts than the old "good" stuff but this means it take a bit longer to work, you can bank on it taking about 1-3 days depending how bad your carburetor(s) is/are. This is a good time to think about jetting, will you be upgrading the pipes and air cleaner? Then put bigger jets in, this sporty had a 40 Pilot and a 170 main, however today we left this bike alone due to the owner wanted to keep the bike completely stock for now. Later we may put pipes, air cleaner, seat and a different style handle bars on, and that's when we will re-jet it. If you have an injected bike, I pray your injectors are free and not gummed up, also your fuel pump may need attention and you should change the fuel filter out just for a precaution. Our parts for this section are \$43.00 for a carb kit and fuel to clean out the tank and refill

### **BRAKES**

Take a look at all your braking components, brake pads, calipers, rotors, hoses. master cylinders and such, change out what looks damaged or in disrepair. You will need to at minimum flush the brake fluid out and replace with new. when you do this make sure you use the correct fluid as recommended by the manufacturer. Also take care when you do this, it can be done three different ways. You can simply do it by gravity with lots of patience, open a brake bleeder and let it drain out as you replace the old with new as it drains ... NEVER let the master cylinder reservoir become dry! When you do this it will allow air to enter the system and then you will have spongy brakes that will need to be bled. The next option is to vacuum bleed them, quicker and the tool is pretty cheap, the tool simply puts a vacuum on the system drawing the bad fluid into a cup out of the bleeder on the brake caliper, once you see the fluid change color to its nice clean state, stop. REMEMBER to NEVER let the master cylinder run out of fluid... if it does happen don't freak, simply keep going until the system is clean then bleed the air out of the brake system. The last way is to use a reverse bleeding tool; this is a more expensive tool, but sure has helped me out on a few occasions. It hooks up on your brake caliper the same as the vacuum bleeder does, but does the reverse as the vacuum bleeder, it pushes fluid through the system back up through the master cylinder, you will never get air in the system this way, that is, if you use the tool correctly ... yup I have made mistakes.

### CABLES AND HOSES

Take a look at all hoses for cracking or wear, if it is old and has been sitting for a long while you will have to change them all out. Cables are your next item to check, make sure the throttle works freely and the clutch cable, if so equipped, is free also

The rest is cosmetic, I suppose, how clean do you want it, are you restoring it or are you buying it to make a buck or for a daily rider, this will depend on how much you want to put into it to make it look pretty. Also look at parts pricing, is it an odd model that parts are next to impossible to find? Is it popular and EBAY has everything for it? Maybe call a used parts place and ask them how easy parts are to find for it. Good things to know before you pick it up.

Oh, what did our customer have into his bike? Well, he spent a grand total of \$1486.00, He spent \$900 on the bike and \$586 on parts and labor with us and has one sweet low cost Sporty!


Smoke Out in North Carolina was to see the cool choppers that were currently being built. And as they say, "that sealed the deal".

Along the USMC, Chris acknowledges the influences of a few other builders, for his work ethic and highly-motivated style of bike building. Billy Lane, Indian Larry,










