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
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


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Dust off your bikes...it's almost spring!

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The Legena **Detroit Lions Gridiron Heroes**

Herman Moore

Years with the Lions: 1991-2001 Virginia

Pro Bowls: 4 (1995-98) Seasons: 11 Heiaht: 6-4 Weight: 218

WR Herman Moore was the Lions' first-round draft pick in 1991 from Virginia and went on to shatter virtually all of Detroit's receiving records. He played in 145 games during 11 seasons (1991-2001) in Honolulu Blue and Silver. A four-time NFL Pro Bowl selection, the Lions' record book has Moore resting on top of Lions' career, season and single-game receiving marks.

He holds Detroit's records for career receptions (670), receiving yards (9,174) and touchdown catches (62). In 1995 he was selected the Lions' MVP on offense after breaking club marks in both catches (also a NFL record of 123) and yards (1,686) while scoring 14 touchdowns. His finest single-game performance came on December 4, 1995 against the Chicago Bears when he had a club record 14 catches for 183 yards, the fifth best total in Detroit history.



He also was the last Lion to catch three TD passes in a game (October 29, 1995 vs. the Packers) until Roy Williams matched the total during the 2005 season. One of Moore's and his teammates' more memorable games came on November 23, 1995 - in a classic Thanksgiving Day with the Minnesota Vikings. Moore (127 yards) and fellow receivers Brett Perriman (153) and Johnnie Morton (102) all eclipsed the 100-yard receiving mark, Barry Sanders rushed for 138 yards, and Scott Mitchell passed for 410 yards in a 44-38 Lions' shootout victory.


Moore was a member of Lions' squads who earned six playoff appearances in the 1990s (1991, 1993-95, 1997 and 1999). He was also a member of two teams that won the NFC Central division (1991 and 1993), and was on the 1991 team that played for the 1992 NFC Championship.

Our Head fabricator Joe Barney- (Fabricator/welder) also played a huge role in the fabrication of parts throughout the build process of the bagger. Rob Thompson- (Sales manager) was in charge of keeping track and ordering of all of the parts for the Detroit lions and promotion of the build. Art Solis (airbrusher/bodyman) and Drew Barlond (painter/ bodyman)- really knocked the paint out of the park with the clean and classy paintjob on this build. A lot of hours were spent on making sure all of the gaps were perfect, which is what we strive on. As an end result we had a long and low, thing of beauty. When we initially unveiled the bike to Herman we could tell he was hooked right off the bat. He loved the way the bike came out and how well it fit his image and style. A few weeks after the bike was finished we unveiled the bike to the public at a Detroit lions home game this season. The public had a great reaction to the motorcycle and we were able to have Herman come down for a few hours and meet with the public, sign autographs, and get pictures with fans with the bike we built. Bill to address veterans' suicide heads to Obama

The Senate unanimously approved a bill named for Clay Hunt, a 26-year-old Iraq and Afghanistan veteran who killed himself in 2011. The bill comes in response to suicides that on average claim the lives of 22 military veterans every day. White House spokesman Josh Earnest said President Barack Obama strongly supports the bill and will sign it.

The measure would require the Pentagon and Veterans Affairs Department to submit to independent reviews of their suicide prevention programs and offers financial incentives to psychiatrists and other mental health professionals who agree to work for the VA. It also would help military members as they transition from active duty to veteran status.

John Stroud, national commander of the Veterans of Foreign Wars of the United States, said the bill strengthens and expands the mental health programs and services available to service members and veterans. Even so, the VFW is concerned that some service members are being kicked out of the military for preexisting mental health problems without first being properly diagnosed or treated, "meaning they could easily be denied critical VA care and benefits after they are discharged," Stroud said.

Stroud and other veterans groups urged Congress to continue to work on the issue. The bill orders the Veterans Affairs Department to find money for suicideprevention programs within its \$160 billion budget.

Iraq veterans in legislature want to protect PTSD dogs

He did two tours in Iraq, but it wasn't until he came home that Sen. David Knezek lost a buddy from his unit that committed suicide. The transition home is too hard for some veterans. Knezek said, and we're not doing enough to help. As one of only two Iraq veterans in the Michigan legislature, Knezek hopes to change that by making it easier for veterans suffering from post-traumatic stress disorder to get well-trained service dogs and all the protections that go along with them.

A first-term senator on the Veterans, Military and Homeland Security Committee, Knezek wants to standardize the training and licensing for PTSD service dogs. He also wants to change Michigan law to provide the same protections for veterans who use service dogs for PTSD and traumatic brain injury as any other person who uses a dog because of a physical disability.

"We came across a number of stories across the country dealing with veterans who utilize service dogs on college campuses, in different businesses, in restaurants, and unfortunately a number of them were being asked to leave," said Knezek, a former Marine. "Folks look at the veteran with the dog, and they don't see any missing limbs, don't see them having any difficulty hearing. They very clearly have the ability to see. So folks think that veterans are being disingenuous with the use of these service dogs."

"What we have found throughout our research is... there are umpteen number of statutes dealing with service animals," he said. "There is a significant lack of definition for what it is these dogs can and cannot provide, a complete lack of standardization as it relates to the licensing process, the training, and how that dog

visibly is showing to other people it is a working service dog. We guickly realized this was going to be a greater undertaking than what we originally envisioned."

Texas center offering innovative treatment for veterans with traumatic brain injuries

The Carrick Brain Centers treats both civilians and veterans, but does not accept insurance. Veterans' treatments and expenses are covered under research contracts or private donations, while civilians pay out of pocket for treatment. No prior diagnosis is needed for post-9/11 veterans seeking treatment for Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD) and TBI.

Patients are enrolled for two weeks and undergo three treatments per day which include mental health counseling and physical workouts with a local UFC champion. There are also fishing and camping trips offered for weekend activities.

The therapies focus on rewiring the brain in order to restore functionality to different areas of the brain. Each patient is offered a customized treatment plan which includes vision exercises, diet guidelines, supplements or hormones. The Carrick center also offers its patented Off Vertical Axis Rotational Device (OVARD) therapy, which provides neurological rehabilitation.

OVARD rotates the patient in a precisely controlled manner. The specific angle, roll and speed of the rotations are targeting the patient's vestibular system which controls balance, spatial orientation and movement. The movement stimulates the vestibular system to encourage neural activity in parts of the brain that have been affected by illness or injury. The rotations are pre-determined by diagnostic testing on the patient. "If you can't stimulate that [injured] part of the brain, other parts won't work as well.'


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The Motorcycle Lawyer on THE LAW

Pushing for Motorcycle Awareness and Safety

We're almost there, folks. The days are finally getting longer and it's finally safe to start thinking about the motorcycle season ahead. Before I talk about prepping your bike for the riding season (next month!), I wanted to talk about a new law that I think is a great step towards improving motorcycling safety. I also wanted to suggest some simple but concrete ways we can all promote motorcycle awareness and safety every day.

This spring, the Nathan Bower Act takes effect and will influence Michigan's newest drivers. The new law (also called Nathan's Law and HB 5438) mandates that driver education classroom instruction "shall include information concerning the laws pertaining to bicycles and motorcycles and shall emphasize awareness of their operation on the streets, roads, and highways." In other words, Nathan's Law ensures that new drivers are being taught right from the beginning that they need to be aware of and watch carefully for motorcycles while they are driving. I think this new law is a sign that legislators are taking motorcycle awareness and safety seriously.

The Nathan Bower Act is one small positive to come out of a terrible tragedy. Nathan Bower was only 19 years old when he struck and killed by a motor vehicle driver when he was riding on his motorcycle just a few miles from home. His family and friends were devastated by his loss and determined to find a way to help reduce the number of riders killed in crashes. In interviews, Nathan's parents and other supporters of the law stated that they wanted to try to save others from the pain and loss of a motorcycle crash. The law was passed on what would have been Nathan's birthday.

I firmly believe that as riders, there is only so much we can do to prevent motorcycle – motor vehicle crashes, and after that it's up to the drivers. However, I also believe that as members of the biker community, we have a responsibility to actively promote motorcycle awareness and safety to everyone. We need to try to build on the buzz created by the passing of Nathan's Law, and try to be as dedicated to promoting motorcycle safety as Bower's family and friends have been.

Promoting motorcycle awareness and safety can be as simple getting a bumper sticker for your car (and your spouse's car, and your kid's cars, and your friend's cars... etc). You only have to do it once, but every time you drive your car you're calling attention to the fact that motorists need to Watch for Motorcycles. (If you don't want to buy a bumper

sticker, my office can set you up for free... contact us via our website.) You can also post messages, pictures, videos, and other promotional material on your Facebook, Twitter, and other social media pages. My team and I are committed to creating and sharing quality motorcycle awareness materials via social media, as part of our commitment to giving back to the biker community; add us to see them! If you're not big on social media, even putting a sign in your window or on your lawn could help remind drivers to be aware.

I've said it before, but joining a local motorcycle group is a great way to support motorcycle awareness activities in your area. Even if you can't commit time to attend chapter events, you could always make a donation to a group like the Motorcycle Safety Foundation or your local ABATE chapter. Even simpler, start teaching your kids when they're little to Watch for Motorcycles by playing the Count Motorcycles game, or slug-bike, or some other game that encourages them to always be on the lookout for bikes.

Whatever you do, make a commitment to spread the word about motorcycle awareness and safety this year. Do it for yourself and your riding buddies, your families, and everyone out there on two wheels. Nathan's Law is a great start... let's keep the momentum going.

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



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Tech Tips By Steve

Harley® Goes High-Tech... Kinda

Sure hope you all are getting through winter OK! I have taken a few fun cold rides to keep my sanity but I am so ready for spring and some serious HEAT!

I have numerous questions and calls on wiring, mostly to do with LED turn signals/headlights and internal handlebar wiring, some stereo conversions too, and YES you can update your stereo and use your stock handlebar controls! (Pre 2014 is easy) New for Harley is the introduction of the cam-bus electric system which started in the electrical systems on the 2011 Softail Harleys and in 2014 for the rest of the Harley fleet, why do you care? Well this is a huge change for how the electronics communicate throughout the bike and if you plan on replacing electrical items on your bike make sure they are 100% compatible with the new system. Using the wrong stuff and the wrong installation on this new system can cause some major league problems. DO NOT try to tap into any wiring on the new system... bad bad things will ensure

What is this new cam-bus style electrical system?

I don't want to get to deep into this but it is a subject you should at least be aware of especially if you have or want to get a newer bike. Can-bus is nothing new, it has been around since the eighties and was invented by Bosch, "Can" stands for Controller Area Network and the Bus is a common interconnection area point and a digital bus allows multiple packets of information from different sources to travel down one path simultaneously. Can-Bus allows most of the various computers and peripherals to talk or communicate with each other in both a simplified and complex manner. This means that nearly every electrical device on your bike could be connected to the Can-bus system which continuously and rapidly monitors everything via a computer. The system can also monitor current flow, voltage, etc. If you tried to tap into the electrical system for an extra electrical gadget Can-bus might "complain" and the Can-Bus computer thinks that the bike has a problem. It might even record the problem and give you a visual signal that all was not well. If the load was bad enough the bike might not start or not able to be ridden.

The problem that arises from Can-Bus is that the electrical system is to some degree no longer relatively easy to modify with changes, or add-ons, etc. Just adding an electrical outlet jack for a phone charger might cause problems. Typically the owners' answer to this is to wire accessory goodies directly to the battery, via a separately added fuse or fused panel. In cases where an electrical part or piece of equipment needs to be controlled by the motorcycle electrical system then the part must be connected through a special isolator that separates the two functions and hides the electrical flow from the Can-Bus system.

Your Harleys engine is controlled by the ECM (Engine Control Module) and the overall motorcycle from the headlight, the speakers and the taillights are now controlled by the BCM (Body Control Module) via can-bus communication, which basically also, just like your car, monitors the system for problems and lets you know about them. To give a "for instance" of the changes ... in 2010 a Softail has 11 fuses and 2 relays. A 2011 has 3 fuses 0 relays and 1 BCM (Body Control Module) and 33 large gauge wires were removed from the harness, so you can see it is helpful in many ways, however if you use good accessories and install them wisely or have a good shop help you there is no cause for alarm. Fig 1 is a Softail Body Control Module, looks similar to a TSSM (turn signal security module).

OK enough of all that poppycock, now onto things I can understand, Basic wiring and how it is connected.

Connectors are probably the most discussed thing in our shop with customers. "How do I get these things apart?" There are a few different ones on a Harley, for example on a 2007 Harley Ultra you have Deutsch, Molex, Pickard, Delphi (fig3), Multilock (fig4), and Autofuse (fig2) connectors. The ones most taken apart for custom work are the Molex and the Deutsch so I will tackle those two connectors only.

Out of all of these connectors the Deutsch style is my favorite by far, they are sturdy weather proof and easy to manage. The downside is they are big and bulky and to do the connections 100% correct you have to buy a \$250-400 tool to crimp the solid style ends, however there are some modified Deutsch male and female ends (stamped style) that can be crimped with a less expensive tool. You can see in Fig 5 from right to left- (left) regular crimpers/stripers \$25 (center) Universal Crimp tool \$72 (right) Deutsch solid terminal crimper \$250-\$400. The universal crimper will crimp the stamped style Deutsch connector but it takes some finessing. They also have a Deutsch/Molex crimper that's around 200 bills but I don't have one to show ya...sorry.

Deutsch

To take the Deutsch connector apart you need no special tools, simply pry the orange top off with a thin screwdriver on the male connector and use needle nose plyers to remove the green wedge lock on the female connector, then on each wire use the small screwdriver to slide back the locking tab inside the connector and pull on the wire...bam disassembled! To reassemble simply slide the wires inside the connector until it snaps in and give it a little tug to make sure it locks, then put the rest of the wires in the same way, make sure they are all sitting inside the connector correctly then slide the wedge lock in which will click and lock all the wires into the connector so they cannot be pulled out, make sure the rubber sealing ring is on (male side only) and your done... easy day my friends.

Molex

The Molex connector is a little harder to take apart, easier with the removal tool but with a needle or a paperclip and some patience you can get them apart with ease. Fig 7

First pull the secondary lock up but not completely off using needle nose plyers on the female side and a small screwdriver on the male connector, then use the Molex tool or a paperclip to release the primary lock inside the connector and pull on the wire, continue until you have the wires out. Caution!!!! Avoid completely removing secondary lock, particularly on the socket housing side. Removal will allow the terminals to rotate inside the chambers, which prevents reinstallation of the secondary lock. If you do make this mistake no worries just remove all terminals from the connector housing before reinstalling the secondary lock, then reinstall the connectors. Not a huge deal and yes I have made the mistake ... I am not perfect by any means, but I tell ya what, once I learn the hard way I never forget...well at least most of the time.

Crimp on connectors




Fig 8 Ever see this? Oh my this is trouble!

I do not like to use these but there are places where there is no other choice. However you can do it in such a manner that they won't be a worry later like in the picture below on this ole shovelhead. Fig 8

I like to use uninsulated crimp connectors personally but if all I have is insulated ones I simply pull the insulation off. I crimp the wire onto the connector then use a dab of solder to make sure it will never pull apart then shrink wrap the connector to give it a nice seal, I have had great success. You can use black shrink wrap for most everything and to add some coolness you can use red on your power wires. In Fig 9 you will also see a yellow crimp connector to the right, these connectors are a little pricy but have a thick shrink wrap already on them, they work awesome, and you even can get them with dielectric grease already in the connector. Simply crimp then heat the tip and it seals perfectly.

Posilock

The Posilock is one of the coolest things that have come out on the market in a long time... it makes custom connections so easy! They come in all kinds of sizes and styles, even waterproof ones. Simply unscrew the tip slide the wire in and screw the tip back on and BAM you have a perfect connection. Much better than any butt connector and the real beauty of these is you can take them apart and reuse the connection as many times as you like.




Fig 10 Posilock



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



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ABATE OF MICHIGAN

Baby-boomer bikers like to wear all black garb: black leather jackets and chaps, black boots, black novelty helmets - if they bother to wear a helmet at all. Serving the same purpose as gang colors, the dark apparel identifies to others that those who wear it belong to a particular subset of motorcyclists commonly referred to as "bikers."

How's that statement make you feel? If like me, it kind of sticks in your craw, you might be interested in knowing that this is the attitude of some Michigan folks with the fervent intent of bypassing your rights and forcing their ideas of what's appropriate on you through law.

This year, the 25 dollar basic rider courses that are financed by you via fees on your motorcycle registrations, are going to give each individual who passes the course a 38 dollar reflective vest. The vests being financed through a federal grant received to address our safety. Yeah, something close to like 200 thousand dollars' worth of reflective vests to be handed out. Do you think it was "bikers" who came up with this "brilliance" as the best bang for OUR bucks to keep us safe? These NannyCrats, as history would have it, tend to look at what Europe is doing regarding vehicle safety and then implement their own version of it. Hi-Viz is mandated in several European countries, so don't be surprised when the mandatory Hi Viz clothing bill hit's the Michigan legislature.

So while several hundred thousand dollars' worth of reflective vests lay on the floor of garages and basements around the state, likely unused for riding purposes, we will be bombarded with advertising to get us to vote yes on increased taxes to fix the damn roads? Granted a couple hundred thousand for roads won't fix much, but it likely would contribute more to our safety than those vests ever will.

I don't know if I am a baby-boomer and really don't care. I am a "biker". I wear what I have always worn without any interest in how it "identifies" me to others. I do not, nor ever have I belonged to a "gang". I do believe the saying, "Harley riders are a dime a dozen, Bikers are a dying breed", is true although I don't limit it to Harley riders. And I know I am not alone.

We, "bikers" pay taxes. We work hard. Many of us are veterans. We contribute generously to our brothers, sisters, and communities. We have respect for the Constitution, our Flag, our Military members, Honor, and each other. In return all we expect is to be left alone to live our lives as we choose without infringement of our rights. Unfortunately, that does not happen without a watchman at the door. American Bikers Against Totalitarian Actions - ABATE of Michigan, is our watchman.

To be clear, we do not represent any "subsets". We are not a club. We do not stereotype or diminish any biker based on club, affiliation, race, sex, beliefs, political party, or brand of motorcycle. We welcome and represent ALL Michigan Bikers and fight to preserve the freedoms of the road.

is proud to announce that this summer; we will be introducing a state-wide, summerlong riding challenge hitting the coolest riding destinations and events across the state – The 2015 Michigan Thunder Run! This is a riding challenge like no-other and features great prizes every month!

The Way it Works

Each month *Thunder Roads Michigan* will announce a list of Thunder Run Stops each month. These stops are selected based upon the recommendations of our readers and confirmed by our editors. Riders can then hit these locations and present their Rider Cards in order to register at each stop.

Once a Rider has registered at the stoptheir Card number is then entered into the drawing for that stop. *Thunder Roads Michigan* will then select rider checks-ins randomly each month from across the state for special prizes and incentives.

Prizes are developed by both *Thunder Roads Michigan* and our sponsors - allowing for some exciting options. They may include stays at exciting stops, riding gear or accessories, gift certificates, cash, and even the opportunity to win a motorcycle!



The beauty and simplicity of this program is that anyone can win with any check-in, but your chances of winning are increased by the amount you ride! The dedicated rider trekking across the state has a greater chance of accumulating prizes -but the couple that can only get out a few days a month to ride can also win! Every check-in counts as an entry in the "drawing" - so if you hit 40 stops in a month, you have twice as many chances of winning as someone that only hits 20. The more you ride - the more opportunities you will have to win! That's the whole idea - to encourage everyone to get out and ride!

State and Stop Prizes

Every month the *TRMI* staff will randomly select winners from the check-ins. Some prizes will be specific to the particular stop - and usually sponsored by that stop. For instance, a leather shop may award a custom leather vest to someone visiting their store during the month of June. That would be a prize specific to that stop and only riders checking in at that location would be eligible for that prize. Other prizes will be state wide, with everyone checking in at any location eligible to win!

If your check-in is drawn, *Thunder Roads Michigan* will post your card number both online and in the magazine. Riders will then have at least 45 days to "claim" their prizes. For state-wide prizes, winners will often have the opportunity to select from a number of prize options. For instance, a rider might have the option of winning a **Rally Package** that includes accommodations and extras for attending the particular Rally. If that rider isn't able to take advantage of that prize - they might opt for a **Premium Leather Jacket** instead.

- Riders are able to win multiple prizes based upon the drawing of their check-in.
- Some prize drawings are specific to only check-ins for the particular month - while others prizes are drawn from check-in's season long.

The first step will be for riders to register for their *Thunder Roads Michigan Ride Cards*. A number of select locations will serve as Registration Centers. Riders can easily register at these points – free of charge. They will then receive their Ride Cards.

Thunder Roads Michigan will also be registering riders for Ride Cards at specific events throughout the year as we distribute magazines. 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As with the magazine itself, the Michigan Thunder Run is presented through the support of our sponsors and partners all across the state. We have secured several key sponsorships already, but opportunities remain. Even if your organization is not a riding destination you might become a sponsor for the tremendous promotional value it offers through the constant media attention it will receive. Obviously this will be a heavy focus within the magazine but we are also working with radio and other media outlets to help spread awareness of the run. 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
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
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LETTER TO THE EDITOR

The semi-automatic AR-15 is the most popular rifle in the United States. There: are several reasons for this. One is that following every major conflict that the conflict have sought to acquire firearms: similar to those they used to fight with. The .223/5.56mm cartridge also contributes to the popularity. The rifle is easy for just about anyone to shoot as it does not produce "punishing" recoil when fired. As a result, it is popular among shooters of smaller stature—women and children But, you are not limited to the .223/5.56mm. You can change calibers easily with the AR-style rifle by simply replacing the "upper" assembly with one in the caliber of your choice—provided it will fit within the AR's "form-factor". You may or may not be able to use the same magazines for the new caliber's ammunition as you can for the original caliber.

Still another factor in the popularity of the AR-15 is probably related to politics When gun control advocates say they want to ban something, that just serves to increase the popularity of that item as people rush to buy them while they still . Those in the carbine configuration with the collapsible butt-stock and shorter barrels seem most appropriate for self-defense as they are easier to maneuver in the narrow confines of hallways and rooms. The caliber is a proven man-stopper. The lack of recoil makes it easier to make accurate follow-up shots if needed. The light-weight bullets do not over penetrate and thus are of less concern in crowded urban environments.

Having a detachable magazine makes the AR-15 rifle easy to reload. Magazines come in 5, 10, 20, 30-round capacity, and some with even larger capacities. (Note, in Ohio you are limited to using nothing larger than a 30-round magazine for a total capacity in your firearm of 31 rounds of ammunition.) The 30-round magazine is the standard for the AR-15 platform.

However, the AR-15 is not something that is easily adaptable for "concealed carry". It is a little too large for that role, although it works well as a "home defense"

So, should you consider the AR-platform to fulfill your self-defense needs? It certainly does if you are not concerned about "concealed carry" when you are out in public. With millions of Americans already having one, it should be an easy choice. U.S. has fought, the veterans of that Plus it has one other advantage. 


