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














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
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TECH TIPS

Getting ready for that SPRING Ride!

Take a few minutes to look over your bike and make sure everything is ready to go. If you're not comfortable wrenching on your own bike or would simply like another set of eyes to go over everything - this is a great time to call your local dealer or shop and schedule a spring service check. There's no shame in reaching out, and a spring session at the shop is a great chance to have everything looked over before you hit the road!

1. Dust Off Your Bike.

Remove the cover and any blocks used to keep your bike in place during winter storage and lower the bike onto its side stand. Remove any plugs, rags or covers from the exhaust pipes and air intakes meant to keep out animals and foreign objects. Wash away any coating you may have applied to protect the frame, rims and chain.

2. Look Over the Fuel System.

Replace the fuel filter and examine the fuel tank, fuel lines and fittings for cracks and leaks. If you used fuel stabilizer, your fuel should be in good shape. Make sure by opening the filler cap and looking inside for gunk or stratification. If the fuel is consistent and clean, you can go to the next step. If not, you're better off draining the tank and fuel lines before running the engine. You also should check and clean your carburetor. Add a fuel system cleaner the next few times you fill your tank

3. Make Sure it's Well-Oiled.

Many motorcycle manufacturers recommend that you change the engine oil and filter before storage and again in the spring. During storage, the oil can separate, causing a condensation build up that may harm your engine. Whether or not you changed your engine oil before storage, you'll still want to check the oil level before riding.

4. Check the Fluids.

Check the fluid hose connections for looseness or signs of leakage. Check for cracks in all hoses and replace as needed. Check the levels and consistency of all of the fluids. Change any fluid that looks suspicious and top off any that need refilling. Always use a new sealed container when topping off fluids. Flush and replace the old antifreeze with proper coolant. You also should replace the air filter.

5. Charge the Battery.

If you removed the battery for storage and kept it charged, just clean the cables and terminals with a wire brush, then grease and reconnect. If you kept your battery trickle-charged or hooked up to a tender.

it's probably in good shape. However, if the bike was stored without disconnecting the battery or without using a smart charger, the battery will need to be fully charged or replaced if it won't hold a charge. In either case, check the leads for corrosion and make sure they're attached snugly. Depending on your battery, you may have to fill the cells with distilled water. Be sure the vent tube is connected and properly routed.

6. Kick the Tires.



If the weight was off your motorcycle's wheels during storage, chances are your tires are in good shape, but you still should inspect them thoroughly before riding. Check for cracks, bulges, punctures, stress marks or flat spots. Using a tire pressure gauge, check air pressure in both tires to ensure they're properly inflated. If needed, refill your tires to the manufacturer's recommended pressure. Inspect the wheels for dents and carefully tighten any loose spokes. Grease the wheel bearings.

7. Hit the Brakes.

Check and fill the brake fluid level, and replace it if it's dirty. Examine the brake lines for cracks and leaks. Inspect the brake pads and discs or shoes for wear. If they're thin, you may want to get new ones. Thoroughly clean the brake rotors with brake cleaner. Lubricate the front-brake hand lever and throttle cables.

8. Rev the Engine.

If you didn't spray fogging oil or lubricate the top of the cylinder before storage, remove the spark plugs and pour 2 tablespoons of oil into the spark plug ports. This will lubricate the top portion of the cylinder walls before you start the bike. When you pull the plugs, check the gaps; if needed, use a gap-setting tool to set them to the manufacturer's specifications.

9. Inspect the Frame, Suspension and Steering.

Inspect the frame and fairing for hairline cracks. Pay close attention to areas around the engine and transmission brackets. Move the forks forward and back to feel for looseness. If there's any movement or clunking from the steering head, tighten it properly. Inspect the handlebars for cracks and lubricate the cable connections. Pay particular attention to brakelever pivot bolts, axle nuts and drain plugs. Lubricate all bearings and grease the kickstand. Check the condition of every nut and fastener, and tighten as

10. Double-Check the Chain and Sprockets.

Check the sprocket for missing teeth or uneven wear. Test the amount of slack in the motorcycle's chain and adjust the tension to the manufacturer's specification. Then lubricate the chain.

11. Take a Look at the Electrical System.

Check your electronics, switches, lights and gauges for proper operation. Test your regular and high-beam headlamps, and front and rear turn signals. Test your rear brake light and ensure it lights up when you engage the brakes. Test the horn to ensure it's working.

12. Test the Controls

Examine the cables and hoses for cracks, kinks or other damage. Test the levers and pedals to make sure they're well-lubricated. Test the throttle to ensure it flows smoothly and does not jam or spring closed when released.

13. Update Your Insurance Policy.

Make sure your insurance policy is current and in force. Far too often people have seasonal policies and they forget to renew once the snow thaws. Then - one slip on winter cinders or a distracted cager can spell financial ruin for you. If you've added any custom parts or equipment, you'll want to be sure they're covered as well.

14. Hit the Road.



Let the bike idle for a few minutes to get its fluids circulating. Check to see whether it idles smoothly and at the correct RPM after reaching normal operating temperature. Use the Motorcycle Safety Foundation's T-CLOCS (Tires, Controls, Lights, Oils and Fluids, Chassis and Stands) checklist before you hop



Researchers at UCLA are using a noninvasive form of treatment called external trigeminal nerve stimulation (eTNS), (electrical stimulation of the nerves) that can be added to an existing regimen of therapy and medication. One of the researchers, Ian Cook, co-developed the still-experimental technique as a treatment for controlling epileptic seizures that were not responsive to medication. In the current study, 12 chronic sufferers of PTSD, whose traumas ran the gamut from car accidents to rape to combat, participated in the eight-week open outpatient study using eTNS.

"Overall, we saw about 30 percent reduction in symptoms across the board in anxiety, sleep, startle reflex, and all major symptom domains of PTSD," says Leuchter. They also saw a 50 percent decline in severity of depression. While that may not seem like a particularly strong symptom reduction, Leuchter adds, "Any reduction in symptoms in this population is very important because this was a group that had suffered with treatment-resistant symptoms for a very long time." One quarter of the subjects' PTSD went into remission.

Since the UCLA study was an augmentation trial—that is, eTNS was administered in addition to patients' existing regimens of psychotherapy and medication—their next phase of research will be a double-blind study, conducted with the VA in Los Angeles, on veterans who have served in the military since 9/11. Since it will be using placebo treatment, at the end of the study, veterans who received placebo will be given a chance to try the eTNS system, as well.

Lawmakers Start Nonprofit to Help Struggling Veterans

Republican Rep. Tom Barrett and Democratic Sen. David Knezek have announced a new nonprofit to help struggling veterans after the state's Auditor General released a scathing audit unearthing problems at a state-run veterans' nursing home in Grand Rapids.

Barrett says he and Knezek, both Iraq War veterans, had been laying groundwork for the nonprofit before the recent audit led to the resignation of Michigan Veterans Affairs Agency Director Jeff Barnes in February.

Barrett says the nonprofit has already raised money from corporate sponsors. It aims to help break the chain of events leading to veteran suicide, help get service dogs for veterans with post-traumatic stress disorder or brain injuries and host town hall meetings.

Genesee County Department of Veterans Services receives \$15,000 grant

State Rep. Pam Faris, D-Clio, has announced that the Genesee County Department of Veterans Services has been awarded a \$15,000 grant by the Michigan Veterans Affairs Agency. The money will be used to hire an additional permanent, full-time accredited benefits counselor.

"I am thrilled to see needed money come to Genesee County to help our veterans," Faris said. "This area has a long tradition of hardworking men and women, and our local servicemen and women extend that tradition across the globe. The benefits counselor will be a very helpful addition to the already excellent work of the Genesee County Department of Veterans Services."

The Michigan Veteran Affairs Agency's county incentive grant program will give money to 19 Michigan counties in the first round of fiscal year 2016 grants. The grants are awarded to counties looking to create local departments of veteran's

affairs, hire additional accredited benefits counselors or upgrade or invest in new technology — all to better connect those who have served in the Armed Forces with the benefits they've earned.

State veterans homes pursuing Medicare, Medicaid certification

The Michigan Veterans Affairs Agency would receive \$70 million to support the Michigan Veteran Health System under Gov. Rick Snyder's fiscal year 2017 budget recommendations.

The recommendation includes \$8 million for MVHS to pursue federal certification from the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services – a move that is critical to the long-term financial stability of Michigan's veteran's homes.

"This funding will help ensure our veterans receive quality care while aligning Michigan with best practices in the veteran health care field," Snyder said. "More than 600 men and woman live in these facilities, and this step will allow the Michigan Veteran Health System to provide improved and necessary care for veterans of today and tomorrow."

CMS certification would allow MVHS to collect additional federal funding available to Medicare- and Medicaid-eligible residents whose cost of care is not fully covered by VA per diem rates.

Capital improvements to both veterans' homes have better positioned MVHS to receive CMS certification, including:

Implementation of electronic medical records at both state veterans homes.

The creation and construction of family rooms and living rooms for visitors at D.I.IHV

An increase in the number of surveillance cameras and the installation of card access pads on many exterior doors at GRHV.

The installation of a patient anti-wandering system for some units at GRHV.



Jason's Top Tips for Getting Ready to Ride

We made it! The clocks have sprung forward and it's officially spring, time to list my top tips for getting ready to ride this motorcycling season. That is, if you ever really stopped riding, since winter was so mild...

#1 Don't Ride Without Insurance: I know, I know, I keep going on about insurance! But the thing is it's really important that you are properly insured before you hit the road. If nothing else, this winter has helped prove my point that you shouldn't cancel your motorcycle insurance during the winter: if you didn't have coverage, you wouldn't have been able to go out on those crazy-warm days we saw, and I know I saw a bunch of bikes out in January 2016. Obviously, another reason to keep your coverage in winter is that your homeowner's policy will not cover your bike if there's a flood, fire, or other damages, so why take the risk? In Michigan, you're required to carry bodily injury coverage to ride legal. I also recommend carrying comprehensive coverage, in case you are in a wreck and want to get your bike fixed. You made need special riders for custom work or other accessories, so be sure to talk to your insurance agent about what you've got and what you need. You can also learn more on my website, www.TheMotorcycleLawyer.com.

#2 Get our Biker Card: Every year, we work with local vendors to get deals or freebies on products and services for bikers who carry our Biker Card*. In addition to all that swag, our Biker Card could also help save a life: The card provides vital information for what to do in the event of the crash, including first-aid basics and other safety tips. #3 Get your Bike Ready: This is a strange spring because I feel like a lot of readers may not have put their bikes to bed last fall like they normally would. What you have to do to get your bike ready to ride is going to depend on what you did in the fall and how you stored it during the winter. If you fully prepped and stored your bike for winter, then you'll have to start with an inspection: remove the cover and put it in a proper storage container so it doesn't get damaged, then start looking at your bike. Make sure all your wires and hoses are attached and damage-free, look for rust or corrosion, check your battery for damage, and test your lights and turn signals. You should also check your brakes. If you rode during the winter, you may want to consider an oil and filter change, and maybe taking the bike in to a licenses mechanic for a full tuneup. The extra cash and effort now could pay off if you are able to avoid problems (and downtime!) in the middle of the riding season. Finally, check your tires.

#4 Check your Tires: Tire condition is so important I felt like it needed to be its own tip! Whether you stored or rode this winter,

you should check your tire pressure, and look them over for flat sports, wear, cracks, debris, and so on. Invest in a small portable air tank so you can fill your tires at home. Even though it's been so mild, at this time of year we do tend to see a lot of swings in temperature, which can affect your tire pressure day-to-day. NHTSA recommends checking tire pressure before every ride, and I'm going to say that's not a bad idea at least until the temperature levels off a bit. At least check them once a week: always use a reliable tire gauge, and check them when the tires are cold. I also recommend carrying a simple repair kit when you ride, just in case you run into a problem.

#5 Watch for Motorcycles: Maybe it seems weird to include this, but it's important that we all get back into the habit of watching for motorcycles as the season gets underway. Start playing "Count the Motorcycles" with your kids when you've got them in the car with you. Start posting on social media about the importance of motorcycle awareness; follow me on Facebook (facebook.com/TheMotorcycleLawyer) to see and share all kinds of information, links, and posters about motorcycle awareness and safety. Spread the word, you could save a life... maybe even your own.


RUNNING TO THE THUNDER

nybody who has been around road bikes more than one season has probably heard of "*Rolling Thunder*", the motorcycle event that takes place in the nation's capital every Memorial Day weekend.



The purpose of the gathering is to honor the POW's, MIA's and those who have paid the ultimate price in all wars where Americans have served. The highlight of the weekend is the motorcycle parade through Washington on Sunday morning when a couple hundred thousand bikes literally make the ground shake as they roar down the avenue. Because it draws so much attention, and the participants come from all over the country, the parade is broadcast on C-SPAN every year. Yes, it is a very big deal, and I am proud to say that I have participated!



There is a second ride which intersects with then blends into "Rolling Thunder" on the Friday prior to Memorial Day. Because of this relationship, and a shared mission of honoring America's heroes, most people assume that they are one in the same, but nothing could be farther from the truth. The ride I am talking about is called "Run for the Wall", and I am proud to say that I have made it. One of the biggest differences is that most participants in "Rolling Thunder" come from the eastern US and ride in for the weekend and then back home to be at work on Tuesday. Riders in "Run for the Wall" leave Ontario, CA and spend ten days on the road before arriving in DC the Friday before Memorial Day to participate in the weekend. For the sacrifices the riders in "Run for the Wall" make to participate they are given a position of honor near the front of the Sunday parade.

Participation in "Run for the Wall" has gotten so large that they have had to break it into three separate groups with different routes as they make their way east. On their journey coast to coast the participants in the "Run" are ambassadors for "Rolling Thunder" at every stop they make. And at every stop the "Run" is welcomed by veterans groups, community groups, whole communities, churches, motorcycle dealers, and fuel stops with food, fellowship, sometimes free gasoline, and always a ceremony to remember the heroes they ride for who "cannot ride for themselves."

Ten days, approximately 3600 miles (one way), sounds like a long haul, and it is. But, when it is broken down between the stops and take into account the places you go, the things you see, and the people you meet, you find yourself wishing it didn't have to end. When I made the "Run" in 1999, I found that my sorrow to be heading home from DC was proportional to the elation I felt when our initial group of 300 bikers pulled out of Ontario. Most of the riders were from the western states, but we also had riders from Alaska, Hawaii, Canada, Australia, New Zealand, and the Azores. Add to that those of us who rode west from all over the country to claim "ALL THE WAY" status (a patch earned not given), and all the riders that joined our eastward odyssey and you begin to understand how special "Run for the Wall" really is.








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HISTORY OF MOTORCYCLES:

Part 9

Last time we took a look at the 1950's and the "birth" of the biker lifestyle. The changes in American culture and society continued to rapidly evolve in the 1960's as well. Harley-Davidson continues branching out during this time, introducing a scooter to their line of rides, as well as the introduction of the Sprint model. In 1962 Harley purchased 60 percent of the stock in the Tomahawk Boat Manufacturing Company and by 1963 the factory is

fully operational as a H-D facility. By entering the boat manufacturing game, Harley soon realizes the relevance of fiberglass in motorcycle production and shortly thereafter begins production of its own components. In 1964 the three wheeled Servi-Car becomes the very first Harley-Davidson motorcycle to receive an electric starter. In 1965 the Electra-Glide replaces the Duo-Glide and is up-

dated with an electric starter. The Electra-Glide is the first FL available with electric start, and the Sportster line followed soon after. Now don't get me wrong, kick starting a bike is cool as hell, but if you're at all like me (lacking in the excess muscle department) then the concept of electric start is consummate. 1966 brought about the birth of the Shovelhead in the Harley family, and the beloved Panhead was replaced on the Electra-Glide models. 1969 brought about the start of the darkest days in Harley history for die-hard lovers of the brand...the merger with American Machine and Foundry, longtime producer of leisure products.

On that note, I'm going to pull a June Cleaver and change the subject in an attempt to divert attention from Harley's adaptation. During the 1960's Floyd Clymer Imports continued using the Indian name on import bikes that were essentially motorcycles fitted with Royal Einfield Interceptor 750 cc parallel-twin engines. British manufacturers including Triumph, BSA, and Norton continued producing bikes and remained dominant in some markets until the rise of Japanese manufacturers in the late 1960s. Of these Japanese manufac-



Honda name was big in the world of motorcycle racing, and they had also introduced the first mass market bike to come with a


So now that we are up to speed on the framework of the 60's, we can get to the focus of this installment. The egocentric, inherently dramatic, attention whore of the motorcycle family....the chopper. In the 1960's chop shops and custom builders

> started springing up everywhere. As custom shops multiplied, so did the number and the diversity of bikes. The original chopper movement was taken to extremes when builders started chopping down and lowering the frames and stretching the rakes. Some shops even built custom exhaust pipes for their patrons. Now, I know we are all about motorcycle

safety, but safety wasn't necessarily the top priority while creating a custom chopper. Choppers are all about style, beauty, getting noticed...a bit diva-ish if you will. Heavy rake angles sacrificed low-speed handling and cornering ability, but damn you looked good tearing up the asphalt. And let's face it; by this time in motorcycle history, there was a

> big enough contingent of people modifying motorcycles that the chopper "style" had begun to take hold. A certain set of modifications became somewhat of a standard... narrow tires on 19"-21" wheels. forward mount foot pegs replaced floorboards, headlights and tanks were often replaced with smaller versions, and last but certainly not least...chrome. Lots of chrome...

you've gotta have bling for your metal prom queen. One motorcycle modification that began at this time and has stuck around since in one form or another came about due to the passing of a law that required a "retention fixture" for passengers. So a vertical back rest was constructed and added to the rear of bikes...the Sissy



Bar is born. And in true chopper fashion, many were custom made to be elaborate and often taller than the rider's head.

Now we can't forget paint...the 60's brought about a surge in candy colored paint, metal flaking, and multi-colored patterns. A look that I like to refer to as the "tilt-a whirl" paint job...if you have ever been to a small county fair it will make sense. The chopper truly allowed for the ultimate freedom for both builders and artists. And the 1960's gave us some of the most memorable and most recognized names in motorcycle history...let's take a look at a few.

Probably the most recognized name in chopper history is Arlen Ness. Ness's bikes were characterized by having low frames and highly raked springer front ends. Many of his bikes also retained the rear shocks to provide a more forgiving ride than the typical hardtail chopper. Ness started out of his garage in 1967, on a bike he bought with prize money from a bowling tournament. He entered his first bike in a show and won first place... this started his career in customs. He worked nights out of his garage in San Leandro. California until he had built up a customer base big enough to allow for him to complete customs as his primary job function. ..and the rest (as they say) is history. The biker world is damn happy you know how to bowl, Mr. Ness.

In 1967 Denver Mullins and Mondo Porras opened Denver's Choppers in San Bernardino. California and soon became famous for building "long bikes"....Denver Choppers.

Denver's Choppers was the first company to manufacture long down tube stretch frames, which came to be known as the Swedish style. This company was instrumental in starting the aftermarket industry that flourishes today with custom parts including frames and springer front ends. Mondo has been dubbed "The Godfather of Choppers" by his peers... quite an honor when your peers consist of motorcycle icons.





Finally, we cannot discuss choppers without the mention of Ron Finch. Finch opened Finch Custom Cycles in 1965 in a small building in Pontiac, Michigan (GO BLUE!). Finch designed, built, and painted amazing one-off motorcycles in his own incredibly unique and extreme style. In addition,

Finch created metal sculptures that resisted any aesthetic classification...the guy may or may not have been a touch off his rocker, but what the hell, his twisted mind made some bad ass metal. Not content with just re-creating metal, he also is highly regarded for his experimentations with paint processes.

His first nationally known custom was a 1966 BSA which he named "Kaleidocycle", which provoked Ed "Big Daddy" Roth to headline Ron as "Michigan's Motorcycle Madman".

The 1960's brought lot of changes to the motorcycle world... not that any of these crazy modifications could have possibly been thought up in a pharmaceutically induced delirium, but it

sure would make things a little easier to comprehend if they had been. Regardless of where the ideas came from, I'm damn glad they transpired from concepts into the entity that is the chopper. The 60's made for a captivating installment in motorcycle history. Next time we will look at the 70's, and hat kind of changes the motorcycle lifestyle and industry faced.

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
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Bullet Points


In case you haven't noticed we are entering a period of time that comes around every four years which has been aptly named the political "silly season." We will be subjected to a relentless onslaught of media ads, bill boards, mass mailings, and telephone calls making pie in the sky promises, pointing accusatory fingers, and voicing outlandish claims as candidates woo and schmooze us for our vote.
