





Max took his first motorcycle ride in the spring of 2010 when he was just 9 months old.

He instantly fell in love and any opportunity he could get he wanted to ride on the tank with his daddy. It used to be a joke that we couldn't leave on the bikes without first taking Max around the neighborhood otherwise he'd throw a fit and cry at

He went on his first charity ride for Toys for Tots when he was 2 yrs. old. He ended up falling asleep, resting his little helmet in the speedometer of his daddy's Soft Tail Deuce. One foot on the horn, one foot on the air cleaner. We would always laugh because when we came to a stop sign, Max would let his feet hang. When his dad would take off, he pull his feet right back up just like dad.



As the years went on Max was just always part of different rides and charity events. If his dad was riding, Max was usually with him. Once he was 4 years old he was too big to be on the tank so we bought an Ultra Classic. This provided him to be secured by the backrest in front on him and the arms/speakers on the side of him. Once we got the Ultra, Max went everywhere with his dad. As his mother enjoyed riding alongside both of them. Max will often yell something out as if I can hear him

and he'll constantly throw an "I love you" sign

In 2014, he asked Santa for his own motorcycle (much to our surprise). With the help of some friends Santa was able to grant that request. The chopper sat in our living room for 3 months since he wasn't able to ride it with all the snow. He would just pretend. The first time he went out on the bike at a local park we were surprised to see what a pro he was. It's in his blood & off he went.



Around his 6th birthday (June 2015) he began telling us his birthday wish was to ride his motorcycle with his

dad. Max's birthday fell on a Tuesday and just so happened to be bike night at Castaways. Max didn't know we had secretly brought his bike to Castaways and when he made the wish; his dad took him to the parking lot and let him ride right alongside of him into bike night. The rest is very public history....

He still rides his own bike on private property and area parks, but you will most likely see Max on the back of his

dad's bike all summer long. When he is 16 years old his dad plans to pass along that Deuce to Max to continue riding right alongside his dad.

CMU Program Helps Veterans

Gaining a degree can be a difficult proposition for a soldier, whether he or she is currently in the service or have their military days behind them.

Central Michigan University's Veterans' Resource Center gained a gold-level ranking for being "veteran friendly" from the Michigan Veterans Affairs Agency last year. Director Duane Kleinhardt said since most staff members are veterans themselves, they can relate to incoming students with similar situations.

CMU has long been supporting students who devoted their time, bodies, minds and more for the defense of their country. Empathy towards those who had similar experiences can be a big part of that, Kleinhardt said. "We want it to be a safe place where [veterans] can talk to someone who has walked in their boots and are going through the same trials and tribulations," Kleinhardt said.

He regularly meets with students, saying the 6 to 8 students he spoke to on a Friday was a slow day. Kleinhardt, who served in both the Navy and the Army, said he wants to use technological resources such as video conferences to make students taking CMU courses on military bases feel more connected to the university.

The VRC also assists active military - including National Guard and Reserve – and spouses and dependents of veterans and active military members.

Dan Maloney, manager of U.S. West Operations at Central Michigan University's Global Campus, oversees CMU's representatives on different U.S. military bases throughout the United States, including Marine Corps Base Camp Pendleton in California and Pope Field in North Carolina, with vetted, qualified instructors to teach the classes. He said U.S. West makes efforts to help soldiers find a program of study that works for them.

Habitat For Humanity Looking For Veterans Who Need Home Repair

Marion Graff leads an interesting life. He's 93 years old and has lived in the same Grand Rapids home since 1953. Graff is also a World War II veteran who served as a Navy sailor.

"We were on the frontline 211 days," Graff recalled.

These days, he said he still keeps busy. However, there's only so much he can do around the house on his own when it comes to maintenance. He said some of the home's features have been falling apart.

"I had an older door. It was in there for probably 30, 40 years," he pointed out. "It wasn't closing real good."

So a friend told him about Habitat for Humanity of Kent County's "Veterans Repair Program". The program helps veterans weatherize and/or beautify their homes. It's been around three years.

Program director Michael Hyacinthe said, "World War II veterans, Vietnam-era veterans, veterans from Iraq and Afghanistan, those who actually own their homes, but their homes are aging. However, many of these individuals are disabled. So their income is very limited."

Habitat has a partnership with Home Depot, providing repair services for qualified service members at a greatly reduced cost. He said Graff's total bill was

\$15,000. So the veteran paid just \$4,500. Home Depot covered the rest. Among the repairs, Graff got a new, efficient toilet, several old windows replaced, as well as new doors. "It's done, and it's gonna be warmer. I know it's gonna be warmer," Graff said

He said he's already been asked about the program. After looking at his heat bill, the World War II veteran has nothing but good things to say. "It's already made a difference in the billing," Graff said.

Verlander Surprises Veterans With Holiday Gifts

Justin Verlander's Wins for Warriors Foundation provided an early holiday gift — a surprise trip to Disney World — to the families of three veterans.

The Tigers pitcher unveiled the gift in a video message to veterans Justin Weis, Adam Gottis, Michael Roberts and their families following the 1000 Christmas Salutes event at the Grosse Pointe War Memorial.

Roseville Meijer also joined the effort, providing gifts for the children of the families. "We know that veterans need time to re-charge and re-connect with their families — and we wanted to make sure they could do that without any of life's day-to-day distractions," said Sandy Hudson, the foundation's executive director. "We truly hope they enjoy their time at Disney World and come back refreshed and ready for the year ahead."

Launched in 2013 by Verlander, the foundation advocates for post-9/11 veterans and their families. The organization has supported veterans returning from Afghanistan and Iraq with mental health disorders, including Post Traumatic Stress Disorder, traumatic brain injury and depression. In its two years, the foundation has granted more than \$650,000 to projects supporting the mental health and well-being of veterans.



Jason's Top Five Things Every Driver Should Know about Michigan's Point System

We're in the home stretch, folks... just about two weeks left until the clocks "spring forward" and we really notice the days getting longer again. It's still a little early to be talking about getting our motorcycles ready for the season, so I thought I'd go over five key points in Michigan's driver's license Point System.

#1 If you get assigned points for a traffic violation, those points stay on your record for two years... period. There is a law in place that prevents the Secretary of State from removing points early or "setting aside" points after a conviction. Many attorneys argue that this is why it's so important to fight every ticket you get, as opposed to waiting until you're close to twelve points; if you lose your case, you could get pushed over the 12-point line, which could result in your license being restricted, suspended, or revoked.

#2 There is a "process of escalation" when it comes to Points. The Secretary of State will contact you by mail to advise you that you have more points than the average driver once you get four points over a two-year period. When you get to eight points, the Secretary of State will contact you again to warn you that your license could be suspended if you continue to break the law. Finally, if you get to the twelve-point mark, you will be ordered to meet with someone from the Secretary of State to review your driving record and take several driving related tests, which could include a written exam, road test, vision test, or others.

#3 Different types of offenses* are assigned different point values upon conviction. The most serious violations, including vehicular manslaughter and reckless driving, have a six-point value. Driving while "visibly" impaired, drag racing, or failing to yield to an emergency vehicle can get you four points. If you're convicted of careless driving, or disobeying a signal or stop sign, you could get three points. Finally, two-point violations include speeding up to 10 mph over the limit, or driving with an open container (of alcohol).

#4 Accumulating Points doesn't just affect your driver's license, it could also affect your insurance rates. Insurance companies may use your points against you and raise your rates or cancel your policy.

#5 If you get an alcohol conviction on your snowmobile or off-road vehicle, the points associated with your conviction will end up on your driver's license. That means even if you weren't driving your vehicle or motorcycle, you could still have your license restricted,

suspended, or revoked if you accumulate enough points during your recreational activities.

Obviously, every case is different and with all the nuances within the law, I can't cover every aspect of the points system in a single article. Mom was an avid supporter of the K.I.S.S. (KEEP IT SIMPLE SWEETIE) method of cooking. I now, more than ever, truly appreciate

her philosophy of always taking shortcuts where you can, as long as your ultimate outcome is that of down home, labor of love cooking.

LUCK OF THE IRISH HEARTY STEW

- 1-1/2 to 2 lbs. of Boneless Sirloin Steak Meat; cut into bite-size pieces
- 2 Tbls. of All Purpose Flour
- 2 3 Tbls. butter or margarine
- 1 Large Yellow Onion; chopped in big chunks
- 1 Can of Beef Stock and 1 Carton or Box of Beef Stock
- 1 Can of Stewed Tomatoes; un-drained
- 1 Envelope of Good Seasons Garlic & Herb Dressing Mix
- 1 lb. of red potatoes, jackets left on, cut into 3/4 inch chunks
- 2 Handfuls of pre-packaged baby carrots
- 1 Cup of Frozen Peas
- 1 Cup of either Frozen Corn or Frozen Broccoli, or both
- 2 Tbls. Worcestershire Sauce
- 1/2 Palm-full of Thyme
- 2 Tbls. Pearl Barley (in spice aisle any grocery)
- 1 Heaping Tbls. of Parsley
- 1 Bay Leaf
- 4 Beef Boullion Cubes; dissolved in 1 cup hot water

Melt 1/4 stick of butter or 2 tablespoons of margarine over medium heat. Dredge your meat chunks thoroughly through flour and then dredge again. Place into melted butter in a Dutch Oven and let brown up good on all sides. Remove to side plate. Now, on medium-high heat, sprinkle apprx. 3 heaping tablespoons of all-purpose flour into same pot. Keep working it around and around for about a minute or so to cook off the flour taste. Next, add your dissolved beef boullion cubes hot water mixture and again, let it all get mixed in well. Keep that wooden spoon moving! Next, add the (1) can of beef stock and keep an eye on it as it will thicken up quickly. Turn heat down to mediumlow. Add the box of beef stock now. Add back in the beef chunks, potatoes, tomatoes, dressing mix, onion chunks, Worcestershire, thyme, barley, parsley and bay leaf. Cook covered for 45 minutes. The last 15 minutes, remove bay leaf and if needed, if stock too thick, add 1 cup of hot water. This will dilute the beef flavor so only add it if truly necessary. Now add in all your frozen veggies and a large pat of butter or 1 Tbl. of margarine, whichever. Take cover off and let go until frozen carrots are tender throughout. Serve in big soup bowls along with a cold apple/walnut & pear salad mixed in creamed mayonnaise and chopped Romaine lettuce. Serve hot crusty bread and take some room temp, margarine or butter and throw in a palm-full of basil and spread on thick slices of hot bread.

Aye! Now this Irish Stew truly is magically delicious!

ONION PIE VIDALIA STYLE

- 3 Cups of thinly sliced Vidalia Onions
- 1/2 Stick of Melted Butter
- 1 Pre-made Pie Shell
- 2 Eggs; beaten
- 3 Tbls. All-Purpose Flour
- 1/2 Cup Half & Half
- 1 Small Tub (8 oz.) of Sour Cream
- 1 Tub (8 oz.) Philly Cream Cheese (room temp.)
- 10 Slices of Hickory Smoked Bacon cooked crisp
- 1 Pkg. of pre-sliced mushrooms
- 1-1/2 cups of Grier cheese (get from Deli counter)
- Salt & Pepper to Taste

Preheat oven to 325 degrees F.

Melt butter down in a skillet and add onions and mushrooms and saute' until lightly browned. Place your pie pan on a sheet pan in case any drips over. Line bottom of pie crust with sauteed onions and mushrooms. In a small bowl beat up the two eggs and the flour together until smooth. Gradually add the half & half, cream cheese, sour cream and salt & pepper to taste. Mix well and pour all over the onions in the pie shell. Crumble bacon all over the top of pie and distribute evenly. Bake for 25 minutes and the last five, slide oven rack out and top generously with Grier cheese and let bake for 5 more minutes. Let cool 5 mins, before cutting.


OH SO LUCKY! IRISH GREEN CUPCAKES WITH GREEN BUTTERCREAM FROSTING

1 Pkg. of White Cake Mix







WE SHOULD REALLY WEAR BLUE

Saint Patrick himself would have to deal with pinching on his feast day. His color was "Saint Patrick's blue," a light shade. The color green only became associated with the big day after it was linked to the Irish independence movement in the late 18th century.

How did the shamrock become associated with Saint Patrick? According to Irish legend, the saint used the three-leafed plant as a metaphor for the Holy Trinity when he was first introducing Christianity to Ireland.

COLD WEATHER HELPED SAINT PATRICK'S LEGEND

In Irish lore, Saint Patrick gets credit for driving all the snakes out of Ireland. Modern scientists suggest that the job might not have been too hard – according to the fossil record, Ireland has never been home to any snakes. Through the Ice Age, Ireland was too cold to host any reptiles, and the surrounding seas have staved off serpentine invaders ever since. Modern scholars think the "snakes" Saint Patrick drove away were likely metaphorical.

THERE ARE NO FEMALE LEPRECHAUNS


Don't be fooled by any holiday decorations showing lady leprechauns. In traditional Irish folk tales, there are no female leprechauns, only nattily attired little guys.

ABATE - Legislative Agenda for 2016

There will be no increase on motorcycle plates thanks to ABATE!

Legislation that ABATE SUPPORTS includes:

- a. HB-4853 introduced by Rep. Tedder (43rd Dist.) to raise the tuition for state sponsored (Public Sector) riders training from \$25 to \$50. The tuition was set in the early '80's and hasn't changed since. This is causing sponsors to drop the classes and student "no-shows". Passed the House and assigned to Senate Trans. Comm. It will be voted on the 2nd week of Jan. 2016.
- b. HB-4854 introduced by Rep. Tedder provides a "waiver" for the State's written test for students who pass an approved Motorcycle Safety Class. Passed and assigned with HB-4853.
- c. SB-404 was introduced by Sen. Joe Hune (22nd Dist.) to make an "exemption" to liability claims for APPROVED sponsors of motorcycle rider training classes such as Community Colleges and Dealer sponsored classes. Will be worked on in late January 2016.
- d. HB-4651 was introduced by Rep. Plawecki (11th Dist.). It will increase the fine for unlicensed riders to match those for car drivers ("up to" a \$500 fine). House Criminal Justice Comm.
- e. HB-4905 introduced by Rep. Jacobson (46th Dist.) would earmark 25% of unendorsed riders fines to the motorcycle riders fund. It is tied to HB-4651. House Criminal Justice Comm.
- f. SB-496 introduced by Sen. Jones could impose POSSIBLE jail time for unendorsed riders to match penalties for car drivers.

Legislation that ABATE **DOES NOT** support includes the following:

a. SB-527 - HELMET BILL introduced by Sen. Warren and Hood REVERSES our present helmet law in favor of a mandatory usage law.

WHAT WE ARE WATCHING:

- Roll-call tapes: Proposals from the Governor's Traffic Safety Advisory Commission (GTSAC) to "encourage" cycle endorsements with a "roll call" tape for police agencies. This tape would "profile" motorcyclists with a "checklist" of reasons to pull them over to check for cycle endorsements RATHER THAN enforce existing endorsement requirements.
- The wrong message: "Look Twice to Save a Life" program which is nationally recognized versus "Ride Safe to Ride Again" which has been supported by the GTSAC "leadership" is vague and targets riders instead of car drivers.
- Wasting your tax dollars: \$342,000 (9,000 @ \$38 each) plus shipping and handling at about \$10 each (estimated) EACH YEAR FOR THREE YEARS has been allocated by the GTSAC to GIVE AWAY "Hi-Viz" vests to riders who pass a state sponsored rider's training class (which costs \$25). The objective is for these bureaucrats to "change the culture" (their words) of motorcycling so you want to wear this stuff.



HISTORY OF MOTORCYCLES:

Part 8


Following the Second Great War, things in the motorcycle world were changing faster than Katy Perry's hair color. Across the pond, the BSA group purchased Triumph in 1951 and quickly became the world's largest motorcycle producer. The German NSU was the largest manufacturer from 1955 to 1959, only to be beat out of first place by Honda in 1960. Norton had its own developments, with the manufacturing of the twin cylinder Domina-

tor with a featherbed frame – lightweight and strong this café racer was the ride of choice by numerous world champion racers. Back home in the states, Indian ceased all operations and production in 1950. Five years later, Brockhouse Engineering purchased

the rights to the Indian Motorcycle name and sold imported Royal Enfield models branded as Indian models until 1960. While others struggled, Harley-Davidson kept on keepin' on and in 1952 released the side valve K model. This model featured an integrated engine and transmission to compete with sportier motorcycles coming out of Great Britain. In 1957 Harley delegated the K model the "Sport-


ster"...it boasted a 55 cubic inch overhead valve engine, and within 1 year of its debut had become known as the first of the "superbikes". The following year Harley introduced the first hydraulic rear brake and new rear suspension on Big Twin models, and the all new Duo-Glide.

Post war background aside...what were our Veterans doing now that the war was over and they were back on American soil? Well they did what any one would do when out of sorts...they found a replacement for the comradery they had found during the war. That replacement came in the form of motorcycle riders grouped



loosely into organized clubs...unbeknownst to them; these veterans had just changed history in the United States. The "biker" came into being, a new social institution had been forever introduced into American society...and we thank you for that.

Last month I mentioned the overwhelming amount of surplus bikes that remained af-



during the war, they realized that Harley-Davison made some dependable machines, but they just couldn't compete speed wise with what they had ridden during the war. So, naturally, they took these surplus bikes home and decided to modify them. These bikes were stripped


down...ammunition racks, windshields, and scabbards discarded. Fenders were shortened or in some cases removed. Some left the paint alone, some chose to alter the standard olive green. What resulted in the end was the start of a new era, one that would change the world of motorcycles for generations to come. And so history

was made again...probably in some dude's garage...the bobber is born. While the bobber will reign for most of the decade, there is yet another change on the horizon...the bobber's flashy cousin...the chopper comes to visit near the end of the fifties.



You may be asking, what exactly is a bobber? Is it the same as a chopper? Well, the answer is No...While a chopper could indeed also be a bobber; they are not one in the same. Webster's time is upon us...A bobber is defined as a stripped, stock motorcycle with a "bobbed" or shortened fender and only essential motorcycle parts remaining. It is minimalistic and has had as much weight shed as possible to increase speed and performance. On the other end of the spectrum lies the chopper...The chopper has also had non-essential items removed, but it has a major difference...the frame is not stock, it has been "chopped" and modified from its original factory

state and the rake of the front fork has also been modified in order to move the front tire further from the bike.




in order to modify their frames and lighten their bikes. Gas tanks, headlights, and blinkers were made smaller. Some bikers removed their batteries and replaced them with magnetos to further reduce weight. Standard front tires were replaced with narrower tires, and handlebars were modified to be taller to compensate for the rake of the front fork (ape hangers). Bikers noticed immediately how much different it was to ride a motorcycle with these modifications, but did that stop anyone from pushing the envelope and creating bigger and better choppers





in the future? Of course not...I've never met a biker who would back down from a challenge, and this was no different.

I affectionately referred to the chopper as the "flashy cousin" of the bobber....but let's be honest here. The Chopper is more like an attention whore, and being in the limelight seems only fitting for such a diva. Choppers are unique, they are individualistic, and they deserve their own article. The chopper era took the Unites States by storm, and produced some pretty amazing names in the biker world. So, although I have been told that I shouldn't encourage egocentrism...I am going to give in, just this once and spend next month looking at all that is chopper, and the extremes the chopper culture went to in the 1960's.

Bullet Points PRACTICE



My name is Rick Wyatt and I am an employee of Total Firearms in Mason, Mi. I became a firearms instructor in the late 1970's with the Michigan Department of Corrections and I am currently certified to provide training for individuals seeking their Michigan CPL. I was recently asked to pen "Bullet Points" and since this is my first article out of the box I want to hit on a subject I preach in the classroom, and that is practice. I am an adamant believer that if you are going to carry, either open or concealed, you have an obligation to practice every chance you get. I know why people say they don't practice, usually time and/or expense, but if you carry neither is acceptable because of the possible consequences of discharging your firearm.

Right up front let me stress that all practice is good practice and dry fire practice is both effective and cost efficient. Contrary to popular belief, dry fire does not harm most modern firearms (rim fire excepted), but if you have any reservations about dropping the firing pin on an empty chamber use snap caps or dummy rounds to protect your firearm. Safety has to be your first concern when you are handling firearms so always make doubly sure your gun is completely empty before you start a dry fire drill. And then practice in a room other than the one where you keep your guns and ammunition and ensuring that your gun is always pointed in a safe direction during practice goes a long way to ensure safety.

The purpose of dry fire is to reinforce shooting fundamentals; opportunities to work on grip, breathing, aiming, trigger control and follow through. If you properly work a dry fire drill just 20 minutes twice a week you will see a marked improvement in your shooting ability. Some of you are probably wondering where you are going to find twenty minutes anywhere in your schedule, and to that I reply that there twenty minutes of commercials in every hour of television so place a target near the TV and dry fire during the commercials



Keeping a coin balanced on the front sight blade is an excellent gauge of how smooth your trigger stroke is.

The secret to a good dry fire drill is staying in control and not rushing to see how many shots you can get off during a given period of time. You are striving for consistency and you always start with a good stance, cycle the slide (if you are using an auto loader) to set the firing pin, take in a full breath and slowly let half of it out as you bring the firearm to eye level, pick up sight alignment and sight picture, place your finger on the trigger and steadily increase rearward pressure until the firing pin/hammer is released, then hold your sight picture for a slow count of ten before you lower the gun. Your primary focus should always be on your front sight and it should not jump when the firing pin falls. If your sights jump it is because you are pulling the trigger making the gun go off rather than gently squeezing or stroking it and letting it go off. To work on trigger control balance a coin on the front sight blade before you go to your sights and see if you can keep it there when the firing pin falls. The ability to keep the coin balanced shot after shot indicates you are developing a good smooth trigger stroke and are well on your way to becoming an excellent shot.

Dry fire is good, but you still need live fire practice to properly gauge your ability and insure that your firearm is in proper working condition. Just like dry fire the secret to a good live fire practice session is not seeing how quickly you can put x-number rounds down range. Rather it is about staying in control and critiquing every shot before you take the next one. Don't worry about speed; shooting fast, before you are ready, just gets frustratingly expensive quicker. Remember that the first rule of "double tap" is that the first shot has to be good before you pull the trigger the second time. You will learn a lot more by taking an hour to shoot one box of ammo than you will ever learn shooting up two or three boxes of ammo in that same hour. Always remember that range staff can be a valuable resource, especially if you find yourself struggling, and most important --- HAVE FUN!
