Mom was an avid supporter of the K.I.S.S. (KEEP IT SIMPLE SWEETIE) method of cooking. I now, more than ever, truly appreciate

her philosophy of always taking shortcuts where you can, as long as your ultimate outcome is that of down home, labor of love cooking.

BLACKENED SPICY GARLIC SALMON

- 1-1/2 lbs. Wild Salmon (4, 6 oz. fillets, skinless)
- 1/2 tsp. Creole Seasoning
- 1/2 tsp. Dried Dill
- 2 Tbls. Pre-Chopped Garlic (in grocery's chilled veggie section) or use real garlic, peeled & finely chopped
- 3 Tbls. Butter sliced into 6 thin pats
- 1 Juice of fresh Lime; juice & zest both
- Salt & Pepper to taste

Preheat oven to Broil. Adjust oven rack to the top of the oven.

Season both sides of the Salmon w/ salt & black pepper, creole seasoning & dried dill. Place on a non-stick baking sheet. Toss garlic evenly over the salmon and top with butter pats; 2 pats for every piece of salmon. Place in the oven and broil for 7-10 minutes, making sure not to over-cook.

Remove, cut lime in half and juice all pieces and then zest the lime over all pieces.

This is such a great, light dish for Spring and the Creole seasoning and that blackened taste combined with the lime just makes it pop! Delish!

PASTA & FRESH PEAS SALAD

- 31 Box of Corkscrew Pasta
- 3 Tbls. Quality Margarine
- 1 Reg. Size Bag of Frozen Peas (thawed)
- 1 Large Red Pepper cut up and roasted in oven @ 350 degrees for 10 mins.
- 1 Bottle of Alfredo Sauce (in grocery aisle along with spaghetti sauce)

Cook your pasta until still a little bite left in it; do not cook unti mushy.

After draining pasta, add to a glass or ceramic bowl and add your heated all the way through Alfredo sauce and the roasted red peppers. Salt & pepper to your desired taste and add the thawed peas last and gently stir so as not to squish the peas.

This is a really good side dish to have with your Blackened Salmon as the creaminess of the Alfredo sauce truly compliments one another.

OH SO LUCKY! IRISH GREEN CUPCAKES WITH GREEN BUTTERCREAM FROSTING

- 1 Box of White Cake Mix
- 18 oz. Tub of Cool Whip
- 1 Egg

Powdered Sugar (Confection)

Mix all ingredients together to be dropped onto cookie sheet.

Drop tablespoonfuls into a small bowl of Powdered Sugar to coat thoroughly to go on sheet.

Bake at pre-heated 350 degrees for 12 minutes. Cool before removing gently with a spatula.

These are so light and not too sweet, just right. I've also done them with other types of Cake Mix... red velvet, fudge chocolate and spice. The white ones just look airy and fluffy for Spring. Garnish w/ the zest of a tangerine over top for a little kick. Yummers!

CAMPFIRE STRAWBERRIES

- 1 Container of Big Sized Strawberries (it's peak time now so be choosey) Farm Stands are good because often if you tell them they're for a special recipe they'll let you create your own selection box.
- 1 Bottle of premium Marshmallow Crème; pour it out into a small glass or ceramic bowl. Wash your strawberries gently under cool water and dry with a paper towel very gently and then let rest on double paper towels to dry complete. Soak kabob wooden spears in water so they don't burn and stick them into top of strawberry and then dip the bottom in the marshmallow crème' and gently toast over fire until bottom golden brown. Can do over open flame gas stove too.

Michigan Veterans to Soon be Able to Receive Health Care Outside The VA

Veterans in Michigan will soon have the opportunity to receive health care outside the VA. Ascension Michigan is partnering with the Veterans Choice Program to give vets the choice to receive care at Ascension Michigan locations throughout the state. Genesys hospital is one of those sites.

To qualify, veterans must face wait times longer than 30 days at the VA or have to travel further than 40 miles from their home.

Privatization Savings Fade as Vets Home Answers Audit

When the Michigan Department of Military and Veterans Affairs terminated 150 state nursing aides at the Grand Rapids Home for Veterans in 2013 and replaced them with a contractor paying much lower wages, state officials said the move would save taxpayers about \$4 million a year.

The state stuck with the cost-cutting move over the objections of veterans living at the home who complained the private nursing aides were poorly trained, frequently quit for better jobs, and had seriously injured veterans by trying to lift them in an unsafe manner. A scathing February audit documented the mishandling of neglect and abuse reports and said the contractor, J2S Group of Grand Rapids, did not meet staffing requirements 81% of the time, lawmakers and administration officials say they are scrambling to assure "our heroes" are getting adequate care.

But the planned remedies — another pay hike for the contractor and bringing in more oversight —could mean higher costs to care for the veterans than existed before the privatization push.

The auditor, by checking surveillance video, also found that 47% of required room checks were not performed, despite documentation showing it was done, and that complaints of abuse and neglect were not properly investigated.

Gov. Rick Snyder called the audit "deeply troubling," accepted the resignation of former campaign manager Jeff Barnes, who headed the Michigan Veteran Affairs Agency, and named as the home's interim director his chief legal counsel, former Kent County circuit and U.S. Navy judge James Robert Redford. Now, actions are happening so quickly that officials aren't able to pinpoint all the associated costs, though Redford told the Free Press he believes there is "still a substantial reduction in cost" from when state employees served as nursing aides.

Officials at the American Federation of State, County and Municipal Employees, which represented the laid-off nursing aides, say even before the latest pay hike for J2S — which the union had not received details about as of Friday — the state is paying more than it did before the switch, and for an inferior level of care, when the extra costs of supervising the contract and other associated problems are included.

During a union appeal in 2013, state officials told the Civil Service Commission the home would easily exceed the required 5% savings threshold for replacing state workers with private contractors.

Nick Ciaramitaro, Michigan AFSCME's legislative director, said the state is now realizing the perceived savings from hiring low-cost workers to care for the state's veterans has not materialized. "You're not going to be able to hire enough people. And even if you do, you're not going to be able to keep them," he said.

The union has offered to call back former state nursing aides who are willing to return. Redford, who is preparing to call for bids on a new contract, said returning state workers to the home, is among the options being considered.

30th National Veterans Golden Age Games in Detroit

Eight hundred men and women are expected to compete in the 30th National Veterans Golden Age Games in Metro Detroit this summer. To make it happen, organizers say, they'll need 2,500 to 3,000 volunteers.

The athletes are veterans age 55 and over who are enrolled in VA health care. They'll compete July 10-14 in events as varied as air rifle, nine-ball billiards and the 1,500-meter run. Bringing to life the old saying about where close only counts, people who used to carry hand grenades will now pitch horseshoes. Figure three days of it with two volunteers for each of two shifts at 40 pits, and that sport alone has 480 volunteer slots.

"We need a lot of hands on deck," says the Detroit VA Healthcare System's William Browning, who, despite his choice of phrase, is actually a veteran of the Army.

The tasks begin with handling baggage at the airport. Genial helpers will need to keep competitors hydrated, keep them from getting lost and keep score.

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


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The Motorcycle Lawyer on THE LAW JASON'S TOP 3 LESSONS FROM RECENT TRIAL VICTORY Just in Time for Motorcycle Awareness Month

May is Motorcycle Awareness Month: The riding season is getting into full swing, and it's our best opportunity to spread the word that motorcycles are everywhere. I recently represented an injured motorcyclist in a court trial, and am pleased to say that justice was served in the form of a verdict of over half a million dollars. The trial, and the crash that led up to it, really hit home for me and showed me that motor vehicle drivers are still not getting the message that they need to be Motorcycle Aware. I want to share the lessons I learned from this case and how they highlight the need for better awareness among vehicle drivers, and then provide a few resources to help you spread the word.

The Backstory: My client was badly hurt when a minivan driver smashed into him while he was riding his Harley on a two-lane country road. The minivan was stopped in the lane ahead, with only the passenger wheels over the fog line. It was a nopassing zone, so my client slowed down well before reaching the minivan, then started to go around. The minivan suddenly made a left turn, slamming into my client in an attempt to turn around. My client had serious injuries, including a head injury, broken clavicle that needed surgery, broken ribs, broken teeth, road rash and scarring, and a back injury that needed surgery two years after the crash.

This case ended up in court because the minivan's driver and the defense team were betting on what is known as the 50% rule: if the defense could convince a jury that my client (the badly injured motorcyclist) was more than 50% at-fault for the crash (over 50% negligent), they would not have to pay non-economic damages, such as pain and suffering, scarring and disfigurement, and loss of enjoyment of life. In other words, they would be off the hook for the long-term effects of the crash. This brings me to my first lesson:

Lesson #1: There may be a bias against unhelmeted motorcyclists. In this case, the defense team thought they could convince a jury that my client was more than 50% negligent in the crash mostly because he was not wearing a helmet (they also said he was passing on a double line). Since Michigan's helmet law was repealed in 2012, I have talked to a lot of riders and non-riders, and conducted focus groups (mock trials), to find out what people think about riding without a helmet. What I learned is that non-riders in particular seem to feel that riding without a helmet is negligent, or that it puts the rider in greater danger than if he were wearing a helmet.

Because of my extensive research and experience handling these types of cases, I was prepared to fight this apparent bias. I filed a motion to prevent the defense team from arguing that my client was negligent for not wearing a helmet, but that motion was denied by the judge. I explained it to the jury this way: whether or not my client was wearing a helmet that morning wouldn't have made any difference in terms of preventing the crash. And, even if he had been wearing a helmet, it wouldn't have prevented the majority of his injuries. I also explained to the jury that my client was riding legal that day, which brings me to my second lesson:

Lesson #2: Riding legal matters, and can make a huge difference if you are ever injured in a crash. During the trial, I emphasized over and over that my client was legal when he rode without a helmet: He had a motorcycle endorsement (CY), his bike was registered, he had proper insurance, he was over 21 years old, and he was carrying the extra \$20K in medical coverage you need to have to ride without a helmet. How could the defense say that my injured client was negligent when he was so conscientious about following the law?

Ultimately, the jury did assign some negligence to my client, but not more than 50%, and I believe that is mostly because they could see that he was fully compliant with the law. Meeting the legal requirements to ride a motorcycle is neither difficult nor

expensive, and it certainly paid off for my client in this case. So as always, I encourage all motorcyclists to "get endorsed, get insured, and spread the word". This brings me to my last lesson:

Lesson #3: Promoting Motorcycle Awareness is an important part of the lifestyle, and we all need to do our part. Let's face it, drivers just aren't getting the message, and I have proof: my team and I are busy every day taking calls from and helping injured motorcyclists who have been hit by drivers who "just didn't see them". Drivers are more distracted than ever: eating, applying make-up, shaving, fiddling with their phones, checking their GPS units, or just zoning out. They are not being extra careful at intersections, where most vehicle-motorcycle crashes occur. They are not checking their mirrors or blind spots before changing lanes (or using turn signals). They are rushing to turn left directly in front of motorcyclists, either because they think they have time, or because they think the motorcyclist can stop on a dime.

I don't believe that vehicle drivers are "out to get" motorcyclists. But I do think that drivers just are not getting the message that our safety depends, more than any other factor, on their actions. I think it's up to all of us to engage with our family and friends, colleagues, and anybody else we talk to, and really spread the word. Just about everyone is on Facebook these days (including me: Facebook.com/TheMotorcycleLawyer), so use social media to get the message out! I challenge every reader to remind one person --friend, coworker, or stranger-- to Watch for Motorcycles every day.

HISTORY OF MOTORCYCLES:

Part 10


The 1960's brought us what was probably the flashiest, most forward customization movement in motorcycle history...a movement that continues to this day. It introduced us to some amazing names in the industry that will surely never cease to amaze,

be you a motorcycle fanatic or not. But while the 60's were all about flare, the 70's brought us some major changes, as well as some significant names out of Japan that would latch on to American motorcycle culture and ride on into the present as standard household names. By 1970 there are approximately 2.8 million motorcycles registered in the United States, so who wouldn't want to try and get a piece of the American pie?

First let's touch on what Harley-Davidson is doing during the decade at hand. H-D Motorcycles was still under the reign of AMF at the time, but that doesn't mean that they were stagnant. To kick off the 70's Harley introduced the XR-750 for Class C racing...a Sportster based motorcycle which they continued to update and improve upon throughout the duration of the decade. 1971 was the first year for the FX1200 SuperGlide - a combination of a Sporty front end and the frame and power train of the FL series. The SuperGlide opened the door for an entirely new class of motorcycle...the Cruiser. In 1977, H-D makes a very public debut of its FXS Low Rider in Daytona Beach, and later the same year releases Willie G. Davidson's dynamic version of the Sportster, the café racer. Willie's bike was only in production for two short years and was deemed "a sales flop" due to its lethargic performance, but eventually became a collector's item. The FXEF Fat Bob bounces onto the scene in '79... appropriately named for its dual gas tanks and bobbed fenders. So while









Harley was certainly not the motorcycle company making leaps and bounds at this time, they certainly didn't stop growing their ever blooming family tree.

Perhaps the biggest change in American motorcycle history in the United States that occurred was the addition of so many Japanese bikes to the mix. While many manufacturers both large and small took their shot at both the racing scene and general riding population, we will keep our focus on the four major Japanese manufacturers who jumped in to American culture with both feet....and managed to find and KEEP their place in American motorcycle history.

First and foremost to enter and succeed

in the United States is Honda. Honda entered the US motorcycle world like a bat out of hell....and just kept on flying. As with many Japanese motorcycle companies. Honda offered models that were superior examples of well-crafted machines. They were very popular in the racing world, and for good reason. The Honda "70" was one of the world's first small 4 stroke, small capacity motorcycles with an engine displacement of only 72 cc. It sported a triangular speedometer and a maximum calibration of 60 mph...Honda constantly upgraded and modified this model. In addition to the "70", Honda introduced America to the CL100, and the XL250. When it appeared, the XL250

> stroke enduro motorcycle, as well as the first mass produced 4 valve model. It was deemed an "enduro" because of its dual purpose... it shared many characteristics of a dirt bike, but at the same time was street legal, and intended for both on and off road use. An interesting aspect of the bike was its narrow streamlining...they were

> was the first modern 4



only 12" at their widest point (excluding the handlebars). The CBX was released during the 70's as well, and was classified as a Superbike. The late 70's Honda brought its CX series to the table...a monumental accomplishment, considering these models boasted liquid cooling, electronic ignitions, and dual CV type carburetors. But of all the models Honda introduced us to (and yes, there are more) the last model I will mention is a very familiar name. Honda's touring motorcycle premiered in 1974....the Goldwing. It was introduced at the Cologne Motorcycle Show that October, and proceeded to make itself at home around the world. Over the course of its history, the Goldwing has had numerous changes and upgrades, with most of its sales being made in the United States.

Next in line to try their hand in America was Kawasaki. These guys were hot on the tails of Honda, and all in when it came to competition. During the 1970's Kawasaki introduced Americans to several noteworthy models. The S1 Mach1 was a direct result of their previous model (the H1 MachIII 500 cc) and was in every aspect a 3 cylinder 2 stroke upgrade. They also produced the Mach1's big brother for a short two years...a larger version of the Mach1 with a displacement of 346 cc. Kawasaki also produced the Z1 in response to Honda's CB750...the Z1 helped to popularize the in-line, cross-frame four cylinder, which would become well known as the "Universal Japanese Motorcycle". This model was also noted for combining numerous elements previously available on other motorcycles into a single bike, and at the time was the most powerful Japanese 4 cylinder 4 stroke ever marketed...factory direct it had a maximum speed of 130 mph. Not too shabby if I say so myself. Kawasaki continued to upgrade models and added water cooling and shaft drives in the 70's, always maintaining advanced, and above all, FAST motorcycles.

Suzuki and Yamaha joined the Japanese quest for American domination in the 70's as well. While Yamaha models were somewhat scarcer than that of Honda and Kawasaki, they did have some pretty cool selling points of their own. The engines were air cooled, parallel twins that were even offered in a six speed version in some markets. Another interesting aspect of Yamaha bikes was that all models came equipped with "Autolube" automatic oil injection, relieving the user from the need to mix gasoline and two-stroke oil. One noteworthy point about these bikes...they were far different from Honda's approach with the dual purpose enduros...Yamaha models varied immensely between street bikes and racing motorcycles. In fact, the frames alone on street models like the RD350 were often upwards of







twice the weight of racing model frames. Suzuki brought us an initial lineup consisting of the GT380 (the Sebring), GT550 (the Indy), and the GT750 (the LeMans). These bikes offered piston-ported two stroke engines featuring Crankcase Cylinder Injection (PosiForce)...essentially a multi-point oil injection system. The 380 and 550 engines were air cooled and marketed as "Ram Air" by Suzuki. The 750 differed from the previous models in that it was liquid cooled and was nicknamed "the water buffalo" in the US, and also featured dual disc brakes up front (another big "first" for Suzuki).

So apparently the Japanese need to be thanked for more than Geishas and sushi...who knew they would create such a surge in competition in the motorcycle industry. Japanese manufacturers pushed the industry and encouraged American manufacturers to step up and polish their chrome if you will. So, I will be the first to say it....thank you Japan, for kicking our ass...We certainly needed someone to light a fire under our somewhat dormant carcasses and regroup. The 1980's brought us shoulder pads and highly flammable hair-dos...but it also brought us some pretty cool modernizations to our cherished two-wheeled cohorts. Next time we will check out what this decade brought to the table...besides the Rubiks cube.





A couple nice days in February and we all start thinking about riding our bikes. But March in Michigan can be an awfully long month. So off we went to Tucson where winters are sunny and warm.





switchbacks and hairpin turns that makes the dragon look like child's play. I'll tell you that this stretch of road is possibly the most beautiful and challenging road in the lower 48. At the end, you won't get a patch or t-shirt that says, "I rode the Apache Trail", or a picture showing you going around one of the curves. You won't even find a little store at either end of the trail to buy Apache Trail memorabilia. But, you will have the satisfaction of riding one of the most exciting roads in the country with your bike between your knees and knowing that no one will ever be able to take that away from you! You will want to check your side walls for wear.

Coming out of the Trails last mountain range will open up to one of the largest copper/gold mining operations in the world. It's worth the time to stop and gawk at one of the turnoffs available. The monster trucks and excavators look like tinker toys. We rode along this mine for close to 10 miles before we hit the town of Morenci.

So another bucket list trip is in the books. Now, back to work so we can go on the next one. Keep the wheel side down, friends.

SHOCK THERAPY

Being by myself, sometimes I have to leave to get parts, materials, pick-up and delivery, etc. By all means, if you come by and the lights are on, stop in and check us out. 


For this month's project, we are going to lower the rear suspension on a 2004 Dyna Super Glide. It is my wife's bike and she struggles slightly to get both feet flat on the ground. The situation is worse on rough or uneven pavement. There are more ways to go about lowering the rear suspension than space will allow us to discuss. Therefore, for this application we chose to use Progressive 444 Series rear shocks. They are 1" shorter than stock and pre-load is fully

When lowering rear suspension be aware that ground clearance will decrease and the normal riding and handling characteristics of the motorcycle will change. Use extreme caution when riding after a change. Lowering the motorcycle could cause it to bottom out, especially over rough terrain or in turns. It is an absolute must that after the shocks are mounted to check for clearance issues. Be sure to check for adequate clearance at: tire to fender, shock to belt or chain, shock to belt or chain guard, shock to brake caliper or linkage.

With the bike securely on the lift, (always use safety strap) put a jack under rear of bike and raise rear wheel until it just starts to come off surface of lift. This will allow removal of rear shocks without a lot of effort. Save all attaching hardware, as it will be used for installing new shocks.

The new shocks come with a couple of different bushing sets for different applications. Follow manufacturer's instructions and use the correct bushing for the specific model. When installing new bushings in shocks. use a small amount of anti-seize where the bushing goes into shock and where bolt or stud goes through the bushing. The shock basically moves up and down within themselves but they also pivot ever so slightly on the mounting bolts.



Since the new shocks are 1" shorter than stock, slowly lower jack until mounting locations line up. Re-assemble using original hardware. Make sure to use any washers or spacers exactly as they were used on the original shocks. Install both shocks making sure to use Loctite on mounting blots and just snug up. Before final tightening, check for proper clearance in areas mentioned earlier. If all looks good, torque mounting bolts to manufacturer specifications.



All that is left to do is set pre-load and test ride. Pre-load is basically the amount of pressure or tension applied to the shock spring when the shock is in its unloaded (no rider on bike) position. To adjust the preload, find a spot on swing arm and a spot on frame to measure between. Use same spot on both sides. On this bike, we used the lower shock bolt and the rear fender strut bolt. Measure between the two points with no rider on the bike. Have the person that will be riding, set on the bike and it should compress about 1".

If it compresses or squats more than 1", you need to increase pre-load by tightening adjusting ring on shock. If it does not compress approximately 1", you need to decrease pre-load by loosening adjusting ring. It is extremely important and I cannot stress the point enough to adjust both shocks exactly the same. If pre-load is not exactly the same, serious even dangerous handling issues result. If unsure about this process, seek the help of a qualified professional. Once pre-load is set, it is time for

a test ride. I want to mention again, riding and handling characteristics may be different. Before your test ride, check all areas mentioned earlier for clearance issues and start out slow. Get the feel of things. If the bike bottoms out over bumps, increase preload. If it is too stiff, back off pre-load. Use slight adjustments, and remember to Always Adjust Both Sides the Same.



The test ride on this project will have to wait as it just started snowing. Surely warmer days are on their way. If you think this might work for you and have any questions feel free to call me. I will be glad to help anyway

Used-Bike Buying Checklist

The American Motorcycle Association

How do you make sure you don't overlook something when you're checking out a used motorcycle? Print this checklist and take it with you.

Do your research

Before you put any motorcycle through its paces, read magazine articles, website reviews and visit online enthusiast discussion forums to glean information about that model's idiosyncrasies. For example, a BMW boxer drains the lifters when it's shut off, so it may make quite a racket when it starts up. If you didn't know that beforehand, you could walk away from a perfectly fine motorcycle.

Match the VINs

The VIN on the frame should match the VIN on the engine, and both should match the VIN on the title. If there's a discrepancy, there should be a very good reason. If not, walk away.

Check the VIN

Call it into your insurance company for a real rate quote. Call it into the manufacturer for any recall info. And, if possible, call it into state authorities, to see if it has been reported stolen.

Check the maintenance records

Sure, these can be fudged, but when you buy a used motorcycle, you have to accept that you must rely on some level of trust. If these don't exist, ask for a verbal account of maintenance history.

Examine tire wear



Look for cupping and make sure there's at least 1/16 of an inch of tread. Check the tire pressure while you're down there. Improperly inflated tires may hint at lazy maintenance habits elsewhere.

☐ Test for excessive bearing play

Ask the seller to put the bike up on the centerstand (when applies). Gently tug on the fork tubes front to back, feeling for play in the steering head. Also, feel for movement in the front and rear wheels and side-to-side action in the swingarm. Basically, any play is bad and a safety hazard.

☐ Check the steering head lock

Does it work? Use the key and find out for yourself, but just as important, look for any signs of damage or excessive wear. Has it been replaced or repaired? If so, the bike may have been stolen at one time.

Examine the air filter

It should be clean and properly installed. Consider a zero-tolerance policy. Dirt in the engine is a very bad thing. Also, is the airbox intact? Extra holes (punchouts) could be fine (as long as they are outside the filter), but ask the seller why they were performed.

Check all fluid levels

Discolored brake fluid, low coolant levels and dirty (or gray) oil are all bad signs. Don't forget that some bikes have separate crankcase and transmission oil—and two dipsticks.

Perform a visual once-over



Look for any obvious mechanical issues—loose or missing fasteners, fluid leaks, pitting in fork tubes, rust in the fuel tank, cable continuity, chain play, sprocket condition, cracked wiring insulation, etc.

Perform another visual once-over

This time, focus on cosmetics with an eye toward identifying crash signs. Look for inconsistencies in paint shade or texture. Cracks in plastic or fiberglass may be invisible from the outside, but obvious from the inside. Use a flashlight and check all the cracks and crevices. Examine footpegs and sidecases for scrapes. Do the control levers appear extra shiny? Ask why and when they were replaced.

Operate all controls

Test the brakes, operate the clutch and take note of sufficient play, shift gears, flip the turn signals, beep the horn, etc. If a test ride is not allowed, then put the bike on the centerstand (if applies) and do a "dry run."

☐ Start it



If the seller isn't hip to a test ride, don't get too discouraged. Many motorcycles have gone out for test rides and have not come back. But, by all means, start the bike. Put at least four of your

senses to work: listen for odd noises, look for smoke, smell for burnt oil or coolant, and feel for heavy vibrations. Throttle response should be crisp off idle and significantly more smoke should not accompany more throttle.

Get out the toolbox

At the least, check air pressures (tires, and forks and shocks, if applicable). If you're so equipped and mechanically able, test the resistance of the electrics with a multimeter, brake disc thickness with a micrometer and cylinder compression with a compression tester.

Are extras included?

Extras you want can make the deal sweeter. If the bike has aftermarket parts you don't want, see if the

owner will take them off and lower the price. Ask for any stock equipment that was replaced with aftermarket parts. And don't forget the tool kit.

☐ "Is this the bike I want?"



Often, what looks great in photographs and sounds great in website reviews falls flat in person. Even if the bike itself is sound, if the model didn't stand up to its lofty rep, go back to

the drawing board. This is your last chance.

☐ Negotiate



Don't just meet the asking price without trying to get a better deal. Every item you found wrong is a negotiating point. You may get nowhere, but you might save a few hundred bucks,

too. And never forget the power of these seven words: "Is that the best you can do?"

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
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THE BASIC RIDER COURSE

One of my goals upon retirement was to become an MSF Rider Coach. Having begun a short attempt at retirement in November, I went about getting lined up for the classes involved in becoming one. Since then I have begun a new job, and taken the first of the classes required to become a Certified Coach Trainer. The first class being the basic beginner's rider's course.

The bitterly cold, but snow free weekend of March 18th found me up at 6AM to be in a Detroit area parking lot by 7AM in the company of 50 or so beginner riders. The Coaches were there long before us, and had been busy preparing the large vacant lot with orange cones, and enough running and warmed up 250cc motorcycles for all of us students.

Shortly after daylight the coaches had us divided into groups, assigned to a motorcycle, and doing rocking movements for a first familiarization with a clutch and its friction zone. For most it was the first time on a motorcycle. I've been endorsed since 1976 and been riding ever since. Needless to say I was thinking it was going to be a long day. But it progressed steadily and by degree, until by noon we were all riding and doing repeated maneuvers to develop a level of competency at using the clutch, and brakes while also learning where to look, what to see, and why to do it.

By training days end, we had lost a few. A few bikes had taken a tumble, none for the first time. The vast majority of riders had come a long way from the idea of riding to actually getting on, starting, and functioning one.

Day two. Same time, same place, and just as cold. We started with some quick review and before long were headlong into some serious drills involving braking, curves, shifting, turning, and all the mental and visual requirements to do them successfully and safely.

Finally, the test. It consisted of portions of all the drills combined into a couple of courses through cones while being observed, timed, and graded. Not everyone passed. Most did. None likely would have been able to pass it when they first arrived.

Everyone who passed the course was very happy and I think most were proud of themselves and they should have been as it was a challenge. It was also an extremely well organized, well planned, and excellently administered training program to help get beginning motorcyclists off to not only a good start but a safe start. In conjunction with their official entitlement to a cycle endorsement they were also advised to remember they had just graduated "parking lot riding" school. An important reminder that there is still a lot to learn, experience to be gained, and caution to be heeded.

I look forward to being part of this initiation into motorcycle riding. It's definitely the best first step anyone wanting to ride can take that I know of, and it's a blast to see the determination, growing confidence, and joy of success on their faces.

I want to add; the bikes are getting used hard. Some are really rough, and keeping them going is an effort for the trainers. The low training fee leaves little for covering the costs of the training and buying new bikes. If you or your loved ones are going through the training please consider donating towards the equipment. The trainers use every single dime of donations to keep the equipment up and running and to occasionally purchase some new machines to replace those that have been used up.

Education, not legislation. Look twice, and save a life.

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
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It won't be long and scooter season will be in full bloom and some of

you, especially those who pay at-

tention to the news, may be thinking about carrying a pistol when you ride. Riders who have had their CPLs for a while have probably already thought this subject through, but newer permit holders or people looking for a gun specifically for carry on their bike may benefit from this article.

The first step in buying a firearm should always be figuring out what your budget for a new gun will allow. Right up front I will tell you there's a lot of wisdom in the old saving "you get exactly what you pay for," especially if you are buying a firearm for personal protection. This doesn't mean you have to go top shelf with a Colt or Kimber (or other high end names), but at the same time I would never bet my life on anything off the 'turd' rack. You will be much better served by being patient and delaying your purchase (or using in-store layaway if available) to buy quality rather than impulsively jumping into a couple hundred dollar mistake you will ultimately hate. If you are new to handguns a reputable dealer with sales staff who are also shooters can be invaluable, and the last place you need to be shopping is the internet where you cannot handle (or possibly shoot) a firearm before you buy it.


After figuring out your budget, you have to consider how you are going to carry. There is nothing that says you can't "open carry" on your motorcycle in Michigan, but personally I don't want the added attention especially if I am riding through town. I also know that there are thousands of outstanding police officers across the country, but it would be my luck that some "Barney Fife" would hear my pipes and see my gun; and I don't want that attention either so conceal carry is the option of least resistance. Handguns come in different sizes; full size, compact, subcompact, and micro carry and each has a purpose and place. Full size handguns are easiest to shoot accurately (especially for new shooters) but hard to conceal. Conversely micro carries conceal guite easily but are more difficult to shoot, exaggerate recoil due to short barrel length, and frankly often lack stopping power because of their smaller caliber. Fortunately, there are a lot of good firearms that fall between the two extremes, and many of them will not break a reasonable budget.

Compact semi-autos are still easy to shoot, a little easier to conceal, and have fairly large magazine capacities, but the extra capacity also means more weight and overall weight can become an issue depending on how you carry. Subcompacts are much smaller and lighter, therefore easier to carry, but lack of mass also means more recoil. The biggest knock I hear against subcompacts is lack of magazine capacity (usually 6-10 rounds). Here is the simple truth; statistically most incidents happen at three yards or less, in less than three seconds, with three or less rounds fired! If you are envisioning self-defense as a long running, protracted gun battle you have either been watching too much television or need to enroll yourself in witness protection.



In the picture above you see a full size HK and a compact Glock on the left, and a subcompact S&W and a micro Sig on the right. In the middle is the Sig P938 and the Glock 43, and you will note that they are sized between subcompact and micro carry, making them easier to conceal. In addition, being chambered in 9mm they have the punch to get the job done. Price wise in this size, the Ruger LC9s starts at about \$450 and at the high end is the Kimber Solo at around \$800, with the others falling somewhere in between. And, unlike the guns on the "turd" shelf, these firearms are extremely reliable and accurate with an abundance of accessories such as holsters and sighting options available. If you are in the market to buy these firearms are well worth a good close look.

Next month I am going to talk about conceal carry on a road trip, which will be appropriate since I will be on the road participating in Run for the Wall 2016. At least you can look forward to more pictures and less verbiage. Till then...









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
