

VETERANS CORNER









The President, as expected, signed the Forever GI bill.

This bill is formally known as the Harry W. Colmery Veterans Educational Assistance Act. It is named after the American Legion national commander who wrote the original GI Bill language in 1944, and it will allow more veterans to use the GI Bill and more time to use it. Some of the changes will go into effect immediately, and some are written to go into effect shortly after.

Some new provisions that go into effect immediately include:

- The fifteen-year time limitation for using Post-9/11 GI Bill benefits is eliminated for veterans who left active duty on or after January 1, 2013, and qualifying dependents (Fry children who became eligible on or after January 1, 2013 and all Fry spouses).
- Reservists who had eligibility under the Reserve Educational Assistance Program (REAP) and lost it, due to the program sunset provision, will have that service credited toward the Post-9/11 GI Bill program.
- Certain work-study is permanently authorized; previously it had to be re-approved by Congress every few years.
- The VetSuccess on Campus program will be available to students across the country
- VA will help veterans to more clearly identify schools that offer them priority enrollment

The majority of the changes enhance or expand education benefits for veterans, servicemembers, families and survivors. Simple breakdowns to a portion of the provisions can be found at

The Motorcycle Lawyer on THE LAW HOW TO PREPARE YOUR BIKE FOR WINTER

With fall and winter on the horizon, bike riding season is drawing to a close. It's now time to start thinking about how you'll prepare your motorcycle for winter. Follow the tips below to keep your bike safe and in tip-top shape for your first spring ride.

DON'T DITCH INSURANCE

Many motorcycle owners cancel their bike's insurance during the off-season in a bid to save money. However, this move isn't as smart as it first appears to be, for several reasons.

First, many bike owners think their homeowner's insurance policy will cover damage to their bike if they store it in their garage. It won't. If a tree falls on your garage, if your garage catches fire, or if it floods, you'll be responsible for paying to fix your bike's damage.

If you're determined to go with the bare minimum coverage during the winter, then keep the comprehensive insurance. This insurance won't protect you on the road, but it will cover damage to your bike. So if your garage floods and your bike gets damaged, comprehensive motorcycle insurance will cover it.

The only drawback to comprehensive insurance is that you can't ride your bike with it. Your comprehensive insurance only protects the bike, not you. So if you decide to go with just comprehensive insurance, you'll likely miss out on the first lovely day of spring because you don't have the right insurance to ride.

PROTECT YOUR MUFFLERS

If you're not running your motorcycle on a regular basis, your mufflers and exhaust can rust quickly. Some mechanics advise to prevent rusting; you can spray WD-40 or another light oil into the muffler ends and drain holes.

Once you've done that, gently stuff the muffler with a light plastic, like a grocery bag. Wrap the mufflers in more light plastic to help keep moisture out.

MAINTAIN YOUR TIRES

Rubber doesn't do well when it freezes, so you need to be extra cautious about how you protect your tires for the winter. A great way to mitigate damage from the cold is to put a piece of cardboard, wood, or foam under each tire. This will keep the tires from resting on a frozen concrete floor

You'll also want to inflate your tires to their maximum recommended pressure. Be sure to check your tires several times while your bike is in storage. It's not a good idea to use a cleaning or shining product on your tires before you winterize your bike. Using one of these products can cause your tires to be more prone to drying out and freezing.

KEEP YOUR BIKE SAFE FOR SPRING

Protecting your bike over the winter is a good way to protect your investment, lower your costs, and ensure your bike is ready for spring. Before you put your bike away for the off-season, be sure to follow these tips to keep your bike safe for your first spring ride.



He didn't. I drank it.


I thought maybe he'd like whisky better than beer so we tried a Jameson's; nope!

What could I do but drink it!


By the time I realized he just didn't like to drink, I was so chitfaced I could barely push his stroller back home.

I was watching Saving Abel perform from the Thunder Roads tent at Harleyfest 2017. After many songs, as the band started the opening riffs for "18 Days," lead singer Scott Austin spoke from his heart about honoring and ap-

preciating our military, including his brothers and his daddy, who all are serving or have served. He spoke from his heart about OUR VETERANS! His words were inspiring, and they gave me chills; I had to fight the tears as they then performed the heart-smashing song, "18 Days."

As I listened to the guitar in the background, I thought of some of my connections with vets. My family and many of my friends are almost all military. My father was in the Navy Seabees, my brother and ex-sister-in-law were both Air Force, and my grandpa was in the Marine Corps. Currently, I also work with veterans with issues.

Saving Abel gave a killer performance and ended their show. Shortly after, they jumped in a side-by-side and were signing autographs in a tent behind a table. I walked straight up to Scott. He said, "Hey beautiful—to get an autograph, you have to go to the back."

I said "No." Scott looked at me like "WHAT?"

Holding the current issue of Thunder Roads Michigan in my hand, with my contact info circled, I told him how he touched my heart and that I wanted an interview with him. His demeanor changed, and he said, "Hey doll, meet me backstage after we are done with autographs." As my girl Heather photobombed us, I calmly walked away, went straight to Jody Mo and said "Guess who is getting an on-the-spot interview with the lead singer of Saving Abel! THIS GIRL!" I wanted to SCREAM!

I walked backstage, and the security guard in the tent informed Scott I was there. Minutes later, he walked up to me and escorted me onto the bus. And may I say—what a gentleman he is.

We had several interruptions while on the bus. Ozzy wanted a photo with the band. It was way laid-back and we shared a lot of laughs with sincerity as Scott answered my questions about what fueled his passions. As I asked him about his bracelets, he explained to me what each bracelet was and what it meant to him.

I learned his biggest passion is autism; it is a cause very close to his heart. He is raising a beautiful six-year-old son with autism; when he is not on the road, he is with him.

Scott told me he loved riding his Harley when he was home. When I told him I could get him any parts—1984 and up—he got a big smile on his face and said, "Now you are trying to sweeten me up!" LOL, I said yes! In fact, I am currently on a mission to find a sidecar so he can safely take his son on rides with him.

His passion for autism and veteran awareness is very impressive. So, there was a concert in a town that shall remain anonymous—he did his heartfelt intro for our veterans, and the sacrifices they make for all of us living in America. And as Scott does, he asked if there were any military or families of military in the house. There were many people at this venue, and not one veteran or military family member responded. What kind of town is that? I deeply relate to Scott's devotion for our military.



This tiny Irish motorcycle girl with tattoos is blessed to be able to walk up to anyone. When someone walks up behind me and catches me blind, I want to punch or freeze. That is when I hear random noises in the parts warehouse or shop, and I jump...like someone cracking a throttle or a part hitting the concrete. Or...maybe Bad Pig himself



David, slamming the bike lift right by me! I so wanted to punch you!

I know I am so safe there, but PTSD is a bitch. Do not surprise me, despite the fact I can walk up to a star or a common guy and talk about my role with Thunder Roads Michigan, being AJ's Vanna and my role as motorcycle shop pit bull at Bad Pig Customs. I am 5'7" and a buck-o-5, but look out; C4 comes in small packages—just saying. I am a veteran's

daughter with a law enforcement attitude.

I was diagnosed with PTSD and believe me, it is an eternal battle. My passion is to work with these guys on their triggers; what catches them off guard; even night terrors. I am a freeze-or-fight kind of girl, and I am not a shrink or psychologist, just a common redneck country girl with an abusive past. I can talk one-on-one with these guys in a comfortable location, and try to help in any way I can. With that, I get to deal with my own issues—and Scott's accomplishments and drive speak volumes in the way he dealt with me demanding an interview on location.

He is an amazing American who loves two extremely and intensely important causes. His career with Saving Abel gives him an extra advantage to be an advocate for these causes; his soul and spirit touch my heart.

The whole point: ANY ONE of us can do this, one person at a time. Pay it forward. Show love and respect for our all of our veterans, people with autism, or any issue we all may have. Take time to be kind, show politeness and compassion.

Scott takes time during his crazy life to bring awareness to autism and our military. He is very proud of his military family and I understand that firsthand. Scott has an amazing edge on the miles he has walked, and because of his fame, he can reach a limitless amount of people.


Scott could have said "no" to this random stranger who walked up to him; but he did not. Instead, he opened his heart and home on the road to me. Scott can instill awareness in minds that are willing and maybe change a few along the way. I have mountains of respect for him. Anyone can get on stage and play. But Scott and Saving Abel take the time to let their audiences know freedom is based on our military; past, present, and future. Freedom is not free. It comes with an ultimate cost. We need to take time to give back, not just sending a gift box overseas. If you see someone who is serving, or a sign that they have served, give them the time they deserve and tell them "thank you."

Recently I was covering an event for "Welcome Home Vets" in Bancroft, Michigan, and my PTSD messed with me so bad, I threw up. AJ and Freddie P know my issues; I took off with Freddie on "Thumper," 230 HP 147 CI! Thank you! No glasses, no hair bands or bandannas; we rode to the elementary school purchased to house homeless veterans and help rehabilitate them as they reenter society. Then I told Freddy, "take the road less traveled," and we did—at beyond speed limits. Just what I needed.

There are over sixty homeless vets in Shiawassee County, Michigan alone, and that is only ONE county in one state. Now think about that nationwide.

Long story short: people like Scotty Austin are truly amazing in what they do for our veterans. Yes, we all have our roles in life to play; let us all learn from our mentors and do our best to be a positive influence, one person at a time. We can all make a difference.



IN THE SHOP WITH RON

TUNE IN FOR BEST

This month in the shop, we will be installing an onboard fuel management system on a 2011 H-D Tri-Glide 103ci. There are far too many options to discuss in the space available. The one we will be installing this month is, in my opinion, a great DO-IT-YOURSELF option for a mildly modified motor. For this application, we chose a Vance & Hines Fuelpak FP3, specific to the year and model bike we're working on.



The actual installation is super-simple; however, you will need a Smartphone with an 8.0 iOS or greater operating system to run the program. All right, assuming we have a Smartphone with the proper operating system, let's get started. The manufacturer's instructions have a scan code you can use to download the operating program. If that doesn't work (as in my case), you can get it from the app store or from Vance & Hines website.



Once you have the app on your phone, the next step is to connect the Fuelpak to the motorcycle. The year, make, and model of your bike will dictate where to connect the Fuelpak. On this motorcycle, under the left side cover, there is a gray plug that is capped just below the fuse panel.



Remove the cap and plug the Fuelpak into this plug. On this bike, there was a convenient place to mount the Fuelpak to on the fuse box support panel.



Make sure your phone's Bluetooth function is turned on; you have an active Wi-Fi signal, the bike's ignition is turned on, and the handlebar switch is in the Run position. A quick note here: you may want to hook a battery charger up to avoid having your battery go dead, as you will have the ignition on without the motor running for a while, and with the headlight on, if your battery is not 100%, it could cause problems.

Now it's as easy as following the steps outlined in the menu. Once you start the program with the bike's ignition turned on (not running), the green lights on the Fuelpak should start flashing, indicating it is communicating with your bike's ECM (Engine Control Module). See picture #4.

After several seconds, your bike's VIN (Vehicle Identification Number) should show up in the correct

window. Confirm the VIN, and choose select a map option. Fuel maps are chosen based on your bike's air intake and exhaust setup, to start with. Vance & Hines have developed fuel maps for virtually every exhaust combination they offer. If you have a different manufacturer's exhaust, you can choose generic under exhaust mfg., and pick one closest to your set-up. There is also the option to choose from fifty different cam upgrade options.

Input the most accurate information possible, and follow the prompts to download the fuel map and flash it to your ECM. Follow these steps closely.

If you have any questions, such as what exhaust to choose, or you don't see your particular cams listed, Vance & Hines has outstanding tech support. They can fine-tune a map for you over the phone even connect to your device and monitor what you are doing by remote.

Once you flash a fuel map to your ECM, the Fuelpak is "married" to that bike only. You can use some functions of the Fuelpak on other bikes: sensor data monitoring, check and clear trouble codes, and search maps without flashing. Vance & Hines recommends after you download your first map to run one full tank of gas before you do anything else to allow the new map to settle in, so to speak. After the first tank of gas, if you feel it still needs some fine-tuning, you can run an auto-tune session which allows you to tune while riding to further tailor the fuel map to your specific riding style and conditions.

If you think this might be for you, download the app and check it out. They have a detailed FAQ section. Again, if you don't find the answers you're looking for, don't hesitate to call tech support—they are very helpful. Take some time and enjoy the beautiful riding weather we've been having.

"Know the truth, and the truth shall set you free" is the very simple Biblical truth Truth is a constant in that you can hide it, lie about it, deny it, ignore it and at-

Four hundred years ago, involuntary servitude was socially accepted throughout most of the known world, viewed as a sign of affluence and refinement among the "polite society" of the day. Revisionist history tells us that slavery came to North America through Jamestown, Virginia in 1619; and even in the now-pious North, it was not uncommon for families of means to own the house : Heroes or villains is a matter of perspective; but either way, slavery was an staff that made the beds, swept the floors, did the laundry, cooked the meals. tended the grounds, and maintained the stables well into the mid-1800s. In both the North and South, it also was not uncommon for freed men (former : doubt on the original grievances. slaves) and their descendants to own slaves who worked their farms, or served as contract labor. One of the largest slave markets in the South was actually owned by a former slave who was also a plantation owner. But slavery was not new to the Americas in 1619; it had been practiced by aboriginal people for centuries before Jamestown was established.

Through the ages, slaves have been among the most valuable "spoils of war." During the Dark Ages, Moorish invaders ventured deep into central Europe. pillaging cities and villages, leaving the men dead, and the women and children slaves; a practice repeated five centuries later by the Vikings. The vast majority of Africans brought to the Americas were the "spoils" of Moorish/Muslim raids, or prisoners of tribal warfare that were sold in slave markets along the Ivory Coast. Truthfully, men of color sold people of color to slave traders, mostly Dutch, for wealth and power.

Revisionists would have us believe that eleven states committed the ultimate act of treason when they seceded from the union over the issue of slavery; however, this is a slight prevarication. The South knew slavery was quickly coming to an end, but neither the North and South wanted to deal with hundreds of thousands of newly emancipated blacks. Both sides negotiated a transition plan in Washington, supported by Northern and Southern leaders, to relocate emancipated Southern blacks to Liberia, with the South bearing the brunt of the costs. Subsequently, cotton and tobacco producers in the slave states needed to sell their cash crops to the highest bidders, namely European and Mediterranean markets, to offset the relocation costs, as well as keep their plantations viable. Congress, which was controlled by the population- and industry-dense North, stepped in to protect northern textile industries—industries that relied on cheap domestic cotton-by imposing an export tariff on southern agricultural products to drive out foreign buyers and further depress cotton prices. This action was a violation of Article 1. Sect. 8 of the Constitution.

To seal the deal, a naval blockade began patrolling the waters and blockading southern ports, seizing ships and cargo that didn't have the proper tax paperwork. Southerners began to view themselves as being occupied rather than equal, and helpless under the boot of governmental oppression

With the election of Lincoln in 1860, rumors of more severe economic meaengraved in stone over the entrance to the Supreme Court of the United States. sures being imposed on the South filled the halls of Congress, and the Southern delegations had no reason not to believe the gossip. Politics aside, the first tempt to write it out of history—but eventually it resurfaces and bites somebody shots of the Civil War were fired on April 12, 1861 at Fort Sumter in Charleston in the ass. Slavery is an abomination and an affront to society as we know it, .* Harbor in an effort to drive the federal troops out of the South and break up but forced bondage in one form or another has also been an institutional constant among civilizations from the beginning of time. And, like it or not, slavery, Proclamation would not be enacted until January of 1863, and then only in the in many different forms, exists in our world today; it's just not politically correct hope of starting a mass slave rebellion to bring the South to her knees. Many of the officers and enlisted men that filled the Confederate ranks had left the federal military to serve their states, which they considered their first duty. This was a common sentiment throughout the military at the time and they did not view themselves traitors, as did many of the Northerners they had previously


