I spent 31 years as a career firefighter. Some might have considered me a hero, but not me. I was just a guy who did his job to the best of his ability. Upon retiring in 2012 I purchased a new Firefighters Special Edition Ultra Classic. October 12th, 2002 was Fire Department, City of New York Memorial Day, that honored the 343 FDNY members who made the Supreme Sacrifice in the Performance of Duty at the World Trade Center on Sept. 11, 2001. The ceremony was held at Madison Square Garden. I submitted my name to the International Association of Fire Fighters and was selected to be one of the 343 flag bearers to participate in the service.

We gathered in the early morning hours at a downtown street corner. It was a dark, cold, rain filled, dreary day which was eerily appropriate for the day's event. By the start of the ceremony our Class A uniforms were soaked. I literally shivered thru the entire ceremony from being cold and wet not to mention

the solemn atmosphere inside the Garden. To this day I still get chills when the National Anthem is played. This eventually led me to get a custom paint piece dedicated to the FDNY on my bike. Working with Pamela Shanteau of Airbrushing by Pamela a design was finalized. Tragically prior to beginning that painting a friend and brother firefighter, Nathan Fought was killed in a motorcycle versus tractor accident. Nate was a great young man with a wife and 4 little boys. This tragedy led to an additional memorial portrait for the bike. Finally, the pieces were finished and the bike became a show piece thanks to the amazing work of Pamela. A few years later a fellow MC member passed. His club name was "Slingblade". Slingblade had a patch with a sword on it that he gave to as many club member as he could. The sword on that patch now adorns my front fender.

To say I'm proud of my memorialized bike would certainly be a gross understatement. Thank you, Pamela, you're the best. It's amazing when I participate in bike shows. I stand behind my bike watching everyone steadily walk down the row of bikes and without a doubt the majority of them stop, point and thoroughly look at my bike. This normally leads to conversation about Nate, the FDNY and all the great firefighters across this country.

#### The 20th Anniversary of 9-11

Where were you on September 11, 2001? This question is one that every American should ask themselves and reflect on. I was stationed at Selfridge ANGB, in a C-130 unit reported at 0630 that morning like any other morning, till it wasn't at 0846 that morning Flight 11 crashes into the North Tower. We are all in shock and thought it was an accident. The unit was working their normal day till 0903 when Flight 175 crashes in the South Tower. We all watched it happened on the television and at that point we looked at each other with awe and knew we were under attack and at war. At that point we went to work and got all our aircraft up and ready.

At 0937 Flight 77 crashes into the Pentagon. The F-16 unit was doing training in Grayling when they received a call to intercept Flight 93 but it was not able to accommodate that request due to not having the necessary load (training) to help take down the plane if necessary. Instead, the people on that flight were able to take it into their own hands by storming the cockpit and becoming hero's by crashing the aircraft down in Shanksville, Pennsylvania. This is just the beginning of a long drawn-out war in Afghanistan and soon Irag. We then had everyone on high alert and wanting to join. The aftermath of this tragic incident actually brought this country together like we should be. We worked together to help in New York, Arlington, VA and Shanksville, Pennsylvania. It made the military proud that we had the American peoples support behind us. We weren't out of the clear even after 10 years of fight, we still had to constantly oversee the possibility of another attack on U.S. soil and we foiled them till September 11, 2012 when the American Diplomatic Compound was attacked and four Americans we killed.

We have over 2.8 million veterans that served since 9/11. We have had 7,057 who was KIA on post 9/11 operations. Suicide for post 9/11 is 5,116 active duty as far as National Guard and Reserves figures are not available prior 2010, but from 2011-2020 there has been approximately 2800 that we have lost. So, when you hear 22 it means we lose 22 Veterans a Day. This needs to be addressed and stopped! This is not the only issue for Post 9/11 veterans; another issue is homelessness, PTSD, depression, anxiety, problems with alcohol and drugs, along with all their injuries. The Burn Pit Registry is a very important thing that most post 9/11 veterans need to ensure they are register on. The easiest way to see if you are on that registry is to complete the questionnaire online at the secure registry portal. https://veteran.mobilehealth.va.gov/ AHBurnPitRegistry/#page/home

All though it's been 20 years ago it seems like it was yesterday, and for some veterans it's every day. The American people need to reach out and help all the veterans who gave their life to protect this great nation. You wonder how? 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# THE MOTORCYCLE LAWYER ON THE LAW

### SB 28 IS NOW LAW— IS IT A NO-FAULT FIX?

Victims injured in "motor vehicle" accidents (accidents that involve a car truck or van) enjoyed unlimited medical bill payment for decades. That changed in 2020 with some additional changes going into effect July 1, 2021.

The insurance folks promised that moving to a system where we choose the amount of PIP Medical coverage on our "motor vehicle" policies would save money on our premiums. I warned that bad things would happen, and they have. The insurance industry sneaked in changes that hurt consumers and increased company profits.

The worst change is that motorcyclists who are entitled to no-fault benefits are now at the mercy of what the owner of the motor vehicle involved in the crash chose for his or her own PIP Medical. If the negligent driver who hit you on your motorcycle chose \$50,000 of PIP Medical-- that's all you will have to pay your medical bills.

A second horrible change reduces payment for familyprovided attendant carefrom 168 potential hours per week to 56 hours per week-- a two thirds or 66% reduction. Attendant care is nursing-like care provided to a patient who is seriously injured. It includes such things as bathing, dressing, taking to doctors' appointments, helping to the bathroom, helping ambulate, wound care, administering medications, and the like.

A third horrible change that took effect July 1, 2021, deals with the amount of money payable for medical services which also affects attendant care. For over 45 years an insurance company had to pay "the reasonable and customary rate in the community" for a medical service provided. Under the new law there is a fee schedule for medical services that is based on the amount Medicare pays. No-Fault coverage will now pay about double the amount Medicare pays. This may sound reasonable, but it is actually less than half as much as what a private health insurance company (such as Blue Cross) would pay and about 66% less than No-Fault used to pay.

These changes affect all cases, even cases that happened years ago. Before 2020 families of the injured accident victim were told payment for medical bills (which includes attendant care) was unlimited and that coverage was available for life.

Enter the new law capping family-based attendant care to 56 hours per weekand reducing the amount payable for

Many families of catastrophically brain and spinal cord injured victims receive care from attendant care agencies. These are companies that provide a professional caregiver. These companies will now receive 66% of what they used to be paid by No-Fault.

Many families received letters from these companies

telling them that they could no longer provide services given the new fee structure. These companies are going out of business.

Example: if the company used to receive \$30.00 per hour for their employee to go provide care to an auto victim.

The company paid their employee \$15.00 per hour and they used the

difference for overhead and a little profit. With the new fee schedule, the company is paid \$19.80. The company can't pay their employee who did the care, pay overhead, and still make a profit.

Michigan Senate Bill 28 was an attempt to help these companies get paid more than what No-Fault paid under the new law so they could stay in business and keep people employed. SB 28 created a \$25,000,000 "postacute auto injury provider relief fund" with the state. A care provider company can apply for additional payment from this fund if they can prove financial losses due to the change in the law.

Most non-insurance folks feel it is a narrow fix with many hurdles and will take months to receive any proceeds, if any. The twenty-five million will be eaten up quickly and we all will be back in the same situation in a short time.

So, Thunder Roads readers, this is not a motorcycle fix we were hoping for. It is a short- sighted effort to help care provider companies get a little more. We are still waiting to see if any of the proposed bills that are more likely to help will be passed. Presently, SB 314, HB 4486, HB 4992 and HB 5125 are all stuck in committee, just idling with no sign of going forward anytime soon.

hour to go Scottish style wi' me!"


The prostitute is mulling this about in her head and thinking to herself how bad could it be? She'd been in the game 10 years now and had literally been there and done that and had all kinds of requests

So I shouted back, "I typically save Aretha Franklin for Saturday nights but hey, this one's for you!"







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






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As the attorney for ABATE of Michigan, I represent injured motorcyclists who more often than not require attendant care assistance with things like dressing, bathing, changing bandages, monitoring medications, ambulating and in significant brain injury case can also include monitoring the injured person himself/herself.

Having said that, under new Michigan law, as of July 1, 2021 in home attendant care is limited to 56 hours per week if provided by an individual who is related to the injured person; by an individual who lives in the same household as the injured person; or by a friend or acquaintance with whom the injured person had a business or social relationship with before the injury.

Because it's usually cheaper for the auto insurer to continue to pay the family/friend than to pay an agency, many insurers are willing to sign contracts with family/ friend care providers to provide care in excess of the 56 hour per week cap.



# Remembering the 9/11 Terrorist Attacks 20 YEARS LATER

#### Survivors tell us what they saw and what they've learned in the intervening years

It's hard to fathom that teens now entering college — or serving in the armed forces — were not yet born on that unforgettable Tuesday morning. Nearly 3,000 people died in Manhattan, at the Pentagon and in a Pennsylvania field on September 11, 2001, in what remains the deadliest act of terrorism in history. To mark the 20th anniversary of that infamous day, we asked people with a connection to the attacks to reflect on what they experienced then and what it means to them today.

Bill Keegan, a lieutenant\* in the Port Authority Police Department: The World Trade Center in lower Manhattan was a beacon to the whole world. It said, "We want to know who you are, we want to work with you, and we want to trade with you." Trade allows us to understand different cultures and different people, and for them to understand us. I think that's why these terrorists targeted the towers.

#### 8:46 A.M.

American Airlines Flight 11 from Boston, bound for Los Angeles, crashed into the World Trade Center's North Tower, between the 93rd and 99th floors.

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Margaret Lazaros, a systems analyst for Empire Blue Cross Blue Shield, who worked on the 27th floor of the building: It was unbelievable. It's even hard to explain. It was such a noise and such an impact that you actually felt it. It felt like the building shuddered. I thought everything was going to fall down. We just all stood there, looking at each other, and I remember I said to my girlfriend, "Something bad happened. I think we need to get out of here."

Vincent Green, a top anti-corruption official in the city's Department of Investigation, who was in an office that faced the twin towers: We didn't think it was an attack at that point. We thought it was some pilot who didn't know what the heck he was doing.

#### 9:03 A.M.

United Airlines Flight 175, also headed from Boston to L.A., crashed into the World Trade Center's South Tower, between the 77th and 85th floors.

Investigator Green: I saw the second plane come around and go into the building. I told my colleague, "This is no accident. We're under attack."

Michael Lomonaco, chef and director of culinary operations at Windows on the World, a restaurant on the North Tower's 106th and 107th floors: I'd been in the shopping center on the lower level when the North Tower was hit. They evacuated us very quickly. I made a couple of calls to let people know I was safe. Then I heard a roar of jet engines. I looked up at the South Tower and saw the moment of impact. A fireball exploded. This was a tremendous shock. I thought of all my friends and colleagues at the restaurant, and I started to do a mental list: Who's up

there now? Who's working? We had 72 of our Windows family working that morning. We also had more than 100 people in a private dining room. So, after the second plane hit, I became emotional and felt tears well up in my eyes.

Salvatore Cassano, a Fire Department assistant chief of operations who became chief of operations right after September 11: The World Trade Center was built to withstand a plane crash. Well, it withstood the plane crash. It just didn't withstand a fire from the thousands of gallons of jet fuel that were incinerating everything in

Systems analyst Lazaros: We got into the stairwell, and it was so quiet. Everybody knew something really bad had happened, and everybody just wanted to get out of there. We all just started walking and walking and walking down. We saw the firefighters, a lot of them. They started coming up the stairwell. So, we all moved over for them. They had so much equipment on them. And it was smoky, and they were sweating already. They were walking up the stairs. We asked them, "Where are you going? Where do you have to go?" They said, "Oh, we have to get underneath the fire. But you go." They had all these ropes and things, and all those guys never got out of there.



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We got to the end of the stairwell and went through the open door. At first we had no idea where we were. I said, "This must be some kind of old subbasement, somewhere that's full of debris." It was the strollers; there were elderly people; there lobby we had come into in the morning, but everything had been destroyed.

#### 9:37 A.M.

American Airlines Flight 77, bound from the Washington area to L.A., crashed into the western side of the Pentagon.

Specialist Beau Doboszenski, a soldier with the 3rd U.S. Infantry Regiment who was working as a Pentagon tour guide: All of a sudden this one airman comes running up the bottom ramp, and he's just beet red. He screams, "We've got to get out of here. A plane just hit the Pentagon." It was a lot of chaos. We had people that were on fire. We tackled them and put them out.

9:59 A.M. The South Tower collapsed.

**Principal Dolch:** We had evacuated all the students to the south, toward Battery Park. As we were crossing into the park I heard the sound that I always describe as snap, crackle and pop. I looked back, and I thought the world had come to an end. Every time I think about it, I shiver. It was just a tsunami wave of dirt and debris, just behind us.


Chef Lomonaco: Suddenly, as I was looking at the twin towers, one of them disappeared in a cloud of smoke. It literally disappeared. There were mothers with were thousands of people who were running north on Church Street, away from this collapse.

10:03 A.M.

United Flight 93, headed to San Francisco from Newark, New Jersey, crashed into an empty field near Shanksville, Pennsylvania.

Stephen M. Clark, currently the superintendent of National Parks of Western Pennsylvania, which includes the Flight 93 National Memorial: The airplane was taken over by the terrorists at 9:28 and didn't crash until 10:03. So what happened during that time frame is nothing short of miraculous. The passengers knew they were part of some type of suicide mission, yet they had the courage to take a vote and then implement a plan to try and retake control

of the plane. They simply ran out of time. There were 33 passengers, five flight attendants and two pilots on board, along with the four terrorists. That airplane was only 18 minutes away from Washington. That particular morning, both houses of Congress were to be in session. You had over 4,500 people working in or near the Capitol building. You had congressmen and -women; you had the incredible symbol of democracy; you had employees; you had visitors. So, there's no doubt that those 40 people saved countless lives.

10:28 A.M. The North Tower collapsed.

Robert Snyder, an American studies and journalism professor at Rutgers University in New Jersey: I was walking past South Street Seaport, and I felt a rumble under my feet. Then I looked over my shoulder, and I saw that the second tower had fallen. The scene was absolutely apocalyptic. Systems analyst Lazaros: I could see the North Tower coming down, and I said, "Oh, my God, that's our place." It was unbelievable. There were so many people that were still on the upper floors and couldn't get out.

After the towers collapsed, friends and family members began a frantic search for loved ones who worked in or near the complex.

**Christy Ferer, founder of Citybuzz** and Vidicom and a former television correspondent who was married to Neil David Levin, the Port Authority's executive director: I went down to the site with pictures of Neil and handed them to the rescue workers and said, "Please look for this guy." It was probably irrational, but I did it. I guess it was about four days later that I really admitted he was gone. Systems analyst Lazaros: It just broke my heart when children walked around looking for their parents, with pictures and posters, asking, "Anybody seen my mother, my father?" Because all I could think of was, It could be my daughters doing that.

For nine months afterward, workers searched Ground Zero.

FDNY Lieutenant Berkman: We're looking to see if there's anybody there, and people keep coming up to us and saying, "Have you seen my cousin?" "Have you seen my father?" The Fire Department people were looking for their family, friends or fire company. Because we knew there were thousands of people potentially trapped in that burning pile of debris, including possibly thousands of first responders. 9/11 widow Ferer, who later became New York City Mayor Michael Bloomberg's liaison to families who lost loved ones on 9/11: Many of the families were just crumbling under the weight of the sorrow, the uncertainty and the lack of closure. A lot of their emotions turned to anger down the road. Many of them did not find body parts. I believe that something like 40 percent still have nothing to bury. FDNY Lieutenant Berkman: I figured it out, at one point, that I must've worked with about 250 of the 343 firefighters who were killed that day. The guy whose gear I borrowed that day, Captain Vinnie Brunton, from Ladder 105, he was killed. When you have 12 or 14 FDNY funerals a day — I had to make a decision a lot of days: Whose do I go to?

In the years that followed, survivors and families pushed forward.

FDNY Assistant Chief Cassano: As much evil as there was that day, there was also much good. I mean the people who came to help us from all over the country, all over the world. We couldn't have done it

Systems analyst Lazaros: You learn to hold everybody closer and don't take anybody for granted. I never get off the phone with anybody I care about without saying, "Hey, love you."

Principal Dolch: There was a long time during which I didn't take care of myself, and emotionally I was a mess, but I didn't really know that until a good two years later. I finally asked myself, Why do I feel almost catatonic most of the time? Why am I still jumping every time there's a siren? I did a lot of resiliency work talking, writing. Learning to appreciate the moon, the stars, the skies and the creator of the moon, the sun and the stars.

Port Authority Police Officer Lim: Several months after September 11, I attended a concert of my 14-year-old daughter's school orchestra. Ravel's Boléro was on the program, and Debra had a clarinet solo. All of a sudden, I broke out crying. I told my wife, "I'm so lucky to be here to hear this." It taught me to appreciate the important

things in life. And at the same time, it was hard to come to grips with the loss of my canine partner, Sirius. Every time I talked about it, I would always say, "Well, the people were more important than a dog, obviously." But I was told by people smarter than I was that until I accepted the loss of my friend, my dog, that I would never get over this completely. Now I can finally say I have.

Alice Greenwald, chief executive of the National September 11 Memorial & Museum at the former World Trade Center site: We have young people and people starting careers who have no memory of this event. And yet they are living in a world that has been defined geopolitically, and in terms of security consciousness, by the events of 20 years ago. This next generation has grown up with the sense that terrorism is the norm, and that breaks my heart. **Port Authority Police Lieutenant** 

Keegan: This country came together. We found that what makes us human together is that people hurt the same way. No matter what your political affiliation is, what your color is, what your religion is. Seeing how we came together and seeing the goodness of people, I think that's something we need to take forward into this COVID situation and further on.

Chef Lomonaco: We also learned that we can rise from the ashes. We learned that we can rebuild our lives.



# BULLET POINTS

#### THINK

One of my favorite duties is teaching the Concealed Pistol Summer is racing towards a conclusion and things have gotten really strange lately. On a brighter note, I was able to take a motorcycle adventure and rode to Deadwood, SD for a trike rally. The last time I did a longdistance bike sojourn was five years ago when I made the Run for the Wall and Rolling Thunder events. Because of other events happening all around me I wasn't sure if I could (or should) make this summer's journey but by mid-June things seemed to level out and I felt I had a green light. Well to make a long story short, because I had put off making the go/no go decision until nearly the last moment I had also put off making the necessary plans and preparations for such a long ride; and I paid for it. Yes, I still went but sailing wasn't as headache free as it would have been if I had put everything together in January (when I booked lodging at my destination) and not had to cobble so much in the last few days before I left. What a pain in the ass, but being in the wind meant it was still a good trip.

Now some of you are wondering where I am going with this, so I won't leave you in suspense any longer. With the current social, economic and political environment we will all find that life is easier if we take the time to plan before we do instead of flying by the seat of our pants. An example, for the last couple of years I have advised hunters to make sure they have everything they need for their hunt before season begins and last year (as usual) our store was mobbed by people looking for ammunition in the last week leading up to opening day. Many were disappointed, some were pissed, but the ammo shortage last November was really severe and those who waited until the last minute had to change their plans. Right now there is a fair selection of both guns and ammunition, but that can all change literally overnight. Hunters beware, even if you think you have enough to get through the season it wouldn't hurt to have a couple extra boxes on the shelf, just in case!

Check your guns, make sure they are in working order while you are at it. I will never forget the guy that came in the store literally on the evening of November 14th several years back looking for a bolt for his Remington 700 Needless to say he was in full panic mode and I didn't help his anxiety much when I told him that you can't just buy a bolt off the shelf and slap it into a rifle and expect it to work, and for it to be done properly the bolt should be fitted by a gunsmith who knows what they are doing. For those of you planning to buy a new firearm now is the time while there is still a semi-reasonable selection on the shelves, and you won't be saddled with a "settled for" gun which we all know you probably won't be happy with in the long run. Plan on buying quality up front and you will find a way to afford a firearm that will serve you well for years and maybe pass on to a child or grandchild. Now is

the time to make the move if you are considering it because we don't know what the next few months will bring.

Now is the time to plan for a lot of things because there is an ill wind blowing and we are all going to get caught up in it. There is an extremely high probability of serious (if not runaway) inflation which severely limit how far family budgets will stretch. When the Fed pumps the economy full of their brand of Monopoly Money the value of the dollars we earn can go into a free fall as inflationary prices rise. Most of you don't know how bad things got in the late 1970's when we lived through runaway inflation, many families spent years recovering from its effect. Fuel and energy skyrocketed, prices on consumer goods spiked, goods and services disappeared, and jobs went away. I knew people who had adjustable construction loans under 5% but ended up saddled with double digit mortgages when the Federal Reserve raised rates to curb inflation. Needless to say. most ended up losing their homes, and buying big ticket items such as cars, motorcycles, snowmobiles, etc. were out of the question if you intended to put food on the table and keep the lights and heat on.

Preplan and you (and your family) will be amazed at what you can accomplish even in a terrible economy. I have a simple rule of thumb when it comes to guns and ammo. I currently have the firearms I would need to if everything were to take a dump all at once, they are my baseline that I can get by with if need be. I also set a baseline for my stockpile of ammunition, no less than 500 rounds for my primary calibers (actually I keep around a thousand) and 200 rounds for my 38/.357 and 44mag. To try to stockpile the amount of firepower I have at today's prices would make your grippers slip and stain your drawers, but I didn't do it overnight. Watch for ammunition on sale or look for it in bulk whenever you can find it, and don't become dependent on exotic calibers because when push comes to shove you won't be able to replace them. This is not a time to take on excessive consumer debit, I am not saying don't buy a good gun or stockpile some ammunition; just keep it reasonable like stashing the bucks for a couple of boxes of bullets every payday instead to abusing the credit card on a single large purchase. Keep it simple, and maybe most important keep it safe and don't make yourself a target for theft. I know that I have already said to much about what I have on hand but know this too, my ammunition and other shooting supplies are always kept secure in a safe and the dogs are always on duty whether we are home or not and they like a nice tender leg of thief now and then!
