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

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THE MOTORCYCLE LAWYER ON THE LAW **DRIVER USING PHONE APP CAUSES MOTORCYCLIST TO LOSE LEG**

As far as I can tell, the state of Michigan began keeping statistics about distracted driving accidents in 2011. That year, the Michigan State Police (MSP) started including a checkbox on the UD-10 police report form for officers to indicate whether a driver was distracted at the time of the accident.

This checkbox specifically asked officers to identify whether the driver was distracted and if so, how?

Presently the choices, as they appear on the police officer's computer are:

Driver Distracted By

- 1. Not Distracted
- 2. Manually Operating an Electronic Communications Device (Texting, Typing, Dialing)
- 3. Talking on Hands-Free Electronic Device
- 4. Talking on Hand-Held Electronic Device
- 5. Other Activity, Electronic Device (Book Player, Navigation Aid)
- 6. Passenger
- Other Activity Inside the Vehicle (Eating, Personal Hygiene)
- 8. Outside the Vehicle (Includes Unspecified External Distractions)
- 98. Unknown

By tracking this data over time, Michigan has been able to gain a better understanding of the prevalence and causes of distracted driving accidents in the state and develop targeted strategies to reduce their

incidence. It is important to note that while this data provides valuable insights, it may not capture all instances of driver distraction, as not all accidents are reported or may not be accurately reported.

According to the latest statistics from the Michigan State Police, distracted driving was a contributing factor in 9,882 vehicle crashes (car, truck & motorcycle) in Michigan in 2020, resulting in 70 fatalities and 2,965 injuries.

These numbers are particularly alarming for us motorcyclists, who are already at a higher risk of injury or death on the road due to our lack of protection compared to passenger vehicle occupants.

In fact, in 2020, there were 1,163 motorcycle crashes in Michigan, resulting in 87 fatalities and 1,543 injuries. Of those crashes, 115 were attributed to distracted driving, which accounted for 10% of all motorcycle crashes.

This indicates a significant need for increased awareness and education about the dangers of distracted driving, particularly for motorcyclists who are already at risk.

The law in Michigan regarding distracted driving prohibits all drivers from texting while driving using a hand-held phone. School bus drivers, truck drivers, and teens on a Level 1 or Level 2 graduated license cannot use a cell phone while driving whatsoever. (MCL 257.602b(1), (3); 257.602c(1))

Horrible case: I presently have a case where a 45-yearold woman was using an app on her cell phone to check her blood glucose level as she is diabetic. She opened the app, selected an option to check levels, reached her phone across her body to the sensor disc on her upper arm. All of this caused her to veer across the center line and strike a motorcyclist heading the opposite way. He lost his leg because of her recklessness.

It has been almost a year and charges are still pending waiting on the MSP's computer lab to analyze the phone for evidence. I will keep you posted with updates. In the meantime, watch out for these reckless drivers.

2023 Riding Season: Reaching The Northern Hemisphere.

t has been great to get a few sunny 50-degree days lately and the sounds of loud pipes and revving motors have been mentally uplifting. The rides have been shorter than most would like, but to get on 2's at the end of winter/beginning of spring gets my heart's motor oil pumping. I crossed paths with a few riders in the Southeast Michigan area and got a chance to speak with them. While they shivered with icicles hanging from their noses, the message most of them shared was "I needed to feel the power and get some wind therapy!"

End of Winter riding is a good way to prepare for the upcoming riding season too. It helps with finding out if your bike needs some

hoses and throttles.
Lights & Electrics: Check brake

lights, taillights and headlights lenses, reflectors and battery.



Oil: Check oil and fluid levels, and ensure there are no leaks



Kickstand: Check sidestand an centerstand for retraction.

And there is a lot of driving while distracted in today's day in age. Some people can't stand loud music, but I am splitting the fence by saying it does create awareness of a bike in the area. Lights, pipes, and music!

Preparing for the riding season is not just about the bike, it also means understanding your body is not quite ready for a long-haul run. Before I start to muscle around up to 1,000 lbs., I like to mentally prepare myself by getting plenty of rest the night before. While I cannot say I am in the gym every day, I am going the extra mile to do some pushups, walk the dog for some cardio, getting to the doctor to see where I am health wise. If you ride in a pack, your brothers and/or sisters should know if you are on medication and what to do in the time of an emergency. (i.e., who to call, if you need an EpiPen, do you take aspirin, how often do you need to eat to keep blood/sugar intact, do you need insulin injections, etc.) It wouldn't be a bad idea to take a weekend class at a local community college to perfect maneuvering your bike. It might even be fun! I know


as the rider for that matter. TCLOCKS (Tires, Controls, Lights, Oil, Chassis, and Kickstand) is more important than ever at the start of the season. Also making sure the horn on the hog works. It may be time to upgrade to louder decibels (dBs) as cagers are truly not looking for bikes or bikers at the moment. Not too many people are driving around in automobiles with their windows down right now.

TLC. Or, even you

some of you are thinking "what the hell is he talking about take a class." But allow me to be direct and state, don't let our egos dictate our ability to continuously learn how to handle our expensive piece of equipment, our pride and joy. Hell, some of us like our bikes more than our significant others at times-LOL!

I am planning for a trip to the east coast this summer as I push to close out my goal of riding in 48 states. I have 28 states under my tires so far and guite a few miles to go. I have reached out to fellow riders about the road conditions, where the state signs are, where internet signals are shotty, how much money I should anticipate to spend if I was to use the turn pike, or if I should use the trucker routes. I have seriously considered going up through Canada, come out at Niagara Falls, hit Buffalo, NY, and go straight North until I hit the state line for Maine. Grab some lobster bisgue and high tail it south until I hit Delaware! I could hit several states within hours between Maine and Delaware (Vermont, New Hampshire, Massachusetts, Rhode Island, Connecticut, New Jersey). If I do it right, I could hit 1 country and 8 states, and others where my proverbial flag has already been placed. For those that may consider this in the future, research your carry laws.

Before I do a 1,000 plus mile trip, I want to check my seat time tolerance. So, I'm looking forward to the Mackinaw Bike Rally happening on June 9-11th. I enjoy inner-state riding equally as much as crossing state/international lines. This will be a good time to make sure your energy levels are plentiful and will be a great weekend of fun and entertainment as well. If you get stuck on the Mackinaw Bridge waiting for entry into the Upper Peninsula, that wind may give you a spanking like Papa handed out when he found out you stole the car on Saturday night after he fell asleep-LOL. In the past, my right leg seemed to be two times more muscular than my left after holding up my hog on that bridge! While it only takes roughly seven minutes to cross, the wait time could be upwards of 20 minutes: Word of advice. use the rest room one last time before you cross... no whizzing off the bridge! That may be your first and last, but you may earn a patch for it-LOL! I hope to see all you "Thunderheads" up there and let's pound that pavement in unison.





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GREAT LAKES BAGGER DRAG RACING

From the start we have imagined squeezing our own personal adventures in somewhere between attending as many bike nights, bike runs, charity events, swap meets, and rallies. Of course, they all pretty much overlap each other. Our riding season is just too short here in Michigan and sadly, we can't go to all of them. Well, let's just say that our heads are spinning with the four different calendars we share between ourselves and the Thunder Roads[®] Michigan team.

In our first issue in January, we were introduced to the world of ice racing and have got to know some awesome people and places involved in the sport. Now we are getting ready for flat track, and the upcoming motocross season. Thankfully, Erin Fay has proven to be the great ambassador that we knew she would for the Motors Lakes Trails segment of Thunder Roads® Michigan Magazine.



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
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VETTERANS **WOMEN ARE VETERANS TOO!!!**

WYLD STALLIONS MOTORCYCLE BUILD

DEREK LONG: UPDATE

t's been a cold and dreary few weeks and I have been struggling to keep warm and motivated. Lately, knowing that I'll be able to ride again soon is helping to keep me moving! I have had some small accomplishments on my build steps, but no matter the size... they are still forward. I started out by lacing a front 21" spoked wheel and getting it trued. It was a challenge, but I was able to persevere. Now, both black front and rear wheels have been laced with chrome hubs and stainless spokes. After handling the challenge that the wheels gave me, I got my frame jig out of storage that was built many moons ago. When I got it to the workshop, I had to do some cleaning on it because it looked like I treated it like a lawn ornament before I was able to get a roof over it. Now, my frame is hanging on it waiting to get chopped.

Since the motor teardown was completed last update, I needed to remove the crusty flaking black paint that was on the cases to start a new. Me and the dirt bike boy started to scrub and got as far as a snail in a drag race. It just wasn't moving as fast as we needed, so we decided it was time for a chemical alternative. We went to one of the Wyld Stallions sponsors ... O, O, O'Reilly Auto Parts and picked us up some stripper that worked well, but by golly it hurt the ole snoot when you got a whiff! Now that I've got them back to bare, I've decided to hold off on deciding to paint them again or leave them alone. I guess I'll leave that as a problem for future Derek.

After looking at the front fork lowers, I made the decision to do a bit of cutting and smoothing. I wanted to shave all the fender mounts, brake connectors, and the steering lock off the triple tree. So, after taking them apart and draining the fork oil, I chucked the fork lowers onto the lathe and cleaned all those pesky brake mounts and fender mounts out of the way. I finished them up by sanding them down with 1500 grit paper. Now they sit in the corner until later times. I locked down the triple trees in

the vice and ate away at the tabs that were no longer needed. Next I'll do the filling and sanding before polishing can commence.

As I wrap up the ramblings of this update, I now have my new pistons and rings, but I am still waiting to get my needed motor components around before the reassembly can occur. I'm getting ready to get some steel ordered so that I can start on my rear hard tail and also get my tires mounted. Step by step, I keep moving forward. Thanks for following m Wyld adventure!

NIC CARLIN: UPDATE

A fter getting the bike mostly stripped down, I laid out my cut lines on the rear subframe. I started cutting the with my Harbor Freight Sawzall blades and I broke 2 of them before I could even make it through one side. So, I grabbed my grinder and threw on an Empire Abrasives cut off wheel. Once I finished slicing through the subframe, it found itself on the scrap pile.

Next, I moved up to the motor compartment and started removing all of the ugly and restrictive air box. I'll be using pod filters on my carbs to get them breathing right and to clean up the engine a bit. The next step will be making the hardtail section and welding it into place and getting the seat mounted. components around before the reassembly can occur. After we got back from vacationing in Hawaii, we got rollin' on the gas tank fab work. Chopping the stock tank mounts was a breeze with the Black Hawk cut off wheels supplied by Empire Abrasives. Once we cleaned the frame up, I then welded in new TC Bro's bungs to mount the new tank that I got from the Novi swap last year. I welded in an old school fuel gage and cleaned everything up a bit with the Black Hawk flap disks that were also supplied by Empire Abrasives. Afterwards, my old lady painted the top of the tank for me, and started working on the sides. She painted directly over the bare metal and I'm liking the look!

I got a set of 12" bars in trade and I'm liking the look a little more than the 16's I was originally going to use. They are a little too narrow for the springer risers, so I'll have to modify them a bit. I started welding in the oil bag mounts, but my welder started laying down booger welds, so I am holding off until I can figure it out. I'm thinking that the weld together oil bag and rubber mounts from TC Bro's should look pretty rad when complete! We've aligned the rear wheel and got the wheel spacers sorted out. That's we're we are now!



























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TERRY SCOTT: INTRO

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TECH TIPS CLUTCHING AT STRAWS By: Nate T.

was in my shop the other day and had a burning thought (there was a slight burning smell -lol) and it got me thinking. It seems to me that our clutches kind of get a bum deal. After all, we can probably admit that we tend to worry more about the shiny covers we plan to hide it under than anything. Out of sight, out of mind. Each time we fire our scooters up our clutch is lucky to get a few guick squeezes, but it's no more than a passing thought. We count on them to be there for us as we bang through the gears when we decide to air it out a bit. We even use them to do tricky things like avoiding the plentiful Michigan potholes, tar snakes, the random grease spot of a critter in the road, or even avoiding making a new one... Am I right? I'll tell you one thing though ... if you've ever had a clutch not cooperate when you needed it to ... it will get your attention in one helluva hurry!

Holding, releasing, or riding the clutch lets you disconnect or reconnect the engine from the transmission whenever you feel the need. Controlling speed, torque, stopping, and taking off of course. The up-shifting part is usually the guickest thing we learn as new riders, but downshifting is one of the most important tools we can learn in the beginning. It is arguably the most important of all... the stopping part! - lol clutch in!! A seasoned rider will use their bikes friction zone more than their brakes regulate the torque to the back tire at slow speed or at high speeds. This is part of how the motor officers get their nine-hundred-pound glides to do handstands and the like. Really, it's asking guite a lot from a part that most of us like to decorate more than pay attention to.

Now that we've got that out of the way, I want to plant a little seed in your brain before you take your first ride this spring. Clutches get the ponies to the ground, right? When we ride, we expect these things to work hard for us. That means when we're putting it to work by creating friction that's hard on a clutch. In most cases friction is typically bad for moving parts, right? Well, that friction eventually will wear things down. Imagine that your clutch gets to the point that it slips a little bit every time that motor turns over. Maybe not even an eighth of a revolution, but a bit, nonetheless. Now, take that a step further. Does your ride have as much pep in its step as it did a thousand miles ago? What about three thousand miles ago? How many of you are pondering the idea of an engine rebuild because you think your machine has lost a little in the seat of the pants? What if I told you that the cure for this might be way less expensive than you might be thinking? What if your clutch is what ails you? Some of us might be thinking. "I can't work on a clutch, it's beyond me, or I don't have the tools to do it anyhow." Well, I'm not going to get into



the details of a clutch rebuild this month because there are way too many types of bikes out there and there just isn't time, but you're in luck.

Truth be told, it isn't that complicated, but it must be done right. It's also easier if you have the right tools and materials to start with. You're going to need a service manual (if you don't own one, get one). You may even need one of those wonderful specialty tools that you buy "to use once" and then use as a paperweight for the next decade or so. In fact, there are a few of those holding things down in my shop at this very minute. Regardless, pay your clutch some attention and it'll end up being better for you, your bike, and your pocketbook in the long run. Probably sooner than later, and I'm happy to be the quy that shares with you where to start.

Our clutches are made of springs, steel plates, and friction discs. Some need fluid to work and some don't. Some use hydraulic pressure to move them and some older bikes use old fashioned levers. All of them work about the same way as the spring squeezes the friction disk into the steel plate. Just like getting on the brakes and it causes that squeeze-a-lation (highly technical term) and locks the two together. You're not getting this for free though. Every time you let off or pull on that clutch, you're wearing stuff down little by little. Then, that wear can and will eventually create dust that kind of likes to stop up the works. Don't fret though, I promise it's qonna be alright.

To start, make sure you are changing your clutch fluid as your manual calls for it. Make sure you go all the way with this one. Make sure you've got the recommended fluid type and the right amount of it. Too much or too little is not a good thing here. I know some people like to check to make sure there's "still some in there" but changing it out tends to clear out that dust I mentioned earlier. The things inside that need to slip, slide, and roll when we need them too will thank you.

Now, comes the part you've been dreading .. the adjustment. Most people get a bit unnerved right now (dry mouth, cold sweats) ... Man or Woman up! – lol. If you've got enough in your noodle to stay up on two wheels, then you can do this! First, read about it carefully in your manual (again with the manual... this will become a dead horse). When they wrote that book, the intention was a bit more than killin'



uninvited insects in the shop or garage. Your manual will tell you how to disconnect or loosen up your clutch cable first, so it doesn't mess with what comes next. Then, it will cover the how's and whys in getting the transmission adjusted just the way you want it. Finally, you're gonna get that clutch cable back on and adjusted in such a manner that the manufacturer would even be proud.

You may have to do this a couple of times to get it just right and that's normal. You won't regret it either. You're gonna notice right away that your scooter has had some sort of attitude adjustment. It may even have that pep back in its step. Maybe you won't have to breathe into a paper bag after you've tried to park it on a hill (gravity is terribly consistent, eh?). Believe me, you'll feel the pride that comes with taking care of your two-wheeler all on your lonesome.
