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

The attendance was starting to pick up at the gun shows, and he needed my help.

I had retired from John's retail store over seven years prior, and after fifteen years of teaching people about guns, I had enough and needed a break. John had been a very good friend, long before working in his store. When John bought the shows from the former owner, he turned to me and asked if I would work with him and find new locations around the state for him to put on gun shows. Not only did I do that, but I also helped set them up, worked security, and helped with parking. Everything and anything. Now my friend is calling for help. He's a friend in need. I can't let him down. Don't worry a bit, John. I'll be there, no problem at all. Thanks for the call. I'm looking forward to spending time with you and your wife.

Then came Friday, the first day of the show, and set up time for many of the dealers and vendors begins much earlier in the morning. checked my weather app before I left in the morning, and there wasn't supposed to rain until after eight that evening. 



Some the accessories include CFR pipes, Freedom true dual head pipes, Indian Performance Intake, hard bags from an Indian Springfield, 11/2-inch lowering kit in the rear with a Roadmaster Fox Adjustable shock, full chrome package on the engine, arrowhead footpads and grips, Custom Dynamics front/ rear signal set, Pathfinder LED headlamp/highway lights, Freedom recurved 14in shield, KST Kustoms 14" Apes. Multiple seats, including a Saddlemen step up and a Dirty Bird solo, and switch back and forth for wherever I'm headed.

#### 5 THINGS A MICHIGAN MOTORCYCLE ACCIDENT VICTIM NEEDS TO KNOW

#### ORV LAWS

any motorcyclists also enjoy operating off-road vehicles (ORV). Here are some highlights of Michigan's off-road

An ORV is a motor-driven, recreational vehicle capable of driving on different terrains not limited to roadways and trails. Examples include:

- All-terrain vehicles (ATVs)
- Motorcycles or related 2-wheel, 3-wheel, and 4-wheel vehicles Before an off-road vehicle (ORV) may be operated on any property, the operator is responsible for ensuring that the vehicle and its riders have the required equipment. There are some exceptions to when certain protective equipment is legally

#### **Helmets & Eyewear Required for ORV Use:**

All ORV operators and passengers must wear a US Department of Transportation approved crash helmet and protective eyewear except when:

The ORV has a roof and proper safety belts, or...

The ORV is operated on a state license game bird hunting preservation at a speed of 10 mph or less or...

The ORV is towing a fishing shanty or supply shed over the frozen surface of public waters at a speed not greater than 10 mph or...

The ORV operator is at least 16 years old and is the guests or family member of the owner of the property where the ORV is being operated.

ORV operators 16 or 17 years of age must wear a helmet unless the parent has given consent for the operator to ride without a

Michigan law gives street legal motorcycle operators the option of not wearing a helmet when operating on roadways. This law does not apply to ORVs, and helmets are still legally required to be worn by operators and passengers on ORVs.

#### **Operator Age Restrictions for ORVs**

Restrictions are in effect on the operation of ORVs by children under the age of 16, including a safety education requirement. There also are specific obligations that fall under the parents or legal quardians of ORV riders under the age of 16 and upon the

#### For Three Wheeled ATVs:

No one under the age of 16 may operate a three-wheel ATV.

#### For Operation of Four Wheel ATVs:

No one under the age of 10 may operate a four-wheel ATV except on private land while performing farm related work

Children 10 and 11 years old may operate a four-wheel ATV only when all of the following conditions are met:

- the ATV is being operated on land owned by the child's parent
- The operator is under the direct visual supervision of the parent

- The operator possesses a valid ORV safety certificate Children 12 to 15 years old may operate a four-wheel ATV only when both of the following conditions are met:
- The operator is under the direct visual supervision of an adult
- The operator possesses a valid ORV safety certificate

**Direct Visual Supervision**: means having direct observation with the unaided, or normally corrected eye, and being close enough to come to the immediate aid of the youthful ORV operator.

#### **ORV Safety Education Requirements**

Anyone under 16 years old is required to possess a valid safety training certificate when operating an ORV.

To obtain a safety certificate, the operator must take an ORV safety education course and pass the certification exam.

The operator must carry the safety certificate with them when operating any ORV.

At the same time, when music volume is moderately up and the rider can also hear the melodies of the environment, it's the safer way of travel. If good tunes is a must to the rider, consider Bluetooth technology through the helmet while ground pounding. Keeping in mind, music is a mood- and mind-altering substance. (Big

Mo, civilian) Therefore, I am in agreement, loud music should be for parking lot pimpin'; not for long hauls or inner city pipin'.

## **History of the Port Huron Motorcycle Club**

group of motorcyclists from the Port Huron area got together on January 16th, 1946 at Dick Beane's Harley-Davidson Shop and Gas Station at 24th and Griswold Streets, and decided to start a motorcycle club. It was decided that the initiation fee for each member would be \$1.00, and an executive board was set up. By the second meeting on the 23rd of January, from a list of 8 suggested names, the group decided that the club's name would be the Sunset Riders of Port Huron. By the next meeting on January 30th, the group had voted to change the name of the club to the Blue Water Riders of Port Huron. The club had decided right from the beginning to get involved in the American Motorcyclist Association (AMA) and by February 13th already had a charter number with AMA as #727. On March 13th the club voted in its new officers with Jiggs DeBell as the President of the club. Finally, on April 9th, 1947 the club was renamed as the Port Huron Motorcycle Club. After holding the club meetings at more than 12 different locations, the club finally purchased the property at 3376 Griswold Street on November 9th, 1949 where the club still remains today. The club officially became incorporated on November 21st, 1949. Although the club was considered to have started by many in 1948 (because that's when they started the paperwork to become incorporated) making this the 75th Anniversary, they are actually in the 77th year as an AMA Chartered Club.

In the early years, the club had generated income from

raffles and promoted sporting events with motorcycle competitions. Throughout the history of the club, they have hosted hill climbs, dirt track racing, treasure hunts, scramble events, ice races, mud runs, enduro events, trials competitions, road runs, poker runs, bike rodeos, sod drags, dirt drags, and more. One event that has been a constant is the Annual Turkey Run which ran in 1946 and is believed to have run every year since.

The Port Huron Motorcycle Club has had members that are were National Champions, International Champions, State Champions, District Champions, and Club Champions, in many different types of motorcycle competitions on both the amateur and professional levels. The club has even had a few factory sponsored professional racers and at least one Hall of Fame Racer.

In addition to many of the traditional events, the club has expanded in different directions in more recent years including 4 wheelers and side by sides. They are currently running all sorts of vehicles at the dirt drags and have now added a dirt style scramble course for side by sides that can be used for different types of small vehicles.

If you ever have the chance to attend an event at the P.H.M.C. you will surely want to check out the clubhouse. The clubhouse walls have plaques, shadow boxes, memorabilia, and dozens and dozens of pictures that show the history of the club and its members that date back almost 100 years. Many of the visitors to the club feel as though they are in a





museum. Although the club has always been a small family like group of people, they have hosted races over the years that have had numerous hall-of-famers and champions that have competed in the club run events.

The club was started by motorcycle enthusiasts for motorcycle enthusiasts to host off-road competitions and they have always been involved in charity and charity events. That was and is a tradition that continues to this day. To give the readers an idea, the club held an Easter Egg Hunt this year, helped numerous injured riders and families in need, will hold a trunk-or-treat for children in the community, donated to several charities and good causes, are collecting toys for Toys For Tots, collecting gloves and mittens for battered children and needy children, and will adopt at least one needy family for Christmas. The club has several military veterans and always has had some veterans in the membership. This year the club donated \$7,000 to the St. Clair County Veterans Honor Guard to help towards the purchase of a new van to help get them safely to the funeral services that they honor.

The club membership numbers have really dwindled over the last five years but are currently rising rapidly again. The membership numbers at this time are 48 active club members and 19 Honorary Lifetime Members. An Honorary Lifetime member is a member that has paid dues and been an active member for at least 20 years. Many of the lifetime members have belonged for 35 - 50+ years. Once a member becomes an Honorary Lifetime Member, they are no longer required to pay dues and they are only required to attend 4 meetings per year. These are the men and women who have helped pave the way for the current and future members of the club.

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## **Port Huron Motorcycle Club** The Club Trophy










he Port Huron Motorcycle Club started in January of 1946 and non-studded ice racing was a big part of the club activities from the very beginning. In 1947 the club members decided to have a club championship which would consist of participating members racing a 500cc open non-studded sidecar class. This type of racing had been a big thing in Port Huron, Michigan dating back to the early and mid-1930's.

The first club championship was won by Holly Allen. When the championship started in 1947 it was just the one sidecar class that they would compete in, but by 1952 they started having a solo non-studded class to compete in as well. In 1970, the club switched up the solo class and made it the 0-250cc non-studded solo class. Jerry Eveningred who had won the solo class at least once before this would go on to win on a 250cc bike 4 years in a row.

In 1972 the club also introduced a third class into the mix with the 351-500cc nonstudded sidecar class which would be won by Jerry Eveningred in its first year of running. Between the years of 1947 and 1978 the club would have multiple winners for all the classes. I don't know at this time when the club decided to have a trophy to keep track of the club champions, but Jerry Eveningred made a 30-inch-tall trophy with an aeronautical cylinder and cylinder head on it with a rectangular wooden base that had a metal plate on each of the 4 sides that would have the year and the name of the champions engraved on it. This "Club Trophy" has been on display in the Port Huron Motorcycle Clubhouse for as long as any of the surviving members of the club can remember. The names on the plaques are like a who's who of the club's history with names like Leo Anthony, Marve Taite, Leo Anthony Jr., Earl Campbell, Max Cook, Wally Hutchinson and many more.

- Question 3 What convinced you to join Abate?
- **Answer:** I had already been to court for riding w/o a helmet several times. I met a quy in Ann Arbor who told me about the city charter, and they had the old wording about the helmet law saying you had to carry it. I spent hours looking for it in the U of M law library and 20 minutes before the hearing, I found it. The officer testified and then the judge asked me what I was thinking, I responded with the number of the charter rule, and he dismissed the ticket. I rode free in Ann Arbor for the rest of the summer of 1974. In the spring the Washtenaw County Sheriff was waiting for me inside of the Ann Arbor city limit. It went down something like this: "Son, I have heard about you. You are breaking the state law, and we don't like it. Next time I see you, if you aren't wearing a helmet, we will tow your motorcycle; I mean drag your motorcycle to the impound lot. Are we clear??" I knew I had to fight the law at the state level. I had already ridden to Las Vegas, and California twice w/o a helmet most of the time. Then I heard about ABATE, I sent in my money ASAP. The 1st Annual Meeting was in Westland, and I rode down there in a mild snowstorm with my neighbor from Ann Arbor in the side car in 1975 and was elected to the Board of Directors.
- Question 4 What is one thing you (we) could do to make Abate better?
- Answer: Remind folks that if they don't like something, or have an idea that gets shot down, don't guit, and don't give up. Be a part of the solution not the problem.
- Question 5 What is the best event you have ever attended, even if it's not Abate related?

- Answer: Harley-Davidson Parade in Milwaukee, giving high fives while riding in the parade.
- Question 6 What do you ride and who is your favorite riding mate?
- **Answer:** Harley-Davidson Road King, my youngest son.
- Question 7 Where are your meetings held, day and time.
- **Answer:** Board meetings are held across the state every 2-3 months, regional meeting at a bar in Oakland County
- Question 8 What is your opinion on the insurance BS in a few short words. (Swearing allowed lol)
- **Answer:** We are the only state in the United States that is stuck with the car driver's insurance coverage choice for medical coverage. It is a crime! Car drivers cause the accidents, and the motorcyclist gets stuck with their coverage!!!
- Question 9 What do you like best about ABATE.
- **Answer:** The people and their love for riding motorcycles.
- · Question 10 How can we recruit more members, especially the younger crew.
- Answer: Stress the riding part of ABATE and our history. They are the future. If they let motorcycling die, we are screwed!! Stress, "Let Those who Ride Decide" it's not just a motto it's a way of Life. Freedom isn't FREE. Talk is cheap. Action takes effort, it takes knowledge, and it takes skill.

ell, it's that Christmas? Well, yes, but I was referring to more restrictions and more hoops to jump through just to be able to purchase a firearm. It used to be simple to buy a nice rifle or shotgun. You would go out to your favorite gun shop, find what you are looking for and buy it. Well, my friends,



that is all about to change starting next year.

All of you legal handgun owners know what you have to go through to purchase a handgun. You go to your favorite Federally Licensed Firearm Dealer (FFL), you pick out what you want, fill out form 4473, FFL does a guery from the FBI through NICS (National Instant Background Check System), if all is good from them, you purchase said handgun, sign the registration, and take it to your local sheriff's office so that they can submit it to the state police. The process is a bit more streamlined as a CPL holder, minus the 8-hour class you must take to get the CPL, then, your name, address, date of birth, driver's license number, and if applicable, your CPL number and expiration date are now all on a list.

"Well gee Johnny, I thought you were talking about rifles and shotguns?" I am now. Starting in early 2024 all firearm sales will be treated legally the same as handgun sales. You will have to go through the same processes to purchase a Henry lever action as you would a Glock 43. The same background checks, the same paperwork, the same trips to the county clerk's office, and so on. But there's more.

Senate bills 76, 77, and 78 "Universal Background Checks" are, in my opinion, an abomination. They were passed into law in April of this year and, in a nutshell (pun intended), takes the handgun purchasing law and applies it to (antiques excluded) all "firearms, gas ejecting devices, and electro-muscular disruption devices". AKA, guns, pepper spray, and tasers.

Senate bill 76 reads "Except as otherwise provided in this act, a person shall not: Purchase or acquire a firearm that is not a pistol without a license as prescribed in this section," What this means is starting in early 2024, you will need a purchase permit or a CPL to purchase not only a handgun but also long guns from both dealers and private sellers. However, a person buying a long gun who acquired a background check by an FFL not more than five days prior to the purchase is exempt from the permit requirement.

You read that right! Even from private sales. The law also includes gifts and heirs. So, gifting your 18-year-old son Johnny your trusty old Winchester rifle in your will, or selling your spare Glock to your neighbor; sorry guys, I need to see that background check or purchase permit. Another change to a private sale regarding pistols is that currently, the seller would fill out the paperwork and the purchaser would have 10 days to submit the paperwork to their local police. Now, the seller not only fills everything out, but they have 10 days to submit the paperwork to their local police department. The only thing the buyer must do, regarding paperwork, is sign it.

"You mentioned something you about a list. What's that about?" Well, the government is prohibited from keeping and maintaining a list of gun owners. But there are workarounds, like handgun registrations. And shortly, not just handguns, but all firearms. According to Giffords Law Center, "Michigan requires the Department of State Police to maintain a computerized database of individuals who apply for a concealed handgun license." Also, "The county clerk must retain a copy of each concealed handgun license application as an official record until one year after the expiration of the license, at which time the county clerk may destroy the record (but shall maintain a name index of the record in the database)". Sounds like a list to me, but I'll leave that assumption up to you.
