
























the fastest hottest rides around, but how cool is it to be able to introduce your baby to something you yourself have had a passion for your entire life!

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## CANADA'S GEORGIAN BAY & U.P. ROAD TRIP:

## NO PASSPORTS REQUIRED

lanning for a motorcycle trip that covers more than 1,200 miles in four days is a lot of fun. If you're like me, you talk about the trip months in advance and you have a basic idea of what's in store, but a good travel plan is truly made with beers around a table with good friends. It's exciting to share the same passion of planning to ride Harley's or any motorcycle for that matter. Then sharing the days ride when you've reached a destination along the way, not necessarily the night-to-night stay. It's just the day's end. It doesn't need to be fancy. If it has running water, I'm good. Oh, and no bed bugs. Decide on an ending point, call around, book a hotel or campground and it's done.

A lot of the times the question will come up "What do I pack?" Then followed by how to pack it (ease of accessibility based on its importance), how old are the bikes that are going on the trip, tools to bring in case mechanical problems arise, repairs shops along the way, if you're crossing any international borders, and of course what cool stops are along the way.

The original plan for our trip was to meet up in Port Huron, MI, cross the United States Border into Canada, then ride up to Tobermory, Ontario and take a ferry boat across to Manitoban Island for the night. The next day, ride up to Sault Ste Marie, cross the border again and explore the Upper Peninsula of Michigan ending in Marquette. Well two nights before we were leaving, my group found out that the ferry from Tobermory to Manitoulin Island was booked up for the Canadian holiday weekend. Apparently, you need to book ahead to ensure your spot on the ferry and the boat ride across to the island was more than \$100 American. So much for our plan. We took a vote to either go up through the Upper Peninsula through Sault Ste Marie to Manitoulin Island or the longer route around Lake Huron and Georgian Bay. Everyone voted for the longer route.

Day 1: KSU's were up at 8:00am in Port Huron, tanks were full, and we ALL were anticipating the worst at the Canadian border crossing into Sarnia, Ontario. Not because we had anything illegal on us but because we were going into a different country as a group of bikers. My biggest concern was if the Canadian Border Patrol was going to make us take unpack all our stuff on our bikes. That's just a pain in the ass! All I had was my Enhanced Driver's License, no passport or birth certificate. I had never crossed the border with just my driver's license before,

so that was stuck in the back of my mind. To my surprise the border crossing was stress free, just basic questions like where I was going and if I had any weapons with me. They say, 90% of what people stress about the border never amounts to anything! We hit the cash exchange, and we were on our way east to Toronto, then north. Sarnia to Toronto went by quickly. The only bad thing to say about that ride was that it stunk like garbage and pig shit most of the way. I have no idea why, but it did. We hit an hour worth of traffic on the northern outskirts of Toronto but that was expected. We stopped for fuel every 150-200 miles and it's better to use your debit or credit card for fuel because it's quicker when you are traveling. Plus, your bank should do the currency exchange automatically. Just make sure you take the necessary steps with your bank, so they don't question your card usage outside of the country.

Just north of Toronto riding parallel with the Georgian Bay the landscape changed into beautiful rock formations. This was the point on the ride where our vacation away from life finally began. Riding 70mph on an expressway or freeway only gives you a glimpse of the wilderness you're passing (I should be using kilometers, but I like the mph better). At those speeds you do the best you can to take in all the sites worth remembering and store them away. You want to stop and take pictures, but you still have six or more hours to ride. Some want to get from point A to B as fast as possible. Not me. I understand there are places to get to and you go along with what the group does.

It was time to eat and Parry Sound, Ontario was the stop. I've heard good things about Parry Sound, and they say there's like 30,000 Islands in that area. We filled our gas tanks and picked Turtle Jacks restaurant to eat lunch at. It was right across from an inlet of Georgian Bay and the staff was

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friendly and food was good. I had the jalapeno burger with a side of poutine. If you are not familiar, it's a Canadian dish of french fries, brown gravy, and cheese curds. While we were eating, a train made its way across this awesome bridge, and I snapped a picture and sent it to my son who loves trains. Everyone laughed at me for taking the picture, but then asked me to send it to them. I would have liked to stay in Parry Sound overnight or even a couple hours to take it in but after lunch we were back on the road.

We threw our rain gear on before leaving, but it made no difference! The storm we rolled into was nasty! There were tornado advisories and some small hail as we found ourselves in the middle of nowhere. There wasn't any place to take cover, so we turned on our hazard lights and slowed to about 15 mph riding single file. We were all soaked no matter the brand of rain gear we had. After about 45 minutes the rain clouds cleared, and we were back to our normal pace. At about 6:30pm we stopped for more gas in Espanola, which is a small town north of Lake Huron about one hour from Manitoulin Island. In Espanola and the sounding area there's a large Native American population and a lot of authentic Native American gift shops with items with meaning and very well made. When I go back (with more money) there are awesome handmade fur trapper winter hats that I must own one day, hopefully sooner than later.

Riding through the La Cloche Mountain Range in-between Espanola and Manitoulin Island was awesome. I had no clue what the mountains were called until I looked them up but the scenery on that ride was unbelievable. I wasn't expecting to see that much beauty in that region of Ontario. The ride on Hwy 6, at least for me, was the most memorable on the whole trip.

Our final destination for day one was in sight. We pulled up to the My Friends Inn on Manitoulin Island and before we

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got off our bikes, we were greeted by the owners, and they had ice cold beers in hand waiting for us. This was too cool; I knew right away we had chosen the right place to stay for the night. The rooms were clean, and the beds were comfortable. Their hospitality took me by surprise and the owners made us feel like family. The only downside to the whole Island was that everything closes early. We rushed to get a quick bite to eat at the local golf course restaurant before they closed at

Day 2: Bright and early, we were back on our bikes with clear skies ahead. We rode Hwy 6 back to Espanola which was great. Gassed up and off to the border crossing at Sault Ste Marie then onward to Marquette, MI. We took our time taking in the scenery. When we arrived at the border crossing at Sault Ste Marie it kind of felt like my adventure was over just because I was heading back into my home state of Michigan. The border crossing again went smoothly. \$4.00 in and \$4.00 out! One thing I forgot to mention is that to get into Canada, they only took card for payment, but to come back to the United States was either cash or card. Crossing the Soo Locks was a cool sight. You could see the change in water level looking down from the bridge. Once we hit Michigan, the mountainous terrain was gone for the most part. I was surprised all over again by the differences in landscape. The Upper Peninsula is very impressive, with its thick wilderness as far as the eyes can see. Riding to Marquette was a pretty straight shot. Every opening we rode past I thought "I bet there's going to be a moose or a bear in view", but there wasn't. It's just so vast, there are too many places for these animals to hide. Some people get lucky and see a moose, bear or even wolf up here but not me, not this time. When M-94 merges with M-28 going into Munising,

Lake Superior was in our site. Munising is one of my favorite cities in Michigan, if you want to call it one. It's a great place to stay because you're on Lake Superior and not too far away from anything you want to do in the U.P. Riding the M-28 into Marquette was a little chilly for a summer day with the wind off the lake but worth the slight chill. Something about riding a coastline is just mesmerizing but knowing that it's in the state where I live made it even better. When we arrived at the Holiday Inn in Marquette I went straight to the hot tub and pool, but not for long. It was time to see the town and



meet up with some friends. Marquette is a college town with a lot of cool bars and breweries. The scenery was different from the trees and rocks we were used to seeing,

but I'm not complaining. Being

in a college town I dressed my best in a Harley T-shirt that didn't have holes, no dead bug or road grim on it, and jeans without rips or stains. We had fun seeing the town and the people in it that night. I hit the pillow hard and woke up to sun and a good ride ahead.

Day 3: We gathered in the morning at Bald Eagle Harley-Davidson. I found a new T-shirt to buy, and we were back on our bikes. The ride was good with a lot of winding roads through the U.P wilderness. We had no destination that day, just ride and have fun. I was able to see a bald eagle flying overhead and one single whitetail deer. A couple hours later we stopped for lunch and decided to ride to the Marquette Lighthouse. The lighthouse was a great opportunity to take some pictures of one of my favorite lighthouses in Michigan



(it's hard taking pictures when riding from point A to B the whole time). Next, we decided to ride to Presque Isle Park, which was about 5 minutes from where we were. It's a very rocky shoreline with small cliffs and rock formations all around. The park is defiantly worth seeing. We mostly stayed on the north shoreline with the park being a peninsula. If you're on the shoreline of the park, no matter where,







it's a beautiful sight overlooking Lake Superior. After the park we hit a couple hot spots around town. My favorite was Blackrocks Brewery. It has a very nice outdoor setting with a stage and tiki bar, beers tasted great too. My favorite was the Hiawatha Ale, which is an apricot wheat ale. After the long weekend I hit the pillow


hard once again but didn't forget to set the alarm to wake up for the longer than planned ride home.

Day 4: The last day. It started off at 8am and the plan was to take my time, stop in Mackinaw City for an hour or two, stop in Vanderbilt to see some family, and then head back home to Lapeer. The ride was great. I stopped on the shoreline of Lake Michigan with the Mackinaw Bridge in the distance to take a picture of my beloved Road King, which has no windshield and will never have one. 99% of the time I wear a half helmet with eye protection. For road trips I do bring a full-face with me, but only put it on when it storms. Crossing the bridge coming home was nice, there was no wind, and you could see for miles. I took a moment to check the weather, and from about Grayling down past home was calling for heavy rain. I decided not to stop and site-see, except for lunch somewhere down I-75 and then head straight home. I had to work the next morning and unfortunately couldn't take another day off. I took I-75 down to the Roscommon exit and got gas and a sub. After, I called the wife and the first thing she said was "ARE YOU OK?" I said "Yeah, why?" She said that it was storming bad and was supposed to last until nightfall. I unpacked my rain gear once again, strapped on my full-face helmet and started the journey home. No more than 10 minutes after hitting I-75 the rain started. Light at first then quickly became a downpour. From Roscommon to my house should have taken me about two hours, but it ended up taking four hours because of the storm.



Another eight hour day on the bike with four hours riding through a storm makes for a long day, but I'm not complaining. Everyone in our group made it back home safe without any issues with our bikes. In total, I had over 1,500 miles on my TRIP meter when I started it from home in Lapeer. All in all, the road trip was a fantastic success and would ride it again in a heartbeat just to get that fur winter

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


## Rider Spotlight on Flat Track Racer Leo Anthony

## Leo Anthony Sr.

December 15th, 1916 - April 18th, 1998

eo Anthony was born in Port Huron, Michigan, the son of Joseph and Helen Anthony. Leo had five sisters and ■he was a lifelong resident of Port Huron. He would start racing flat track in 1934 and start racing professionally in 1937. Anthony wasted little time in showing his skills as he went out and finished second to Lester Hillbish at the Springfield mile in his first year as a professional. In those days the Springfield Mile determined who was the Grand National Champion, so taking second at that time would be the equivalent of finishing second in the point series of modern times. Leo would become a Harley-Davidson factory rider and he would go on to win three National Races and a number of regional races.




On February 8th, 1941, Leo would go on to marry the love of his life Betty and they would remain married until her death on May 23rd, 1991. Leo had two boys and two girls. Both of his boys raced flat track, ice raced, and rode street bikes. Two of his grandsons would also go on to race flat track, ice race, and ride street bikes on her Harley-Davidson as well. Three generations of

National Champions and successful motorcycle racers. Betty was named by the AMA as one of the top ten most beautiful women of the AMA. She was known to be a skilled motorcycle rider in her own right and could be seen driving her daughters around town on a Harley-Davidson with a sidecar.

During the Second World War, Anthony was called on to go

out to Texas to be a civilian contractor that would train the military troops on how to ride Harley-Davidsons and work on them as well. That didn't happen though as Anthony was involved in a serious accident while riding his motorcycle out to Texas. The accident happened in the St. Louis area and the gentleman that owned the Harley-Davidson Dealership there actually took Anthony





Davidson was in attendance at the Milwaukee Mile to see one of his racing heroes (Anthony) take second. Willie G, would later go on to tell Leo Anthony Jr. that he was thrilled to see his favorite racer (Leo Anthony Sr.) flying in Milwaukee back in those days. Anthony would go on to win one more national race in 1948 at the Spencer, Iowa








National. He was a force to be reckoned with through 1950 up until he retired.

Anthony was friends with several of the Davidsons and both Walter Davidson Jr. and Willie G. Davidson were fans of Leo's homemade spaghetti. Willie G. would call Leo in his later years to chat with Leo and sometimes Larry Gilbert (owner of the Port Huron Harley-Davidson Dealer) would check on Leo. Dale Walksler of Dale's Wheels Through Time Museum was also an acquaintance of Leo Anthony. Anthony was known to go to Daytona and hang out with a lot of the older racers right up to his last years.

Leo Anthony Sr. is recognized in the American Motorcyclist Association Hall of Fame having been inducted in 1998. He was also inducted into the Michigan Motorsports Hall of Fame and his pictures and name can be seen in both the Harley-Davidson Museum in Milwaukee and Dales Wheels Through Time Museum in Maggie Valley, North Carolina as well as still gracing the pages of magazines and internet sites for motorcycling. In his retirement years Anthony owned a Harley-Davidson Dealership for about 6 years, owned a few bars over the years, and owned a Yamaha Dealership for a few years. The first year they were able to process 8 full deer for 8 veterans and this year that number almost doubled to 14. At first, they

Each of the 14 veterans on the list received an entire processed deer, each. It was in January that Warrior's Oath VMC delivered on their never-ending promise to take care of other veterans that otherwise may slip through the cracks of other veteran organizations out there. 'A Warrior's Oath Is Forever."

Unfortunately, this is something that most veterans can relate to and is what motivates the WOVMC members. It's a qualifier in a way to show that you want to help veterans in need daily. It's a necessity. It's a mindset. They are





welcoming other veterans who might want to be part of their VMC, but you must follow the same channels of prospecting to show you're of the likeminded, and of course have a great will to serve your veteran brother or sister. Congratulations!

In my short conversation with their President Johnny D, it was cool to hear the vision and excitement he has for growing WOVMC. With only existing for about 5 years, their latest chapter opened just a few weeks ago in Plymouth, Indiana. Even with his chapter in Big Rapids only being started about three and a half years ago, it's clear that they aren't new to this as most of the members have been part of many of the other largely recognized veteran clubs. Johnny D mentioned that he alone has been involved with similar veteran organizations for over 30 years and many other members could say the same. They are working on growing through the proper channels and keeping their commitment and focus on finding veterans that really need help. Filling







that void where most veteran organizations don't have the programs needed. They bring light to the fact that "A lot of veterans struggle every year and after all they gave, a little help goes a long way in helping them."

It's helped them focus on different missions surrounding them. From working with the One of Many VMC and helping raise \$8,000 to buy a reliable vehicle for someone in need, to many other things they have



The audience's anticipation grew and grew... finally the count down: three, two, one BAM! Women screamed followed by a lot of nervous and relieved laughter from the crowd.

Alpinestars was established in 1963 and for the past 20 years have developed the innovation of airbag technology specifically for riding. There are multiple options available for purchase and only recently, in my opinion, they are somewhat affordable—about \$750. Here are some examples:


Tech-Air10: An airbag suit designed to protect riders whose goal is to ride fast. This suit is a slim wearable Airbag system. It covers the rider's shoulders, chest, back, and hips. The built in lithium battery has a life span of 24 hours. It is designed for track and road use and can be used for race and street riding modes. Tech-Air10 provides the most coverage for riders.

Tech-Air Race: Designed for full upper body protection for track day and performance riders. Once fully inflated, it protects the back, kidneys, chest, and shoulders. The battery lasts 25 hours when fully charged. The firmware offers a street setting for nonracing use on the road.

Adam Sandoval was there too. Adam is a world record motorcyclist, philanthropist, YouTuber, and social media influencer. He gave the attendees tips on using social media with motorcyclists and encouraged us all to be philanthropic toward the motorcycle community. Sandoval's personal philanthropic work is inspiring. In 2014 he created the ScootinAmerica, a two-year trip to raise money for the US military. He visited every Harley-Davidson dealership in the lower 48 states. He rode cross-country six times and logged over 80,000 miles, visited almost 700 Harley-Davidson dealers while raising hundreds of thousands of dollars for our nation's heroes. ## PREPARING FOR 2024 RIDING SEASON

elcome spring! I hope the warmer weather has everyone's spirits up, but as always if you find yourself feeling down, please don't hesitate to reach out, we are always here for you. With all the weirdly warm weather this year, a lot of you have already been out riding. I hope that you took the time to do your routine maintenance checks before your first ride. I'm so ready! I want to remind everyone before they go start up their bike that there are a few things that are just good practice before you do. First off, if you have been storing your bike, check for small animals or debris that may have gotten in somewhere they shouldn't have. If you didn't treat your fuel with a fuel stabilizer it might be a good idea to drain it, especially if you didn't fill it before parking it. Change the oil and check all fluids! Inspect the battery and check the electrical system. Examine the controls. Clean, check and lubricate the chain, if belt driven ensure the belt is adjusted properly. Check brake pads and levers. Check tire tread and tire pressure. Inspect the spark plugs, let the engine run for a few minutes and listen for strange noises. Check for loose bolts such as motor mounts, swingarm, axle, steering head fasteners, wheel balance and suspension. Also check the air pressure in the shocks for a more comfortable ride. Performing a quick preventative maintenance on your motorcycle will keep you ready to ride safely, you can enjoy your ride and be safe out there.

As a veteran I find that being able to get on my bike and ride is such wonderful therapy, sometimes even better than a therapist! Progress has been pretty slow on the build so far, but hey... I finally have a bike to



## UPDATE TERRY SCOTT **TERRY SCOTT**



I've been putting in the time and working on the frame of my bike and have got the major work done on it. The big thing I have been doing is coming up with a design and plan for the bike. One big thing I learned from doing the build contest last year was I need to go into this with a set design/idea. I wasted a lot of time by not having a set path. An example of this was I wasted a month on

building the hard tail for my bike by changing the design and material I used a bunch of times to end up with a finished product I was not happy with because of the time wasted. So, beginning with the frame, I gave it a custom downtube and used a piece of 1"x1.5" solid stock that I milled a 5/8" slot on both sides and then drilled a bunch of holes in it to lighten it up some. I've also goosenecked it 4.5" with a new backbone and gave it a custom gusset to help support it all. also put a new neck on it while I was at it.

I do have a few important things left to do on the frame, such as tank mounts and the seat mount. I also have to make the front engine mount but as far as I am concerned the major framework is done.

So far, I think it is going pretty well! As always be safe, be cool, and be excellent to each other.








## JOSH BRUST SEDALIA MISSOURI


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

Remember, although we've been lucky to get out early, make sure to check your tire pressure! Before I got on my bike, the very first thing I checked was the tire pressure, and yes - they were low. The last thing you need is low tire pressure to put your machine into a wobble which could cause an unwanted accident!

## BULLET PUINTS

orry, no witty intro. I'm just jumping right into it. The whistleblower group, Empower Oversight, is warning that the Biden administration is preparing an "unconstitutional" power grab to regulate private gun sales by requiring a background check.

In a letter sent on January 31, 2024 to Attorney General Merrick Garland, Empower Oversight said it had learned from two sources that the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives (ATF) was directed by the White House to make the change and "has drafted a 1,300 page document in support of a rule that would effectively ban private sales of firearms from one citizen to another by requiring background checks for every sale."

A 1986 law was passed that explicitly forbids background checks for gun sales between private citizens. Empower Oversight said it believes that only Congress can make such a change because of that law.

The letter states, "Such an expansive rule that treats all citizens the same as Federal Firearms Licensees would circumvent the separation of powers in the constitution, which grants 'all legislative powers' to Congress while requiring that the President 'take care that the laws be faithfully executed."

The letter also states, "To the extent such a rule prevents the private sale of firearms, it would also clearly violate the Second Amendment to the United States Constitution, which declares that 'the right of the people to keep and bear Arms, shall not be infringed."

President Joe Biden signed an executive order in March, (2023) requiring the Federal Government to "clarify the definition of who is engaged in the business of dealing in firearms, and thus required to become Federal Firearms Licensees in order to increase compliance with the federal background check requirement for firearm sales." The President also admitted that his goal was to "move us as close as we can to universal background checks."

The ATF has submitted a rulemaking proposal that I've been keeping tabs on since September of 2023. So have a lot of other Second Amendment advocates, because it raised some big alarms with us. It appears that the administration was seeking to require any private citizen who sells even a single firearm online to register as a Federal Firearms Licensee (FFL).

In 1986 the McClure-Volkmer Bill was enacted as part of the Firearms Owners' Protection Act (FOPA). FOPA made

clear that the "business" of selling firearms "shall not include a person who makes occasional sales, exchanges, or purchases of firearms for the enhancement of a personal collection or for a hobby, or who sells all or part of his personal collection of firearms."


On June 25, 2022, the Bipartisan Safer Communities Act (BSCA) was signed into law. Section 12002 of the BSCA broadened the definition of "engaged in business" to all people who intend to "predominantly earn a profit" from wholesale or retail dealing in firearms by eliminating the requirement that a person's "principal objective" of purchasing and reselling firearms must include both "livelihood and profit."

The statute now states that, as applied to a dealer in firearms, the term "engaged in business" means "a person who devotes time, attention, and labor to dealing in firearms as a regular course of trade or business to predominantly earn a profit through the repetitive purchase and resale of firearms." However, the BSCA definition does not include "a person who makes occasional sales, exchanges, or purchases of firearms for the enhancement of a personal collection or for a hobby, or who sells all or part of his personal collection of firearms."

According to the proposed rule by the ATF, because of the internet, gun shows, flea markets, and other similar events, they want to change the definition of "dealer" to clarify that "firearms dealing may occur wherever, or through whatever medium, qualifying activities may be conducted. This includes at any domestic or international public or private marketplace or premises."

Some nonexclusive examples from the proposed rule include "a gun show or event, flea market, auction house, qun range or club, at one's home, by mail order, over the internet, through the use of other electronic means (e.g., an online broker, online auction, text messaging service, social media raffle, or website), or at any other domestic or international public or private marketplace or premises."

Basically, these examples are letting you know that in order to buy or sell firearms, under this proposed rule, anywhere but a brick-and-mortar store, the government wants you to be licensed. This way they can track all of your guns. This is why I always say... vote accordingly! So, if you're like me and oppose this possible rule change, let your elected officials know. Until next time, enjoy spring, summer will be here soon. Be safe everyone!
