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

PATRIOT GUARD RIDERS STANDING FOR THOSE WHO STOOD FOR US

n Thursday December 21, 2023, I was invited to attend and witness a Patriot Guard mission at the MBS airport in Freeland, MI by a couple of good friends, Shane and his wife Sam. The purpose of this mission was a Help on the HomeFront (HOTH) by the Region 6 Patriot Guard Riders, where we would welcome our Troops home and to show respect to any Military members traveling during the Holiday Season. Shane had told me the story of how and why the Patriot Guard Riders was formed, but I didn't fully understand the impact they make until I attended this mission and witnessed the gratitude not only from the military member but also the family members waiting for their loved one to arrive home.

When I arrived with my granddaughter, we were greeted with a field of American Flags as we walked through the airport doors into the lobby. There were over 20 Patriot





Guard members all mingling, waiting for the next scheduled flight to land, and to disembark. As members of the Patriot Guard moved around the area, they would ask other persons waiting if they happened to be veterans themselves. If they met someone who was a military member, they would shake their hand, thank them for their service, announce to anyone listening their name and branch of service, and follow up with a cheer of "Hip-Hip-Hooray!" from all the Patriot members. As the flight arrival time drew near, all the members made their way to the exit gate and lined up on both sides, each member holding a flag, and making a receiving line for all the passengers to walk through. We all joined in singing Christmas carols until we could see passengers coming through the doors. Civilians were greeted with "Happy Holidays" and military members were greeted with a line of handshakes and the cheer of "Hip-Hip-Hooray!" After the last passenger passed through the line, the Patriot Guard members moved toward the buffet

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


of food they had set up previously to relax until the next plane arrived. During that time, I had the opportunity to speak with John, who is the Patriot Guard Director of Region 6 in Michigan. The true purpose and the reason the Patriot Guard exists is to honor fallen soldiers at funeral services all across the country, and to put a barrier of protection and support between the fallen soldier's family members and any protesters that intend to harass and disrupt the service. Guard" makes perfect sense to me. They are Patriots, by definition - a person who vigorously supports their country. They were created to stand *guard* and give military family members the respect and privacy they deserve.

John emphasized to me many times; anyone can become a Patriot Guard. 2024 WYLD STALLIONS MOTORCYCLE BUILD COMPETITION MEET THE BUILDERS!





IS YOUR SCOOT A GARAGE ROT?

th home life, work, and the upcoming riding season ahead, I'll be continuing to share Smoke 'N Gearz with all of you, but I will be bi-monthly for now. With that being said, I missed you in January, So, Happy New Year and welcome to 2024!

To all the drifters and driftets waiting for our season to open back up with 60-degree days, it's been a pretty mild winter thus far with the exception of what the middle of January gave us. A few riders and I were out on the 1st of the year and in great spirits at 32 degrees with no snow and no ice on Detroit roads. Was it a cold ride-HELL YES. It was colder than a polar bear's toenails. However, it was something some of us have never been able to do before. I was in heated

gear but not plugged in, to test my tolerance. My fingers were cold and locked in a position on my handlebars when I finally stopped for gas. Still, it was a great adventure for the 50-mile journey. I had purposely ridden down historic 8 Mile Rd. (east to west and back) for the world to see how crazy I was-lol-just kidding. Really, I just wanted to show my badge of honor and represent for us Bikers on day one of 2024. I'm quessing I may not have been the only crazy one -lol.



Sitting back in colder temps lately has given me much time to think and research. Goals for the year have been set. Due to being rear-ended in 2021, my last few years have been limited miles and visiting physical therapy and other services. This year, my personal goal is to put 15K miles on the odometer and when I knock out my last year's goal of running up the east coast to Maine, it will help. One of my immediate goals this year was to attend the PROC (MC PROFESSIONAL CONVENTION) in January that took place in Indianapolis, and I can proudly put a check mark next to that one. Something else I'm really looking forward to is seeing many of you at this year's Round-Up in July and August in



So, some may be thinking, "what the heck is garage rot?" Well, this is what happens to your scoot when it is not ridden for a lengthy time. For instance, brake fluids start to breakdown, pistons may stick, piston rings could rust, tires start to go flat/dry-rot, rust could enter the gas from built up condensation, oil may leak from front forks, and/or critters might crawl into your exhaust or other places they decide. None of which a rider wants to deal with on the

day of breakout. Proper storage is the best thing to do. If you can, put your bike on a stand, dolly, or jack. Then, use a fuel stabilizer and a battery tender. I also recommend putting a coat of wax on that paint job. Lastly, find a way to plug your exhaust pipes!

A recent trip to a dealership and speaking with some mechanics, specifically Chris at Motor City Harley-Davidson in Farmington Hills, I got some tricks to the trade and even started considering changing the suspension of the front forks.

Everyone thinks of changing the rear, but not only is it for the comfort of the ride, it is a safety factor. The shocks you choose to use are up to you, and a debate for a different date. I can only suggest that one should check their fluid every few years. The weight of the oil, plus the brand of suspension determines if the ride is stiff and feels like a workout, or rides like a brand new 1973 Cadillac Fleetwood. Other notable items to check are wheel bearings and ways to reduce the infamous "death wobble." Check out this video on



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THE MOTORCYCLE LAWYER ON THE LAW

HERE IS SOME LEGAL ADVICE FROM JASON-THE MOTORCYCLE LAWYER ON MANY DIFFERENT SUBJECTS.

Using Ride-Sharing: Never allow an Uber or Lyft driver to drive you anywhere unless the ride is active on the rideshare app. Drivers for Uber, Lyft and other ride-sharing companies are required to have at least \$1 million worth of bodily injury coverage. However, the \$1 million coverage only applies if there is an active ride on their app.

Some drivers will offer to drive you for cash. They want the cash, and they don't want to share it with Uber. Don't allow it. This is for both safety reasons and insurance coverage.

I read about a case where the passenger wanted to stop at a store near his final destination. The driver went to that final destination and logged the ride off in the app. Then, as a courtesy, took the passenger to the store 3 blocks away where they were in a serious crash. The result was that the million-dollar bodily injury policy did not apply because it was not an active ride.

Only Own Your Vehicle: In Michigan the owner of a motor vehicle or motorcycle is 100% responsible for the negligence of the driver of the car he or she owns. Stated another way, if a husband and wife are listed on the registration as both being the owners of a car and the wife runs a stop sign, severely injuring someone, both the husband and wife will be sued and both are responsible for all the personal injury damages.

This is why I advise that the husband alone be on the registration and title of the vehicle he primarily drives and the wife be listed solely on the registration and title for the vehicle she primarily drives. That way, only the driver of that car will be sued. This is especially true because a husband and wife typically own their home together. If only one spouse is sued and the worst should happen - a judgment for over their policy limits is obtained - the house cannot be taken to satisfy the judgment. If both spouses were sued, then the house would be subject to the judgment.

Riding and Deer and Dogs: Animals are no joke—they can be a major hazard for motorcyclists. I have handled many cases involving them and injured riders. With a dog, we often are successful for motorcycle operators and passengers by pursuing action against the dog owner's home-owner's insurance policy.


With deer, the only claim can be for a passenger against the motorcycle operator's insurance policy. I call these "friendly claims." If you're riding and see a deer or a dog, slow way down and assume the animal will dart into your path. The Michigan Motorcycle Operator Manual even says to stop, "...then wait until the animal leaves or move past the animal at a walking speed."

Never Brandish a Firearm: Many motorcyclists carry a firearm, especially after the legal requirements for obtaining a Concealed Pistol License were lowered. However, even with a CPL, brandishing a firearm is illegal. Brandishing a firearm means pointing, waving, or displaying a firearm with the intent to cause fear in another person. This has been in the forefront of my mind since I learned that a friend of mine, a fellow lawyer, was recently charged with this.

Imagine the scenarios that many people may think are okay to do: a road rage incident where one driver is doing all kinds of crazy aggressive things, so the other driver pulls out his pistol and points it to the sky, as a warning. That driver would likely be charged with brandishing a firearm. My advice is to never show your firearm unless you are in a situation where you would be allowed to actually use it.

Road Defect Crashes: If you or someone you are riding with goes down because of a pothole, road construction, negligence, or other road defect, take at least 50 photographs of the defect, the roadway and signage leading up to it and the surrounding area. We often get calls after this kind of wreck and the city, county, or state will go out and fix the hazard within hours of the crash. Without photographs of the cause of the crash, it becomes a very difficult case.


The Harmony in Compromise

Lisa Fountain, (a resident of St. Clair County, A daughter of the American Revolution as well as a member of the Civil Air Patrol) had the opportunity to attend a wreath laying ceremony at Arlington National Cemetery around 17+ years ago. She says her visit to Arlington sent an electrifying surge of emotions into her and it's powering her efforts to bring her emotional experience back to her hometown. Lisa said, "The experience was so completely humbling she just had to find a way to bring it home."

During the National Wreaths Across America Day on December 16, 2023, more than 2 million wreaths were placed at national, local, and veteran cemeteries across our nation. Of all the military ceremonies I've had the privilege of observing, national wreath day falls into a category of its own and sadly I feel it is one of the most overlooked. This is the only ceremony that I know of that honors our fallen veterans that has zero government funding and let me tell you it is thriving!

This was started in 1992 when a surplus of wreaths were donated to Arlington National Cemetery by the Worcester Wreath Company. Then BAM!! Along with the support of communities and volunteer veteran













organizations, it caught on like wildfire and quickly became a national project! Wreaths Across America was born! Every year thousands of volunteers flood the grounds of over 150 cemeteries holding wreaths (still produced from the Worcester wreath company and created from a lot of balsam pine trees grown specifically for this cause) where at every grave they take a moment to place a Remembrance wreath, speak the soldiers name aloud and give thanks.

For some it's an emotional time to visit their past and for others it can be an annual labor of love, or a family tradition. For me, it's a chance to spend time with some of my favorite people and plus, I get to support, record, and spread the word about our little community and the amazing people in it!


Last fall the Honor Guard of St. Clair County was kind enough to adopt me for the day and brought me in with open arms to record a flag retirement ceremony. I found it completely humbling that over the holidays they thought of inviting me once again for National Wreath Day in December to participate and to photograph the day. So, from the shadows I did my best to catch the special moments as they paid patronage to their fallen brothers and sisters! To me, no honor could be as great as being requested to record and share the unfiltered emotion that I was entrusted with and to show them support.

Taking part in the wreath placement, it was great to see some familiar faces of not only the Honor Guard, but also the Boy Scout Troop of Marysville, members of the VFW Post, and of course members of the Port Huron Motorcycle Club. It's





MY BIKE, AKA EXIT 9

My 2011 Harley-Davidson Road Glide has been redone from the front tire to the rear. I purchased it as a stock FLTRX (Road Glide Custom) with 8,000 miles on the odometer. Now, it has a 23" x 16" set up which makes it sit like a Cane Corso. The original factory color was a canvas of Sedona Orange and now has a mix of Amber Whiskey and bursts of abstract art. it comfortable with the



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I REMEMBER THE WINTER SNOWSTORM OF 1967

inter snow is finally coming, and I can't help but remember the winter of 1967. I was staying in downtown Detroit with two of my brothers. It was the

last winter before going into the Army. We were working on building a hard tail chopper after we came home from our day jobs, welding or painting one part or another. Six inch over springer front end with a nineteen-inch wheel and a fifteeninch rim in the rear. A sportster tank over a Harley twelve-hundred motor. All the paint was done in a candy apple red. With very heavy silver metal flake. Very old school paint on a modern chopper. This was David's bike, his money, and our help. We worked on it almost every day and then we would proceed in the repetition of our usual nighttime activities. Get to the bar by eight. Eat a burger and drink beer. Around eleven or twelve, if we had played enough pool, it was time to head home or to a different bar. Usually at two in the morning, we'd stop at a diner before going home and of course all we talked about was bikes. We had to work in Birmingham in the morning, so it would be an early rise, but we were young and full of stupid, so it was what we did. We had a friend named Tom, who was our welder, so he usually came along with us. We didn't mind. He helped pay for gas and

There were reports of a big storm coming and it was already snowing hard as we went into the bar, but when we came out the side streets were a mess. There must have been six or eight inches at least when we all piled into my brother's car cold and wet. One problem, we cleaned off the car, but the road was slick. We had to get out and push the car to get it going. We couldn't leave it. During snowstorms you would get a ticket, buried by the plow, or both if you parked on the street during the emergency parking ordinances. Neighborhood bars on

side streets only left room for curb parking and one lane down the center. If you met someone coming the other way, someone had to back up. Back in those days there was really bad snow, even in the city. Good times, really. We were too young to buy beer, and nobody cared. We had the world by the tail and were having the time of our lives.

The next summer, my brother David and I would join the Army. The bike was done and Mark who was deferred 4F, would take care of our bikes while we were gone. Our buddy Tom had moved with his mom to the suburbs somewhere. Mark was there waiting for us after we took our physical and when we'd come home on leave. The bikes would be all gassed up and ready to ride. Mark was kind of a cornerstone for

> David and I. He was a pretty tough guy and didn't take anything from the neighborhood hoodlums. We had to take him to the hospital to get sewed up at least a couple of times when he'd get in a fight with someone who had a knife. David was killed in action late in 1969, and I was sent home with him. The Vietnam War was going on strong, and we drew short straws. Hell, it seemed like just about everyone I knew drew short straws. Bob Hope was visiting troops, and everything back home seemed

to change. Veterans were not popular among those my age. Especially on a bike. The music changed while we were in, but we still had a shock when we returned. Even riding to the bar was different. Just Mark and me. Just not the

Mark and I continued for a while, but it felt like we were from different worlds. I saw how hard losing David had hit Mark. Mark ended up taking David's chopper and rode it for a while before he had passed it on to a younger brother. Mom wasn't thrilled about another son riding but she must have known it was inevitable. I mean my father rode, so we were all going to ride. Deciding to leave Detroit, I rode back home to lowa to be with my father on the farm. A couple of my younger siblings stayed in the Detroit area with my mother. Mom and dad had separated, and dad went back to lowa. Back home on the farm, I was able to get my bearings a little better. Small towns appreciate veterans differently. Over time, I went back and forth between Muscatine Iowa and Royal Oak Michigan. Winters were different between Muscatine and Royal Oak. Muscatine had a lot of high wind when the Northerns blew down and everything turned to ice. The north side of Detroit still had a lot of snow, but I didn't go back into downtown Detroit much after that. Times had

changed along with the weather. I can remember a lot more snow back then and running around the streets with two of my brothers. We'd push through winter and then ride our bikes together all summer until the snow returned once again. We just took it all for granted. Those were different times. I will always remember the snowstorm of 1967, but it was April of 1968 when spring presented a last ride with David and his red chopper. He was so proud of his bike and for good reason, it was an awesome looking bike. Then we both went into the Army. I remember that red chopper and the winter snowstorm of 1967.


Our next big benefit will be for the Lenawee Foster Care / Childrens Protective Services in April, and we will be reaching out for help gathering products that are on their "wish list."





With that out of the way, I do have some bad news for you as well. The price of ammo is going to go up. Vista Outdoor, the parent company of Remington, Alliant Powder, CCI, Federal, SEVI-Shot and Speer, sent a letter to their customers that they will substantially increase its ammunition prices due to "an anticipated global shortage of gunpowder." According to Vice President of Sales, Sporting Products Brett Nelson, "Due to world events our suppliers have notified us of unprecedented demand for and an anticipated global shortage of gunpowder, and thus has increased our prices substantially. We must therefore raise our pricing to help offset those increases." Well, that sucks! Didn't we just go through this in 2020 and 2021? What is "increased our prices substantially" you ask? Well:

Shotshell 1-7 percent

Rifle 1-7 percent

Handgun 1-5 percent

22LR/Shorts 1-5 percent

WMR/HMR 1-7 percent

Primers 5 percent

Alliant Powder 10 percent (limited availability)

That may not seem like much on paper, but I assure you that it is. Especially in these hard financial times (I get a double dose of financial bad news this month - hurray birthdays). But that shouldn't mean that I give you a double dose of bad news. So here is a bit of good news! Some sane people in our state government want to make it available for schools to teach firearm and hunter safety. House Bill 5334 and Senate Bill 664 have been introduced in the Michigan House of Representatives.

It states, "By not later than June 1, 2025, the department, in consultation with the department of natural resources, shall adopt and make available to schools a model program of firearm safety instruction

for students in grades 6 to 12. The instruction must be not less than 8 hours in duration, must comply with the requirements of the safe handling course provided by the department of natural resources, and must be taught by an individual who has been certified as a hunter education instructor by the department of natural resources." According to the bill, no firearms or ammunition will be allowed in the schools. So, I'm assuming then, that they would have to teach this off-site, because they would teach: "proper usage and handling of firearms, safe cleaning and maintenance of firearms, and safe hunting practices." Schools may provide this instruction as an extracurricular or "part of an existing course for the purpose of teaching selfexpression and enjoyment of recreational activity." Also, any student who completes this course is considered to have completed the full hunter safety

If I may opine on this for a minute, I would've loved to have this in my school back then. You see, most of the time it's the dad teaching the child how to properly handle a firearm, how to hunt and learning to love both the sports of shooting and hunting. In his younger days, my dad loved to hunt, but I only knew of this from stories he would tell and that was all I got, stories. He had lost his passion, and his ability to hunt when I was 6 years old with a debilitating back injury. I never got instructions on how to properly handle a firearm or the finer points of going on a hunt from him. I learned these things on my own much later in life. So, anything having to do with teaching a child (or adult for that matter) firearm and hunter safety, I am 100 percent behind.

I'll be keeping my eye on this one to see if it gains any traction now that the Legislature has come back into session. Also, I will be calling my local Representative to urge him to keep pushing for the bills that I previously mentioned to go through. If you are in favor of this type of education (which I hope you are) I ask that you do the same. Also, if you feel the urge to get Stabby a birthday present, she's been eyeing up the Glock 48. Until next time, stay safe and vote accordingly.


my Trike! This year is going to be A LOT of fun and I am really looking forward to more charity events!
