

BUCKET LIST

t always lights a fire inside us when people start talking about going on a bike trip, right? Usually, these conversations happen when riders start talking about the places they've been or the places they want to get to. I couldn't tell you how many times I've listened to others talk about riding the Triple Nickel in Ohio and what a great ride it was. Well, the opportunity arose, and it's now checked off our bucket list!

The five-day trip that started on Wednesday morning and ended with us coming home late Monday evening. When we pulled into the garage and got off the bike, we had managed to roll 1,729.9 miles. Yup, I wish I could have caught the .9 before rolling into the garage because I would have gone around the block before turning the bike off. That's my OCD kicking in and it hasn't stopped bugging me since. When we arrived at our Airbnb in Hillsboro, OH I made a point to log our arrival miles at 380.4 from our driveway to the house we rented. It probably would have been less miles and time if we had ridden the expressway, but we all agreed to take the scenic route and to avoid the highway as much as we could. About 30 minutes before our destination, we stopped at a covered bridge for some pictures with the group and the bikes.



Rolling into town we made mental notes of places to eat and grab a drink as we passed by them, but found ourselves heading back to the nearest place to home after a long day and unloading the bikes. That place happened to be the Beechwood Pizza & Carryout. Keep in mind this is a small town and things aren't open so late and we were hungry! Luckily, we had picked the right place because the owners and staff were soo friendly and even though the kitchen was closed when we walked in, they took care of us anyway. They fired up the oven and we all agreed that it was some of the best pizza we've had. They visited our table as we ate and shared the day's ride with them over some drinks. That hospitality and friendliness reverberated everywhere we went.





We came to ride, and we squeezed in as much seat time as we could with the time we had. We rode to Black Sheep H-D and Hillbilly Hot Dogs in West Virginia, CinCity H-D in Cincinnati, the



NADA Tunnel in Kentucky, and the 555 from the south end to the top. Before leaving Black Sheep H-D we asked if they could recommend a fun spot to check out before we headed back to Hillsboro, and they suggested Ford's Garage. They were right, it had a pretty cool design like an old Ford assembly line. On our last day before officially heading home, we reached the top of the Triple Nickel where we stopped at the Triple Nickel Saloon and met the owner Uncle John. We picked up some patches and stickers from him and surprisingly found out there was another Uncle John that owned Uncle John's Riverside Café just 1.5 miles south of the Saloon. We had passed it on our way and decided to go back and check it out. Again, everywhere we went the people were so kind and friendly. On one of the previous days we were out riding, we found ourselves at Lisa's Wayside Inn in the town of Russellville for a bite to eat. While we were there, we met the owner of the bar and yup, her name is Lisa. She was so kind, just like everyone else we had met on our travels. So kind in fact, that she offered to make us some special cobbler if we came back the next day. Of course, we did, and it was totally worth it!

There's no question we'll find our way back in the future. Even though we struggled with the H-D navigations system's inaccuracies, it 100% took us on the twisty routes we requested. The Triple Nickel is great, but none of the hills and curves disappointed, no matter the direction.





With all the riding we got in, we wanted to relax at least one of the nights around the fire but that's hard to do without firewood and being on bikes. So, we made a call to the owner of Beechwood Pizza and Carryout and took him up on his offer to deliver us some bundles of wood. See what I mean? Super friendly peeps! It was the perfect night to sit around the fire and relax. That was until we discovered that the Northern Lights were happening, and we had a front row view. It was so cool to experience the amazing show the night sky

was putting on in front of our eyes. That was another first for us and could not believe how beautiful it was as we started seeing pictures online from back home in Michigan and all over the states.

After riding the Nickel and making a few stops afterward, we stayed the night in Zanesville. One of the couples that came along with us had to make their way home the day before and didn't get to enjoy the ride with us there, but we did get some really great rides together the days before. The next morning (Monday) Aly and I slept in as the other couple we were with made their way back too. After loading up the bike we made our way to the Muskingum WW

Il & Korea Memorial. Let me say, it is a very moving monument that the town came together to create. Check out the Veterans Corner in this issue for more pictures and information. We had a long ride ahead of us, so we pointed our scoot toward home. What a fantastic trip we had, but it's always good to be home, right?



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

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READERS RIDES

few years back, I owned a 2010 Ultra Classic Harley-Davidson which was unfortunately stolen. I've owned several smaller sport bikes since then, but I always wanted to get another big bike. Last September, I was heading down to ride the Tail of the Dragon with a group of friends and of course along the way we stopped at several Harley-Davidson Dealerships. When we got to Buckeye Harley-Davidson in Dayton Ohio, my buddy suggested I trade in my 2001 GSXR600 for a down payment on a bigger bike. The salesman was more than happy to let me trade up. So, I signed some papers, and was the new owner of a 2020 Harley-Davidson Street Glide. The dealership had to perform an inspection before I could take it out of the state, so I didn't get to ride the dragon tail on it, and I didn't get to ride it home. But they did deliver it to me here in Michigan, I didn't even have to go back and pick it up. Within 3 hours of them

dropping it off, I was already taking it apart to start doing some modifying. I have blacked out the chrome, vinyl wrapped the bike, upgraded the intake, exhaust, floorboards, put on extended bags, spotlights, different tank dash, handlebars, grips, levers, different crash bar, saddlebag bars, updated speakers, added a sissy bar with my shop logo stitched in, tuner, painted rims, LEDs, speaker lids, luggage rack, and driver back rest. I haven't even owned it a full year and you wouldn't recognize it as the same bike I purchased.

I've put a little over 3,000 miles since I purchased it last September, and in August I will be heading back down to the Tail of the Dragon, this time on my Street Glide!



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AMERICAN BIKERS AIMING TOWARDS EDUCATION

hat you need to know about ABATE of Michigan. ABATE of Michigan is not a club or riding group, it is a nonpartisan grassroots political organization committed to protecting the rights, and interests of Michigan motorcyclists. Being a member of Abate of Michigan does not come with any requirements for participation in any event or function, nor does it exclude participation in a member's choice of any meetings or events anywhere in the state.

ABATE of Michigan welcomes all motorcyclists regardless of choice of motorcycle, motorcycle activities, sex, race, or political affiliation. No requirement is necessary to even own a motorcycle. We try to go about the business of getting the business done in Lansing in as fun and entertaining manner as we can. We also extend a large and generous hand to our local communities, because in addition to being motorcyclists we are also the sons, daughters, mothers, fathers, grandparents and neighbors of our communities and we care.

Region numbers are assigned by legislative district, not where members choose to participate. ABATE of Michigan, while widely known for its activities regarding the helmet law, is not so well known for a multitude of other motorcyclists' issues that the organization monitors, lobbies, and has great interest in. These are a sampling of the issues ABATE of Michigan continuously monitors and lobbies our legislators in Lansing on.

- Motorcyclists training and licensing ~ ABATE was integral in the development of Riders Courses offered by the State and continues to provide most of the instructors and trainers of the instructors in Michigan. We have kept these courses available to the public for \$50 at all the state training locations for years. We continue to monitor the security of the funding for these courses.
- Highway engineering issues relating to the safety and accessibility of motorcycles ~ This includes everything from potholes, tar snakes, and cheese cutters, to red lights that do not recognize motorcycles.

 Insurance regulations ~ There is no legislation passed in Lansing that does not go before the eyes of insurance lobbyists, and they introduce more legislation than any lobbying group. It is imperative that we closely monitor and maintain meaningful input on these types of legislation.

An important issue to ABATE of Michigan is the safety of Michigan motorcyclists. In this state there is no one who pushes harder for awareness of motorcycles. We do this through signs, both yard, road, and billboards. We produce our own radio PSA campaigns. We go to schools and drivers training classes to extend our input as motorcyclists to the kids and students.

- ABATE pays for Lobbyists in Lansing, attends fundraisers and other political events to promote positive motorcycle agenda and fight the negative government intrusion against your freedom.
- ✓ ABATE was instrumental in amending the motorcycle helmet law to allow adult choice.
- ✓ ABATE initiated and passed legislation 6 times to keep the Motorcycle Safety Fund solvent.
- ✓ ABATE was able to take motorcycles out of the road tax increase legislation in 2015.
- ✓ ABATE members have taught thousands of motorcyclists to properly ride and get the motorcycle endorsement on their driver's license.
- ABATE members teach motorcycle awareness in driver training classes and promote motorcycle awareness with yard signs, highway billboards, radio ads and other means to help keep you safe.
- ✓ ABATE has fought the insurance industry on decreasing or eliminating your benefits and increasing your premiums.
- ✓ ABATE of Michigan is closely aligned and associated with most national Motorcycle Rights Organizations. And stays abreast of and supports issues on the Federal level.

AMA - American Motorcyclists Association - We have enjoyed the presence of Imre Sauter, AMA legislative affairs specialist at our Annual Seminar for several years.

MRF - Motorcycle Riders Foundation - We have also had Jay Jackson Vice President from the MRF at the Seminar.

MSF - Motorcycle Safety Foundation - Most of our Riders Course instructors and educational materials come from the MSF.

We also work with the motorcycle dealers, State and Federal Governmental Associations, COC, Confederation of Clubs, BOLT, Bikers of Lesser Tolerance, and multiple state organizations, on issues that we share. There are dozens of lesser-known issues, like Ethanol, HIPPA, motorcycle only checkpoints, lane usage, Right to Repair, parking restrictions, motorcycle Restrictions from locations, EPA, and aftermarket parts regulations that we monitor, engage, and then continue to monitor.

While not everyone has the time to contribute to every organization or cause that they may support, we would ask you to take this opportunity to support ABATE of MICHIGAN to help us help you. We really are all in this together and while we may differ on an issue or two, in the grand scheme of motorcycling we share our opinion more than we do not, especially, the right to ride free and safe, in MICHIGAN.

- ✓ ABATE has monthly meetings in your region to keep you informed on legislation and other activities that concern motorcyclists.
- ✓ ABATE does have parties, motorcycle rides, and other social activities for our members to enjoy. ABATE membership includes a \$3500 accidental life insurance policy at no cost to you.
- ✓ ABATE is the recognized premier State Motorcyclist Rights Organization in Lansing. Your legislators know us, and we know them.

or motorcycle enthusiasts, there are few experiences more exhilarating than navigating the twisting, turning roads of the Tail of the Dragon. Located in the Smoky Mountains of North Carolina and Tennessee, this iconic stretch of highway offers 318 curves in just 11 miles, making it a must ride destination for riders seeking adrenaline fueled thrills. I have been fortunate enough to

have visited this area numerous times in the past few years and have come up with a few tips to help make your trip a success.

Trip Planning

Embarking on a motorcycle trip to the Tail of the Dragon requires detailed planning and preparation to ensure a smooth and enjoyable ride:

- 1. Choose the Right Time: Try for spring or fall when the weather is mild, and the roads are less crowded compared to the peak summer season. I have been in June, August, and September. June was the best weather wise. And later in the day is best to avoid traffic.
- 2. Select Accommodations: Book lodging in advance, as nearby hotels and campgrounds can fill up quickly, especially during weekends and holidays. Consider staying in motorcycle-friendly accommodations equipped with amenities such as secure parking and bike washing stations. There are many smaller towns around the Dragon that offer lodging including Robbinsville



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NC, Maggie Valley NC, Maryville TN, and Cherokee NC. I prefer to stay in Cherokee due to its central location to all the various routes in the area.

- **3. Prepare Your Motorcycle:** Before hitting the road, perform a thorough inspection of your motorcycle, checking tire pressure, brakes, lights, and fluids. Carry essential tools and spare parts for roadside repairs and consider investing in a roadside assistance plan for added peace of mind.
- 4. Pack Wisely: Pack light but efficiently, bringing along essential gear such as riding gear, rain gear, sunscreen, hydration packs, and a first-aid kit. Secure your luggage properly to prevent shifting or imbalance while riding. Tennessee and North Carolina have mandatory helmet laws so do not leave home without your lid.
- 5. Plan Your Route: Research alternative routes and scenic detours to and from the Tail of the Dragon, allowing for flexibility in your itinerary. Consider exploring other renowned motorcycle routes in the area, such as the Blue Ridge Parkway, Cherohala Skyway, and the Great Smoky Mountains National Park. I always tell people that even the roads you take to get to the roads you want to ride are amazing.



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What to Do

Once you've made the necessary preparations, it's time to hit the road and experience the thrill of the Tail of the Dragon:

- Drive Responsibly: While the Tail of the Dragon offers an adrenaline-pumping ride, safety should always be your top priority. Observe posted speed limits and be mindful of other motorists sharing the road.
 - 2. Capture the Moment: There are many photographers along the Dragon to capture the moment for you so you can pay attention

to the road. The main photographers are Killboy and 129Slayer and they upload their pictures nightly to their websites. To make finding your pictures easier, pay attention to the time you ride the Dragon.

- **3. Embrace the Adventure:** Embrace the twists and turns of the road and savor every exhilarating moment. The Tail of the Dragon offers a unique driving experience unlike any other, so enjoy the ride!
- 4. Explore the Surroundings: After conquering the Tail of the Dragon, take some time to explore the charming towns and natural attractions in the surrounding area. From hiking trails to waterfalls to other exciting roads, there's no shortage of outdoor adventures to be had.

What Not to Do

While the Tail of the Dragon promises an unforgettable experience, there are a few things to avoid to ensure a safe and enjoyable journey:

- 1. **Reckless Driving:** Resist the urge to push your limits or engage in reckless driving behavior. The Tail of the Dragon can be unforgiving, and even minor mistakes can have serious consequences.
- 2. Overestimating Your Skills: Be honest about your driving abilities and do not attempt to tackle the Tail of the Dragon if you're not comfortable with challenging driving conditions.

There are numerous pull offs on the Dragon to let faster traffic pass. Keep an eye on your mirrors and if a faster rider is approaching be kind and move over.

By carefully planning your journey, riding responsibly, and embracing the spirit of exploration, you can make the most of your experience and revel in the thrill of the open road. Insider Tips to TRIPLE Your Compensation After a Motorcycle Crash!

awyer friends of mine that handle auto accident cases often ask me how I am so successful at getting results for my motorcycle clients. Here's some information I am not afraid to share to maximize your case after a motorcycle accident. At the end of the day, as biased as this may sound (and, hey, it probably is), anyone that has been in a motorcycle wreck is better off by calling our office for **free advice**, a **free case analysis**, and to activate all our resources- that means **specialized representation**- as soon as possible (that's **877-Biker-Law**).

1. Activate a Professional Investigation on Your Behalf.

Time is of the essence. The faster a professional investigates the accident on your behalf, the better case you will have. Insurance companies often dispatch their investigators within 24 hours of receiving the accident report and will try to build a case against you. This is what we do immediately on every case.

2. Get Medical Attention Immediately.

Complain about everything that is hurting you from head to toe. Some adjusters attempt to deny injuries that "materialize" sometime after the accident but were not initially complained about. The truth is, often it's only after a few days that soreness and pain come to the surface. Highlight your experience and endorsements to bolster your case. How long have you been riding motorcycles? How long have you had a motorcycle endorsement? These are the kinds of questions I would ask my client when building a case.

7. Defeat the Bias: "Motorcyclists are Hard to See".

Provide details about your bike's visibility to counter claims of visibility issues. Can you describe all the lights and reflectors on your bike? Is there any chrome on your bike? These are some questions I may ask during my client's deposition to help their case, that they were easy to see. Bonus points if we can argue that the driver should have been able to hear your motorcycle as well. What exhaust system is on your motorcycle?

8. Keep a Pain & Treatment Diary.

Sometimes it can be beneficial if the client keeps a diary that succinctly highlights the care required, medical equipment used, and treatment rendered. To keep the diary from being discoverable in a lawsuit, I have my client write on the top of the first page: "For my attorney- Privileged Communication". Now it is part of the attorney-client privilege and is not discoverable by the other side. 9. Avoid Gaps in Treatment.

A gap in treatment is when the plaintiff was treated by doctors for their injuries but stops, either for a period of time or altogether. The defense attorney often tries to argue, "They must not have been injured as bad as they claim" or "Plaintiff must be all better, otherwise they would be going to the doctor".

Noticity of nature. For many riders, this connection goes beyond the physical—it touches the spirit and every perfect gift is from above, coming down from the Father of lights, with whom there is no variation or shadow due to change."

This verse encapsulates a powerful message of consistency and benevolence that aligns closely with the spirit of the motorcycling community in Michigan. The "Father of lights," as mentioned in the verse, can be seen as a metaphor for the ultimate source of goodness and reliability in the universe. Speaking to a few lifers and OGs in our area, they are noticing more riders wearing a pass pin that are usually found on their vest, aka Cut, Colors, or Rags. Some people, not in the MC culture, wonder what is the point of it? In short, it is a sign of respect. These pins were first brought on the set as far back as World War II by veterans returning home and riding their motorcycles. It was an item of dignity and not everyone had them. One might have seen them worn early in the history of outlaw clubs originally, but the meaning was widespread and now seen on the Cuts of 99. It's not a situation of being watered down, but merely a statement that a lot more riders are passing through unknown towns of that clubs' Colors. So, to have an unnecessary conversation, which could lead to unrelenting chaos, the pass pin shares, "I am simply passing through." I am not interested in any business of any type "here." Some more of the background, just like a patch, it is earned-not given. 


UPDATE DEREK LONG owosso michigan



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My story about the life and experiences of growing up with the Pony Cycle's.

I was just born when my dad and grandpa bought the prototype of a scooter that later became the Pony Cycle. As I got older I found myself going into work with my dad on Saturday's and playing among all the boxes, tires and cool stuff You can imagine how many cool things there were around a shop (Hawk Tool & Eng.) that build motor scooters.

At 8 years old I started to ride the bikes around the shop grounds and parades. They had 6 acres of property and a oval drive through it.which made it like a race track. Clarkston - was a small village back in the 50's. Hawk Tool employed between 75 to 100 people and made everything possible themselves. The employees got to know me pretty well as I needed help with repairs and things like gas, oil and air for tires. My grandma & grandpa used my time at the shop to get help with the garden and household chores, see there house was next door to the shop. Grandpa's work vehicle was a 3 wheel Pony Cycle with a big front box on it. Some of the worst times to ride his work vehicle was right after he moved dirt with it. The dirt and dust would fly out of the box and get in my eyes, no matter how good I sweep it out. Hawk Tool was also working on making carnival cars with 3 wheels and low to the ground. These were great to drive and comer on 2 wheels as they were very tippy.

No matter how I tried there were only certain bikes I was allowed to drive around. My teenage years gave me the willingness and knowledge to learn how to machine and weld, so I built a few things myself, and latter starting my own business. I have been-tokistefies--fi-om-m y-dad-aboutt he difficulties of manufacturing and some of the family disputes. One he has mentioned was making the handlebars themselves. Dad said they could buy them for half of what they could make them for, of course grandpa won and they made them. I enjoy sharing this story and hope you have also.

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

FLAT TRACK RACER REGINALD D. MULL

Reginald D. Mull July 17, 1927 - January 14, 1983



Reginald D. Mull was born in Lansing, Michigan, the son of Ralph and Emma Mull. Reggie had one sister and three brothers. He lived in the Lansing area from birth into adulthood supporting himself and his family as a motorcycle mechanic and as a motorcycle flat track racer. He also served in the Air Force at the end of the Second World War. On October 14th, 1947, Reggie married his sweetheart Dorothy, and they went on to have four sons - David, Dennis,



Danny, and Dean. Dorothy also rode motorcycles and rode her own AJS brand motorcycle until eventually it hurt her back too much to ride anymore. Reggie's father rode a Sunbeam Motorcycle a little bit and Reggie's sons Dennis and Danny also rode motorcycles for many years and are still enthusiasts today. Reggie didn't get started in racing until the late 1940's but once he did get started, he was quite successful. Although he never won a national race, he did win and podium at a lot of races throughout the Great



Lakes Region. Some of the highlights of his racing career

include his time racing in Detroit at the Motor City Speedway. In 1948 and 1949 he finished 2nd at the Motor City Speedway and in 1949 set the new fastest times for 6 laps, 8 laps, and 15 laps. In 1950 and 1951 Reggie would not settle for runner up in Detroit and won both years at the Motor City Speedway. One of the victories received a little extra celebration as the promoter really celebrated it because it was the winning of the 1,000th main event at the race facility. He raced several different brands over the years but seldom

rode Harley - Davidsons or Indians. He raced AJS, Ariel, BSA, Matchless, and Norton Motorcycles. Reggie didn't race in AMA Competition from June of 1953 until 1960. In his time away from the AMA Competitions he did get to do a little racing over in Canada and even managed to win the Carling Red Cap Trophy in Ontario, Canada in 1956. He kept working on and selling bikes throughout the 1950's as he owned Capital City Cycles. Later on, he moved to California in the 1960's and although he didn't race as much anymore, he was racing against some great competition at Ascot Park Racetrack, Gardena, California. While in California, Reggie worked as a motorcycle mechanic and later as a maintenance man at Regina Winery. Reggie had some great races and probably a few rivalries throughout his racing career and he was a lifelong motorcycle enthusiast. He is still talked about today as a great rider and was even listed as

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

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
one of the top dirt trackers in the world back in his days. He will be remembered by a lot of the old timer racers and fans from Michigan as he put on such great shows while racing at the Motor City Speedway against some world class riders of their time. Reggie dabbled in other types of motorcycle riding and racing as well. He raced TT Scrambles, Drag Racing, Hill Climbing, Ice Racing, Enduro Racing, Trail Riding, and Street Riding. Like other great riders in his time, Regie was somewhat of a Renaissance Man of motorcycling as he raced the


famed Jack Pine Enduro Race and raced the Daytona Beach Course as well.

REGINALD MULL

REGINALD MULL ONE of the best young competition stars developed in the Mid-West in recent motifs is none other than Regional "Reggie" Mull who was beirs on July 17th, 1627, at Lassing, Michigan, of Pennsylvania Dutch descet, and who in the past couple of years has come through with some fine wins while riding A. J. S. and Nerton machines. Reggie showed great heart and determination when he had a taid accident at Nor-ton, Kansas in 1995. Both his unkles were chipped and sprained, and although he was unable to compete an the 'A-millers he continued right on riding the half and mile circuits. 1948This greatest thrill in competition was the first time ho won the 16-lap feature event on the Motor City Speedway at Detroit. Ranseal Peterson always gives him the most trouble to beat, and in August 1949 Reggie set the following new records on Motor City Speedway in Detroit: 6-laps 1:52.08; 8-laps 2:01.78 and 16-laps 556.03. He considers the following riders tops in their respective types of competition: Dirt track, Jimony Chann; 'A-mile banked speedway, Russell Peterson, and in Amer-ters road racing, Billy Mathews.





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Provide the symmetric everybody! It has been a long wait. In this episode of Bullet Points I'm going to change things up a little bit. I sat down with my good friend and tattoo artist Dion Socia at his shop, Magic Circle Tattoo, in Bay City, Michigan to talk about how he got started in the tattoo world and why he finally figured out he should be carrying a firearm.



Dion got his start in artwork as a caricature artist at an amusement park in Florida. Growing his talent and managerial skills, he became training manager for new hires. While this was a great learning experience, he eventually decided it was time to move on to bigger and better things. After reconnecting with family, he moved to Chicago to apprentice in one of his sister and brother in law's tattoo shops. As he recalls, "It was a five-year apprenticeship, which is exceedingly long. And it became abundantly clear that I was free labor for the shop." Dion finally decided to leave Chicago and move back to Bay City. His first stop for a job was a new tattoo shop that had just opened in an old church. When that interview didn't give him the vibe he was going for, he made his way over to Electric Chair Tattoo. After working there for nearly 6 years, and becoming one of the top earning artists, he decided it was time to open his own shop. And with a little help, he did just that.

Fast forward to gun talk. He finally realized that there are a lot of sh***y people in this world, and he should probably have something to defend himself with. Where he lived at that time in Chicago, there were a lot of mostly peaceful protests going on. When those protests started to escalate to more violence, property damage, and expanding outside of the city, he decided that was the time to be able to protect himself. Now purchasing a firearm in Illinois is a lot more difficult than here in Michigan. There you need to obtain a FOID (Firearm Owners Identification) card before even being able to step foot in most gun stores. You then must wait 10 days, to the minute, after purchase to be able to pick up your firearm. Dion recalled one of his first times in an Illinois gun store when a customer came in to pick up their firearm after the 10-day waiting period and they were told that they had to wait another 12 minutes because their 10 days wasn't fully up yet. The store was afraid that the person might be an undercover cop trying to set them up and made sure to follow the law. So, impatiently, the customer waited.

Dion comes from a family full of Military Veterans, so he was not new to how to handle and carry a gun safely. After talking with his brother, who is a Marine, it was recommended that Dion get a Beretta 92, as it is a very reliable handgun. After several near-violent incidents, he decided that it was time to get a smaller, more concealable firearm, as the Beretta is a full frame. Eventually he went and got his CPL (Concealed Pistol License) and wound up buying himself a Ruger LC9S for his EDC (everyday carry). As I sat with him listening to his story and B.S.'ing as we do, we got to show and tell on our EDCs. My brand-new as of today Glock 48 (sorry, Stabby!) and then my Sig Sauer P320 against his Ruger LC9S. I did get a peek at the Beretta 92 as well. Both are extremely nice guns but come on man! Clean that S**T!



All joking aside, I wish more people would open their eyes

and realize that they need to be prepared and able to defend themselves and their loved ones. I will leave you all once again with "vote accordingly". Also, don't criticize my tattoo too much, it's not done yet!



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DIY: H-D STAGE 1 AND TUNER

ver since the creation of handheld tuners for fuel injected motorcycles I have always wanted to try one, but I've never had the need for one until now. I have installed Stage 1 kits on fuel injected Harley's in the past but had the dealerships do the tuning, and the bikes I wrench on for other people; the owners wanted them professionally tuned. I haven't heard anything bad about the tuners, I just would not expect your bike to be at its absolute peak performance levels of horsepower, and torque if you choose to use one instead of a professional tune using a dyno. I ride a 2021 Harley Road King Standard with a 107



cubic inch. I know with the 107 unless I dropped big bucks on engine work my bike was not going to be a performance bagger. I am going for sound and looks more than anything on this bike. I did a bunch of research on great sounding pipes for the Harley M8 engine and decided to go with the Tab Performance 2 into 2 head pipe with the 50 cal. 5-inch



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slip-on mufflers with the zombie baffles. For the air cleaner I went with the Arlen Ness Beveled Inverted Series Black. I will admit I was a little nervous spending the money on a tuner but with the research I did which included some time on YouTube and asking bike shops a lot of questions; I felt that buying one for myself was the right choice. I decided on the Dynojet Power Vision 3 tuner for my make and model. My parts arrived about a week after I ordered them, I had already taken off my stock exhaust and air cleaner, so I was ready for install right away. It was still a week or two before the warmer weather came into town, so I had time. The TAB Performance exhaust came with new mounting brackets and exhaust seals. Personally, I was not impressed with the exhaust gaskets provided, they were very loose fitting in the heads of the engine. I could spin them around with my finger very easily, so I bought the Harley brand exhaust gaskets. Both brands were beveled gaskets so I knew the Harley brand wouldn't have a problem with sealing. The install went smooth for the most part, I jumped the gun a little bit and installed the crossover section bracket and crossover pipe to the bike before I tightened up the right side of the bike/exhaust, which threw things off a bit. I took the crossover back off and followed the direction provided by TAB Performance. When you install the pipes to your cylinder heads make sure to use an inch pound torque wrench. If you have not installed exhaust pipes before and you're planning to do something similar to this, it's important that you have the right torque wrenches for the job. DO NOT try to convert foot pounds to inch pounds, just buy two separate torque wrenches. The clearance between the exhaust and engine are tighter than the stock exhaust was, but nothing was touching and there was enough room between for some movement from the engine rumble. I made a mental note of the clearance and would check it again when the bike was running. I used a high temp exhaust sealer for the slip-on 50 cal. mufflers. There was an ugly bolt hole left behind in the engine casing from the

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stock exhaust bracket, so I went to the hardware store and bought a chrome bolt to plug in the hole. I also bought some floorboard 3/4-inch extensions from HOGWORKZ, I didn't like the supplied ones that came with the exhaust head pipe. The Arlen Ness air cleaner was beautiful, there were a lot of pieces and screws, but it was easy to assemble.



If I had to tell you what I thought was the hardest part about the installation, it would have been not having an extra pair of hands when lining everything up and bolting it into place on the bike. I always worry about dropping or scratching a motorcycle part that I can't afford to replace. I think that the Arlen Ness air cleaner

changed the look of my bike more than the exhaust did. I love it! I now have my bike put all back together, it's time for the tuner. I plugged the Power Vision 3 tuner into the ECU plug and powered up my bike. The tuner turned on automatically and I followed the prompts. I picked a preloaded tune from the Power Vision that fit the description of my bike, the exhaust style, and the air cleaner style. The tuner asked if I wanted to replace my existing tune on my bike, I said yes, and it started to load the tune I had chosen. If you're not familiar with it, this process is called flashing.



After about 5 minutes it was done, and it told me to power off the bike for 10 seconds. After 10 seconds I turned the bike on and fired it up. The engine sounded good; the exhaust sounded awesome! I revved the engine and there were no backfires. I took the Road King out for a test ride and the exhaust

was music to my ears compared to the stock exhaust. Everything sounded good except for small backfires on deceleration at higher RPM's. There is a manual tune option on the Power Vision 3 which allows you to ride the bike with the tuner hooked up and it analyzes the data from your O2 sensors and makes small changes to the fuel management system on your bike. I went for a longer ride which included slow speeds and highway speeds using the manual tune setting until I was happy with the data collected. I saved it to the tuner and re-flashed the bike again with the new data. It took care of the backfires I was getting, and I have no complaints. I feel satisfied with the upgrades to my




bike. There are other excellent brands out there on the market you should keep in mind if you plan to do similar upgrades to your bike. Do research based on your needs and wants, nothing is cheap anymore so fall back on the old' "measure twice and cut once" mentality. Wrenching

on your own bike can save you a lot of money but try not to bite off more than you can chew.



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
