CHAPLAIN CHARLIES CORNER: GIFTS FOR THE ROAD: WHAT THE WISE MEN STILL TEACH US ABOUT THE RIDE

he holidays have a way of sneaking up on bikers. One minute we're squeezing in those last cold-weather miles, and the next minute winter hits us so hard we're wondering if heated grips can be retrofitted onto our recliners. But even in December, when most of our machines are tucked under covers. We riders understand Christmas differently than most. We know something about journeys, purpose, faith, and what it means to follow a light through dark places.

So, when the old Christmas story brings up the wise men and their long ride across the desert, we get it. These weren't three guys wandering through a greeting card, they were travelers. Road warriors of their era. Their bikes just happened to have hooves.

What they carried with them, and why, still speaks to anyone who knows what it feels like to follow a road that calls to you.

The Ride to Bethlehem

Those wise men didn't just ride across town. They likely traveled hundreds of miles through rocky terrain, desert winds, unpredictable weather, and roads that made Michigan potholes look civilized. But they kept going because they believed something meaningful waited at the end.

Riders understand that mindset. Sometimes you follow a road not because it's easy or logical but because something in your spirit says, "This is the way." You trust the light, the gut feeling, the direction God nudges you, even when the route looks impossible on the map.

Gold: Honoring the King

Gold was the first gift they laid down. Not a financial tip, not a souvenir, gold symbolized royalty. Authority. Identity.

As riders, we understand honoring someone worthy. We respect those who've led the way. We nod to every biker we pass. We stand tall for those who've sacrificed

Gold reminds us that Jesus is King, on the road, in our homes, in our struggles, and in every mile marker of our lives. It means your past roads don't disqualify you. Your scars don't define you. You ride with purpose because you ride with the King.

Frankincense: The Gift of Presence

Next came Frankincense, a symbol of worship and divine presence. Ancient priests used it in the temple, and it meant, "God

Every rider knows something about presence. Not just being alive but feeling alive.

That moment when the wind hits just right.

When the sun paints the tank with gold. When a long stretch of asphalt becomes a prayer without words.

More than once, I've had clearer conversations with God on two wheels than inside any building. The road strips away noise. It leaves space for truth.

Frankincense reminds us that God isn't far away. He's not waiting for you to clean up your life first. He's right here in the garage, in the storm, in the quiet miles, and in the struggles, we don't talk about out loud.

Myrrh: The Hard Roads

Then came myrrh. A strange gift for a newborn, because myrrh was used for burial and suffering. It symbolized sacrifice, specifically Jesus' mission to save.

Riders know something about hard roads. We've lost friends. We've seen pain, both physical and emotional. The holidays are joyful for some, but for others they stir up grief and memories.

Myrrh speaks right into that. It tells us Jesus understands suffering, not from a distance, but

He stepped into a broken world to heal broken people.

Myrrh means: There is hope for those riding through pain.

Why These Gifts Still Matter

When you look at gold, frankincense, and myrrh through a biker's eyes, here's what they say:

Gold \rightarrow You belong to the King.

Frankincense \rightarrow You're never riding alone.

Myrrh \rightarrow Your pain has a Savior, not just a story.

Those gifts weren't random. They were prophecy wrapped in saddle bags. A message that the Savior understood kingship, worship, and sacrifice before He even spoke His first word.

A Christmas Challenge for Riders

Your bike may be parked. The roads may be icy. But your heart can still ride strong this Christmas.

The wise men didn't arrive empty-handed, and neither should we.

Bring the gifts only a rider can offer:

Honor \rightarrow Live with integrity.

Presence \rightarrow Show up for people who need you.

Compassion \rightarrow Look out for the lonely and the hurting.

Those gifts might not smell like Frankincense, but they'll change lives all the same.


Final Miles

YEAH, OR MEH?

Product: TechMount Tech Gripper 4

Also known as: The Biker Gripper (available through the Law Abiding Biker Store or on Amazon)

Reviewer: Big E - Mid Michigan Biker Podcast

When it comes to mounting a phone on your motorcycle, there are plenty of choices out there. The trick is finding one that actually holds up to real-world conditions — Michigan roads, vibration, and weather included. For me, that's been the TechMount Tech Gripper 4, also known as the Biker Gripper when purchased through the Law Abiding Biker Store.

I first discovered this mount while following Ryan Urlacher, the YouTuber and podcaster behind Law Abiding Biker. After watching his videos and hearing how highly he spoke of the mount, I decided to give it a shot. That was four riding seasons ago, and I've been using one ever since.

The Tech Gripper 4 offers a few mounting options. You can go with the handlebar clamp, or my personal favorite — the perch mount that attaches right to your handlebar controls. It's a clean setup that keeps your phone accessible without cluttering your bars.

My Samsung Galaxy S23 Ultra fits perfectly in the mount, and even after thousands of miles, I've never experienced vibration damage or the dreaded phone flop. The springloaded grip system holds the phone rock solid — you'd have to work to get it out by accident.

After about four years of use, the ball swivel on my original mount began to loosen up. It still held my phone tight, but the head would sag over time. That's something worth noting for riders who log a lot of miles. This year, I replaced the mount head, and it's back to working perfectly again.

Bottom line: the Tech Gripper 4 is built to last, delivers a strong and stable hold, and has earned its place on my bike. Whether you grab one from Amazon or the Law Abiding Biker Store, it's a solid investment that's proven itself season after season.

Pros & Cons

Pros:

- Holds phone very securely, even on rough roads
- Adjustable perch or handlebar mount options
- Compatible with a wide range of phones, including large models like the S23 Ultra
- · Long-term durability; replacement head available if ball swivel loosens
- Simple, clean design that doesn't clutter handlebars WWW.THUNDERROADSMICHIGAN.COM







- Ball swivel may loosen after a few years of heavy use
- Open cradle leaves phone exposed to rain or road
- Slight bulk from perch mount may interfere with tight handlebar setups

Final verdict:

Yeah. The Tech Gripper 4 has earned my trust. Even after four years of use and one replacement part, it's still my go-to mount — and I don't see that changing anytime soon. It just plain works.

Life is short bikers, so get after it.

he bike was a beautiful,
magnificent disaster. Under a
thick coat of road grime, lake dust,
and a fine layer of fried onion rings, it was
impossible to tell that the custom cruiser

HOW HARLEY TOOK ITS SOUL BACK: The Real Story Behind November 1990

ost people talk about Harley Davidson like it has always been this unbreakable symbol of American grit. Truth is, there was a stretch of time when the Motor Company was bleeding out on the shop floor. The late seventies and early eighties were rough. Riders loved the brand, but even the loyal ones were carrying drip pans and praying their bikes made it home.

Then November of 1990 showed up and everything changed. That month marked the moment Harley took full control of its future, tightened the bolts on its identity, and proved that American steel still had something to say.

Let's dig into the moment Harley grabbed its pride back and punched its way into a new era.

The AMF Hangover

AMF bought Harley in 1969. At first people thought it would be a good thing. Big money, big backing, big future. By the late seventies that dream was about as stable as a bike with the axle only finger tight.

Production was fast, sloppy, and held together by luck. Mechanics joked that every Harley came with two warranties. One for the engine and one for the oil stains in your garage. Riders stayed loyal because the brand was in their blood, but the frustration was real.

The Buyback and the Rebuild

In 1981 a small group of Harley executives pulled off a buyback. They basically said, alright enough of this circus. They took the reins and started rebuilding the company from the inside. It was not sexy. It was not instant. It was a grind.

This crew poured themselves into improving manufacturing, training workers, listening to riders, and tightening every single part of the process. The Evolution engine had already shown promise in 1984, but it was November of 1990 when everything clicked.

That month marked the true heartbeat of the Harley turnaround. The company rolled out a refined lineup powered by the Evo and built with a level of care the brand had not seen in a

Why November 1990 Mattered Dependability Finally Arrived

The new Evo powered bikes were smoother, cooler running, and far more reliable. Riders were hitting highways with confidence instead of fear. For the first time in a while, you could roll out for a weekend trip without packing a full set of gaskets and a lucky rabbit's foot.

American Manufacturing Got a Big Win

Harley upgraded every part of its production process. New machines, better training, tighter tolerances. It was a full commitment to earning trust back. For a lot of riders this moment felt like America itself had straightened its spine. It said we can still build something that makes the rest of the world pay attention.

Riders Returned in Force

Word spread fast. Harley is back. Dealerships got busier. Riders who had jumped over to Japanese bikes started drifting back. The culture swelled. This was the decade that shaped modern Harley culture. The patches, the clubs, the rallies, the pride. It all got a major shot of adrenaline right here.

It Saved More Than a Brand

This is the part people forget. If Harley had gone under in the eighties, cruiser culture as we know it would not exist. The entire American V twin identity would look different. No Road Glides, no Dynas, no Softail Fat Boy rolling into Terminator 2. No sound that makes your chest vibrate. No shared language of chrome, leather, and loyalty.

November 1990 kept the heartbeat alive.

What That Means Today

When you ride a Harley now, you are riding the result of a comeback story that almost did not happen. Every rumble, every ride, every mile traces back to the moment the company decided to take its soul back and rebuild it with pride instead of shortcuts.

Iright ya two wheeled fanatics! Got some news from the Indian Motorcycles camp. They're dialing up the **Scout** lineup for 2026 with a couple of sportier versions: the **Sport Scout** RT and the smaller Sport Scout Sixty.

The New Kids on the Block

These aren't full-blown, built-from-scratch bikes, but they're cool updates to existing models, joining the refreshed Scout family we started seeing in 2024. This all happens as Indian's parent company, Polaris, is getting ready to hand over their controlling stake to a private equity firm called Carolwood LP early in 2026. As most of you know.

2026 Indian Sport Scout RT: The Big Dog

- This one's the heavy hitter, weighing in at **568 lbs wet**.
- It rocks Indian's larger 1250cc liquid-cooled V-twin
- Power-wise, you're looking at a claimed 105 HP and 82 ft-lbs of torque, all paired with a six-speed transmission.





- It comes in three colors—**Black Smoke** (starting price: \$16,999), Sunset Red Metallic, and Chalk.
- The RT's standout feature is the rigid, locking saddlebags, which are supposedly waterproof and offer about 37-38 liters of storage. For a fun visual, that's roughly 10 gallons of volume—enough to hypothetically stash about 48 cans of your favorite beverage on each side! (Seriously, imagine the haul!). Just be ready for the extra 80+ lbs that full cargo would add.







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• Finishing the look: a small front fairing, flat handlebars on 140mm risers, forward controls, and a 19-inch front wheel. Despite the "Sport" name, that setup screams straight-line cruising.



2026 Indian Sport Scout Sixty: The Starter Sporty

- This bike is aimed at folks who are newer to the riding game, with a starting price of \$11,499.
- It shares a similar chiseled style to the RT but differs with the 999cc motor.





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· You get a claimed 85 HP and 65 lb. ft of torque, hooked up to a five-speed manual gearbox vs the 6-speed on the RT.



It weighs a bit less at 549 lbs. ready to roll,

and doesn't include the stock luggage bags of the RT.

- Both the RT and the Sixty share the same 41mm forks and adjustable shocks, plus the same size single front disc brake.
- The Sixty sits the same as the RT with its 25.7 in seat height.
- It's only available in Black Metallic unless you step up to their Limited model. Myself, I find a "blacked-out" bike super cool.
- Like the RT, it has a small front fairing and mini apehanger-style bars.
- Good news for tire enthusiasts: both Sport models come standard with Metzeler Cruisetec tires.

My Takeaway

Honestly, over the past couple of years I've purposely walked through more than one Indian dealership when given the chance. I've found myself seriously thinking about an Indian more and more. I'd like to think of myself as a Harley guy for life (no way I'm ditching my current rides), but man, those Pursuit Elite and Limited models are looking sweet!

Even though I'm not actively shopping for another cruiser, the 2026 release announcements have grabbed my attention. This month's head-to-head between the Sport Scout Sixty and the Sport Scout RT sparked my curiosity and also encouraged me to dig a little more into comparing them both to a couple of H-D offerings for 2026. Staying focused between the two bikes in this Two Wheel Takeaway, I'd just stick with the Sixty's "good enough" looks for the cost difference. If I were to push myself to the pricing of the RT, I'd have to seriously consider what else is out there in the market and do another Takeaway. Like the Harley-Davidson **Sportster S**, which seems like a more direct category rival.

Check in with your local American Legion Riders, Combat Veterans Motorcycle Association (CVMA), or Rolling Thunder chapter. Whether it's helping a family in need or just swapping stories over a cup of hot coffee, you're part of a community that rides together—even when the engines are quiet.

This season, take pride not just in your service, but in the roads you've traveled and the ones still ahead. The freedom we fought for is the same freedom we feel in the saddle.

So, as the snow starts to fall, remember: the road will thaw, the sun will rise, and spring will call us back to the wind. Until then, keep the spirit alive, look out for your brothers and sisters, and ride safe—whether it's on two wheels or just in your heart.
