

CHAPLAIN CHARLIE'S CORNER: SOMETIMES WE HIT "PAUSE"

t was an ordinary evening at the Sanford American Legion, where I had come to attend an American Legion Riders event. The place carried that familiar mix of laughter, camaraderie, and the smell of coffee lingering in the air.

As I was walking through the event hall, I noticed two ladies hard at work. They weren't there for our Riders gathering—they were preparing the room for the next day's burger night. Tables had to be shifted, chairs stacked and unstacked, and the whole space arranged just right before the grill fired up tomorrow.

Now, I don't know about you, but I have a hard time walking past someone working without jumping in. Something in me just won't allow it. I thought: I can't let them handle all this alone. So I joined them—grabbing tables, stacking chairs, hauling things around until the hall was ready for the next night's crowd.

It felt good in the moment. Helping out always does. But the next morning, that's when life changed.

The Pain That Presses "Pause"

I woke up the next day with my right shoulder aching deep near the blade, my arm tingling like it had fallen asleep, and shooting pains running down into my hand. My index finger was completely numb—like someone had pulled the plug.

Now, every biker knows our bodies carry wear and tear. Long rides, wrenching on bikes, and years of wind and weather leave their marks. But this wasn't just muscle soreness. This was different. My body was sounding an alarm: Stop. Something's wrong.

I ended up in the ER, and before I knew it, I was staying overnight for tests. The verdict? A nerve problem in my neck. Suddenly, lifting tables and chairs wasn't even possible. Riding my trike? Out of the question.

And just like that, life hit the "pause" button.

The Frustration of the Pause

For those of us who ride, the rhythm of the road is part of who we are. There's freedom in the rumble of the Harley, therapy in the miles rolling by, and a kind of quiet prayer in the wind pressing against your shoulders. It resets the soul.

So, when the ride gets taken away—not by winter, not by choice, but by your own body—it stings. It feels unfair, like someone has stolen your lifeline.

But faith reminds us of something deeper: in God's hands, even an unwanted pause can serve a purpose.

God's Perfect Timing

Ecclesiastes 3:1 tells us: "There is a time for everything, and a season for every activity under the heavens."

Looking back, I can see God's timing even in this interruption. This problem showed up right as wedding season—the busiest stretch of my year—was wrapping up. If it had struck a month earlier, I would've been in real trouble. But here it was, arriving at a time when I actually had room to slow down, meet with doctors, and focus on healing.

That's not luck. That's God's hand at work.

What feels like a roadblock to us often turns out to be a pit stop in God's plan. He knows the road ahead better than we do.

A Lesson from the Shop

Think of it like wrenching in the garage. None of us would hit the highway knowing our brakes are shot, our tires are bald, or our oil's running low. You could try to push through, but disaster is just around the bend.

The wise rider pauses. Fixes the problem. Then rides out safe and

God deals with us the same way. Sometimes He flashes the warning lights. Sometimes, He takes away the keys. Not as punishment—but as protection.

What the Pause Teaches

This "pause" has already been teaching me a few things I think we all need to remember:

We're not invincible. Psalm 39:4 says: "Show me, Lord, my life's end and the number of my days; let me know how fleeting my life is." Every ride is a gift. Each day is borrowed time.

Pride gets us in trouble. I thought I was helping by moving those tables, but if I'm honest, pride was pushing me too. I didn't want to look lazy while others worked. Sometimes wisdom means saying no, not yes.

Slowing down opens your eyes. When you're forced to stop, you notice what you usually ride past—family, friendships, even your own need for God's grace.

The Takeaway

So here I am, sidelined for a while. My trike's parked, my right arm isn't cooperating, and my plans look a lot different than what I wanted. But God is still good.

Pauses aren't the end of the ride. They're part of it. Every long haul has fuel stops, detours, and breaks on the shoulder to check the map. Life is no different. God knows when we need those breaks.

This Month's Next Step

Maybe you're in a pause yourself—health issues, job stress, family struggles, or just plain burnout. Don't waste it. Don't resent it. Ask God: What do You want me to see in this season?

Use the time to rest, repair, and refocus. Call someone you haven't checked in on. Open your Bible and let His promises settle in. And when the pause ends, you'll ride out stronger, steadier, and maybe even more grateful for every mile.

Closing





RONNIE

I started riding motorcycles when I was a eighteen and like many, I started off on sport bikes with my buddies. The last one I owned was a Honda CBR 900 which was stupid fast and even though I didn't make the switch to Harley's until this one, I never shook the need for speed. I

I've ridden it to Sturgis, Florida a few times, the Tail of the Dragon, and through other states to get there. I just got back from Missouri from a trip with friends. I'd say my favorite place I've ridden so far is Connecticut. It was beautiful and I would love to go back!



Like I said, I ride the bike. Since the start of 600 miles from when I got it, I'm now over 40, 000 miles. Right now, it's in the shop to have a fork seal leak fixed that happened along the way home from Missouri. I'm hoping to have it back soon so that I can still make a trip up



















to the Tunnel of Trees this fall. If the bike is ready, my son and I may try to sneak back down to the Dragon soon. Next year, Colorado is on our bucket list.

A LOT of things have been done on the bike. I've switched out the bags after being painted to a different set, (still have the old ones) had some Arlen Ness accessories added, and had the front and rear wheels changed on top of the motor and paint work. Only thing left to do is the stereo system. I love showing off my bike and people love seeing it when I do. I've entered it into a handful of bike shows including the Thunder Roads Michigan Bike Show in July at Friday Night Bikes in Lapeer where I took first place for my category. I've had some good feedback and have been fortunate to take home some awesome trophies. One being more recent and that is so tall that it barely fits in my garage.

YEAH, OR MEH?

Nelson Rigg NR300 Route 1 Travel Bag BY BIG E

¶hen it comes to long trips on a touring bike, having the right luggage can make or break your ride. For my nine-day Tennessee adventure, I picked up the Nelson Rigg NR300 Route 1 Travel Bag, designed for Harley-Davidson Touring bikes (or really any touring setup). I originally bought this bag anticipating some two-up traveling, but ended up running it solo — and that gave me some interesting insight into how it performs.



Room for Days

The first thing I noticed was how spacious this bag is. I had no trouble packing everything I needed for the trip, with room to spare. If you're the type to overpack, or just like having a little extra space, this bag delivers.

On the Road

Mounted up, the NR300 was easy to secure. The included straps worked great, and Nelson Rigg even added elastic holders to keep the extra strap ends tucked away — a small but thoughtful detail. Riding one-up, I did notice some drag from the wind tugging on the bag. My guess is that with a passenger, the airflow would be different and that issue would be reduced. Not a dealbreaker, but worth mentioning if you usually ride solo.

Rain or Shine

One of my favorite features was the included rainfly. It's not only well-made, but it attaches directly to the bag and actually works with the rack straps to stay locked in place. That's a smart design. My only gripe? The openings for



securing the rainfly could be a little bigger. It takes some effort to connect everything just right — but once it's on, it's solid. Add in the ability to lock the bag itself, and you get an extra layer of

security when you're parked.

Bang for the Buck

Here's the kicker — I found this bag on Amazon at a great price. For what you get, I honestly think this is one of the most underrated trunk bags out there. Nelson Rigg packed in a ton of features, gave it a practical design, and kept it affordable compared to some of the bigger-name brands.

Pros & XCons at a Glance **Pros:**

- ✓ Spacious interior with plenty of packing room
- ✓ Easy to secure with smart strap management
- ✓ Rainfly integrates with the rack straps and stays put
- ✓ Lockable for extra security
- Excellent price-to-feature ratio

Cons:

- X Rainfly openings could be larger for easier attachment
- X Can create noticeable wind drag when riding solo

Gear Score: 8.5/10

Solid choice for anyone looking for luggage that balances price, features, and practicality.

Verdict: Yeah!

Michigan has a strong community of veterans and riders who support them, especially in the fall when charity rides and memorial events are common. Here's how you can combine both:

Fall Rides That Support Veterans in Michigan

1. Patriot Ride

- Multiple locations, often SE Michigan
- A fundraising ride to support veteran organizations like Fisher House, Wounded Warrior Project, and local shelters.
- Usually happens in early fall. Includes a police escort, flag ceremonies, and food.

2. Ride for the Red (American Red Cross - Service to the Armed Forces)

- Varies by year often Grand Rapids or Lansing area
- Supports emergency assistance for military families and veterans.
- Family-friendly and often tied to community events or car shows.

3. Michigan VFW or American Legion Charity Rides

- Held by local posts across the state
- Many VFW and American Legion posts host poker runs and scenic rides to raise funds for veteran support.
- Call or check Facebook pages of local posts to find dates (especially in fall).

4. Run for the Fallen / POW-MIA Awareness Rides

- Upper and Northern Michigan
- Honors Michigan's fallen service members and raises awareness for
- Usually includes memorial stops and veteran speakers.

Other Ways to Support While Riding

- **Donate per mile:** Some riders pledge a certain amount per mile to a veteran charity during a fall ride.
- Wear patches or display flags: Many groups appreciate visible support like POW-MIA flags or "Support Our Veterans" gear.
- Ride with veteran groups: Some veteran MCs (like American Legion Riders) welcome civilians to ride in solidarity during public events.
- **Stop at veteran-owned businesses:** Especially in small Michigan towns—many have veteran-owned diners, shops, or repair garages.

Sample Fall Ride Plan: "Ride for Vets" Tour **Best Fall Motorcycle Routes in Michigan:**

1. Tunnel of Trees (M-119)

- Harbor Springs to Cross Village
- Hugging the Lake Michigan shoreline, this narrow, winding road is lined with dense trees that blaze with fall color.
- Must-stop: Legs Inn in Cross Village for Polish food and killer views.

2. US-2 - Upper Peninsula

- St. Ignace to Manistique or beyond
- ~90+ miles
- Combines forest and sweeping Lake Michigan views. Smooth pavement and very light traffic.
- Stop at: Cut River Bridge overlook.

3. M-22 Scenic Route

- Manistee → Frankfort → Sleeping Bear Dunes → Traverse City
- ~116 miles (or longer if you explore side routes)
- Rolling hills, shorelines, wineries, and small towns. Insanely beautiful
- Detour: Pierce Stocking Scenic Drive in Sleeping Bear.

4. Huron National Forest Loop

- Start from Oscoda or Mio
- Loop through forests, lakes, and quiet towns. The tree canopy here

is breathtaking in October.

• Great for riders who like less traffic and more nature.

5. Black River National Forest Scenic Byway

- Near Ironwood (Western UP)
- Waterfalls, tall pines, and some elevation changes. Very remote, but
- Combine with a visit to Lake of the Clouds in Porcupine Mountains.

Fall Riding Tips

- Dress in layers: Temps can swing 30°F from morning to afternoon.
- Watch for wet leaves: Especially in corners—slippery like ice.
- Fill up early: Gas stations in the UP and rural areas may be far apart or closed.
- Bring a clear visor or sunglasses: Low sun angles and glare can be
- · Avoid dusk: Deer are very active in the fall.
